ADVANCING CLIMATE & ENERGY PLANNING

- Assisted San Diego County Office of Emergency Services and local districts to incorporate extreme
 heat, drought, and coastal flooding in the 2015 San Diego Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan.
- Partnered with SDG&E and SANDAG to promote energy efficiency funding and strategies to cities in the region through the San Diego Regional Energy Partnership.
- Provided grant application support to coastal cities applying for sea-level rise planning funding.
- Provided capacity to local agencies for GHG inventory updates and implementation of various Climate Action Plan measures such as alternative transportation, energy efficiency retrofits, and trainings through the Americorps CivicSpark program.

RAISING THE PROFILE OF REGIONAL LEADERSHIP

- 8 Climate Collaborative Members attended and presented at the first annual California Adaptation Forum in August in Sacramento.
- Interim Mayor Todd Gloria recognized the efforts of The Climate Collaborative in his plenary speech at the Climate Leadership Conference in February.
- Climate Collaborative hosted a sold-out Sea Level Rise Boat Tour for conference attendees.

- The Climate Collaborative Manager was invited to speak at the San Diego Civic Leaders for Engagement Forum, sponsored by The San Diego Foundation.

- The Climate Collaborative was invited to a Sustainable Communities Leadership Academy in Washington,
 D.C. hosted by Institute for Sustainable Cities. We were one of nine collaboratives in the nation to attend and share strategies for supporting local climate planning and energy efficiency initiatives.
- The Climate Collaborative co-hosted a Southern California workshop on State Energy and Climate related policies, including the new Safeguarding California Plan (California's Climate Adaptation Plan).
