Construction on the University of San Diego College for Women began in September, 1950. Delayed because of a strike, it wasn't finished until May, 1952.

For most of the men who have pondered the idea of a University, the dream and the school have been hard to come by. The idea first came to Bishop Buddy after he first came to San Diego. His idea consisted of a four year liberal arts college including a College for Women, a College for Men, a School of Theology, and a School of Law.

Success depends a lot on first impressions and this is why the Bishop asked the Religious of the Sacred Heart to build a college for women in San Diego. It was felt they would help establish the excellence of the enterprise so Bishop Buddy shared his plans with Mother Rosalie Hill. The 167 acres chosen was named Alcala Park in honor of Father Junipero Serra's first California mission. Groundbreaking ceremonies were in May, 1948 and the foundation was laid on September 22, 1950. The architecture, chosen by Mother Hill, is Spanish Renaissance. She had been favorably impressed by the architecture of the University of Alcala in Spain and she based part of her choice on this.

Construction was completed in May, 1952 although classes had begun February 11, 1952. By fall, 1952, more than 100 women had registered. Today the enrollment is 685. One of the aims of the College is the refinement of taste through an appreciation of beauty; its principle function is to produce the most intelligent womanhood possible.

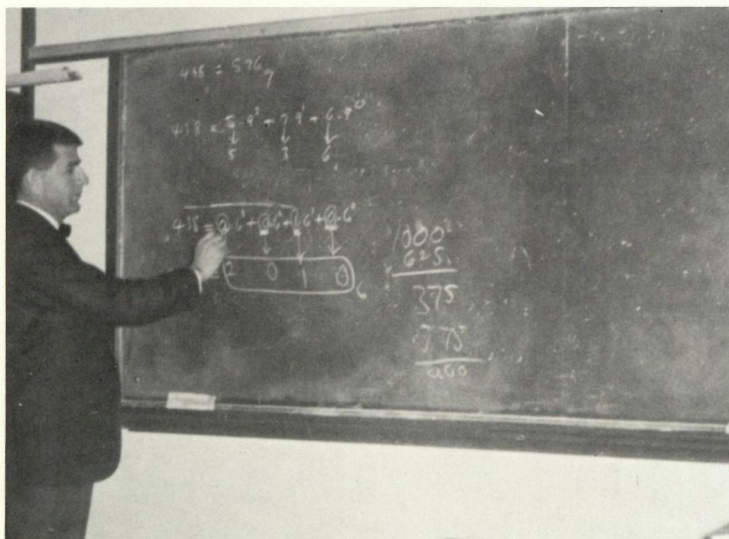


Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies Mobile Radiosotope Training Laboratory: Fall Semester, 1966

