

## Businessmen Named As USD Trustees



Colachis is President of the J. W. Colachis Company, a real estate investment and management firm with holdings in California and Arizona. He is also President of J. C. Resorts, which owns and operates the Surf & Sand Hotel in Laguna Beach and the Inn at Rancho Bernardo. He maintains partnership equities in the Grossmont Shopping Center in La Mesa.


Born and educated in Phoenix, Colachis received a degree in Engineering from the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. He is a member of the La Jolla Town Council and the La

Jolla "Civic Round Table." He was recently honored by the Rancho Bernardo Town Council for his contribution toward "Symphony on the Green."

Derbes is President of the Signal Companies, Inc. A native of Cincinnati, he graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1952 with a B.S. in Engineering. In 1963, he received an MBA degree in Management and Marketing from Xavier University in Cincinnati. Derbes was employed for 24 years as an engineer and manager with the Garrett Corporation, one of the Signal Companies, becoming a vice president in 1979. ## Summer School Courses Offered

USD's Summer School sessions began on June 1 and will run through August 24. Additional sessions will begin on June 22, July 13, and August 3.

Tuition fees are \$135 per unit of credit for undergraduates. A half-price rate for clergy of all faiths and auditors is available. Graduate-level tuition fees are \$140 and \$155 per unit of credit. Room and board are available on campus. Pre-enrollment is requested; for details, call 293-4585.

The College of Arts and Sciences will offer 44 courses, including Photography, Exploring Religious Meaning, History of Jazz, Computer Fundamentals, and Intermediate Spanish.

Seventeen evening courses offered by the School of Business Administration will focus on: Financial Management, Group Dynamics and Leader-

ship, Estate Planning, and Executive Career Development.

The School of Education offers 38 courses, including off-campus fieldwork, as well as on-campus studies. Topics include: Principalship, Group Counseling, Curriculum and Methods of Teaching, Learning Disabilities, Research Methodology, and School Finance.

The Philip Y. Hahn School of Nursing offers two courses: Perinatal Nursing: Theory and Application and the Nurse and the Law.

Several specialized courses are offered including: an undergraduate Paralegal Studies program; a liberal arts summer program in Guadalajara, Mexico; an Historic Site Archaeology Technician certificate program; an LSAT preparation course; and summer law programs in Guadalajara, London and Paris.

## Administrative Law College Set June 24-27

The Administrative Law College of the California State Bar will present a program for government-employed advocates and adjudicators at USD June 24 through June 27.

Registration of \$290 includes tuition, lodging, meals, and materials. Pre-registration is requested. For details, call USD's Office of Continuing Education at 293-4585.

Although the session is primarily for governmental employees (including administrative law judges, hearing officers, and members of boards and

commissions), privately-employed advocates and adjudicators may enroll.

A workshop format with small groups led by experienced instructors will be used. Students will be assigned either to Advocate training or Adjudicator training, depending on background and interest. Topics covered will include: hearsay in administrative hearings, evidence, prehearing and hearing procedure, making an administrative record, administrative and appellate review, and legal writing.

## Alumni Invited To Give Input In Gen.Ed. Review

Alumni are being invited to participate in a review of undergraduate General Education courses by Dr. Joseph Pusateri, Dean, College of Arts and Sciences.

In its "Statement of Principles," approved by the University Senate, the "indispensable qualities" for a USD student to attain are: communications and comprehension skills; knowledge of the historic, economic, and sociopolitical functioning of society; awareness of science and the world of nature; acquaintance with the arts; perspective on cultures other than one's own; and a concern with the questions of theology and philosophy.

Additionally, three subcommittees have been formed to deal with: review of "Core skills: mathematics, languages, communications skills; Review of distribution requirements in philosophy, religious studies, the humanities, and the sciences; Investigation of a possible "Integrated Learning Component," a multidisciplinary approach.

The subcommittees seek input from alumni and members of the USD community. The full committee will present its findings for approval by the faculty and the Board of Trustees. Mail suggestions to Dean Pusateri, College of Arts and Sciences. Deadline: September 1981.

## Woman Of The Year



## Associated Alumnae Of The Sacred Heart









Our daughter Susan will graduate from the University of San Diego in May, having completed all of her studies toward a B.A. in History in three and one-half years. She is an excellent student and we are proud of her academic accomplishments at USD.

