Two Given Robes Of Domestic Prelate

Two San Diego monsignors, recently named domestic prelates by the Holy Father, received the robes of their rank from the Most Reverend Bishop.

At ceremonies in St. Rita's Church, Sunday, August 16, His Excellency officiated at the investiture of Rt. Rev. Msgr. John F. Gallagher, JCD, pastor of the parish.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas Egan, JCD, secretary of the Matrimonial Tribunal, was invested in the purple cassock and mantelletta of the prelacy at rites, Wednesday, August 12, in the College for Women Chapel, Alcala Park.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. James T. Booth, JCD, chancellor of the San Diego diocese and pastor of Mission San Diego de Alcala, read the Papal Briefs naming the two priests prelates.

Represented at the investiture of Msgr. Egan as a prelate were the faculties of University of San Diego's College for Women, College for Men, Immaculate Heart Seminary, the staffs of the Bishop's chancery and The Southern Cross, more than 50 monsignors and priests and lay friends.

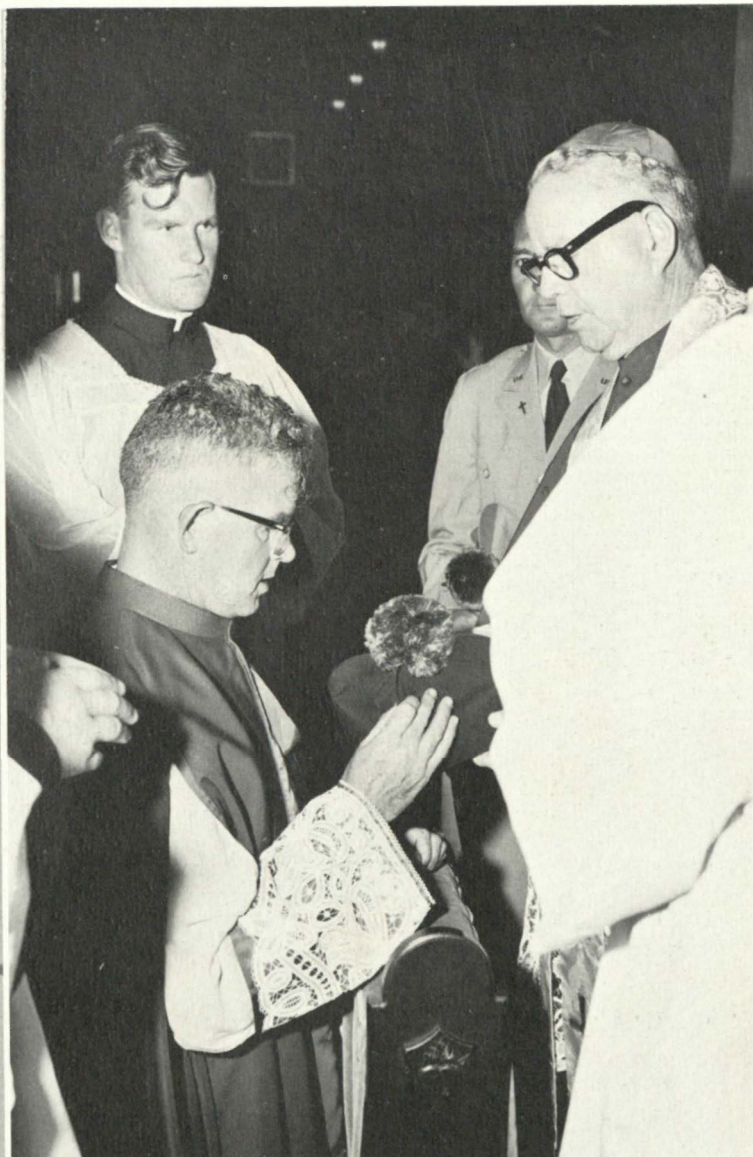
His Excellency said the record of Msgr. Egan's achievements is the story of his zealous labors "to glorify God and to bring peace to human souls."

