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# Irish Comedy Set Tonight

'Juno, Paycock' To Feature Kral, Sloan, Pickett In Leading Parts

The Aztec Theatre Guild's second production of the year "Juno and the Paycock," opens at 8:30 tonight in the Little Theatre with other performances scheduled for tomorrow night and Dec. 11-13.

Freeman H. Meskimen, director of the production, said the play produced bitter resentment when first presented in Ireland in 1924. He said Sean O'Casey, the author of the play, angered the Irish people because he was mad at the Church, government and people for their failure to solve Ireland's problems.

Featured in leads are Joan Kral as Juno, Jim Sloan as "Captain" Boyle and Albert Pickett as Joxer Daly.

In major supporting roles are Sharon Price and Dave O'Neill who play Mary and Johnny Boyle respectively.

Others in the cast are Fred Berling, Ed Creason, Ursula Haag, Carol Kriner, Dick McLaughlin, Jack Pickett, Don Reed, John Selzer, Mike Anderson, Virginia McKinnor and Carolina Teran.

Ed Woeten is assistant director, Dick Lennon is stage manager and Walter Stump is house manager.

The setting of the play, Meskimen said, is in a 1922 Dublin tenement in the midst of Irish nationalist furor and recounts the effects of a sudden inheritance on the poverty-stricken Boyle family.

In discussing the play's meaning, Meskimen cited a comment made by the irresponsible "Captain" Boyle when confronted with Ireland's problems. "We've nothing to do with these things. That's the government's business, and let 'em do what we're payin' them for doin'."

The play's tragic ending leaves the play's status as a comedy open to question, Meskimen said. "But O'Casey saw in the very nature of the Irish people a burlesque, comic quality. We realize in 'Juno and the Paycock' that life is so tragic that if it weren't comic, it would be unbearable," he added.

Genzlinger is an assistant professor of music and Dalrymple is a graduate student here. Miss Quist has sung with the New York City Center Opera. Mrs. Kouns is Concert Choir and the New York City member of the Star-Light Opera.

The production will be presented by the College Chorus and the San Diego State Symphony Orchestra and will be free to the public.

San Diego State's production will be one of the largest of the "Messiah" in Southern California this year, Director J. Dayton Smith said.

# Student Hit by Auto Here

A San Diego State junior was struck by a sports car early Tuesday evening as he was walking across Montezuma road on his way to a fraternity meeting.

Dennis R. Lottermoser, 20, was reported in fair condition in Donald M. Sharp Memorial Hospital yesterday with a possible concussion and abrasions.

Police said the driver, Peter D. Dreesen, 21, also a SDS student, was going east on Montezuma road. Lottermoser, whose father died recently, was hit on the right

side and was hurled over the car. Neither was cited.

This is the second accident involving SDS students in the college area within the last three weeks. The first one occurred Nov. 14 when a lunch truck and an auto driven by a SDS sophomore collided at the intersection of Campanile Drive and Hardy Road. Police credited safety belts with preventing possible serious injuries to the student.

"I was going east on Montezuma road. I didn't notice how fast I was going. He was about five feet in front of me when I first saw

him. He just came out of nowhere," police quoted Dreesen as saying.

Lottermoser told police he had just gotten out of his car and was walking across the street. "I don't remember how far he was from me when I first saw him," he told police.

Connie Clark, a SDS junior, said she heard the car strike Lottermoser. She said she was standing in front of the Kappa Delta sorority house more than a block away when she heard screeching brakes and the thump of the impact.

Applicants will be interviewed by the Publications Board at 8 a.m., Jan. 8, in HS108.

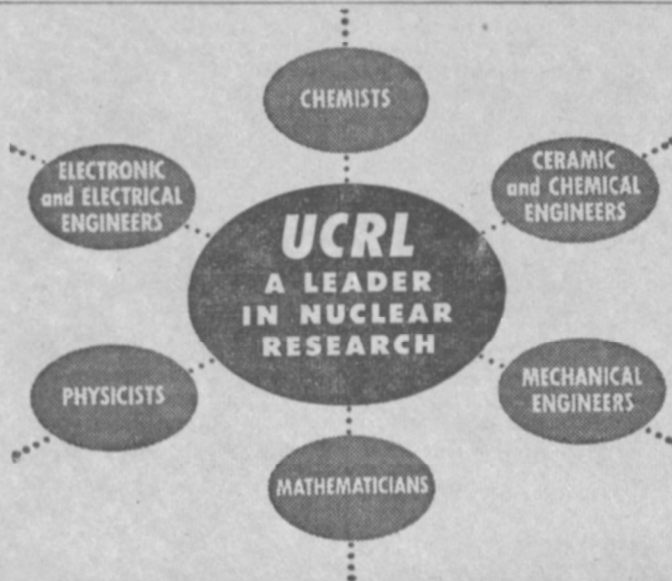
## Units To March In Toyland Parade

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## Dickens Recital Set At 11a.m. Tuesday