The small class atmosphere and outstanding faculty have stimulated and challenged her intellectual capabilities and personal growth. We have especially appreciated the special teacher-interest that extends beyond the classroom even into the teachers' homes on special occasions. Such warm attitudes and friendly socializing from faculty members encourage the student in many positive ways. It is obvious to us that Susan has a good personal feeling and relationship about her teachers and classes.

Susan's advisors and professors in her major field of history have been encouraging and instrumental in directing her college career in the light of her abilities. This faculty concern has given her confidence in the pattern of her curriculum development. She has been provided with opportunities for special projects on research levels and this work has taken her into the community and provided first-hand insights into the historical development of San Diego.

The religious and philosophical discipline at USD helps to strengthen and crystallize moral convictions. We were happy with the encouragement Susan received when she entered USD in January, 1978. She had been rejected from UCSD because of her refusal to pay mandatory registration fees that covered abortion funding for the students. (The case, Erzinger, et al. vs UCSD Regents is now being appealed in the Federal Court.)

The beauty of the campus setting, the lovely buildings, and grounds, the Seminary and Chapel all contribute to make USD an inspirational place to matriculate. Both Susan and we are grateful for the fine education she has received while attending USD. USD is tops on our list!

### Business School Joins Beta Gamma Sigma

On May 17, twenty-nine charter members were inducted into the newly installed USD Chapter of Beta Gamma Sigma, the national business scholastic honorary fraternity. Dean Allan R. Bailey, SDSU, represented the national organization.

The first honorary member inducted as a charter member was San Diego businessman Larry Lawrence, Chairman of the Del Coronado Corporation. Mr. Lawrence, a member of the USD Business School Advisory Board, spoke to the group on the positive future of USD. He emphasized that USD's fully accredited School of Business is prepared to fill a growing community need for a second major school of business.

USD became eligible to form a Beta Gamma Sigma Chapter once the undergraduate program was accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB). There are approximately 153 chapters nationwide and membership is based on scholastic achievement and moral character. The major criteria

are: juniors must be in the top five percent of their class; seniors in the top ten percent; and MBA-candidates in the top twenty percent of their graduating class. Faculty must have completed three years as full-time business school faculty members.






### Sister McHugh Retires



The 24th Commencement of the School of Law took place at 10:30 a.m., May 24, with degrees conferred on 283 graduates. The class included recipients of the first Masters of Comparative Law degrees to be awarded by USD. Ed Meese III, Counselor to President Reagan, was Commencement Speaker and an honorary degree recipient. Meese is on leave from USD's faculty and the Directorship of the Center for Criminal Justice Policy and Management.

The Undergraduate/Graduate Commencement was held at 3 p.m., with Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger addressing the ceremony. Four hundred undergraduates and 130 graduates were eligible to receive degrees.

Among the undergraduates, 66% of those receiving degrees were women, and 34% men. Among the law graduates, 66% were men, and 34% women.

**EXCERPTS FROM COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS BY LAW SCHOOL VALEDICTORIAN THOMAS MUNDELL:**

"It is customary at graduations for the valedictorian to express the collective thanks of the graduating class to those who have made this day possible. Of course, we are all deeply indebted to the Officers of the University, the Law School administration, and particularly to the law faculty — who tormented us, and teased us, who sometimes bored us, and sometimes entertained us, but who, above all, educated us. To all of you — thank you. There is another group which I haven't mentioned. Those close to us who suffered through Law School right along with us, who made sacrifices of their own so we could get through . . . parents, grandparents, spouses,

children, brothers and sisters, aunts and uncles, and friends. You all helped!" (picture, page 3)

**EXCERPTS FROM COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS GIVEN BY COUNSELOR TO THE PRESIDENT EDWIN MEESE:**

"It is a difficult time for the law profession, and you must concentrate on ethical responsibility, criminal law practice, and legal services to the poor to turn around negative impressions about the profession. New lawyers should maintain a high degree of professional responsibility, integrity, and discipline.

Watch out how you practice law and who you associate with. Make your work an individual statement.

Criminal law is too important to be left entirely to the attorneys specializing in that field. All lawyers should participate in producing effective law enforcement for the protection of citizens and should work toward making better prisons and jails.

