# THE JENNY CRAIG PAVILION USHERING IN A NEW MILLENNIUM FOR USD ATHLETICS OPENING TIP-OFF ... FALL, 2000

With a donation of \$7 million by Sid and Jenny Craig, the University of San Diego received the lead gift necessary to proceed with planning its much needed \$17.5 million Sports/Activities Center. The ground breaking ceremony took place on May 5, 1999 and construction is underway with the facility scheduled to open in the Fall of 2000.

The pavilion, which will be located at the eastern end of campus between Torero Stadium and Cunningham Baseball Stadium, will include a 5,000-seat gymnasium, coaches offices, fitness center and athletic training facilities, showers and locker rooms, concession stand, and reception room. The Monsignor I.B. Eagen Plaza off the Pavilion entry, will take advantage of the view across campus to the ocean. The USD Athletic Hall of Fame will also be housed in the facility; it will be renamed in memory of Chester Pagni during the Fall of 2000.

"The Jenny Craig Pavilion is vital to the quality of life on campus," said Tom Iannacone, USD Director of Athletics. "It will have a positive and historical impact on many generations of students. It will also allow us to pursue championship venues for men's and women's basketball, and women's volleyball."

Other benefits the administration and coaches anticipate are the opportunity to attract television coverage of games, and to host West Coast Conference tournaments, USD tournaments and special games such as the Torero Tip-Off.

After standing inside the JCP on photo day in early October, head coach Kathy Marpe stated, "It's hard to describe the excitement I felt standing in the middle of the Pavilion construction area. The pride I felt at being a part of a first class facility. A dream come true."

## 1999-2000 USD Women's Hoops Season Preview

## Toreros Ready to Challenge During Millennium Curtain Call

San Diego women's basketball enters the last season of the 21<sup>st</sup> century hoping to build on the foundation of success laid in the previous two seasons. 1999-2000 promises continued transitions from a team who has improved on their overall and West Coast Conference record in each of the last three seasons. Now, the Toreros prepare for their final campaign in the USD Sports Center and anxiously anticipate the completion of the new Jenny Craig Pavilion scheduled to open for the 2000-2001 season.

USD, with a 14-13 overall record, posted their first winning season since 1992-93 when the Toreros qualified for their only trip to the NCAA Tournament. San Diego tied for fourth in the WCC race with a 7-7 mark – their first upper-division finish since 1994-95. Three starters and 10 letter-winners return for head coach Kathy Marpe, who prepares for her 20<sup>th</sup> season patrolling the sidelines for the Toreros, her 26<sup>th</sup> season in collegiate coaching.

USD welcomes back three of five top scorers from last season, headlined by a pair of All-WCC First Team members, senior guard Susie Erpelding (San Diego, CA) and senior forward Jessica Gray (Redwood City, CA). Erpelding and Gray were the first USD teammates to earn all-conference honors since 1990-91 and finished one, two in the scoring race with Erpelding averaging 14.0 points per game and Gray at a 12.2 clip. Senior forward, Maria Perez-Barris (Barcelona, Spain), returns after posting a solid season after transferring from Solano College and averaged 5.8 points per outing as the Torero's first player off the bench last year.

USD took full advantage of all trips to the charity stripe in 1998-99 and ranked second as a team in overall free throw percentage in 1998-99 at .715, and improved their average in league games converting at a .728 clip. The Toreros were led by Erpelding, who finished second in the WCC in free throw accuracy at .860, and ranked 14<sup>th</sup> nationally among Division I leaders.

San Diego's stingy defense prevented opponents from lighting up the scoreboard last season. The Toreros allowed just 58.5 points per game to lead the West Coast Conference in team defense in overall games and ranked 14<sup>th</sup> in all of Division I. USD was equally stingy during league play and ranked second in WCC contests allowing league foes a paltry 59.9 points per game. The Torero defense ranked second in the WCC in overall steals in 1998-99, averaging 8.7 an outing. USD was also successful in blocking out, holding opponents to just 33.3 boards per game – the fewest in the conference.

Gray returns as the Toreros leading rebounder and was the first Torero post player since Chris Enger to rank in the top ten in overall scoring and rebounding during a season.

Head coach Kathy Marpe is understandably eager to get the new season underway with such a talented cast of returners and an infusion of size in the post and speed and scoring on the perimeter. "We have a lot more depth at key positions this season," stated Marpe, who feels team defense will continue to be a strength, but certainly not at the expense of the offense. "Our inside presence with Jessica (Gray) and consistent leadership from Susie (Erpelding) are the best combinations of both we've had since Chris Enger and Angie Straub. We're smarter and more experienced in all areas. This season we'll be more consistent scoring because we can attack and score in a variety of ways."