John Greaves, an authority on the life and writings of Charles Dickens, will give a recital on "David Copperfield" at 11 a.m. Tuesday in the Little Theatre.

Greaves is also a dramatic reader who gives a simple, sincere and authentic interpretation of Dickens' humor and characterization. Dr. John Aseltine, a retired San Diego educator, said.

The Dickens expert will place "David Copperfield" in its setting of 1849. He will comment on the manuscript in the Victoria and Albert Museum in London and its importance as a study of childhood.

Greaves will provide comments on various aspects of the book between excerpts of "Betsy Trotwood and Dr. Chillip," "Creakle," "Mr. Dick and Mr. Dick's Parliament," and "Mr. Micawber." He appears without props, costumes or makeup and enacts all excerpts from memory.

Greaves, a retired financial executive, is Honorable Secretary of the Dickens Fellowship which was founded to keep Dickens in the public eye. Since World War II, he has given over 600 recitals to schools, colleges, literary societies and service clubs throughout England.

This is the Englishman's first visit to America. He arrived in San Diego in October and has been touring West Coast cities and colleges. He has been invited by Harvard University to make a recording for its "Literature on Film" series.

He appeared on Harold Keen's "People in the News" television show with Dr. George L. Phillips, professor of English. Greaves has given his recitals before many organizations in the San Diego area.

## USC Teacher Plans Speech On 'Courage'

Dr. Eleanor R. Metheny, a University of Southern California professor, will speak on "The Courage to Lead" at 11 a.m. Thursday in the Quad.

"Dr. Metheny will direct her lecture towards the student as an individual and his role as a leader in this money-making world," Dr. Carl W. Benton, chairman of the Men's Physical Education Department, said.

Dr. Metheny has done much writing in the field of physical education for such magazines as McCall's, Charm, Glamour and Science Digest. She also is the author of a book, "Body Dynamics," and was co-author of "The Trouble with Women."

Dr. Metheny assisted in the development of the National Youth Fitness program inaugurated by President Eisenhower. She received the Honor Award from the American Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation in 1950. She is also a member of the Japan National Recreation Association.

The student unit of the California Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation is co-sponsoring the event with the Lectures and Assemblies Committee.

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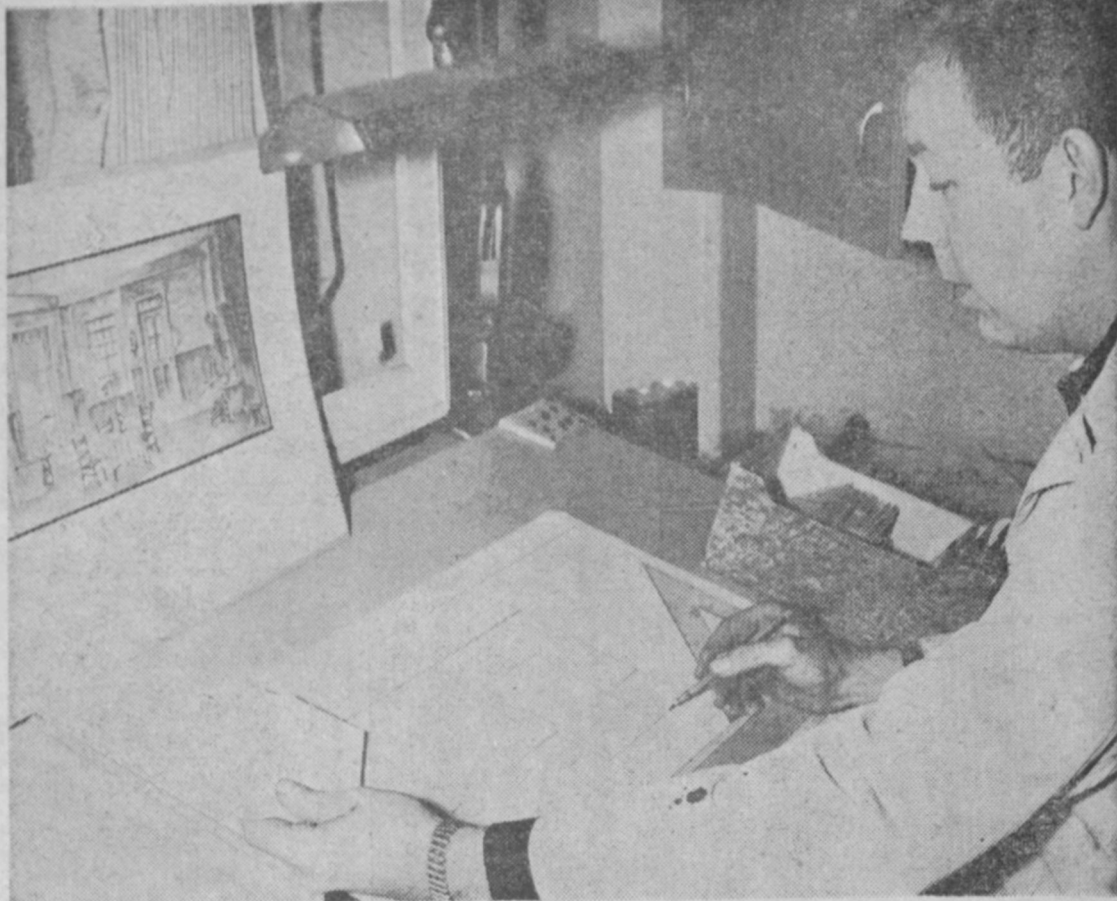