Citing the "the vast amount of work which never comes to light" the Bishop said that 354 matrimonial problems were solved out of 391 submitted in 1958. The solution meant adjustments in the home, the Bishop added, and adjustments meant domestic peace as well as peace of conscience.

"Indeed," said his Excellency, "the supreme tribunal in Rome, which upheld the

new monsignor's decisions in all cases, sent its congratulations to the diocese for his great work."

Paying tribute to the Holy Father and the Bishop for the honors that had come to him, Msgr. Egan said: "I would be the first to disqualify myself for so great a privilege." He added that "this testimony of paternal affection" is "evidence of the great esteem that the Holy Father entertains for our Most Reverend Bishop" and "illustrates... the keen interest the Pope has in this energetic and rapidly growing Diocese of San Diego."

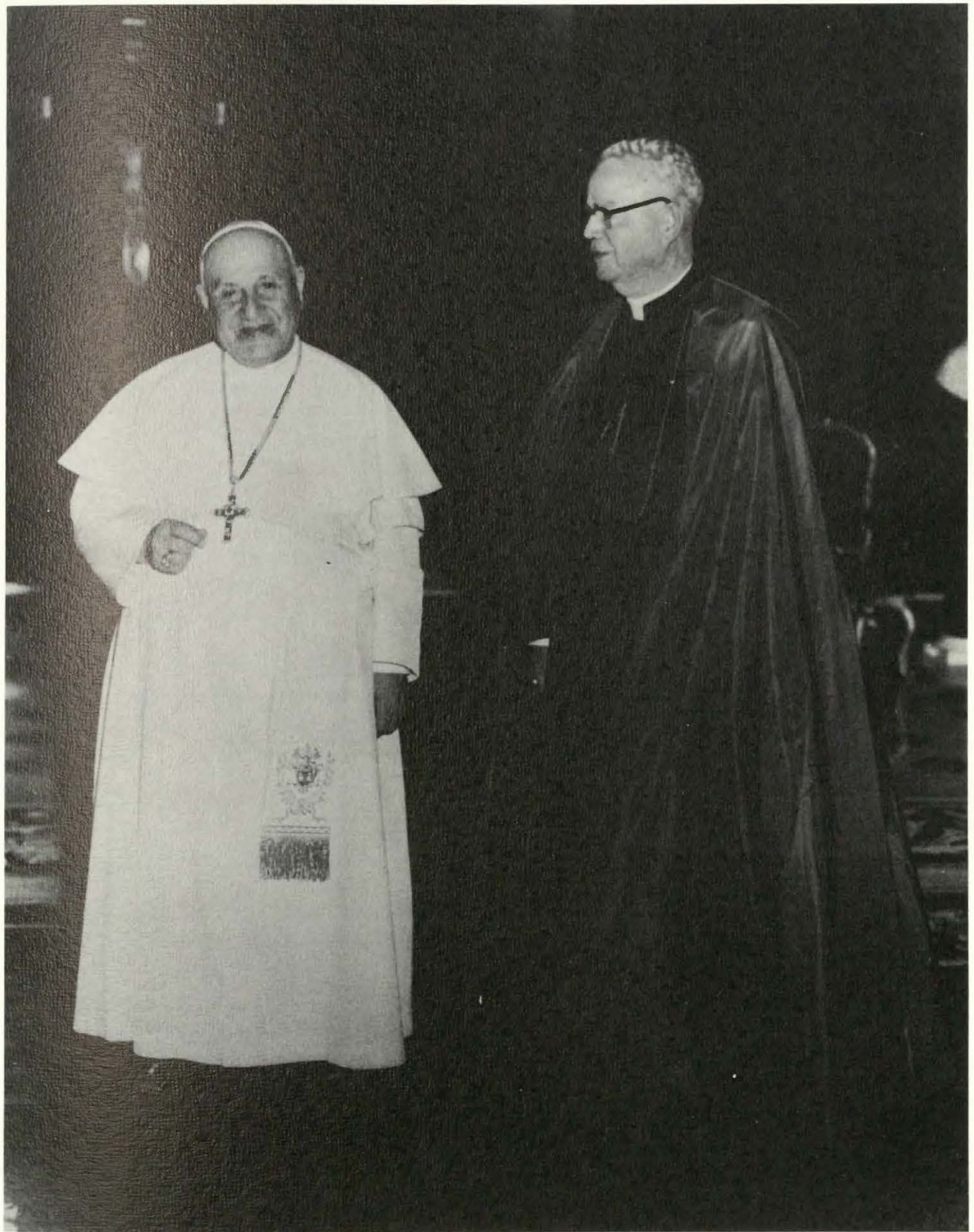

Sandra Loubat Is New Orleans Athlete Of Year

Sandra Loubat, a charming 19-year-old sophomore at the University of San Diego's College for Women, has been named the New Orleans metropolitan area's outstanding athlete for 1959.

Sandra is the top-ranking woman tennis player of the southern states and two years ago, upset San Diego's Karen Hantze when the two were playing the summer circuit. The Louisiana miss with light brown hair and brown eyes, is only the second woman to win the New Orleans outstanding athlete award in 20 years.

She will fly back Wednesday night for the presentation banquet to be held Thursday.

