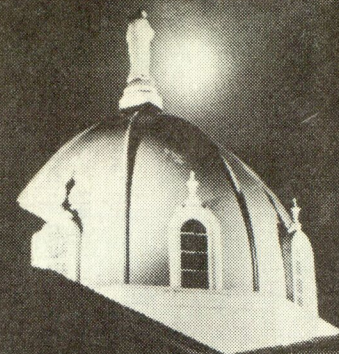

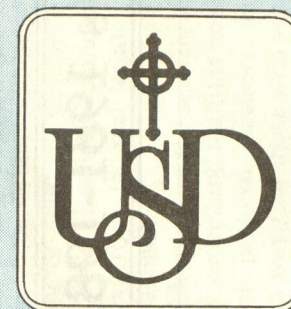

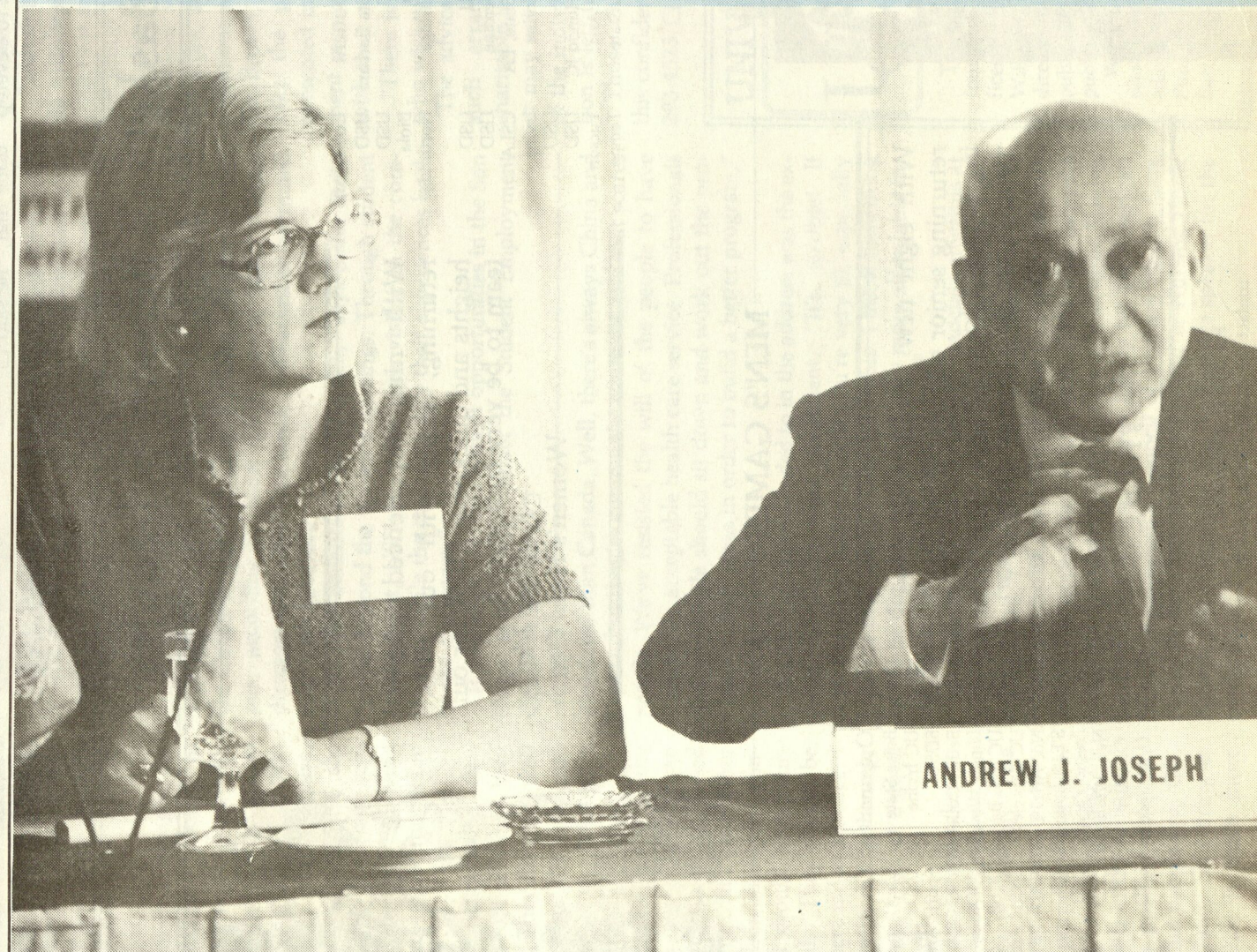

Francis Sullivan appointed to head Criminal Justice Center

A new acting director for the Center for Criminal Justice Policy and Management of the University's School of Law has been appointed for the current academic year, according to an announcement made recently by Sheldon Krantz, dean of the School. Filling the post will be Francis C. Sullivan, distinguished visiting professor, founder and director of the Louisiana Criminal Justice Program. Sullivan will be a member of the School of Law faculty during 1981-1982 and is on sabbatical leave from Louisiana State University, where he serves as professor of law in addition to his other responsibilities. He has been director of the Comparative Study of the Administration of Justice, a project of the Ford Foundation; founder and director of the LSU Institute of Continuing Legal Education; and director of training for the Conference of Appellate Judges of the American Bar Association.

"We are privileged to have Professor Sullivan with us," Krantz commented. "He brings to the classroom and to the Center directorship an illustrious career."

The Center for Criminal Justice was founded by Edwin Meese, III, on leave from his duties with the University to act as Counselor to President Reagan. According to Dean Krantz, Meese continues his interest in the Center and acts in an advisory capacity. Center activities include legal education programs, research and publications, conferences and workshops and public service projects. It serves as a resource for visiting scholars and provides information and assistance to criminal justice agencies, public officials and the news media. Through the Center and its programs, the School of Law makes a unique contribution to the improvement of the criminal justice process. □

Mal Rafferty: Irish mastermind of the University of the Third Age

Malachi J. Rafferty, affable Irishman and USD's Director of Continuing Education, speaks with a vestigial brogue and goes about his work with an ease and good humor that belies the pressures of his office.