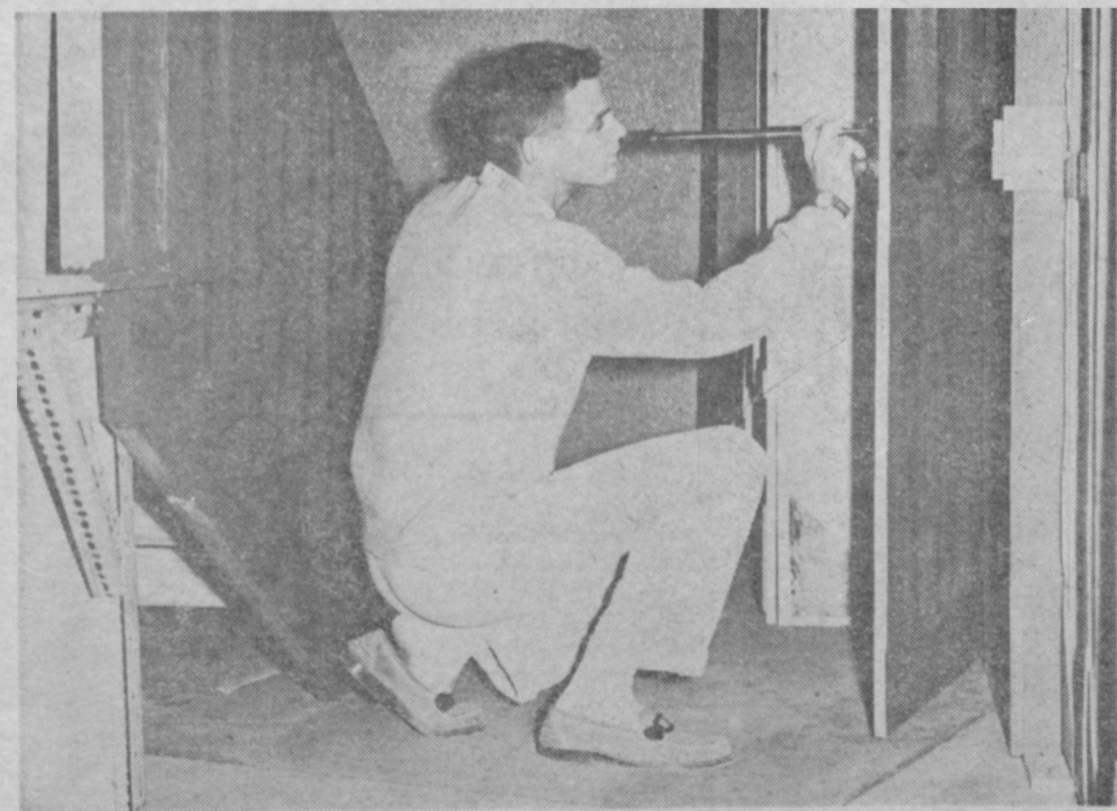

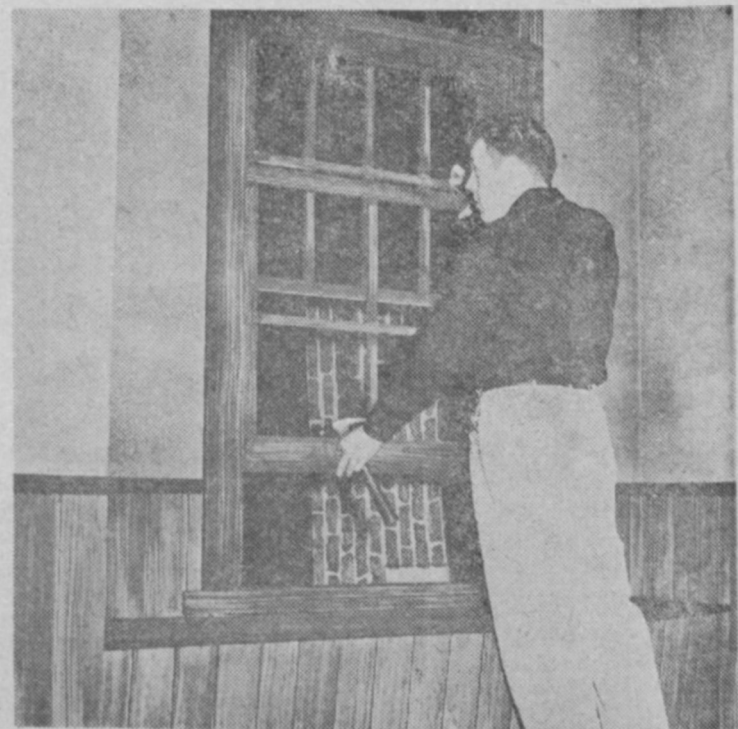
BILL HEKTNER, technical director, checks files for scenery and sets to be used in "Juno and the Paycock."

# 'Show Biz' Rated Tough

Freeman H. Meskimen, a San Diego State alumnus, who is a professional actor on television, in movies and on the stage, said there is no sure way to break into show business.

Meskimen, who is currently directing the Aztec Theatre Guild's production of "Juno and the Paycock," said at the present time there are more than 11,000 actors in the Screen Actors Guild in Hollywood. Com-

petition is tough, he said. He said in order to get into the Guild a producer has to say you are definitely in a production.

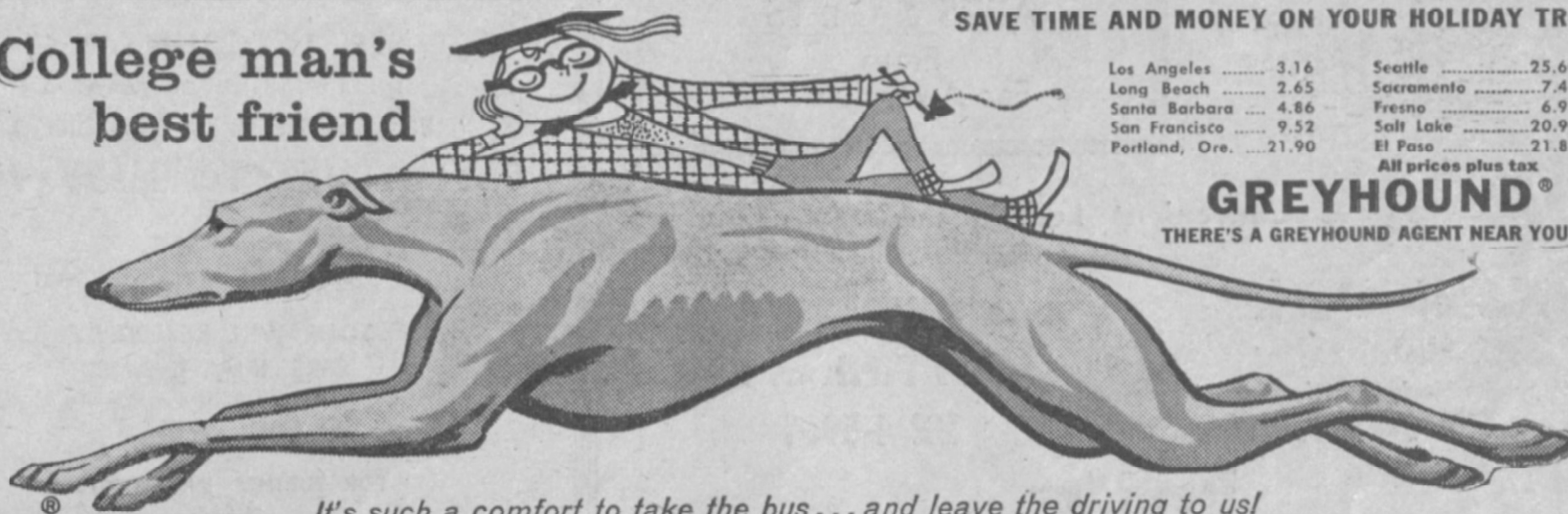
"Agents are a necessity and without them you get nowhere," he said. Meskimen added that most are good business men, but some fit the description you see in the movies.