Sandra is the healthy all-American girl type. An honor student with a B plus average, she is treasurer of her sophomore class and president of the college's Women's Athletic Association. She also was treasurer of her freshman class. She is majoring in history and minor in languages preparatory to studying law.

She and Karen became fast friends while making the circuit two summers ago and this had a lot to do with Sandra's decision to attend college here. This plus the opportunity to hone her tennis game on the tough competition lurking everywhere on the west coast.

In fact, Sandra and Karen are in the women's doubles finals of the March of Dimes tournament. However, they will be unable to play their match with Kathy Chabot and Molly Danielson on schedule next Sunday at Kona Kai Club due to Sandra's flying awards trip. The match will be played at the convenience of all parties.

Sandra took up tennis at the ripe old age of 8 under the coaching of her father, Sterling Loubat, who owns a hotel and restaurant supply business in New Orleans, a city famous for its food and hostilities. Unfortunately, all Dad Loubat could do was coach. His playing days had been ended by a severe heart attack in 1947. Sandra later got instruction from Emmett Pare, the prominent Tulane coach who has tutored Hamilton Richardson and Ron Holmberg, among others. Currently, Sandra is getting pointers from Les Stoen at the La Jolla Beach and Tennis Club.

Sandra's mother, Eva, and her 10-year-old sister, Lyndell, also play, and Sandra believes that Lyndell is a real comer.

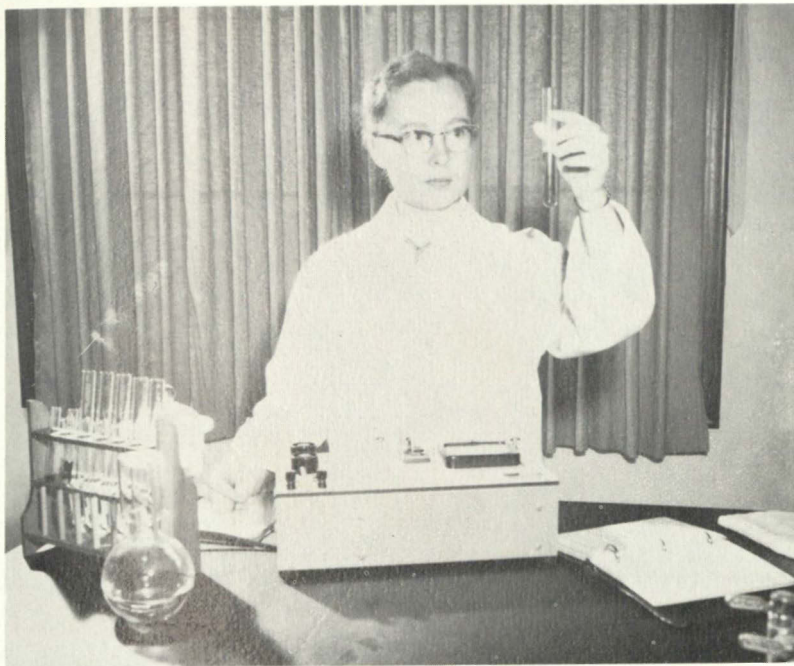
Sandra is a sophomore at the University of San Diego's College for Women. She's majoring in history, and her minor is languages. After receiving her bachelor's degree, she plans to study law.