Mal (as he is better known) heads a program that offers in a typical year more than 100 courses, registers nearly 7,000 participants, and operates on a self-generated budget. He has been doing this at USD since 1975, bringing with him an impressive background in both the academic and corporate world: he has been assistant to the president and director of recruitment for Marymount Palos Verdes College, vice president in charge of operations for International Community College in Los Angeles, assistant dean of foreign students at UCLA, chartered accountant, and manager of his family's wholesale business back home in Ireland. Graduate of Dublin's University and Trinity colleges and of UCLA's Graduate School of Management, Mal brings to the Continuing Education unit a special expertise and competency.

One of the projects he most enjoys is the University of the Third Age, USD's continuing education program for persons over the age of 55, modeled after the prototype program at the University of Toulouse. Now in its third season at USD, the U3A concept was brought to this campus by General Victor Krulak, who also helped

organize the first program in 1978. Since then, the USD event has become the prototype for four other similar programs across the country.

"We're looking forward to another successful run of the U3A beginning January 4," Mal reports. "Sandra Kraemer, who is coordinating the program for us this year, has designed a fine array of course topics, ranging from jazz to controlling utility rates, and a superb faculty."

According to Mrs. Kraemer, the U3A sessions will be held every weekday except Friday from 8 a.m. until shortly after noon, and will conclude with graduation ceremonies on January 21. Nineteen subjects will be covered in a curriculum designed to touch on world events, languages and humanities, science, and concerns specific to the age group. The first hour of each day will be occupied by physical fitness activities.

James Gordon, president of the U3A Alumni Association, says he would recommend the program to anyone. "The speakers are without exception outstanding and make their subjects come to life. The entire program is topnotch and most worthwhile."

Suzie Wilson: USD freshman and World Champion horsewoman

A stranger watching Susan Wilson will see a 17-year-old with tawny hair framing a pert, smiling, friendly face and deep brown eyes. A USD faculty member will see an eager, pretty freshman from Salt Lake City. But a devotee of the horse world will be looking at the World Champion in the Juvenile Five-Gaited Saddlebred division, a championship Suzie won in Louisville last August. As a result of those top honors, Suzie will be one of four young Americans to represent the American Horse Show Association and the American Saddlebred Horse Association in a world show to be held in Paris in mid-December.