Lawyers should work toward ensuring access to justice for citizens. Legal services to the poor is one of the most important responsibilities a lawyer has.

During the past 15 years, we have been willing to leave this task to the legal services' groups. I hope you will be among those pioneers with new solutions.

To do this, law school must not be just a place to graduate from. Law school must be a place where graduates return on a much greater scale than today to build on the law center concept and clinical programs.

Welcome to the law. It's a great profession." (See page 2 for list of law school honor graduates.)

**EXCERPTS FROM UNDERGRADUATE/GRADUATE COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS BY FRANKLIN AWARD WINNER, FLINT LEWIS:**

" . . . I can't help but think that I and many other students have not realized just how momentous this occasion really is. It signifies the completion of a process of tremendous importance — a college education . . . I also feel that many of us are not aware just how valuable this education really is. So often we view the decision to come to college as being 'what everyone else is doing' or the other option to getting married. We frequently view it as a means to an end — a pathway to employment or graduate school, but rarely do we say, 'I came here to learn.' Fortunately, the best thing about an education is that we usually get one in spite of ourselves.

. . . I'm speaking of the challenge that confronts each and every one of us who have achieved this education. I feel strongly that we have a responsibility to make our moral decisions from the highest level of knowledge we can reasonably attain. This is our responsibility as graduates, to make use of what we've learned and to continue to learn so that we can handle the tough moral decisions that confront us as individuals and as a society. **EXCERPTS FROM COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS GIVEN BY SECRETARY OF DEFENSE CASPAR W. WEINBERGER:**

" . . . I'm not worried about the pessimist today. This nation has come a long way from our mood a few years ago. The late sixties and seventies was a period of uncertainty and self-doubt in the United States. At times it seemed as though we had forgotten our roots and the things we have stood for as a nation. We sought in vain the goals which had always guided us. As our values were assailed and institutions attacked so our self-confidence waned. We forgot our past, doubted the present, and feared the future.

That time is past. We have looked ourselves over and decided that whatever our imperfections, we are fundamentally sound. As President Reagan has put it, "Americans have begun to dream again of a better future." It is a time of hope and yet it is a time of great challenges. Perhaps our greatest challenge is to protect our regained sense of hope.

For, it must be admitted that our self-doubts were apparent to others who depended on us. And as we lacked self-confidence we neglected our interests in the world which was also changing.

It is especially important that our allies join with us in making the sacrifices which are inseparable from increased levels of defense spending.

The United States is faced now — as we have been for some time — with a very basic decision. If we continue at recent expenditure levels for defense, we will be inferior to the Soviets in a matter of years. The consequences for our security and that of our allies would be extremely grave . . . There is another source of danger, and, in the end, it is of far greater potential . . . That is the danger of our own complacency, of our failure to see what is going on in the world, and to act on it. Throughout our history, observers have remarked on this nation's fundamentally peaceful nature. The reason for this is not hard to grasp. We are as a nation constituted, that is to say, we are made up, of free men and women. We lead our lives by the goals we set for ourselves and that, in a few words, is the kernel of a free society. Obviously there are very few people who would go to war for its own sake, and there is no one who is happy to pay for the tools of war. The result of our attachment to safe and abundant private lives, and the ability to elect a government to encourage this, is that we have historically given a lower priority to defense in peacetime than many other countries . . .

This administration has promised to restore our military and economic strength and President Reagan was elected to carry out that pledge. We shall not waver in our determination . . .

Our goal, our aim, indeed everything we do, is done to secure peace with freedom for ourselves and for all our descendants and to help our allies, who share the same aspirations, to reach the same goal.

Peace with freedom is an indivisible goal, and it is this happy condition — which we have had for so long — that we strive to keep.

Our interests are world-wide, and the threat that we face is also world-wide. We cannot afford to neglect one area to bolster another. We must be strong enough to protect our interests wherever the challenge arises.

We must be strong at home, and the President's economic program now before the Congress is designed to regain that strength for it . . .

Great challenges bring forth the best in nations and they also bring forth the best from individuals. I'm sure that each of you can testify to that from your own experience here. The harder the work, and the more difficult the problem — the more that's asked from you and the more you give — the greater the sense of accomplishment.

It is far better, as Theodore Roosevelt said, to get down in the arena itself and grapple with the issues big and small — with the very stuff of life — than to sit always in the
