

This is the day the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it!



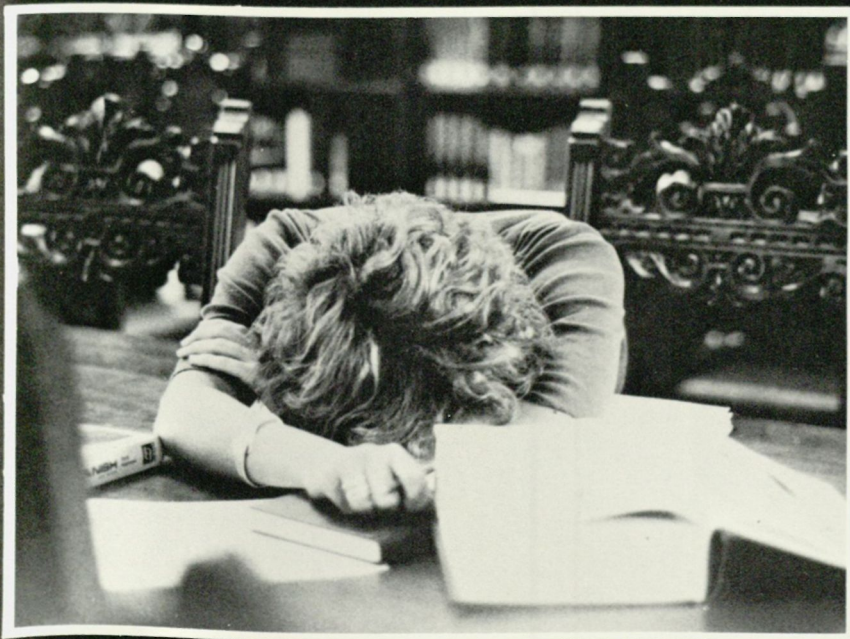
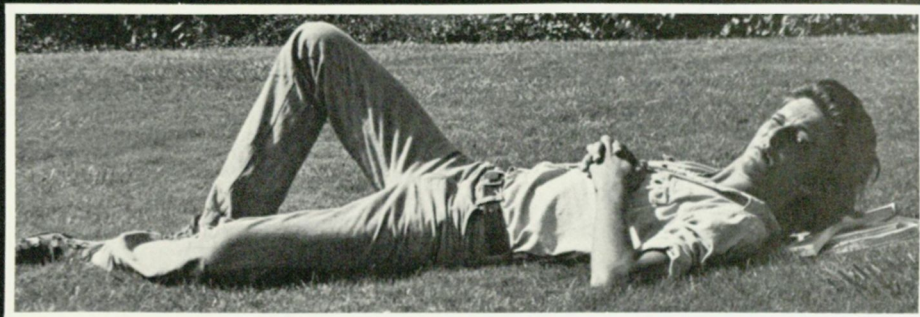
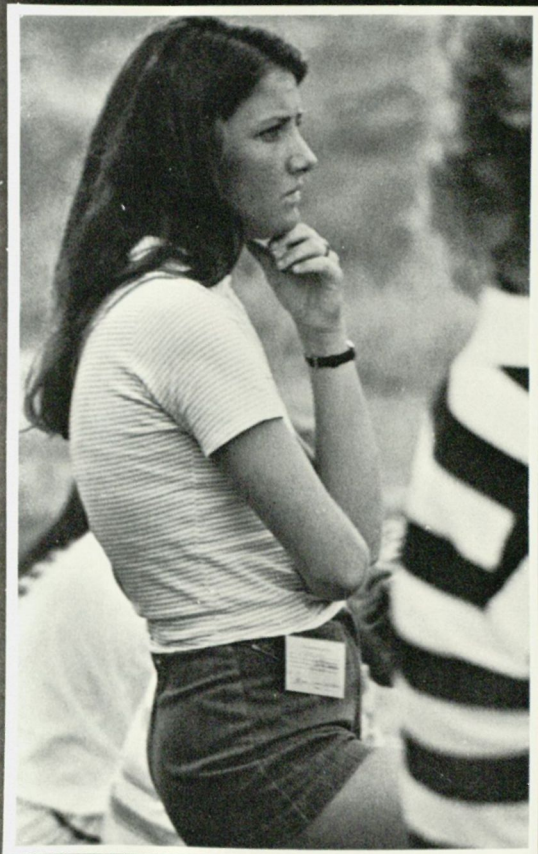