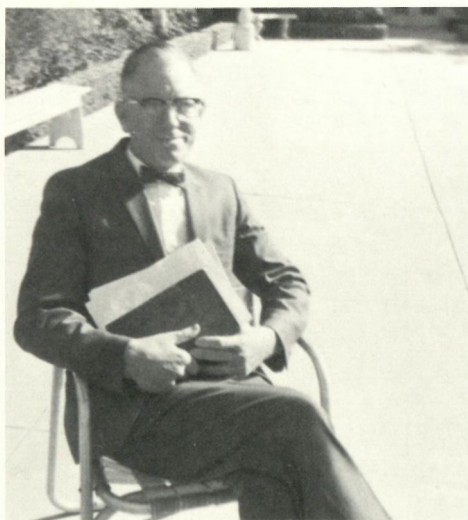

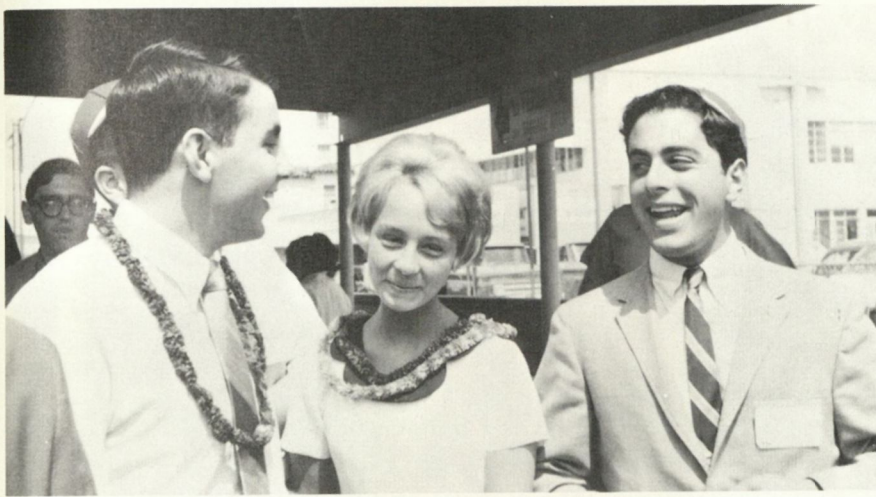

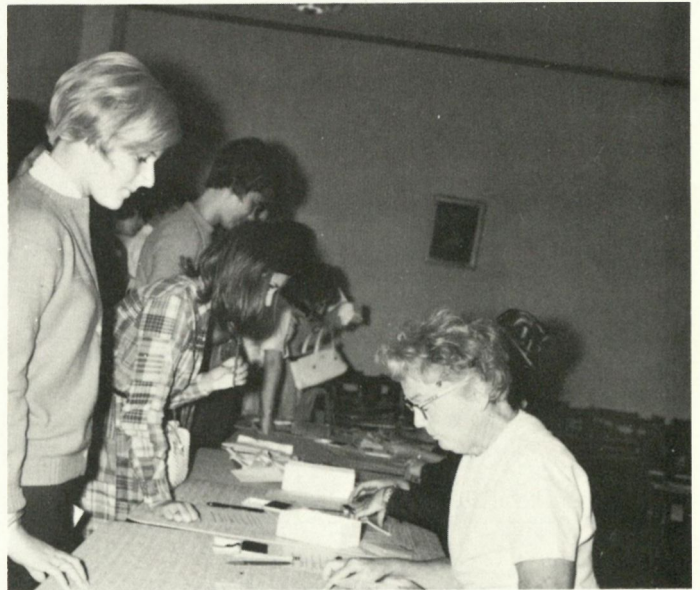

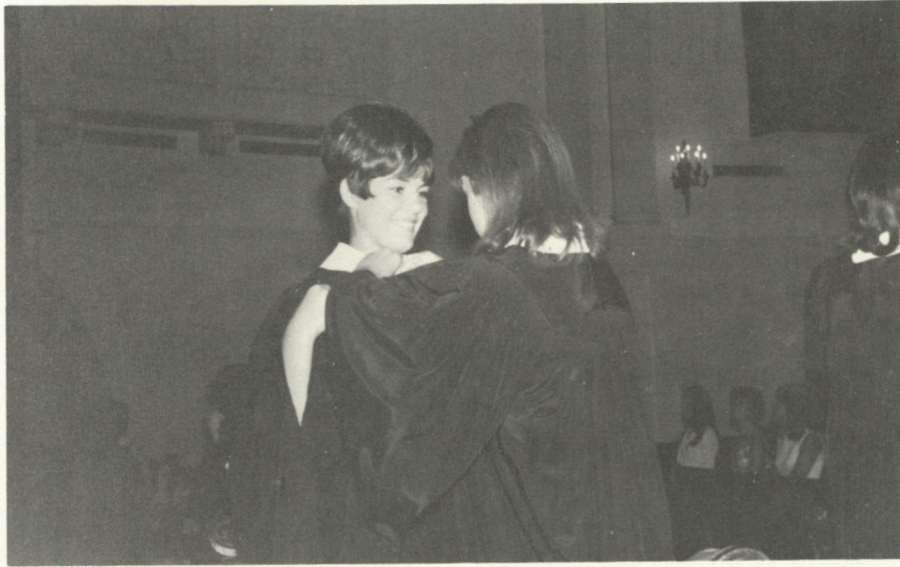

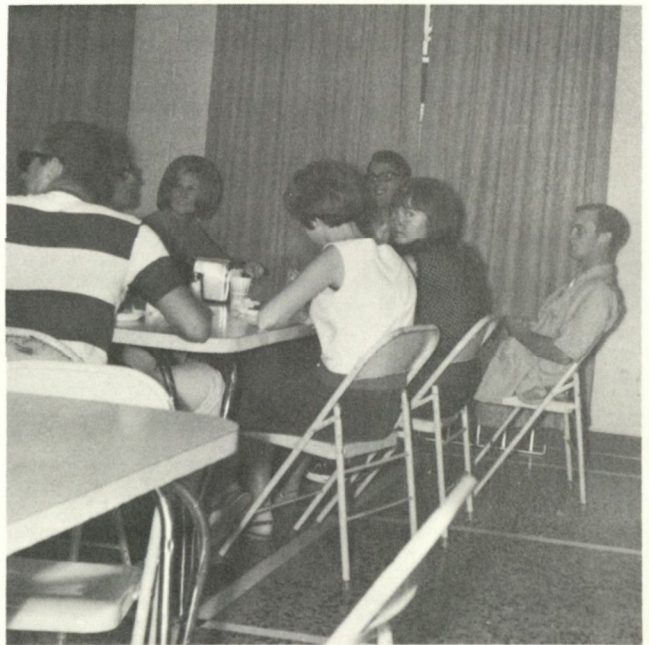