Sandra is a native of New Orleans, and started playing tennis at the age of eight. Between pounding away at tennis balls, Sandra's studies took her through grammar school and the Academy of the Sacred Heart, a school in New Orleans conducted by the Religious of the Sacred Heart. It was only natural that she would want to come to the College for Women—also conducted by the Religious of the Sacred Heart.

Sandra and Louis Riecke, a weightlifter seeking a spot on the U.S. Olympic team, will be honored as the New Orleans athletes of the year at the banquet of champions sponsored by the New Orleans Athletic Club in its grand ballroom Thursday, January 21.

When she received the telegram informing her of the award, Sandra said, "I was so overjoyed that I thought I was confusing wishes with reality. I feel very proud to have been given such a great honor. It is still hard to believe."

But the Alcala Park sophomore earned it.

Members of the faculty and student body at the San Diego College for Women were elated at the news of the recent acceptance of Miss Janet Naidl to graduate study by three universities in the field of medicine.

Miss Naidl, a senior at the College for Women, has been accepted for advanced study leading to the MD Degree by the Creighton University School of Medicine, the Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania, and the St. Louis University School of Medicine.

By means of high academic achievement in her major and minor fields, chemistry and biology, admissions tests given by the various universities and personal interviews, Miss Naidl won the coveted acceptance for graduate work in a field in which only 10 per cent of applicants are accepted.

The prospect of four years of graduate study, one year's internship, and one year's residency is a pleasing one to this senior, who has planned a medical career "since grade school." Her final choice of medical school is that of St. Louis University.

Miss Naidl is the daughter of Mrs. Rowena Ireland Naidl, a teacher in the San Diego School System. Her sister, Rowena Naidl, a 1959 magna cum laude graduate of the San Diego College for Women, now serves as a Navy ensign in the capacity of communications officer in the NOL laboratory, Silver Springs, Md.

A student of the College for Women since her freshman year in 1957, Miss Naidl serves as president of the college's Science Club, plays the viola in the String Ensemble Group, and is a member of the Children of Mary.

USD To Construct Stadium Seating 5,000, Clubhouse

Construction will begin within a month on a 5,000-seat football stadium, athletic clubhouse, and swimming pool at the University of San Diego. Bishop Charles F. Buddy, president of the university, announced last night.

Bishop Buddy, addressing Booster Club members and faculty, estimated the cost to be between \$500,000 and \$600,000 for these facilities on a 51-acre site immediately east of the campus and north of Linda

Vista Road.

The announcement was made at a dinner held at Lark Cafeteria in the Arts and Science Building.

"We hope to have the football field complete by Sept. 15," the Bishop said. "Work on the clubhouse will be done later as we receive additional money."

He said the stadium could be expanded in the future to accommodate 40,000 to 50,000 fans. Target date for the complete construction has been set for Sept. 1961.

"The clubhouse, patterned

in Spanish renaissance, will have six offices, one large assembly room, a lobby, 24 showers, an area for visiting teams and 24 apartments for professors and coaches," he said.