Championships are not exactly run-of-the-mill in the Wilson family, but they aren't scarce as hen's teeth, either. Gordon Wilson, Suzie's father, acquired his first horse in 1965 when he took a pony in trade for a used car. Today, the Gordon Wilson Stables in Sandy, Utah, occupy an 80 X 120 foot barn, employ a trainer and other helpers, and transport their horses from show to show in a custom-built van large enough to house 12 horses and living quarters for the family. In the years between, the ribbons have accumulated for the entire family: Mrs. Wilson and her hackney pony won the reserve champion ladies harness pony class of the World in 1978; one of the Wilson's hackney ponies, Late Edition, was world grand champion three times; Patti and Tom, a USD senior, have walked off with innumerable ribbons, and it is not unusual for the family and their

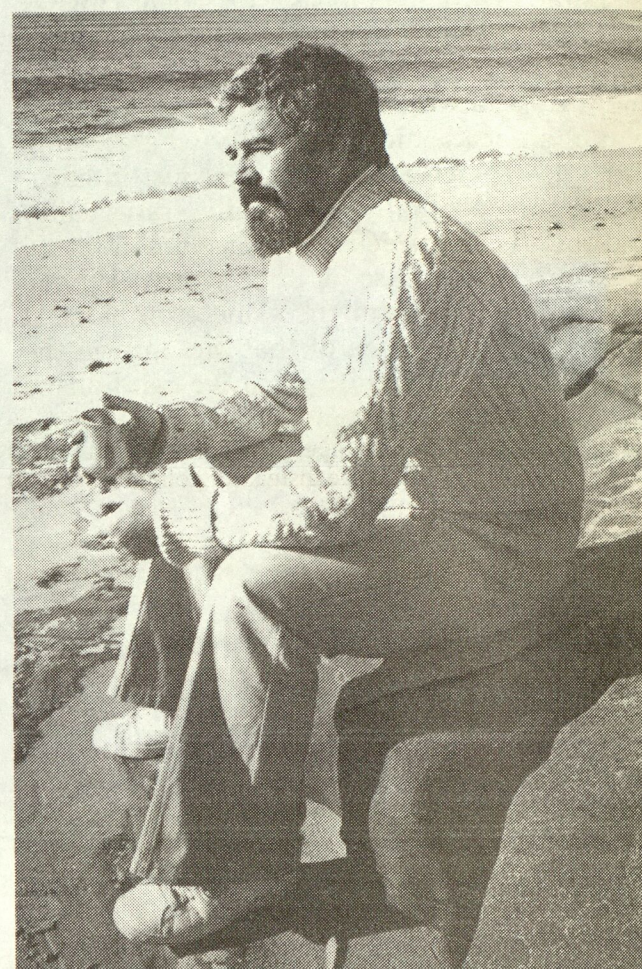
horses to leave a show with a ribbon for every class entered.

Gordon Wilson's feeling about the connection between horsemanship and character-building are reflected in a 1979 interview reported in the Salt Lake Tribune. "Kids need a pet because it gives them something on which to shower affection, especially when the child has suffered a disappointment at school or at home. It helps to fill up their time and teaches them a sense of responsibility as well as building confidence, self-control, and teaching patience. A horse teaches a child that to be loved, he must give love and kindness. And it teaches the fundamentals of life: socialization, life and death, and that love of a horse can be shared by many."

Suzie, who has been riding since she was two years old and showing horses since she was four, agrees. "My horses have taught me so much — not just about horsemanship but about other things, too. Particularly patience, and how to control my temper, which can be pretty bad sometimes. My dad always says it's easy to smile when you come out with a blue ribbon, but the thing to learn is to smile when you only have a yellow ribbon. I always think of that."

Patience, endurance, discipline are all key factors in succeeding, as Suzie has done, in the world of showing horses. Her schedule would be considered difficult even for someone devoting full time to it — this year, for the

How much to grow or perhaps not to grow is question at USD

Next year, enrollment at the University of San Diego will pass 5,000 — a full three years ahead of projections.

Now the university — which has grown at a spectacular rate while similar institutions were stagnating — must make an important decision: Does it want to continue growing?

During the next several months, USD President Author E. Hughes, who just completed his 10th year as head of the institution, will be intensively surveying students, faculty, administrators, and the board on academia's variation of the Hamlet question — To Grow or Not to Grow.

"It's a critical decision for us. We're now setting a new 10-year agenda," said Hughes, explaining that once the new growth path is set, it will be difficult to change directions if opinion on campus changes.

Hughes is staying neutral. He points out the advantages and disadvantages of the two strategies: "If you decide on the future strong growth, you have the economic advantage of a greater amount of income. Secondly, you can have wider diversity of your curriculum. A third factor can be that you attract attention from around the nation and might be able to get programs you otherwise would not get. And faculty salaries can expand much faster if you have the greater income."

"But there are obvious disadvantages to further rapid growth," he said. "As the enrollment grows beyond 5,000 the size mitigates the kind of interpersonal relationships we value on this campus (the comfortable student-faculty ratio, for example)."