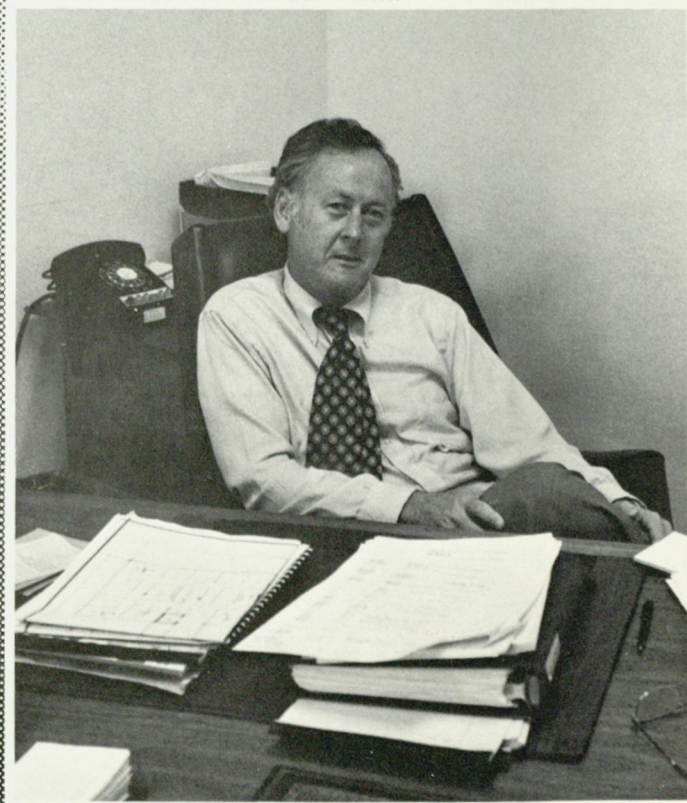
SISTER SALLY M. FURAY VICE-PRESIDENT & PROVOST

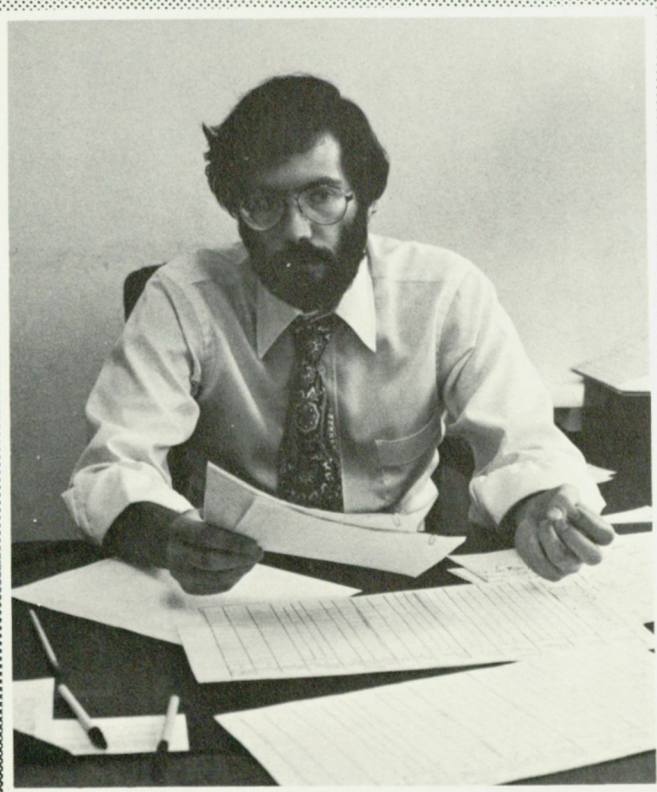
FATHER LARRY DOLAN-CHAPLAIN