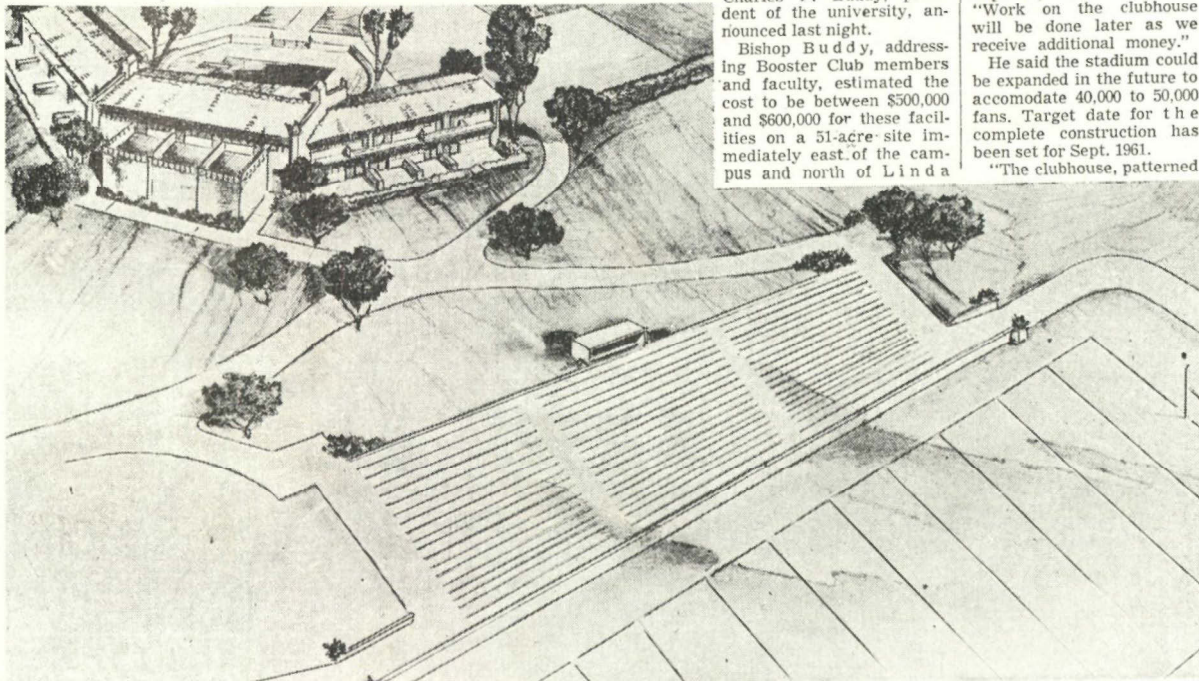
No plans have been established for lights so that the first season, at least, will see the Pioneers playing games in the afternoon.

The Bishop said that under the Government land grant "the university must show some action within the 18-months period and the deadline is Nov. 1."

"Money will be received for this project through subscription and we hope most will be from big foundations," he said. "The Booster Club has asked to take on the stadium as its project."

The stadium will be constructed in a canyon area with the clubhouse on a plateau to the north. The pool, which will comply with Amateur Athletic Union standards, will be 75 by 40 feet.

The Bishop said plans at the present do not call for a gymnasium.