"And there is the physical plant required for additional growth. You have to have the buildings and physical resources, and at the current level of interest rates, construction is very difficult," he said.

There won't be a campuswide vote on the issue, but it's clear it won't be as simple as grow or no-grow. The consensus will likely involve compromises and subtle shades of meaning. "Maybe instead of going from 5,000 to 10,000 the optimum will prove to be something like 6,500 as a goal," he said.

One important consideration will be USD's role in the marketplace. It competes for students with two big state institutions, UCSD and SDSU. All along, USD has pointed to its critical difference as a smaller, more intimate institution: "The more we become like them (UCSD and SDSU), the less likely it is that we have a future," emphasized Hughes.

That statement is representative of Hughes' approach to higher education — and explains why this story is running on the financial page, rather than in some other section of this newspaper.

Verily, Author Hughes may be San Diego's most successful businessman. His spectacular success in building USD in just 10 years resulted mainly from his ability to balance demand and supply factors. He has demonstrated an acute sensitivity to the market — the demand side — while deftly handling both the economic (fund raising, construction) and personnel (faculty, staff) needs of the supply side.

In doing so, he has built a very enviable record. In 1971, USD's enrollment was 2,311. Now, it's 4,791 — a growth rate of well over 100 percent in 10 years. During the same period, the total enrollment of all the nation's four-year private colleges barely inched up from 2,024,000 to 2,591,000 — a growth rate of less than one-fourth of USD's.

Sensitivity to the demand side explained much of the gain. Taking over a liberal arts college for women and another for men, and a law school, Hughes tested the market and opted for the practical approach. USD added business, nursing, and education schools.

The most visible success has been the business school. Hughes, who has a Ph.D. in business education and was former business dean at Northern Arizona University, immediately sensed the possibilities. "Even in the 1960s, when there was such an anti-business mentality, the business schools still grew, and significantly," he said.

He brought in Dean James Burns, who recruited a prestigious faculty. Enrollment has more than tripled and both the undergraduate and graduate courses have won accreditation, as well as an enviable reputation in the community.

Now, a \$4 million new business school building is planned, "and we're \$2.8 million into it," said Hughes. Similarly, market sensitivity has led to establishment

of other courses, curriculum concentrations and special programs. Among them have been para-legal and advanced psychiatric nursing programs; the Labor Management Relations Center and Center for Public Interest Law within the School of Law; and the University of the Third Age for senior citizens.

Competing with large state universities, USD has placed heavy emphasis on its holistic, values-oriented approach — dealing with the social, spiritual, cultural, and physical sides of the student self in addition to the intellectual.

Although USD is not a government grants-grabbing type of institution, it snapped up \$50,000 from the National Endowment for the Humanities for the setting up of team-taught interdisciplinary ethics courses in the College of Arts and Sciences. The faculty is preparing courses in ethics, values, business and society, morality and education and ethics and environmental problems. In an era of parental concern about campus morality at state universities, USD's ethics approach might be its best sales point — the major reason USD can thrive despite higher costs.

Today tuition is \$2,240 a semester and room and board is between \$1,345 and \$1,535. By contrast, UCSD's tuition is \$827.50 for the full year. In 1971, USD's tuition was just \$750 per semester — thus, it has tripled. But UCSD's tuition for a full year in 1971 was \$636 — almost three-fourths of what it is now. But even as the gap widened dramatically, USD maintained 10 percent-plus annual growth.

Most importantly, USD has been able to emerge from a deep deficit. In 1972, the deficit was \$415,962. But beginning in 1975, USD started reporting surpluses every year, and for the year just ended rang up \$364,000.

An accumulated deficit of \$1.8 million has been reduced to \$471,795 as of Aug. 31 of this year. USD has gone to the tax-exempt bond market for \$11 million in funding (\$4 million long term, \$7 million shorter term), but that's over for now: Interest rates are too high, said Hughes.

Beginning immediately, Hughes will be sitting down with groups of faculty members, discussing the critical growth topic. He will reach the students through its government apparatus, and will counsel with his cabinet (administrators, deans, etc.) and board. "I hope it is an intelligent, thoughtful discussion — not a debate," he said. □

major shows alone, it's Kansas City in November, Paris in December, Phoenix in February, Denver in March, Dallas in April, Houston in May, Lexington in July, and Louisville for the world championships next August. For Suzie, embarked on her college years with plans to become a doctor of veterinary medicine, discipline and hard work are imperative. About every three weeks or so, she flies from San Diego to Dallas to spend time with her trainer, Dale Milligan, and to ride Tinsel Town, one of her three prize-winning horses. "I've been on a horse every day of my life since I was two years old," Suzie says, without exaggeration, "and this is the longest I've ever gone without riding every day."