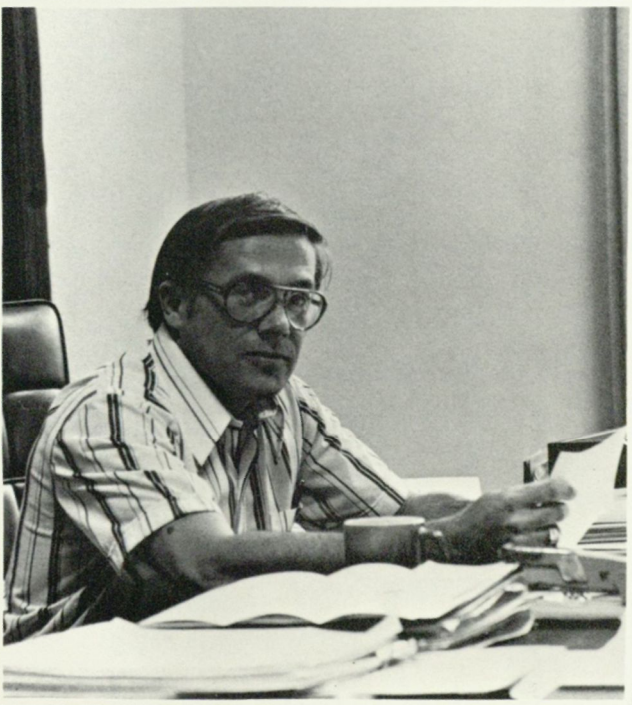
THOMAS F. BURKE-STUDENTS

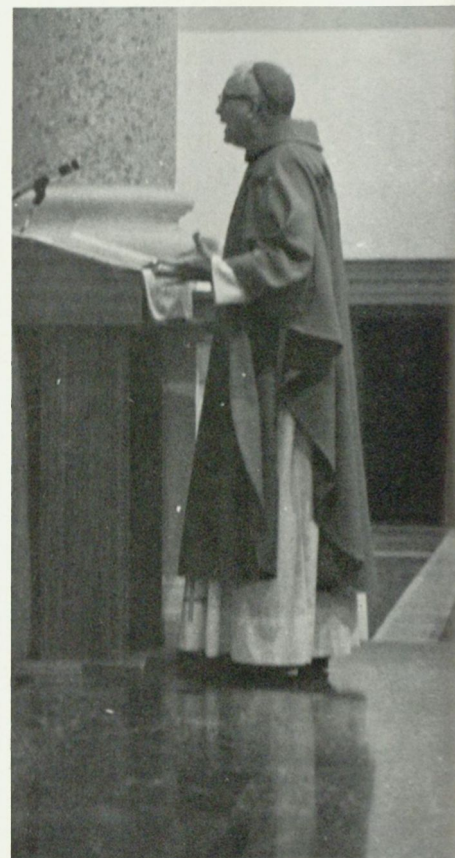
DONALD B. PETERSON COLLEGE OF ARTS & SCIENCES