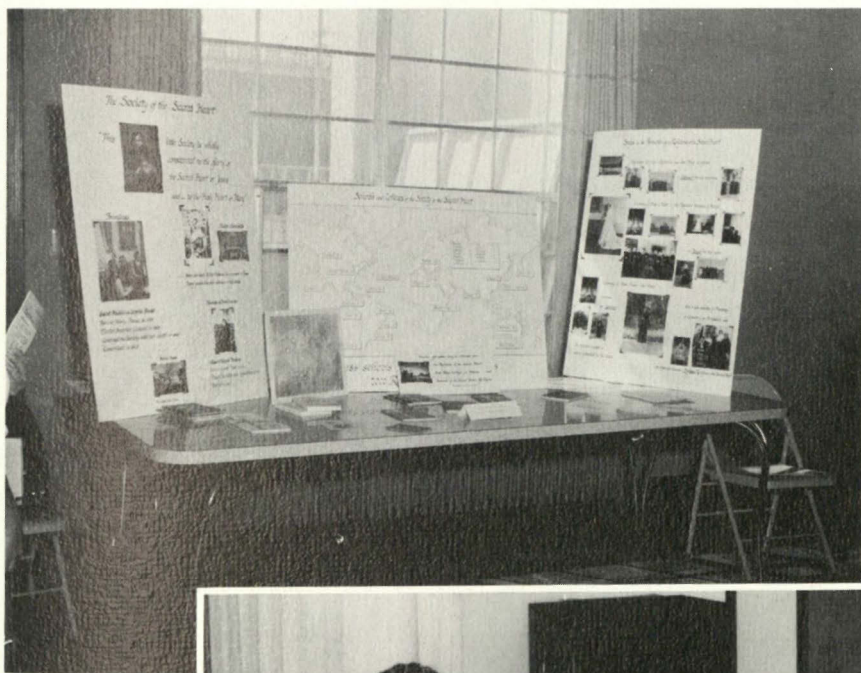

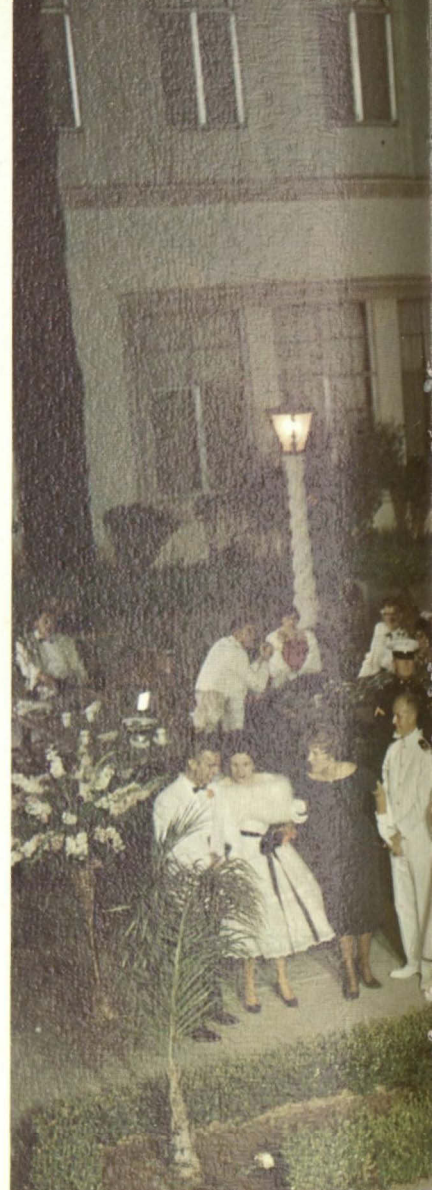

The founding purpose of the Alcala Park Players is that those interested in dramatic art may put into practice theory learned in drama courses, with the hope that a love for good theatre, may be fostered, which will enrich the knowledge of history and literature learned in academic courses. To start off the year, Craig Noel, the resident director of San Diego's Old Globe Theatre, spoke concerning the theatre of today. Mr. Noel emphasized the fact that participation in dramatics, whether amateur or professional, must be accompanied by constant effort and prevailing interest. He stated that the greatest reward in theatre work is the personal sense of achievement rather than monetary remuneration or recognition. An actor, or actress, has a spirit of dedication and a belief in his, or her, work, and this explains the hard work and long hours which are more than made up for with the burst of applause at the end of a good performance.

The Alcala Park Players endeavor in all their productions to create the atmosphere of true theatre. Scripts are approached first on the basis of the interpretation of the imagery connoted in the lines. Improvisation is the next step as the actress analyses her character as to motives behind the action and words, and acts out in her own words the character's response to various situations. Only after this is done is the script memorized and polished for the final production.