Asked if she develops affection for the horses she spends so much time with, Suzie replies that she does. "Sometimes it's hard, because horses are constantly being sold, and then you see your horse being shown by someone else. But Dad will never sell Ballerina," she says, referring to one of her trio, with which she appeared on the cover of the June 1981 *National Horseman*. "Ballerina is a world champion and a mare, so she can be bred. Dad's been offered a lot for her, but he wouldn't sell." Then a broad smile spreads across her face. "Anyway, he knows if he did, I'd kill him."

When Suzie shows next at the American Royal, it will be her last show in the Juvenile Division, since that class is restricted to persons under 18. She will then move up to the Amateur Division, a fact Suzie mentions with a certain relish, as though to say she looks forward to a whole new arena in which to compete and prove the Wilson prowess. Talking to Susan Wilson, one has no doubt she will emerge from her first competition in this new division with both a smile and a blue ribbon. □

USD to sponsor Buddhism seminar in Hawaii

NFL Man of the Year Scholarship goes to USD freshman

When San Diego Charger Charley Joiner placed among the top five finalists in the 1980 NFL Man of the Year contest, William Miller had little reason to believe that it would have any bearing on his college education. A Point Loma High School senior at the time, Bill planned to attend USD as an accounting major in the fall. His accounting teacher knew of his plans. She also knew that, as one of five finalists, Joiner had a \$2000 college scholarship available to San Diego high school students.

The scholarships are part of the NFL Man of the Year contest sponsored by the Miller Brewing Company. Fans vote for a player from each NFL team to be recognized for his contributions to the community as well as his contributions on the field. The contest is narrowed down to five finalists from a total of 28 top vote-getters. The contest winner receives a \$5000 scholarship in his name to be awarded to an area high school student in his team's home city. The four finalists receive \$2000 scholarships, and the remaining 23 players receive \$1000 scholarships. The students awarded the scholarships are selected on the basis of transcripts, written biographical sketches, including career plans, and an oral interview.

Bill filled out the forms supplied by his teacher, detailing his activities with the local Little League, his better than 3.0 index, and his plans to become an accountant.

This summer, representatives from the City and County School Districts and representatives from the Chargers selected Bill and three other San Diego high school students from among more than 30 candidates. "They called me up and asked me to come for an interview. The awarding of the scholarship hinged on the interview," recalled Bill. Bill's interview with the representatives went well. So did the interviews of the other three students. "They were supposed to pick two of us, but they couldn't make up their minds, so they decided to divide the scholarship among the four of us," he said. Charger President

Eugene V. Klein volunteered to match the Miller scholarship and donated \$500 to each of the students. With the addition of the Klein grant, each student received \$1000 towards their college education.

A Charger fan who says he doesn't hold it against the team when they lose a game, Bill says he "really appreciated the award." □

World Association of Sacred Heart Alumnae meet in U.S.

For the first time in its history, the World Association of Sacred Heart Alumnae will hold its world meeting in the United States. San Francisco, home of the Association's president, Miriam Gray, has been selected as the site for the event, to be held from April 20 through April 25, 1982.

According to Mrs. Gray, the theme of the conference this year is "A World in Transition," and panels and workshops will focus on four areas of concern: family, education, career, and community. The conference will open with a panel of four experts, each presenting an overview of the four topics, to be followed with workshops where participants will hear representatives from countries where studies on these subjects have been conducted.

"We are basing our plans on an attendance of about 400 people," Mrs. Gray said, "and we hope to have representatives from each of the 34 member countries."