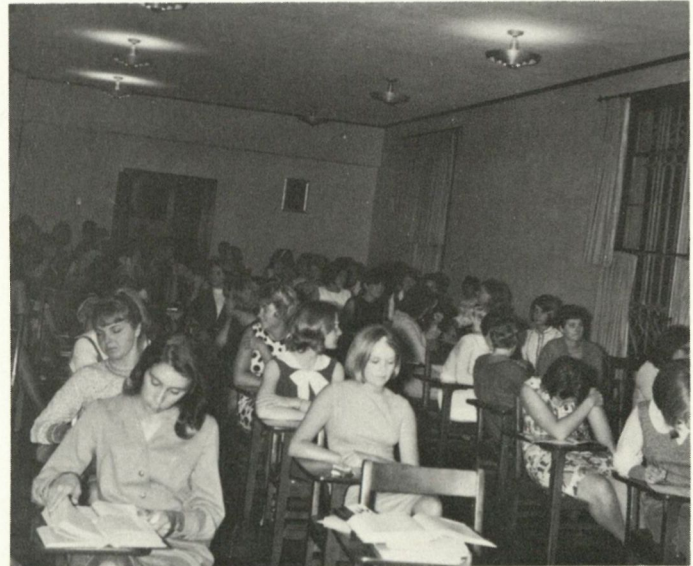

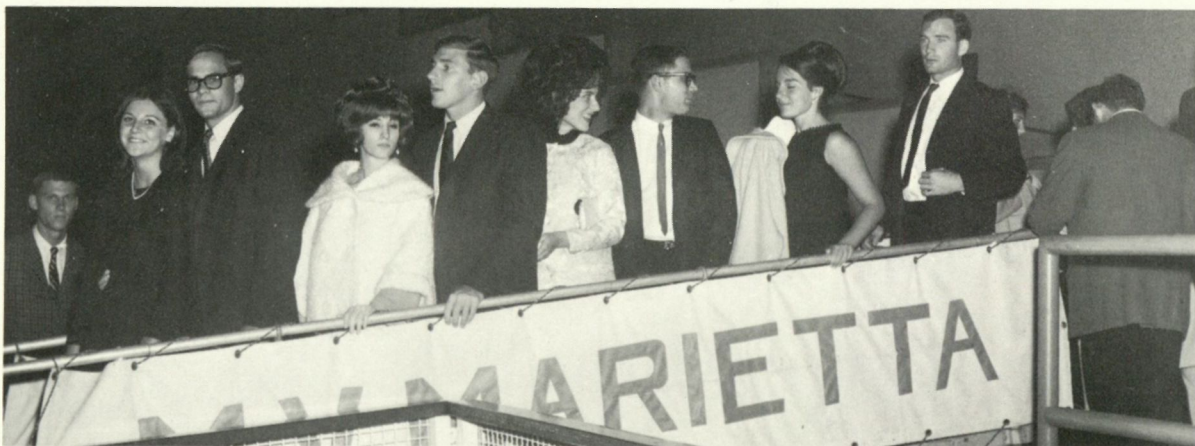

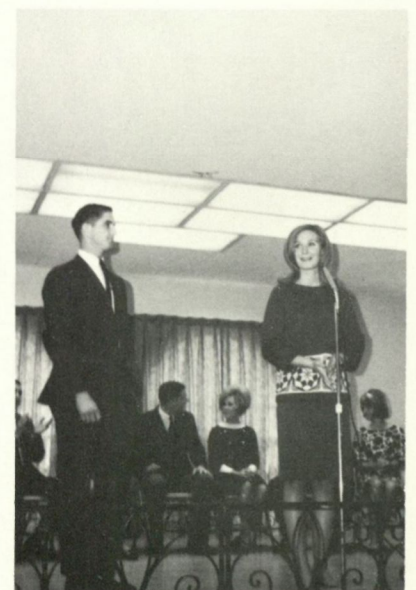

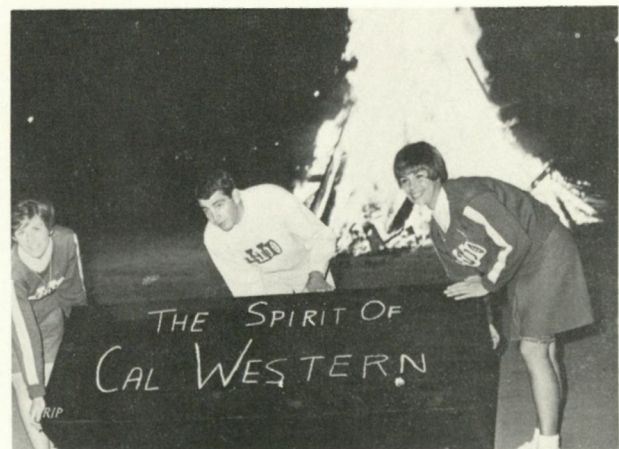