Depth comes from a group of newcomers with impressive credentials. Freshman Kerri Nakamoto (San Jose, CA) led Archbishop Mitty High School to a state championship and an undefeated 31-0 record as a senior and will likely start next to sophomore Melissa Glazebrook (Mountain View, CA) who was a teammate of Nakamoto's for three years at Mitty. Erin Malich (Mason, OH) adds a physical inside presence, while Jen Wedo (Downingtown, PA) provides USD with one of the purest shooters the Toreros have had in recent memory, according to Marpe.

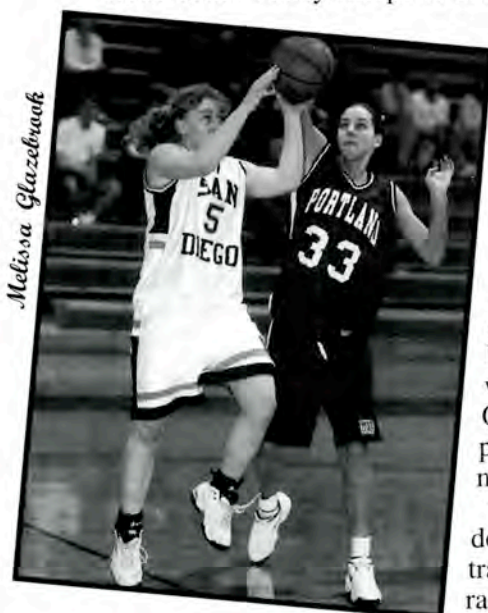
"Our defense was always consistent last year, but our offense was up and down. The biggest key for us this year is our ability to score. I think we're on track to keep going up. I'd like to think we can challenge for the conference race," Marpe said.

## Torero Head Coach Kathy Marpe

20th season

### An Elite Group of Coaches

University of San Diego head women's basketball coach Kathy Marpe joined an elite group of coaches last season when the Toreros downed Portland State University, for her elusive 300th career collegiate coaching victory. With the win, Marpe joins a select group of about 60 active coaches who have surpassed the 300 career victory plateau.

1998-99 was another year of successful transition for Coach Marpe and the Toreros. San Diego proved its mettle in posting a 6-1 West Coast Conference record in the USD Sports Center, including a 3-0 record against post-season qualifiers Pepperdine, Saint Mary's and Santa Clara. Now, poised on the close of the 20th Century and the dawn of a new millennium, Marpe looks to guide USD women's basketball to the top of the conference standings and make a much anticipated return to the post season.

### The Secrets to Marpe's Successful 20 Years at USD

Coach Marpe begins her 27th year as a collegiate head coach and her 20th patrolling the sidelines for the University of San Diego. The changes she has witnessed in the game of women's basketball and the skills and athleticism of today's student-athletes, is nothing short of staggering.

Adapting to the changing environment is key to building a winning program. Success through change permeates Marpe's long and distinguished coaching career and, her 312 career victories attest to her ability to flourish in a changing environment. Despite the myriad of changes in women's college basketball and the ever-increasing skills of the student-athletes who play them, Marpe's success comes as a result of embracing - not resisting change. Her versatility was proven in 1998-99 when the Toreros posted their first winning campaign at 14-13 since 1992-93 and a fourth place showing in increasingly competitive WCC. Marpe relied on a freshman point guard to run the Torero offense and despite inexperience and injuries at key positions, orchestrated USD to a 6-1 league mark at home - the second best record in the entire WCC.

### 1997-98 WCC Coach of the Year

USD's success in 1998-99 was a continuation of the momentum established by the Toreros in 1997-98 when Marpe's young Toreros made a radical change for the better as her squad rebounded from a rugged 5-22 finish in 1996-97 to place fifth in the West Coast Conference with an 8-6 WCC mark, 13-14 overall. The eight victory improvement was one of the biggest single season turn-arounds in league history, and earned Marpe her second WCC Coach of the Year honor - also winning the award in 1993.

## Dean Marpe

As the "dean" of West Coast Conference coaches, Marpe possesses the necessary perspective to appreciate the radical changes in the league. During her tenure at Alcalá Park, Marpe has twice won WCC Coach of the Year honors. She shared the award in 1993 after leading the Toreros into the NCAA Tournament for the first and only time in school history - upsetting Santa Clara in the WCC Tournament Championship. Marpe won the award in 1997-98 after leading her team to one of the largest single-season turn-arounds in WCC history - an improvement of eight games.

Last season, Marpe led the Toreros to home upset victories against #25 Santa Clara, Saint Mary's, Pepperdine and an overtime win against Portland. All four WCC foes slayed in the USD Sports Center, advanced to the post season. The victory against the Broncos was the Torero's first win against a Top-25 opponent since 1992-93.