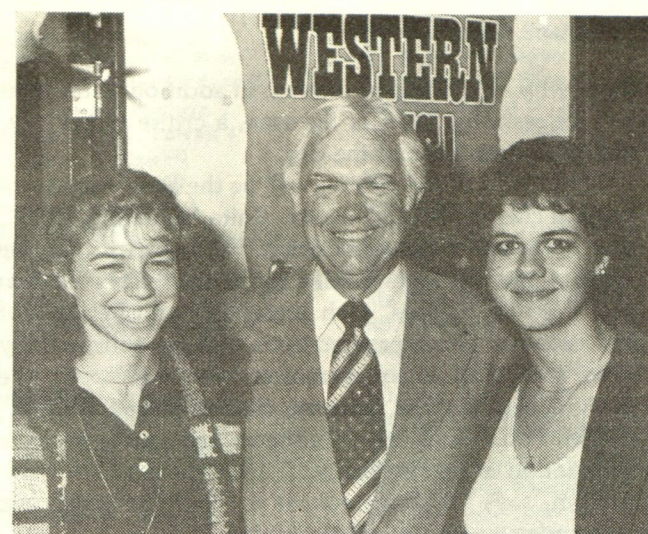
All sessions of the world meeting will be held at the Jack Tar Hotel, except for the Symposium, which will be held at Menlo, a Bay Area Sacred Heart school.

Noted nursing educator appears on campus

Virginia Henderson, R.N., M.S., international lecturer, consultant, and nursing school educator informed and amused more than 125 members of the USD community at a "dialogue" sponsored by the Graduate and Undergraduate Nurses' Association and the USD Nurses' Honor Society on November 11 in Camino Theatre.

According to Ms. Henderson, the biggest program in nursing lies in getting the average nurse "to see the significance of the contribution he or she can make, that what he or she is doing is important." Ms. Henderson believes there is not enough emphasis placed on the significance of nursing. "I wish the practice of nursing had the same status as lawyers, doctors, or teachers do," she said.

When asked what could be done to emphasize the significance of nursing, Ms. Henderson pointed to Clarabel Wheeler of the Veterans Administration, who set up a system of examinations through which nurses could advance to a high position while staying in patient care. "Your advance was marked by a salary increase, that's a position that all Americans recognize," she remarked. On a more serious note, Ms. Henderson suggested setting up a tutorial relationship between students and "skilled, competent, able, practitioners in the field."

Ms. Henderson questioned the existence of the often discussed shortage of nurses. "In foreign fields they think we have an over-abundance. They do quite well with fewer nurses. It's relative; it seems the more you have, the more you want. Nursing is holding a reasonable number of people in its ranks."

With regard to the focus of nursing research, the speaker expressed a belief in the importance of an analytical approach to nursing, with research focused on practice. "This doesn't mean that I don't value other types of research — I do," she added. In addition to conducting their own research, nurses should be encouraged to find other research as well. "They should be taught to find what factual basis there is for practice. I do not worship research; I do not feel as if it is the only basis for practice. It is only one way to get at a good reason for doing something," she said.

Medicaid, Medi-care, and other legal steps taken to make health care available to everybody have not served their purpose, according to Ms. Henderson. "The programs have been misused by practitioners, or they just haven't served their intended purpose," she said. But while these programs might not be serving their intended purpose, Ms. Henderson points to the socialized medicine of other countries as a possible solution. "England has a successful program. But people say, 'Oh, you can't compare the U.S. to England.' So I bring in Canada, but they say that the U.S. is much more

In the afternoon, the USD Toreros, coached by Bill Williams, defeated Chapman College at USD's Homecoming game.

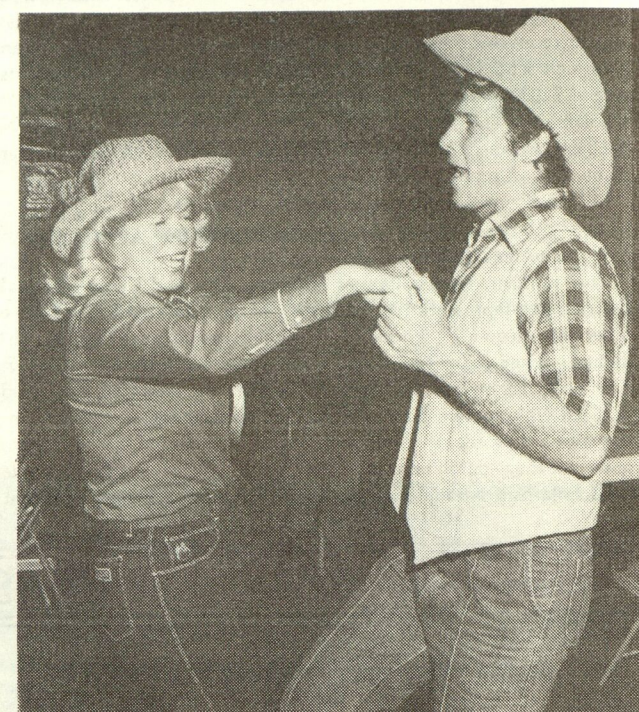

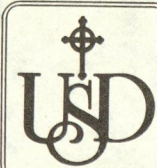

The use of such arrangements as unitrusts, annuity trusts, charitable lead trusts, and the pooled income fund may or may not be suggested, depending upon the objective of the individual and his special situation. Implementation is left to the individual and his advisors."

