Dr. Davis, the well-known Samuel Johnson scholar, will lecture on Dr. Johnson at 7:30 p.m.; refreshments will follow, during which guests may meet Dr. Davis. Local AAUP chapters and English departments will be invited; the event is also open to the public.

### MEETINGS OF THE SOCIAL & MISSION COMMITTEE:

Committee: one or two representatives of Sacred Heart Schools and Colleges on the West coast

Mothers: Marie McHugh, Menlo Park; Mary Anne Cronin and Wesley Pribyl, Broadway, San Francisco; Greif, Seattle (could not attend, but sent report); Bruhn, El Cajon; Glowienka, San Francisco College for Women; Pugh and Lawrence, San Diego College for Women.

Four major points covered in the meetings:

- 1. Current service programs in each school and college on the west coast.
- 2. Current service programs in other schools and colleges in California.
- 3. Evaluation of on-going services of Sacred Heart schools and colleges on the west coast.
- 4. Resolutions.

Some current service programs in Sacred Heart schools and colleges on the west coast:

- 1. All are tutoring disadvantaged: poor, minority children, deaf, mentally retarded, emotionally disturbed children.
- 2. Most of the junior and senior high schools are "candy-striping" (nurses' aides in hospitals) and "Marian visiting" (visiting and helping elderly persons on convalescent homes).
- 3. Some special service activities: SFCW's "Project Amigos" (USF and SFCW students, about 30, spend their Easter vacation in Tijuana where they live in the poorest section). They tutor the children in these "colonias" and repair and/or build houses, schools, clinics -- whatever is needed. USD's service to the "Town Council of Kearney Mesa" by helping to eliminate political and social apathy in Linda Vista.

#### Some Resolutions:

- -1. Establish a west coast News Bulletin giving news of service programs in Sacred Heart schools and colleges on the west coast.
- 2. Collaborate with other schools and colleges in service programs.
- 3. USD investigate possibility of joining with USF and SFCW students in "Project Amigos" and "Amigos Anonymous."