## Excellence On and Off the Court

Marpe is the active leader in career coaching victories with 225 at USD and ranks third among conference coaches in WCC wins (90). In 14 WCC seasons, Marpe has produced 15 All-WCC performers, 15 WCC All-Academic selections and has placed four players on the WCC All-Freshman teams. In 1998-99, junior guard Susie Erpelding, became the first Torero women's basketball player to earn GTE/CoSIDA First Team All-Academic America honors.

## Prior To USD

Prior to arriving at USD, Marpe directed the University of New Mexico to seven seasons of success on and off the court. The Lobos were 51-30 in Marpe's last three seasons, having posted wins over two nationally-ranked teams in the same season. Playing in "The Pit", the UNM women drew over 1,000 a game with crowds reaching the 2,000-3,000 mark on occasion — attendance figures unheard of in the mid-70s. By the time she left the Albuquerque campus, Marpe had led the Lobos to consecutive finishes in the AP Top 20 and six AIAW Regional appearances in seven years.

## In the Beginning

Marpe broke into the coaching ranks at Spring Lake (MN) High in 1971 after earning a Bachelor's degree in Physical Education at the University of Minnesota that same year. Along with heading women's basketball, Marpe served as the head coach for women's volleyball, softball and track. In three basketball seasons, her teams compiled a 53-1 record.

## Involvement

The Minnesota native strongly emphasizes community involvement and has stressed it to every team she has ever coached. Marpe feels that "It is very important to remember who you are and where you come from, and also to give back to the people around you or to those who aren't as fortunate."

Marpe also has served as a voting member of the AP Top 20 Poll, the Kodak All-American selection board and the Western Regional seeding committee. In 1990, she was a member of the gold medal-winning East coaching staff at the U.S. Olympic Festival. Kathy's family is also involved in the program. Her mother, Genevieve, assists in the basketball office keeping in touch with the Torero women's basketball alumni and extended family.

## The Future

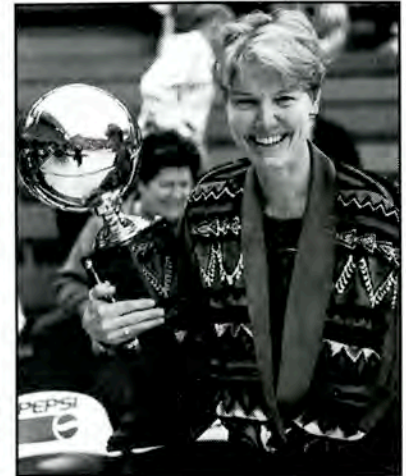
After surpassing 300 career victories and working with a quality group of veteran returners and exciting newcomers on the rise, Coach Marpe feels rejuvenated and excited for the upcoming season, her 20th year guiding the Torero hoops fortunes.

"A couple years ago it would have really seemed like 20 years. Now, it's like, Wow! 20 again," Marpe said.

Marpe credits much of her optimism and excitement to the youth and energy of her coaching staff and the enthusiasm has been infectious. Oh, and the quality of her team also brings a smile to her face.

Added Marpe, "This group of athletes is so pleasant to work with and having young assistants brings new vigor."

Erik Johnson begins his second season on USD's staff, bringing proven experience as a recruiter, motivator and enthusiastic teacher of the game. The program's recruiting coordinator, Erik is also in charge of post play instruction, scouting and practice planning.

Before joining the Torero staff, Johnson spent four seasons at the University of Rhode Island - the last two as first assistant under head coach Linda Ziemke. In addition to managing the bulk of the recruiting duties for the Rams, Johnson's primary coaching responsibilities at URI included developing post players, shooting, defense and scouting.

A native of San Jose, CA, Johnson was a four-year letter-winner at UC San Diego, leading the Tritons to three NCAA Division III Tournament appearances including a Sweet-16. He served as captain and was the team's leading scorer as a senior completing his career as the all-time career and single-season three-point record holder.

Johnson holds a Bachelor's degree in Psychology from UC San Diego (1994) and completed his Master's Degree in Adult Education from the University of Rhode Island in 1997. Johnson recently married Laura Davis, a member of the USA National Volleyball team, and currently resides in Mira Mesa.

**NADINE MASTROLEO - 2ND YEAR**

Nadine Mastroleo enters her second year at USD after spending three years as the first assistant at Colgate University, under head coach Ron Rohn. Mastroleo was involved in all facets of the Red Raiders recruiting efforts. In charge of Academic Advisement for the Toreros, Nadine also is in charge of point guard development, recruiting, scouting and practice planning.

In her playing career, Mastroleo spent one season at Syracuse before transferring to University at Buffalo, where she twice led the Royals to East Coast Conference championships and served as team captain in her senior season. While at Syracuse she was awarded the Mary Ann Renahan award given to the player demonstrating tremendous courage and desire, and while at Buffalo won Most Improved honors and the coaches award following her senior campaign.