"USD Toreros: Unbeaten, untied, unrecognized"

What's the best-kept football secret in San Diego County? If you guessed the University of San Diego Toreros, you're right . . . the Toreros rarely make the headlines because they play at the NCAA Division III level. There are no scholarships, no cars, no 80,000-seat stadiums, and no post-season bowl games or cross-country trips with which to entice athletes. Simply put, there's not much recognition.

Do not get the idea, though, that this makes their brand of football any less intense or exciting. Those who read the fine print know this year's USD team is 8-0 and ranked eighth in the country.

But even the rankings don't always make sense at this level. The Toreros were No. 7 the previous two weeks. Last Saturday they defeated the University of San Francisco 27-14, but dropped a notch.

Division III also has a playoff system. It would seem the Toreros should be invited to this year's party, especially if they finish the season undefeated. They won't be. For one, there are six other unbeaten teams at this level.

Most of them also happen to belong to the Western region (of which USD is a part) that spans from the West Coast to Iowa.

One probably thinks this would upset head coach Bill Williams and his team. Wrong again. There is more to life than football for the 31-year-old Williams, whose blond hair and well-tanned body appear better suited for Mission Beach than the football field. "We're striving to develop the best Division III program we can," he said while sitting in the tranquil surroundings of the University's pool the other day. "But we're not worried about rankings, playoffs, and post-season bowl games. Teams that get too caught up in those kinds of things end up getting beat because their minds aren't on the game. We just take each game one at a time and do the best job we can. Being 8-0 is enough for us right now. The best thing is there's no pressure from the alumni or administration to win. Any pressure we have is self-induced. We (the staff and the players) want to develop the best small-college program in the United States."

Unlike the big time, football is not top priority at

USD, or any Division III school, for that matter. "I laugh when I hear big-time coaches talk about how hard it is to recruit," Williams smiled. "We have to do a better job than the major schools. We can't offer scholarships or apartments or anything else. We have to sell our athletes on the school, its academics, instructors, and environment . . ."

Williams, then, is limited in the number of athletes he and his staff can pursue. But he's quick to note that this aspect makes his job that much more enjoyable. "We do a heckuva background check on the high school and junior college kids we bring in. We look for players who are honestly concerned about an education first. Sure, we hope football is high on their list, but we don't want it to be their first priority. So we end up with a more mature type kid. Kids who are easy and a lot of fun to coach. I'll tell you, I think I have the best coaching job in the United States and it'd take a heckuva lot to get me to leave. The players make it a pleasure to coach here and I could stay here forever."

When Williams took the head coaching job at USD in 1976, he was only 26 and the youngest college head football coach in the country. It didn't appear to be the most lucrative of positions. The school had moved up to Division III (from the club level) two years before. They won only four games in the ensuing two seasons and Williams didn't do well with his first team either, finishing 1-7-1. But things quickly improved. The Toreros were 3-7 in 1977, and followed with 7-4, 5-6 and 6-5 seasons prior to this year's so-far perfect season.

The success is more pleasing than surprising to the head man. "When I got the job, our goal was to go slow and develop an honest, class program. I think we've done that," he said. □

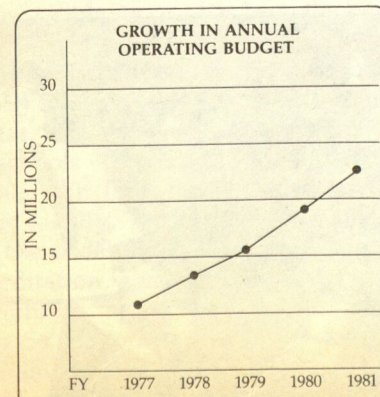
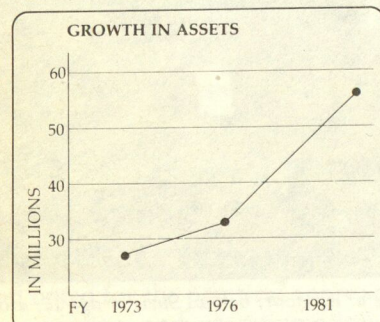
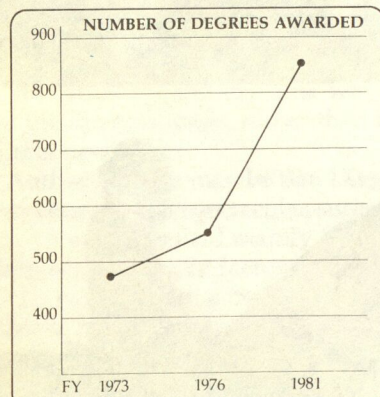
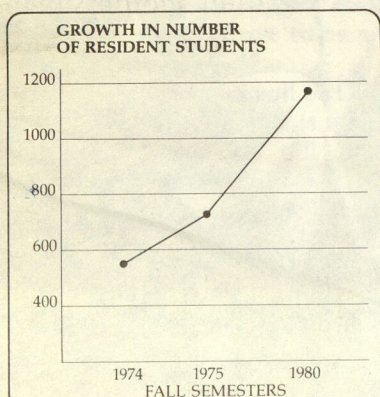
Annual Report shows University gains