CHOIR

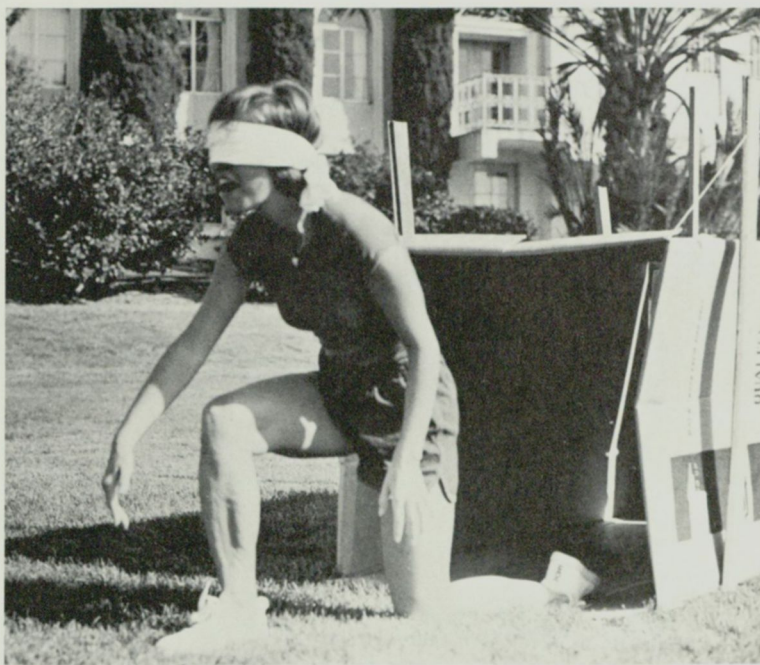

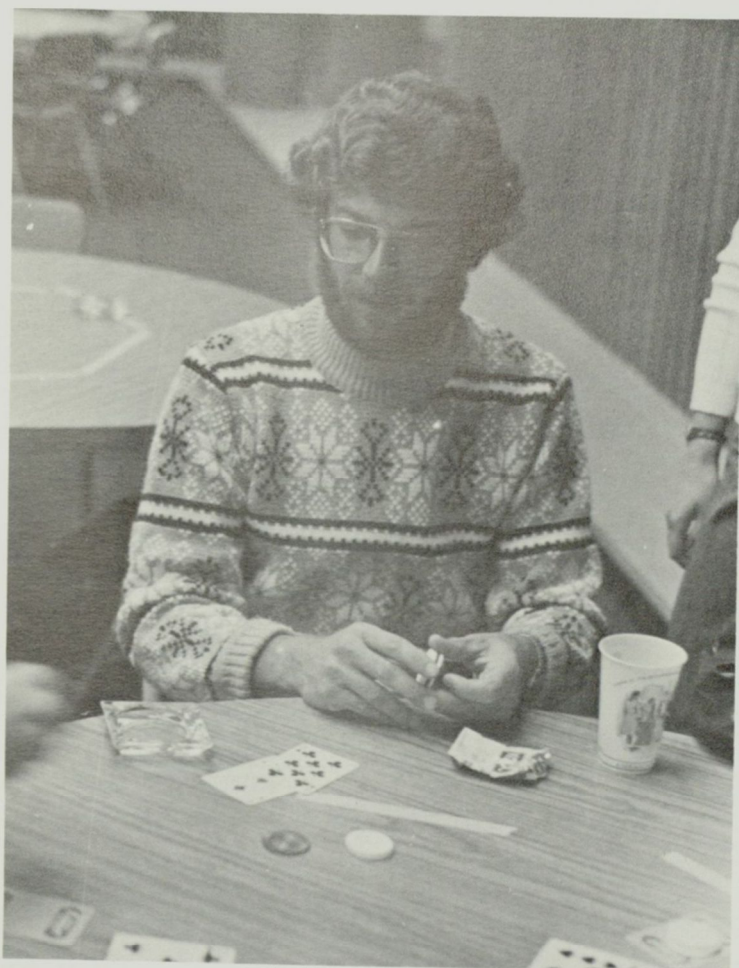
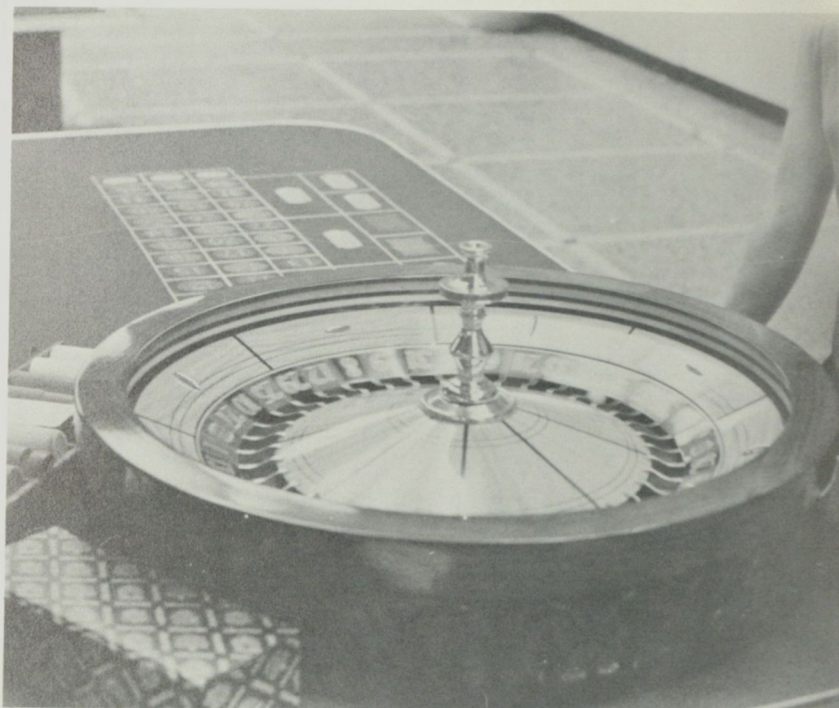