If you have had no professional acting experience, agents won't sign you, Meskimen said.

He said actors get roles in community theater productions and ask a number of agents to see them in these roles in hopes they will sign them to a contract. If the agent likes their performance he will ask television casting people to see it.

After acquiring an agent, many interviews and readings for roles are next. It gets pretty discouraging to be turned down for roles time after time, he said.

All-conference forward Bernie Finlay led a fiery but slow-starting Aztec varsity basketball squad to a 73-57 win over its alumni counterpart Monday night in Aztec Gym.

Finlay had 19 points for the evening. Ray Waters and Hal Brown followed with 16 and 12, respectively, and paced the Aztecs through a first half in which the best the varsity achieved was a 14-14 tie.

Ex-SDS great Tony Pinkins scored 20 points for the Alumni, but he and his teammates' fierce shooting and rebounding were unable to squelch the Aztecs' big weapon in the second half—the fast break.

## BIG SECOND HALF

Coach George (Ziggy) Ziegenfuss' charges literally ran away from their opponents in the third and fourth quarter with a 40-point scoring spree in which 73 per cent of their field goal attempts dropped through the hoop. A skin-tight varsity defense held the Alumni "big guns," Pinkins, Jim Sams and Jim Poole, to only 17 shots during the Aztec scoring binge.

The SDS starters led 48-43 with seven minutes remaining on the clock. Two minutes later, leading by the same margin, what Ziegenfuss termed "the best fast-break club I've had" bolted into action. The final score was the result.

## PINKINS SHARPEST SHOOTER

Alumnus Pinkins took honors for the night's sharpest shooting, hitting six field goals and going eight-for-eight at the free-throw line. He was backed in his efforts by Sams, Poole, Archie Rambeau, and Don Hegerle.

Slender, springy Pinkins also engaged in a four-quarter rebounding duel with Finlay, and center Eddie Davidson, who was making his debut in the Aztec starting lineup.

Alumnus Rambeau had a rationalization for his team's ultimate defeat which his colleagues seemed to share. "We just weren't in shape to keep up with them," Rambeau said.

# Aztecs Beat USD, 20-6 In 'Grid' Win

End Jim Terry snagged two touchdown passes to lead his Aztec teammates to victory over the University of San Diego, 20-6, in the first SDS-USD flag football game, held between the two schools.

The Aztecs got off to a spectacular start when tailback Phil Jones intercepted a first-period pass on his own 39-yard line and sprinted 61 yards for the first SDS tally. Jones then passed to end Dallas Evans for the conversion.

After a scoreless third period, Don Magee fired a 40-yard pass to Terry for a third tally, then slipped off tackle for the conversion and a 20-0 SDS lead.

The final period also marked the lone scoring effort by the Pioneers. Jim Weatherall passed to Bill Bowman on an air-ground play covering the 43 yards to the end zone. The conversion attempt fell through, and the final score stood at 20-6.

## 3 Wrestlers Crippled For Grunt Opener

A bruising fraternity touch football game last week dealt a crippling blow to San Diego State's varsity wrestling squad.

Co-captain Jim Bodenhamer suffered a broken finger and 177-pounder Jim Hilton received a broken arm in the same fraternity game, according to Coach Harry Broadbent.

Broadbent said the two injuries leave the Aztecs in poor physical condition for today's season opener at Camp Pendleton.

Another injury—leaving Iowa transfer Jack Dray with a bad shoulder—has further depleted the squad. Broadbent had rated Dray a top prospect.