A native of Buffalo, NY, Mastroleo served on the Health and Wellness Committee at Colgate and coordinated a student-athlete lecture series, obtaining funding through the Patriot League. She also coordinated Colgate's Fighting Eating Disorders Group (FEDS) throughout the university community. Mastroleo graduated in 1994 with a Bachelor's degree in Health and Human Services from Buffalo.

**LAKEYSHA WRIGHT - 4TH YEAR**

Lakeysha Wright enters her fourth season as a member of the USD coaching staff. Wright joined the program after a five-year run with San Diego State; four years as a player and one as a student assistant coach. During her three years at USD, she has been involved in recruiting, scouting, developing the skills of perimeter players and assists with practice planning.

Wright made a substantial impact with the Aztecs from 1991-95. During her four year career, she helped lead SDSU to three NCAA Tournament appearances and back-to-back WAC titles. The Aztecs

had a 87-31 record during her career. Wright ranks fourth all-time in San Diego State history in assists (358) and ninth in steals (153).

She was named to the Western Athletic Conference All-Tournament Team and earned All-Defensive Team honors. She also was an All-WAC Honorable Mention selection in 1995. During her senior season, Wright was named team MVP and best defensive player along with her twin sister Falisha - who played in the American Basketball League for three seasons. In her last season with the Aztecs, she dished out 165 assists, a total that ranks seventh on the Aztecs' all-time single season assist chart.

Wright is a native of Paterson, New Jersey and holds a bachelor's degree in physical education received from San Diego State in 1996.

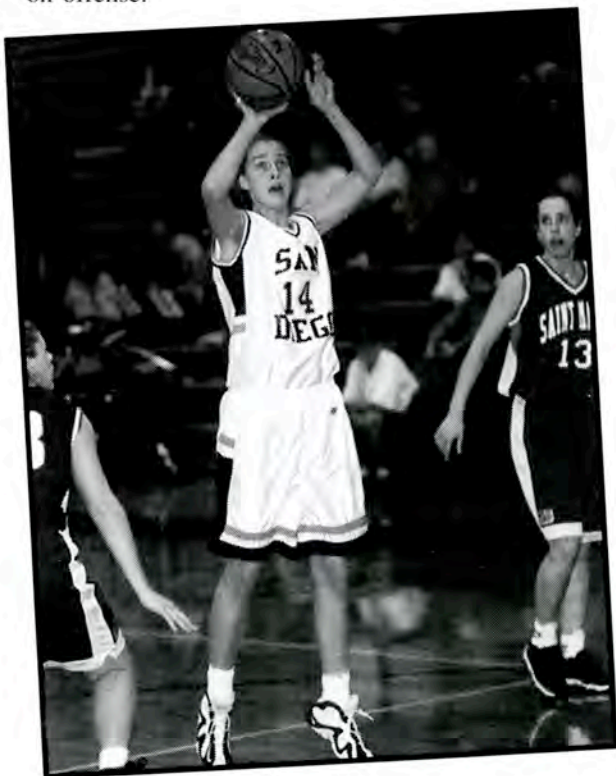

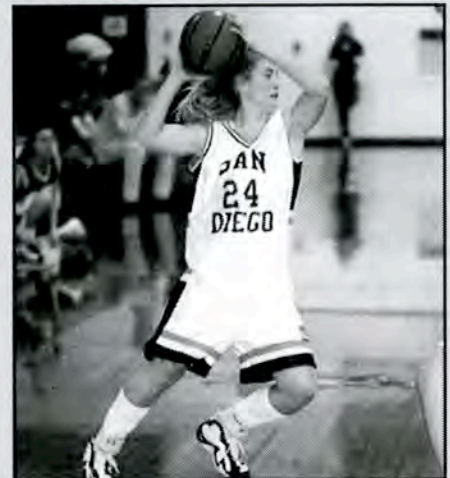

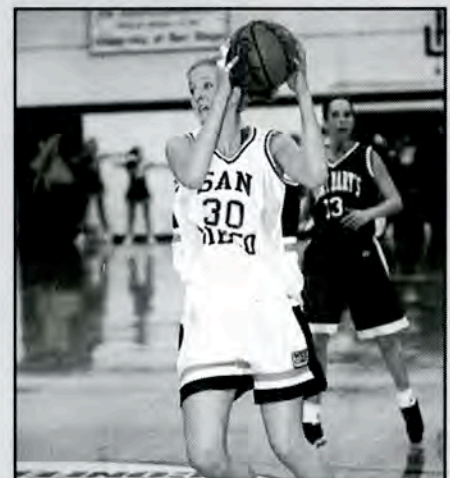

## The West Coast Conference

When the West Coast Conference got its start back in 1952, the founders really had only one goal in mind - to create a convenient way for five Bay Area schools to play basketball. What has grown from that original vision 46 years ago is a marvelous cohesive athletics league which is competitive at the national level in 13 sports.