action this year. He is the "speedee" on the court. His potential for next year is high and it looks good for the whole team.

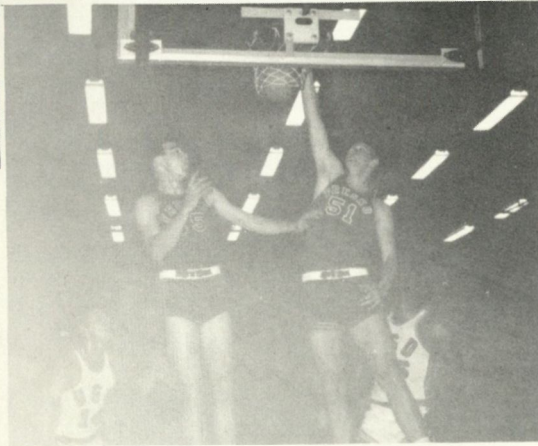
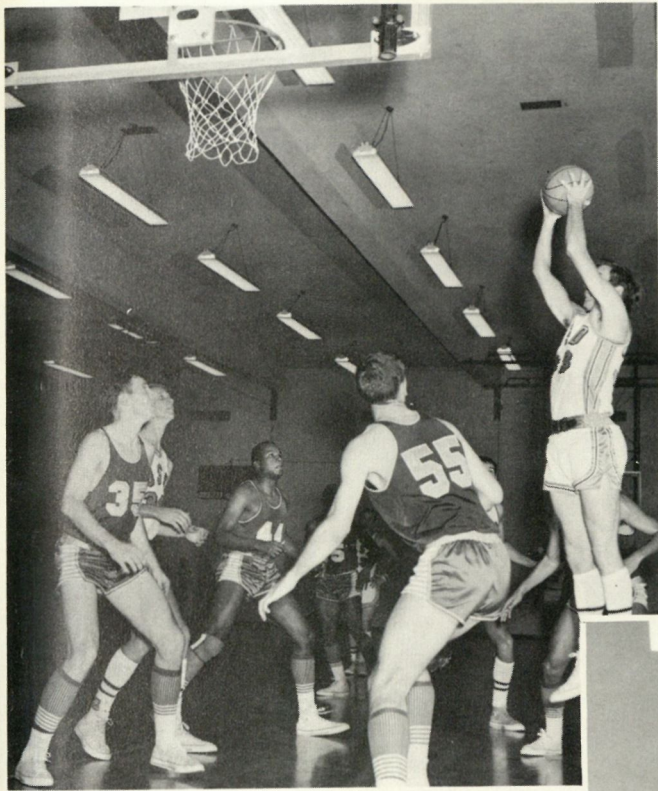