Following today's meet with Pendleton, the Aztecs Tuesday take on UCLA, and the three ailing wrestlers are not expected to be ready for that meet either.

## RALLY 'ROUND THE FLAG BOYS

Two immutable facts make Wednesday's official suspension of the University of San Diego's student newspaper an act contrary to any acknowledged precept of the free press system.

First, and unquestionably foremost, is the fact that during its short life, The Paper was not dependent upon the university for operating funds. Set up as independent from school financing, it was a student newspaper which sought to balance its books from advertising income alone—a phenomenon almost unheard of in the ranks of college newspapers.

Secondly, The Paper was suspended for printing an article devoid of editorial comment, buttressed with attributed quotes yet characterized by the school's administration as a veiled criticism of the College for Women.

On the basis of these facts there can be no justification for the administration's action.

Throughout history, free human beings have experienced a traditional abhorrence of the act of suppression. Americans long ago transcribed this feeling into the Constitution, which guarantees freedom of speech, religion, press and assembly.

Students at the College for Men are to be applauded and supported for their conscientious show of concern and their courageous choice to stand up and be counted when a principle of such moment and consequence is at stake.

## College for Men's Paper, Masquers Draw Suspension

Publication of the University of San Diego's student newspaper, The Paper, has been suspended by the university's administration, Msgr. John Storm, president of the College for Men, confirmed Wednesday.

Unofficial sources had said earlier in the week that the publication had been suspended "for an undetermined period, maybe forever."

The suspension stemmed from an adverse reaction by university officials, including the Most Rev. Charles F. Buddy, bishop of the San Diego diocese, to an article which appeared in the Nov. 20, 1958 issue of The Paper.

Student editors and reporters were informed by letter Monday that the publication was being suspended, although no announcement was made at that time to the student body.

### CONFIRMATION GIVEN

Official confirmation for the students came at the College for Men's student body meeting Wednesday. Officials also confirmed that the student drama group, The Masquers, had been dissolved as an aftermath to reaction from the article.

Tony Piazza, associated student president of the College for Men, said that the students "must be moderate." In the next two weeks we are going to sink or swim," Piazza said. "Put your faith in me and I will go along with what you want," he told the students. "I'm a senior and I'm scared. I have no place to go after this," he said.

The students gave Piazza a unanimous vote of confidence by voting 197-0 in favor of a motion that they "back Piazza up in any action he takes."

### ADVISERS 'INACTIVE'

Faculty advisers for the drama group and the newspaper have been relieved of their posts as advisers, university officials said.

The article which drew the criticism told of a forthcoming Masquers' production which would use San Diego State co-eds in feminine roles. Policy announcements by the university's College for Women stated that no women students would be allowed to act or assist in College for Men drama productions, the article said.

## Trotmelter Fears Gates, Keyes In Tomorrow's Tilt

Marine Corp Recruit Depot Coach Bull Trotmelter has respect for two Pioneer backs who will perform in tomorrow night's game against the Devil Dogs. "The Pioneers' Tom Gates and Bob Keyes figure to be the best backs we have faced this season," Trotmelter said yesterday.

Trotmelter noticed Gates' potential when the latter performed for the Hawaiian Marines last season. The Recruit Depot opposed the Hawaiian Leathernecks twice last year.

Trotmelter, who saw the Pioneers play only once this year (against Montana, Saturday) admitted that his scouting report showed little because USD was operating against a single-wing club, and the Pioneers showed very little until the last quarter.

Trotmelter intends to use the same starting lineup which was so effective against Montebello last week. One exception, Billy Martin will start in place of injured Al Hall at left halfback. Trotmelter added that Hall will see some action.

The Marine coach agreed that USD is much better than last year when the Pioneers dropped a 41-0 decision to the Leathernecks.

Outside of Hall, Trotmelter is bemoaning five other injuries. Centers Ron Collins and Doug Day are on Trotmelter's "doubtful" list and halfback Dale Martin and guard Ernie Delco are definitely out of tomorrow's fray. Martin has been hampered with an arm infection.

USD Coach Bob McCutcheon reports that tackle-guard John Mulligan and quarterback Jan Chapman, two first stringers, will see only "limited action." Chapman and Mulligan went to the sidelines in the Pioneers' come-from-behind victory over Montana State University.

Duane O'Connor, a former junior college All-American from Citrus JC, was named to take over the signal calling job, with J. T. Trily replacing Mulligan.