The eight current members of the WCC span the Western United States from Canada to Mexico. Though the institutions range from the pine forests of the Northwest to the sun-drenched beaches of Southern California, the combined excellence in athletics and academics sets the conference apart on the national scene and draws the individual institutions together in a common mission.

The WCC sponsors championships in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross-country, men's and women's golf, women's rowing, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis and women's volleyball. The league was chartered by five Bay Area institutions (Pacific, Saint Mary's, San Francisco, San Jose State and Santa Clara) as the California Basketball Association, playing its first game on January 2, 1953. After two seasons of play under that name, the conference expanded to include Loyola Marymount and Pepperdine in 1955, and became the "West Coast Athletic Conference" in 1956. The name was shortened to "West Coast Conference" in 1989. The current alignment of Gonzaga, Loyola Marymount, Pepperdine, Portland, Saint Mary's, San Diego, San Francisco and Santa Clara has remained unchanged since 1979, making the WCC the third

most stable conference in the nation. Only the Ivy League and Pacific-10 have been together longer.

The 1999-2000 season marks the 13th year for the WCC's women's basketball league, one of the most improved in the nation. USF's appearance in the 1996 NCAA Sweet 16 was the first ever for a WCC team. 1998-99 was a breakthrough season for the conference. For the first time in women's basketball history and just the second time in conference history, four

WCC schools qualified for the post-season. Saint Mary's won the conference tournament to earn the automatic bid and was joined in the NCAAs by Santa Clara. In addition, WCC co-champion Pepperdine and Portland received berths in the WNIT. The only other time half the conference qualified for post-season play was 1989 when four men's basketball squads (NCAA: Saint Mary's, Loyola Marymount; NIT: Pepperdine, Santa Clara) managed the feat.

WCC women's basketball started in 1985 with seven teams, including current members Loyola Marymount, Pepperdine, San Diego, San Francisco and Santa Clara. Nevada and U.S. International left the WCC in 1987, replaced by Gonzaga, Portland and Saint Mary's.

In the first 14 WCC seasons, seven women's teams have claimed the regular season or tournament title. As for its overall success, the WCC has annually advanced at least one team to a national championship semifinal since 1989. League members have won over 30 NCAA team and individual championships overall, most recently as USD junior Zuzana Lesenarova won the 1999 NCAA women's tennis singles title.

## 1998-1999 Season In Review

## Toreros Post First Winning Season in Five Years; Dominant on Defense and at the USD Sports Center

### Continuing the Rise

1998-99 may not have been a breakthrough year for the University of San Diego, but it was a season of multiple improvements both offensively and defensively. USD posted a 14-13 record in 1998-99, the Torero's first winning campaign since 1992-93. Entering a new season poised on the brink of a new millennium, the Toreros appear ready to take the next step and challenge in the continually improving West Coast Conference.

### Best Start of the Decade

USD opened the season with a 6-4 record to open non-conference play - the Torero's best start since the 1989-90 campaign when they went 9-1. San Diego opened with a 23 point victory against UC Irvine (11-14-98) and took to the road for a Pacific Northwest swing where they blitzed a pair of Big Sky opponents, Portland State, 80-44 (11-20-98) and Eastern Washington, 56-35 (11-22-98). San Diego's offense was firing on all cylinders during their best start of the 90's, outscoring their opponents by a average of 22.2 points per game in their six wins.

### 300th Victory for Marpe

The victory against the PSU Vikings was especially meaningful for the Toreros since it was career victory number 300 for USD head coach Kathy Marpe. In her 19<sup>th</sup> season guiding the Toreros and her 25<sup>th</sup> year in collegiate coaching, Marpe joined an elite group of current and former coaches to surpass the 300 win plateau.

### West Coast Conference Action

USD finished the non-conference schedule with 7-5 mark and entered West Coast Conference play and 1999 with a 72-60 victory against Pacific (1-2-99) in the USD Sports Center. San Diego hosted San Francisco in the WCC opener and downed the Lady Dons 58-49. The Toreros faced a tougher challenge the next night hosting defending league champion Santa Clara. After missing the conference opener with a broken toe, junior forward, Jessica Gray returned to the Torero lineup, pouring in a game-high 18 points to power USD to a 53-51 win against the Broncos who were ranked 25<sup>th</sup> in the nation at the time. It was USD's first victory against a top-25 opponent since 1992-93.