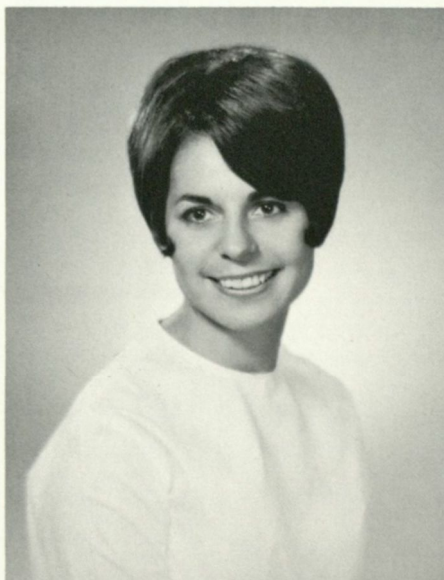

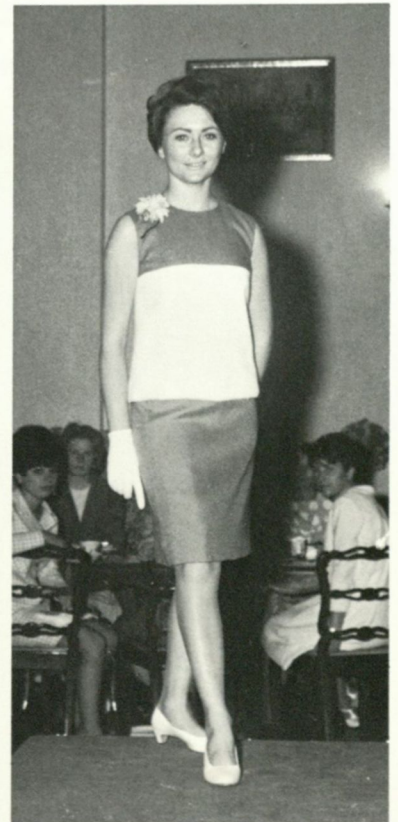
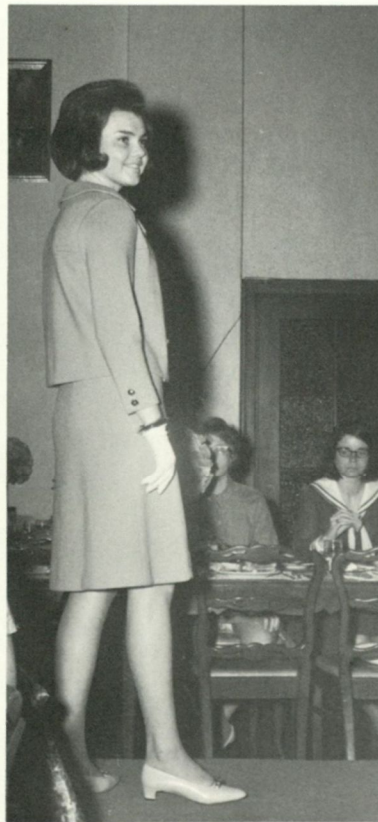
