September, 1955—College at last! In the first few frantic days wise and generous big sisters were a beacon in the darkness. It was to thank them that the Class of 1959 first tried its wings in a production for the whole student body. Under the chairmanship of Linda Hope and Angel Kraemer, the Freshman Follies opened on Hallowe'en afternoon, and the student body has been laughing ever since. In fact, our theme song might still be "We are Specimens Not Found in the Book."

The weeks sped quickly by: the first midterms, the Harvest Dance, the Christmas Ball, and finally a vacation to prepare for final examinations. Shortly before Christmas we elected permanent class officers: President Sandra Schwarzman, Vice President Angel Kraemer, Secretary Patricia Mulcahy, and Treasurer Margaret Farrell, who worked with our counselor Mother Furay.

At the start of the second semester we tried our social wings by presenting a Valentine Dance. Gay heart-shaped piñatas hung from the Rose Room ceiling.

Spring meant a series of firsts—first Bal des Fleurs, first graduation, and the first class reunion, a breakfast at the La Valencia Hotel in La Jolla. We had bid farewell to our senior big sisters at a beach party at La Jolla Shores earlier in the month.

That fall we were sophomores. Angel Kraemer took over as president, and her assistants were Madelyn Lo Piccolo, Mimi Zolezzi, and Patricia Mulcahy. Mother Campbell was our new class counselor. We had our first little sisters, and we tried to do as much for them as our big sisters had done for us.

In October came another first for USD—we fielded a football team, and our first opponent was the U.S. Air Force Academy. Throughout the fall months we cheered the Pioneer's initial efforts. Our high point of the year was the Bal des Fleurs at which we honored the seniors. Masses of

baby orchids in pearly abalone shells decorated the dining hall, and a huge fan-shaped shell formed a backdrop for the orchestra.

We returned in the fall of 1957—upperclassmen at last! Mother Kraemer was our new counselor and Kathy Seabrook wielded the president's gavel. She was assisted by Vice President Mimi Zolezzi, Secretary Dorothy Tato, and Treasurer Varian Benjamin. Former President Angel Kraemer had been elected Recording Secretary of the student body. Our first get-together was a beach party in La Jolla, then our social chairmen, Madelyn Lo Piccolo and Patricia Mulcahy, organized the Autumn Leaves dance in November.

All too soon spring, was upon us, and our summer fashion show, soon to be followed by examinations and graduation. The year ended with the University Ball at the Mission Valley Country Club, and our class reunion at the Town and Country Hotel.

When we returned in September we were mighty seniors. To start the social year the class presented the opening dance, Carribean Cruise, on the Palm Court. On the fifth of December we presented the annual Christmas Ball in the Circus Room of the Hotel del Coronado. The student body proclaimed the first off-campus formal "the best ever". Happy seniors were very proud. The proudest should have been our officers: President Celia Fountain, Vice President Susana Jimenez, Secretary Jean Hicks, and Treasurer Cecilia Merino. Of course, our Counselor Mother McShane gave invaluable assistance.

With graduation we will leave our college by the sea with sadness, for Alcalá Park is part of us, and we part of Alcalá. We have watched our campus grow, and we have grown with it. In years to come our thoughts will return to SDCW even if we cannot ourselves, for we are all one with the bond of the Sacred Heart holding us always close.

CLASS HISTORY

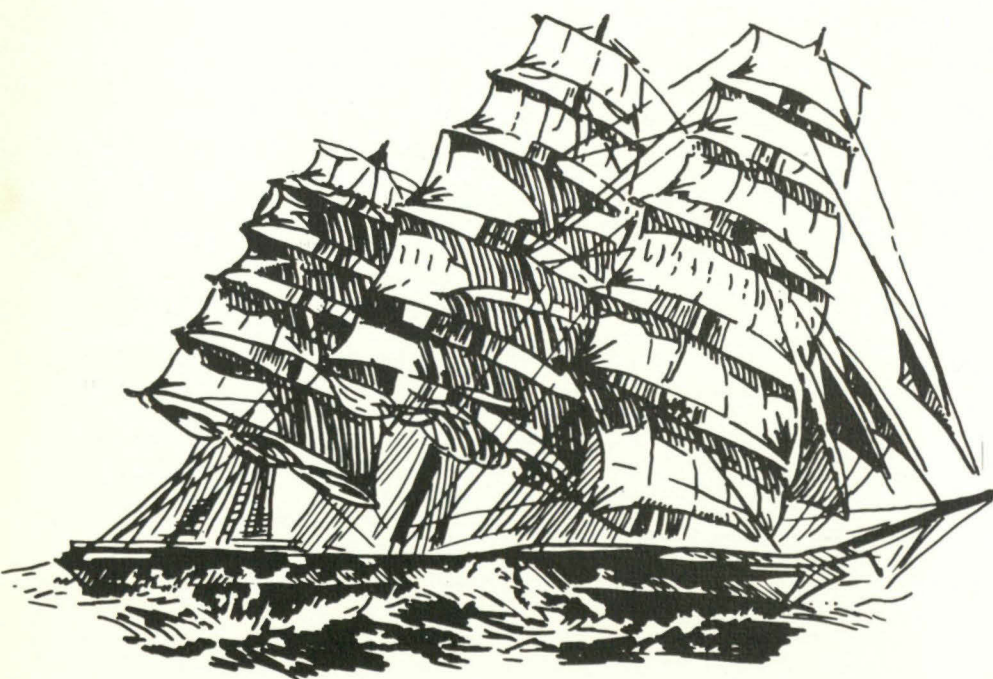

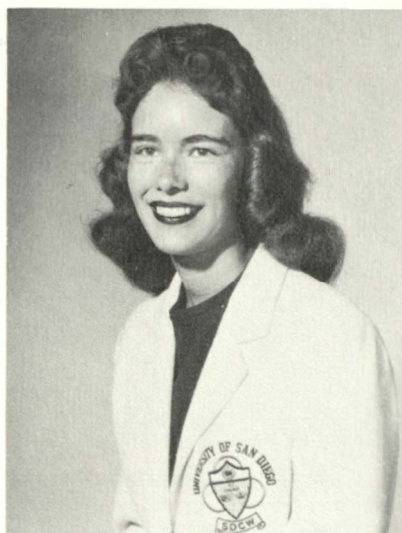
The Class of '62 enthusiastically supported such college projects as football cheering, the Seventh Annual Christmas Pageant, and the newly organized Catechetical Guild.

This Seventh Annual presentation highlighted the distinctive melodies and national costumes through which the people of various lands have worshipped the Christ-Child and celebrated His Birthday. After a reverent portrayal of the angel's message to the shepherds and a brilliant Nativity scene, the Pageant of the Nations represented dramatically the Austrian custom of the Advent wreath, while the Choral Club accompanied the scene by singing the ancient Advent hymn, "Rorate Coeli".