Three days later, USD hosted perennial WCC

power Saint Mary's and USD junior guard Susie Erpelding nailed a buzzer beater near the top of the key to capture the thrilling 55-54 victory to improve to 3-0 in league play and pushed their winning streak to four games - their longest string of the season. The win was the Toreros' first against SMC since 1995-96.

### Road Weary

Unfortunately for the Toreros, they had to leave the friendly confines of the USD Sports Center and travel to Moraga for a rematch against Saint Mary's. USD could not find an answer to Gaels offense and dropped a tough 55-48 decision. The Toreros dropped their next three WCC contests, including road losses to Pepperdine (1-22-99) and Loyola Marymount (1-23-99). USD hosted the Lions on their home floor the following week and lost a 66-65 battle on a last second shot for their only home WCC setback of the season. LMU was the only league school to sweep the Toreros in 1998-99.

### Slaying Conference Dragons

San Diego snapped their four game conference skid with a convincing 76-72 victory against league-leading Pepperdine (1-30-99) behind a 20 point performance from Erpelding. The Toreros took a 5-4 league mark with them on the Pacific Northwest swing to Gonzaga (2-4-99) and Portland (2-6-99) losing both. USD had another immediate shot of redemption hosting the Pilots and Bulldogs the following week with entirely different outcomes. The Toreros shocked Portland (2-11-99) in a 73-70 overtime victory in front of a regional television audience. Gray came up big for the Toreros once again with 17 points and 11 rebounds and was equally impressive two days later with a 19 point 10 rebound performance against Gonzaga (2-13-99) in USD's 72-54 win.

### Victory For the Road Warriors

San Diego returned to the road in search of their first road win since late November and did not find it against eventual league co-champion Santa Clara (2-19-99), losing 67-51 to the Broncos. USD finally broke into the road win column the next night with a 52-42 victory against San Francisco (2-20-99) to sweep the Lady Dons for the first time since 1993-94. The victory secured a .500 WCC season for the Toreros.

### Erpelding = Grand Scorer

USD made a brief appearance at the 1999 West Coast Conference Tournament, falling to Portland, 63-48 in the opening round at Toso Pavilion in Santa Clara. Erpelding provided the lone Torero highlight, scoring a team-high 17 points to reach exactly 1,000 points in her USD career.

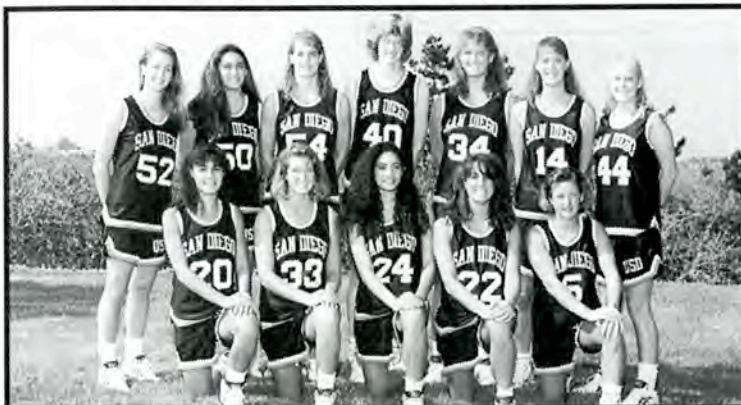

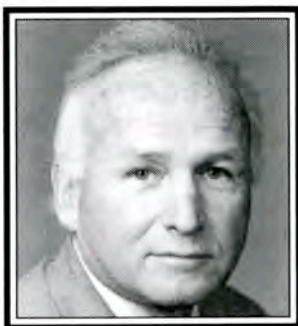

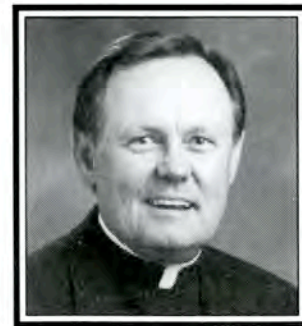

## **TOM IANNAONE** **Director Of Athletics**



Tom Iannaone is in his twelfth year as Director of Athletics at the University of San Diego. He was named Director of Athletics on September 1, 1988 after holding the same position the previous four years at St. Francis College of Pennsylvania.

At USD, Iannaone directs an Athletic Department that includes sixteen NCAA Division I intercollegiate varsity teams, eight men's and eight women's, plus intramurals and recreation.

In the last eleven years behind his direction and leadership, Torero Athletics has enjoyed successes both on and off the playing field. His accomplishments at USD include an internal reorganization of the athletic department, plus improvements in the major areas of personnel, scholarship assistance, facilities, promotions and marketing, fund raising, drug education, academic support, and a university approved plan for scholarship support and sports sponsorship. In addition, he was instrumental in USD gaining membership to the Pioneer Football League, which began play in 1993. He has served on the I-AA Athletic Directors Association Executive Committee; and is past Chairman of the West Coast Conference Athletics Directors Committee.

