Overview

The University of San Diego is a dynamic Catholic institution of higher education located on 180 acres overlooking San Diego's Mission Bay.

Chartered in 1949, USD enrolls nearly 5,300 students who may choose from more than 50 undergraduate and graduate degree programs. The University's academic units include the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Schools of Business Administration, Education, Law, Nursing, and Graduate and Continuing Education.

Throughout its history, USD has remained committed to the ideals of liberal education and to recognizing the dignity of men and women as human beings and as creatures of God. As a Catholic institution, the University is committed to examination of the Catholic tradition as the basis of a continuing search for meaning in contemporary life.

The 16th century Spanish architectural style of the campus buildings and the beautiful campus grounds create a pleasant atmosphere for both students and visitors. The blue dome of the Immaculata Church on campus is a San Diego landmark.

USD offers a year-round calendar of concerts, art exhibitions and lectures open to the public. Its men's and women's sports teams compete against national opponents in campus sports facilities.

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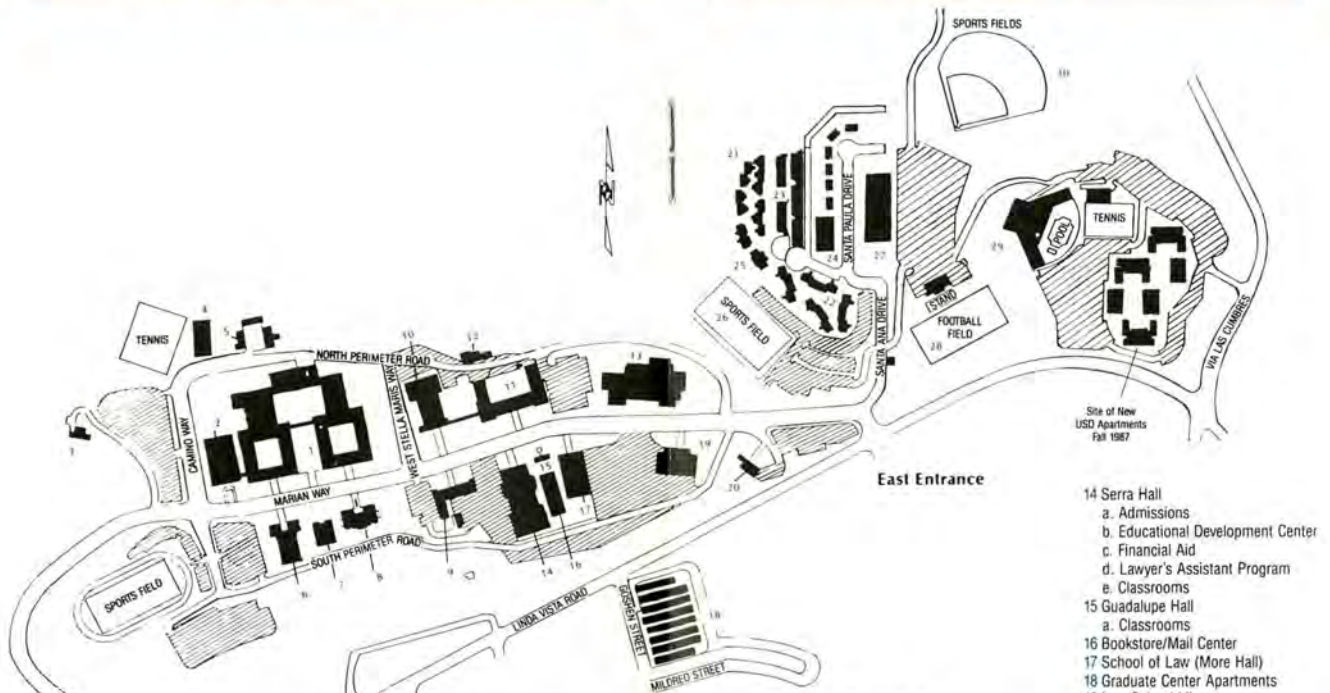

THE CAMPUS



Facilities

USD's 180-acre campus is located atop a mesa overlooking San Diego's Mission Bay, just off of Interstates 5 and 8. The campus includes 60 buildings designed in 16th century Spanish-style architecture.

The upper campus includes all of the University's administrative and classroom facilities. Located at the east end of campus are the Mission housing complex; graduate student apartments; and the Sports Center, containing an Olympic-size swimming pool, gymnasium, stadium, tennis courts, weightlifting area and playing fields.

Recently constructed facilities include Olin Hall (1984), home to the School of Business Administration, the Douglas F. Manchester Executive Conference Center (1984) and the Helen K. and James S. Copley Library (1984).

Currently under construction is the University Center, a 74,500-square-foot facility which will house dining, meeting and office areas. The center will open in 1986. Construction recently began on a 154-unit student apartment complex near the Sports Center.