The first presentation was the BISHOP'S BEGGAR on the President's Feast. This short play was given as chamber theatre, the stage devoid of scenery, and the action alternating between narration, dialogue and action. On November 20, and 21st, the Players and the Alcala Masquers of the Men's College presented THE LATE GEORGE APLEY, a satire on Boston society in the early decades of the twentieth century. For Reverend Mother's Feast Wishes, February 11th, a verse reading was presented which portrayed the foreshadowing of the realities of the New Covenant, the living sacrifice, by the offering of bread and wine by Melchisedech, and the manna given to the Jews in the desert. These realities gave a deeper understanding of the daily Sacrifice of the Altar and a more profound realization of Christ's Presence in the Tabernacle. Other productions, in conjunction with the Masquers were the original musical, THE GIRL FROM HISPANIOLA, on February 27, 28th, and the Passion Play on Palm Sunday.

The spring production was JANE EYRE.

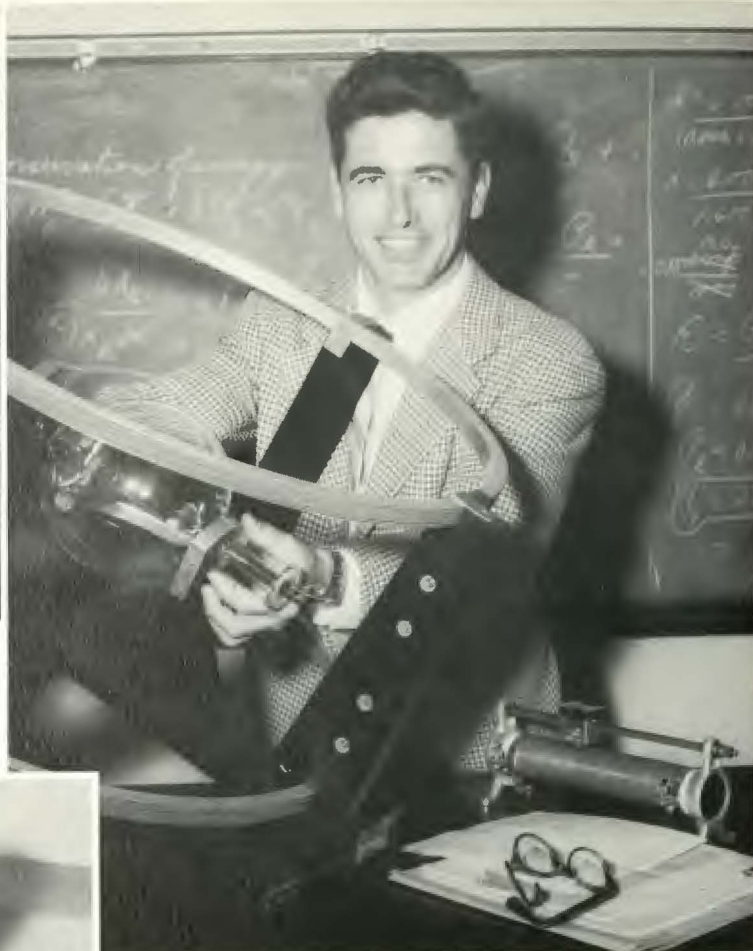

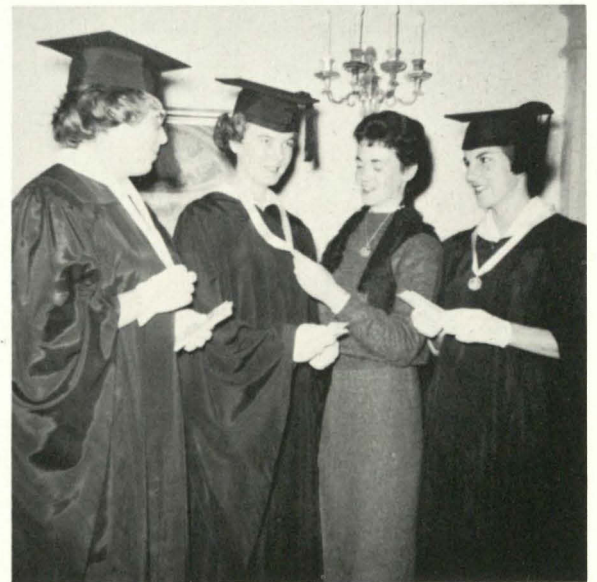