CASINO NIGHT

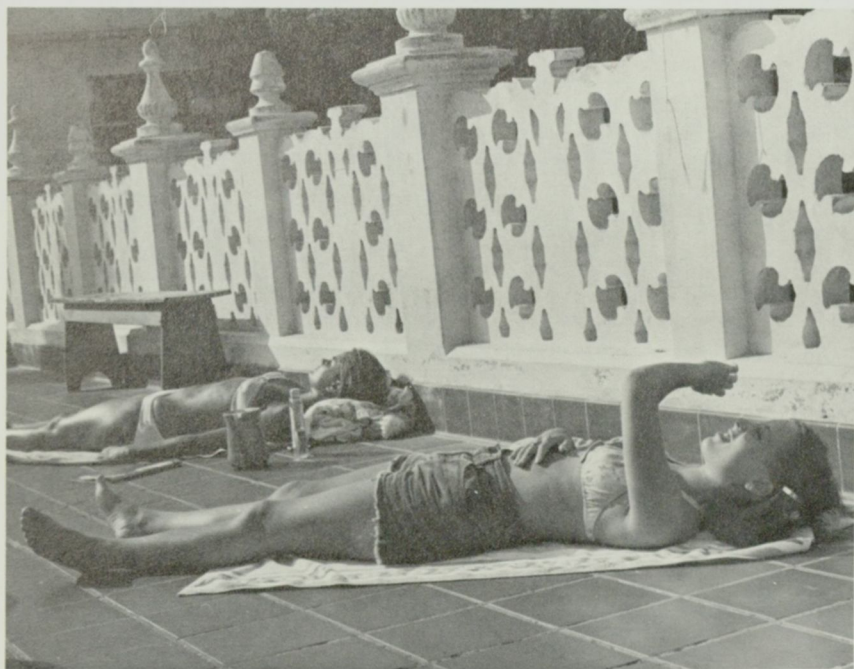
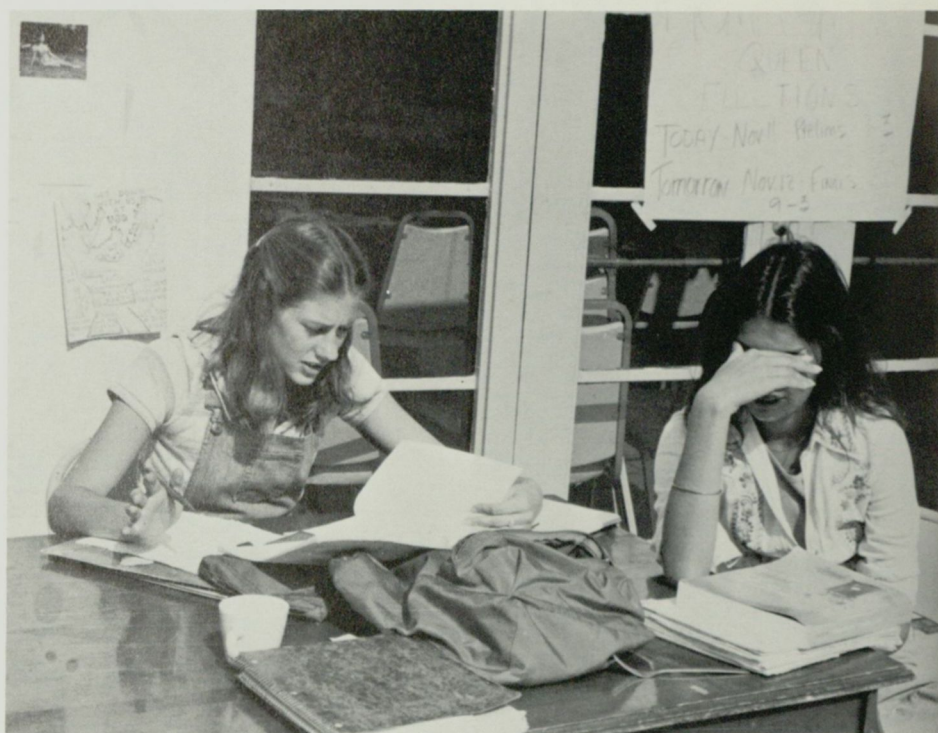
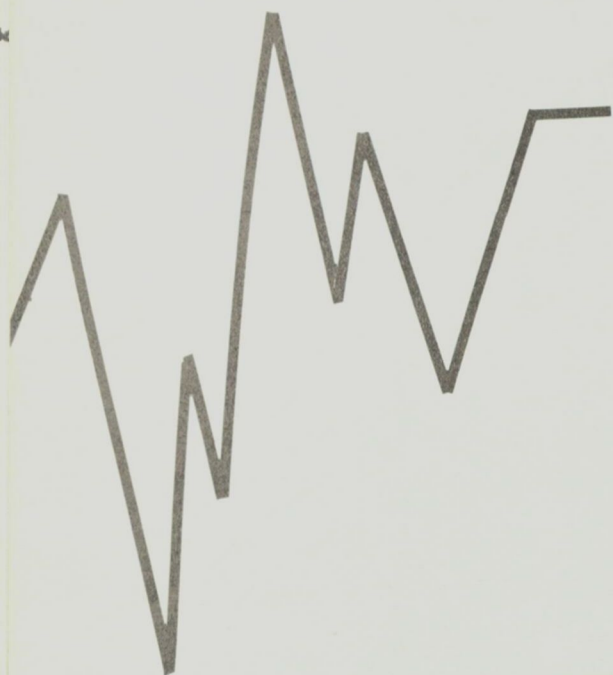

