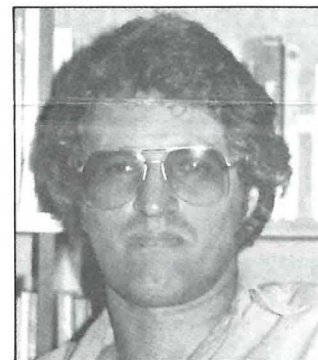
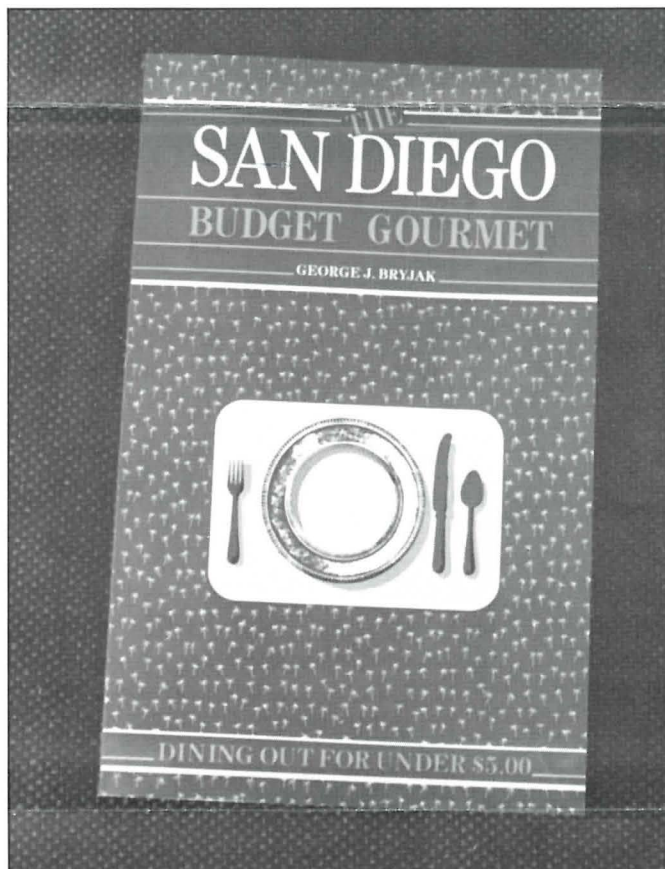

Each restaurant is located in nearby Linda Vista, and each comes highly recommended by **Dr. George Bryjak**, assistant professor of sociology, whose recently published paperback, "The San Diego Budget Gourmet—Dining Out for Under \$5," is a guide to budget restaurants throughout San Diego.

All employees—staff, administrators and faculty—are invited to attend and participate in the activities. The picnic will begin at noon at the grassy area east of Founders Hall.

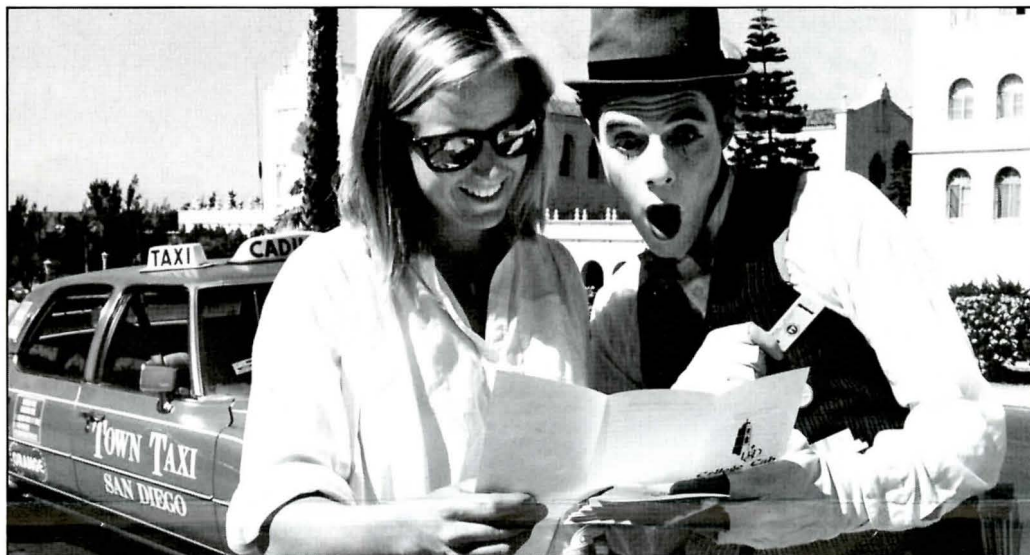
"This is our once a year time when we pause from our daily schedules to say thank you to all of our employees who serve the University," says **Dr. Judith Munoz**, director of Human Resources.