During Iannaone's tenure, facilities at the USD Sports Center, along with all athletic fields, have seen vast improvements. Improvements at the Sports Center include complete renovations of both the north and south wings that added offices for administrators and coaches; additional locker rooms for women's basketball, volleyball and women's soccer; an athletic department conference room; and an academic support room. Torero Stadium, where football, men's and women's soccer compete, was widened to accommodate soccer, and added a state-of-the-art lighting system and scoreboard. The Softball Complex has benefitted with a new dugouts, scoreboard, batting cages and additional seating. Additionally, The Canyon Field received lighting and a complete renovation for intercollegiate practices and intramural use. This past spring ground broke on the Jenny Craig Pavilion, a new 5,000 seat multi-purpose facility that will be home for USD basketball and volleyball, and benefit the entire university community.

On the playing fields, USD has sent twenty-four teams to NCAA Tournaments since Iannaone's arrival in the Fall of 1988. Additionally, the school has captured eight conference championships; twenty-three NCAA All-Americans; seventeen CoSIDA/GTE Academic All-Americans; nineteen conference Coaches of the Year; fifteen conference Players of the Year; and three West Coast Conference Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Besides having the 1999 NCAA National Champion in women's tennis (Zuzana Lesenarova), the Torero athletic program came out on top of the WCC schools in terms of overall strength in 1999 (based on an unofficial scoring system produced by USD each season. For the first time, the 1998-99 combined men's and women's athletics programs at USD ranked first in the standings. Since 1988 the university has been the host site for NCAA Tournament events for women's volleyball, men's soccer and women's tennis.

Prior to USD, Iannaone built an impressive list of credentials at St. Francis College as Director of Athletics between 1984-87. His major contributions included the expansion of sports offerings and scholarships for both men and women, improved budgets, renovation of athletic facilities, the hiring of additional staff, and the establishment of a master plan for the future and continual development of athletics. He served on several committees, most notably the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Infractions committee and the Northeast Conference committee on conference development.

He served as assistant Director of Athletics at Fordham University between 1977-84. Along with his administrative duties, he was assistant football coach for the Rams. Between 1975-78, he acted as offensive coordinator and backfield coach as Fordham captured 19 victories in their final 24 games during this span. The '77 squad was and remains the highest scoring team in Fordham history, averaging 34 points per game. In 1983 he was presented the prestigious Jack Coffey Award by the Alumni Association for his outstanding contributions to Fordham athletics. He also served on various Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference committees.

Prior to Fordham, Iannaone taught physical education and coached track and field, and football in Connecticut Public School Districts from 1964-76. He made his collegiate football coaching debut as an offensive backfield coach at Western Connecticut State University in 1974. A 1964 graduate of the University of Connecticut, Iannaone received his master of science degree in physical education from Southern Connecticut State University in 1973.

Tom and his wife, Cynthia, have three children: Tom Jr., Jennifer and Eric. All three are graduates of the University of San Diego.

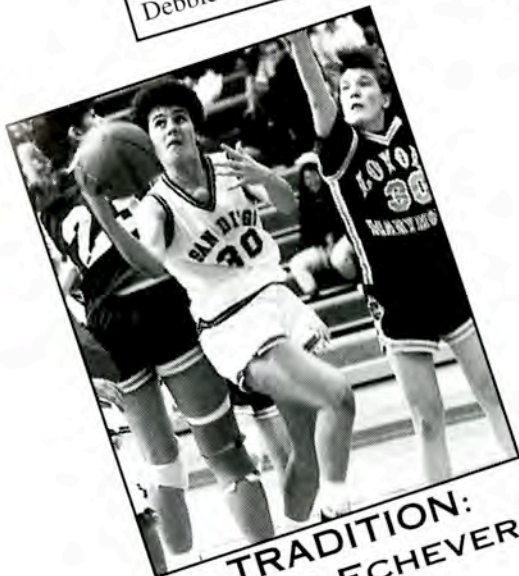

## Discover the University of San Diego

### SETTING

The University of San Diego is an independent Catholic institution of higher education. Founded in 1949, USD is located on 180 acres overlooking Mission Bay, San Diego Harbor and the Pacific Ocean. The campus is named Alcalá Park and is located just 10 minutes from downtown San Diego. The campus was named after a Spanish village near Madrid - Alcalá de Henares. Founded by the Greeks as Complutum, the village was later renamed Al Kala (the Castle) by the Moslems. Christians recaptured the village centuries later and founded a university whose buildings became the inspiration for USD's architectural style.