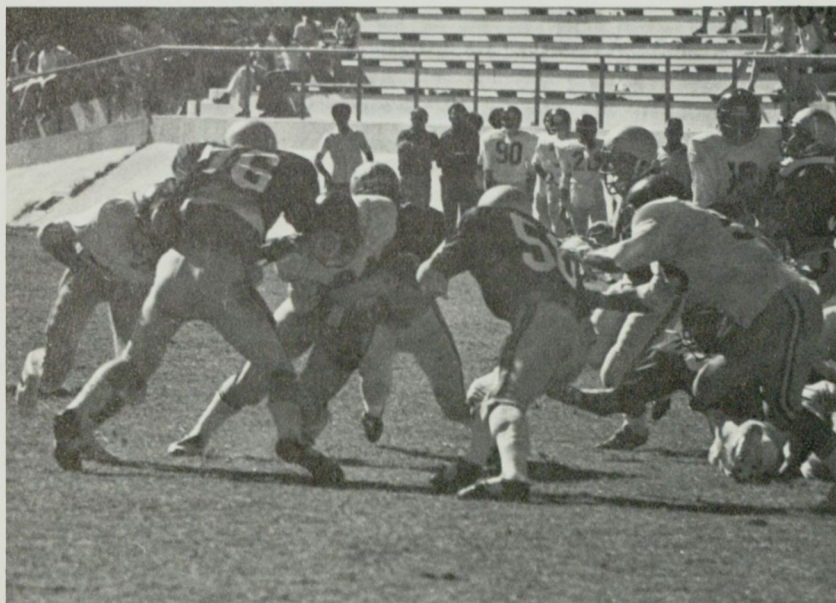


Under the leadership and direction of first-year Head Coach, Bill Williams, the 1976 Football Season was filled with gaining experience and determination. Despite a 1-7-1 record, the scores were close, and the team showed effort and strength in competition.