## Around Alcalá Park

The **College of Arts and Sciences** recently received a \$50,000 grant from the Atlantic Richfield Foundation to purchase three pieces of equipment.

The liquid scintillation counter, UV/visible spectrophotometer and Sorvall ultracentrifuge rotor will enable faculty to more adequately introduce students to modern research techniques. The departments of **biology, chemistry, physics, environmental studies, marine studies** and the new **electrical engineering** program will benefit from the equipment.

The **School of Law** is working with San Diego Superior Court on an experimental teleconferencing project designed to save the courts, attorneys and

clients hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The experiment allows a judge to preside over certain types of hearings and other court proceedings by telephone. The equipment features four outside phone lines, enabling a judge to preside over a hearing with up to four attorneys.

According to law professor **Robert Simmons**, who conceived the project, teleconferencing eliminates the need for personal appearances by attorneys and their clients, thereby saving large amounts of money.

The **Student Affairs Office** and the **Associates Student Body** recently introduced "College Cab"—a free ride program for students in unsafe situations.

The program is believed to be the only one of its kind in the United States. It provides students with a free taxi cab ride any day or time if their car breaks

down, they are in an uncomfortable date situation or they have had too much to drink.

USD contracted with Orange Cab Co. of San Diego to provide the rides at an estimated cost of \$1,000 to the University for the semester-long experiment.

The **English department** has inaugurated a tutoring program for elementary school students in southeast San Diego.

Thirty-three USD students are teaching English, reading and math to children at five elementary schools, according to **Sr. Betsy Walsh**, professor of English and program supervisor. Because of the program's success, she expects to continue the program next fall.

"To extend the possibility of the educational process to the poor and the marginalized members of society is the privilege and the responsibility of the Catholic university," **Sr. Walsh** says. ■

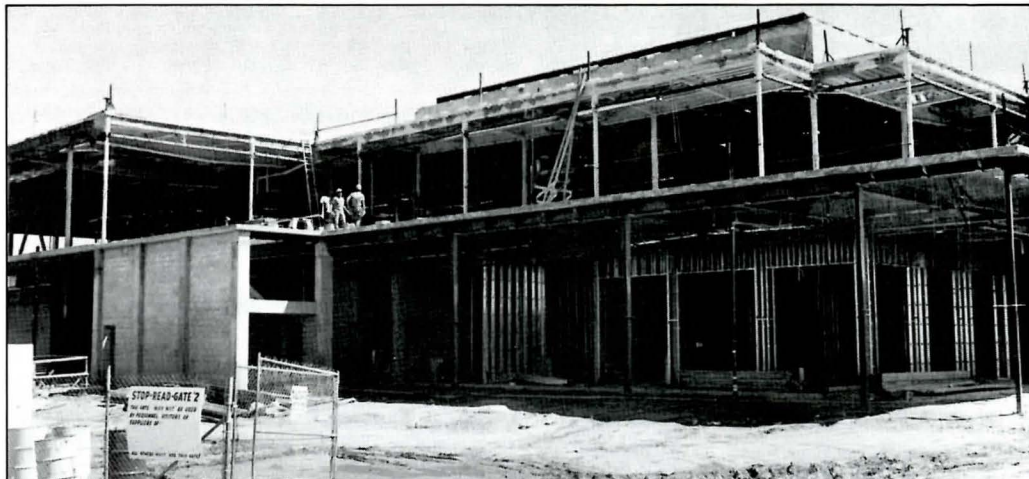

## Can you serve as a big brother?

**D**o you spend a few hours each week playing ball, visiting local attractions or just talking? Could you share some of those hours and activities with a youngster who has no parent to pro-

vide companionship or guidance?

The Big Brothers program, established in San Diego in 1961, pairs little brothers, boys aged 7-13 without a male parent in the home, with male adults in a one-to-one relationship to provide a role model while sharing activities. There is a companion program which matches girls aged 7-13 with an adult woman called The Little Sisters program.

The two programs provide adult companionship to 263 San Diego children. There are 200 children on a waiting list hoping to be similarly paired.

The Big Brothers organization conducts an extensive screening process before matching an adult and child. Consideration is given to geographical location of the two, common interests, preferred activities, personality and the child's family situation.