Growth of the University in the academic year just ended is graphically illustrated in the recently published 1980-1981 Annual Report, a project of USD's Office of Public Relations.

Figures cited in the Report show that total assets of the University climbed to nearly \$58 million in fiscal 1981, compared to \$35 million in 1975-1976; student financial aid (exclusive of the School of Law) soared to almost \$7 million compared to \$1.9 million in fiscal 1976; and fund raising programs realized contributions totalling \$2.3 million in contrast to \$715,000 for 1975-1976, while alumni participation in the annual fund jumped 85% over the preceding year.

Other highwater marks include a record high enrollment of 4,428 (Fall headcount; in Fall 1981, enrollment increased again to 4,791), growth in faculty numbers to 164 full-time, and the addition of new programs as well as the strengthening of existing ones.

"But in the final analysis," President Hughes states in his Report message, "the University's finest achievement is what it has always been and, I trust, always shall be: the ongoing creation of an academic community where young men and women may grow, not just intellectually but spiritually, culturally, physically, and socially — to become fully human in the most profound sense of that word. 'Whole' and 'holy' come from the same etymological root. The implications of that fact inform the University's approach to what we call holistic education and our grounding in the traditions of the Roman Catholic faith."

USD, UN Association co-sponsor World Issues Roundtable

A stellar cast of men and women from the political, academic, military, and media worlds joined together on October 26 and 27 to participate in the San Diego World Issues Roundtable, one of four such programs held in this country in recent months. Coordinated by the United Nations Association in cooperation with the United Nations, the San Diego event was sponsored locally by the University. The roundtables are designed to give high level representatives of the media an opportunity to meet with leading international experts to discuss critical global issues and their impact on Americans, as well as to discuss the role of the UN in their resolution.

Herb Klein and Gerald Warren, top executives with the Copley Press; Ellen Cook, professor of international business at USD; and Gloria Penner, program director for KPBS moderated, respectively, sessions on "a New World Information and Communication Order," "The United States and Latin America: Perspectives and Prognosis," "Perspectives on Asian Development in the 80's," and "The Escalating Arms Race and Disarmament." Speakers for the sessions were Elie Abel, award-winning journalist; Dileep Padgaonker, deputy director

of UNESCO's Office of Public Information; Abelardo Valdez, chief of protocol for the White House; Dr. Gustavo del Castillo, director of the program in North American Studies, Center for Advanced Social Research in Anthropology, Mexico City, and UCSD faculty member; Andrew Joseph, assistant secretary-general of the United Nations; David Osborn, former United States ambassador to Burma; Vice Admiral John Marshall Lee (USN, Ret.), a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and numerous other similar organizations; and Ambassador Curt Lidgard of Sweden, ambassador for disarmament in Geneva since 1978.

Keynote speaker for the event, which was held at the Little America-Westgate Hotel, was Dr. James C. Jonah, assistant secretary-general for personnel services with the United Nations, which he has served since 1963. Dr. Jonah spoke on "The Future of the United Nations System."

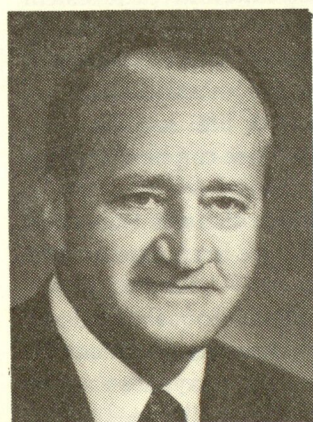