### THE CAMPUS

The USD campus is regarded as one of the most architecturally unique institutions in the country, featuring 18 major buildings designed in an ornamental 16th

century Spanish Renaissance style. Since 1984, USD has completed eleven major construction and expansion projects. A five-story parking garage (1,100 spaces) was completed in 1998. The 5,000 seat Jenny Craig Pavilion, USD's new Sports/Activity Center, is due to open in the fall of 2000; and this past October was the ground breaking ceremony for the Joan B. Kroc Peace Institute. A landscaped fountain plaza was finished in the fall of 1995, connecting the entrances of the Immaculata and Hughes Administration Center. In 1992, the university completed the 45,000 square foot Loma Hall, which includes an expanded bookstore, a larger mail center, classrooms and laboratories. In 1990, the renovated Katherine M. and George M. Pardee Jr. Legal Research Center opened, a facility that offers the latest in information technology.

### ACADEMICS

USD enrolls more than 6,800 students who have a choice of more than 50 undergraduate and graduate degree programs. The university's academic units include the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Schools of Business Administration, Education, Law and Nursing. Class size generally averages between 18-25 students with the student to teacher ratio being 18:1. Over 97 percent of USD's full-time faculty hold doctorates.

In the annual ratings of the country's colleges and universities, published by *U.S. News & World Report*, USD moved from the regional to national category in 1994. The university is ranked among the top 100 schools in the nation.



### DID YOU KNOW ?

• The University of San Diego was selected by the John Templeton Foundation for its 1997-98 Honor Roll of Character-Building Colleges. The honor roll recognizes 135 four year accredited undergraduate institutions that emphasize character building an integral part of the college experience. Foundation officials made special mention of USD's "Ethics Across the Curriculum," a campus-wide initiative funded with a two-year, \$138,000 grant from the E.L. Wiegand Foundation. USD is one of eight California colleges and universities named to the honor roll.

### STUDENT LIFE

Student activities include cultural events, dances, boat cruises, beach parties, BBQ's, concerts, comedy nights, symposia and much more. Students participate in a wide range of volunteer projects such as adult literacy tutoring, senior citizen outreach, and house building in Tijuana. The intramural program is also an integral part of student life at USD with over two-thirds of the USD community partaking in intramural sports.

### ATHLETICS

USD is a member of the West Coast Conference for nearly all sports and competes in 16 intercollegiate sports on the NCAA Division I level. The football team completed its sixth season in the Pioneer Football League. Women's sports include: basketball, crew, cross country, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball. Men's sports include: baseball, basketball, crew, cross country, golf, football, soccer and tennis. Since 1990 USD teams have won 7 conference championships; made 20 post-season appearances; had 19 Conference Coaches of the Year; 16 Conference Players of the Year; 11 Conference Freshman of the Year; 3 WCC Scholar Athletes of the Year; and 21 NCAA All-Americans. This past year, Zuzana Lesenarova, a three-time NCAA All-American on the women's tennis team, became the school's first ever national champion by winning the 1999 NCAA Women's Tennis Singles Championship. Winner of five of the last six ITA Grand Slam singles titles, Zuzana is currently ranked No. 1 in the nation for the 1999-2000 season.

### USD Academic Support

The USD Athletic Academic Support Program is designed to assist and motivate student-athletes in their journey and progress towards their academic goals, and ultimately graduation. The primary objective is to improve the student-athletes' study skills, support them in their academic work, and encourage scholastic achievement. It is essential that student-athletes receive the necessary academic assistance to continue normal progress toward a degree while participating in athletics.

USD student-athletes receive assistance through advising, progress reports, academic tutors, campus learning centers, such as the Logic, Math, and Writing Centers, and the Accelerated Study Program. The Accelerated Study Program provides a monitored, quiet area open only to the student-athletes to ensure quality study time. These services are available to all USD student-athletes.

## Torero Strength and Conditioning

The USD strength and conditioning program is under the direction of Steve Brown who is in his fifth year. The University of San Diego athletic department recognizes the need for all athletes of all sports to engage in a comprehensive strength and conditioning program. The USD strength and conditioning program has been designed to develop functional strength, speed, power and endurance. The development of these physical attributes is ineffective if the athletes are not able to carry them over to the playing field. Adhering to a properly designed program of strength training, conditioning and nutrition can enable our men and women to become the best possible athletes they can be, while simultaneously reducing the incidence of injury.

The heart of the strength and conditioning program is the USD Sports Center weight room. It is open exclusively to student-athletes at specific times each day. The weight room contains 5,000 square feet of Olympic platforms, free-weights, selectorized machines, dumbbells and cardiovascular equipment.

USD student-athletes receive intensive instruction on proper weight training technique; speed, power and agility development; and sport-specific conditioning. Their strength and conditioning programs are specific to the nature of their sport or position. Each athlete is individually monitored throughout their program to ensure the greatest chance of athletic progress.