The highlight of the season was the Homecoming Game, with the Toreros' 16-14 victory over St. Mary's. Junior Bob Myers set a new USD record, kicking a 46-yard field goal, with 8:11 left in the game. Junior Quarterback Andy Slimak led the offensive drives and threw for over 1190 yards. Junior Pat Iaccino was top receiver and ran for 526 yards. Iaccino also led in scoring for USD with 24 points. Both Slimak and Iaccino were named co-offensive players of the year. Sophomore defensive-end Greg Perkins and Junior defensive-back John Manson were both named co-defensive players of the year, and Junior Jim Allen was chosen the special teams player of the year. Steve Goodbody led the rushing attack with 262 yards, and Tony Lennon led in interceptions. Junior Kevin McGarry led in punt returns with 60 yards.

Coach Williams summed it up best: "To us, our last game was the beginning, not the end, and we're looking forward to a very good season next year."





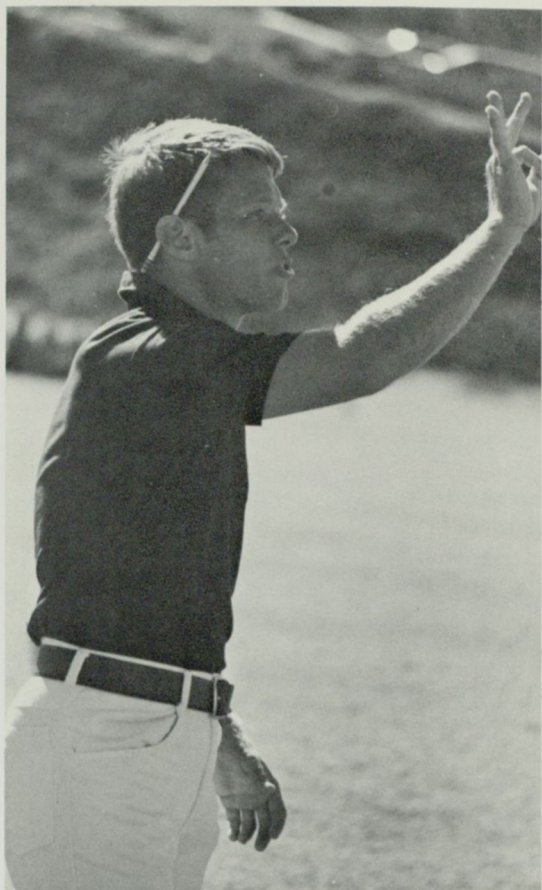

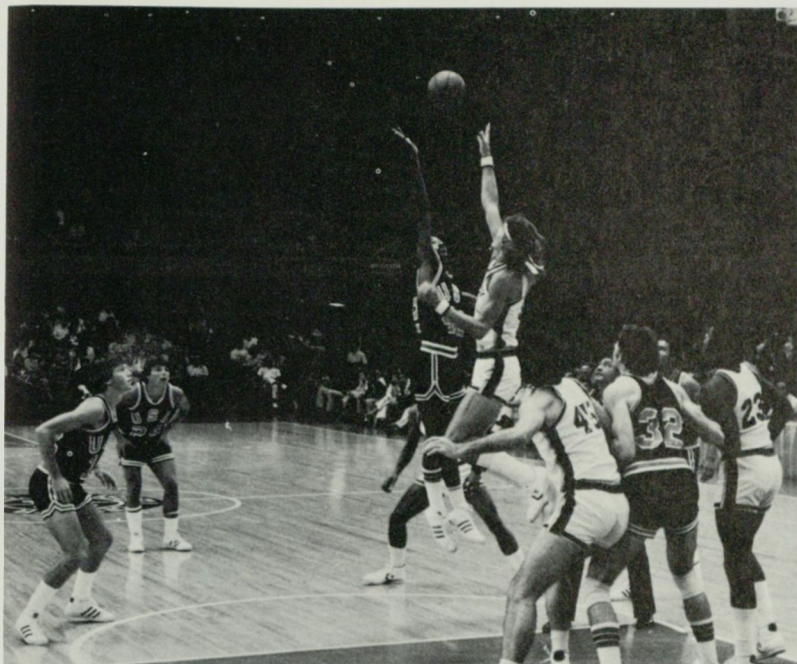

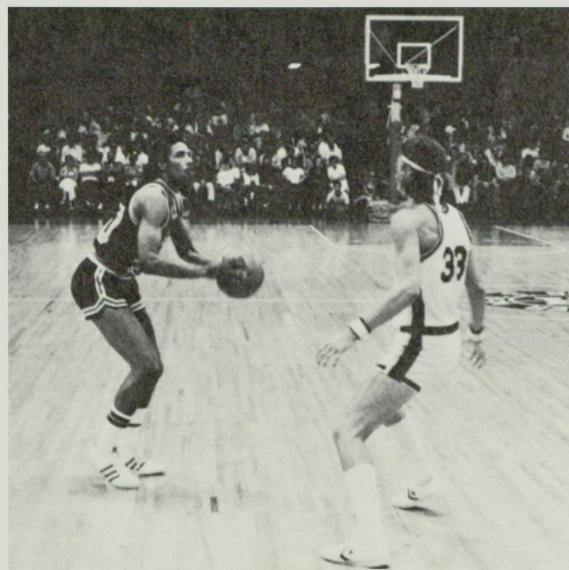

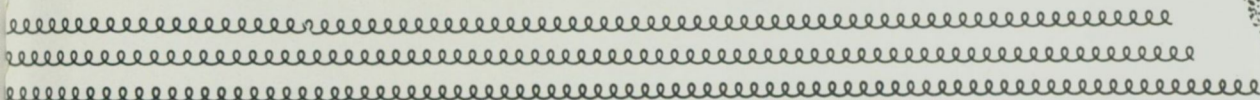
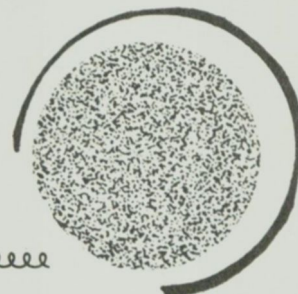


SOCCER

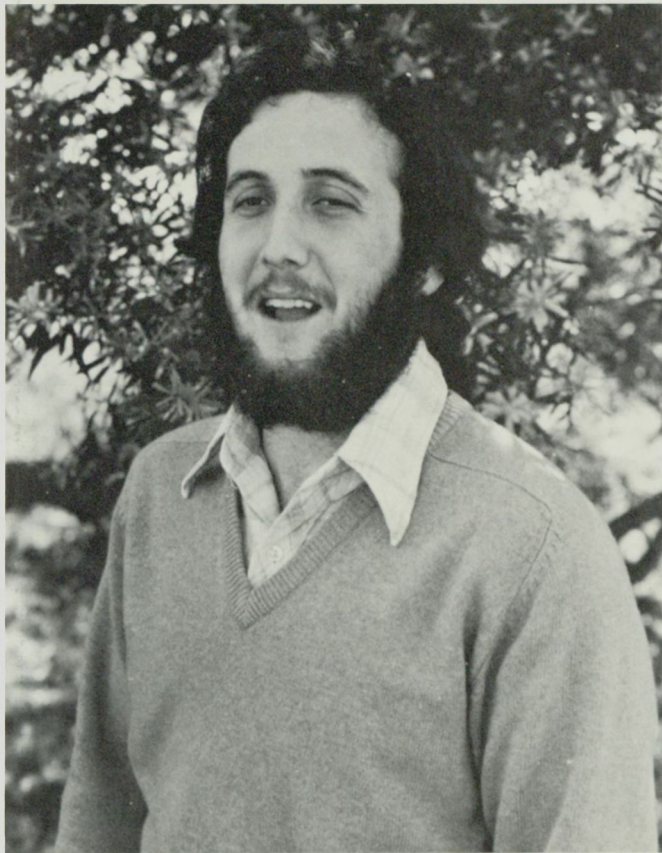
... MORE STUDENT LEADERS

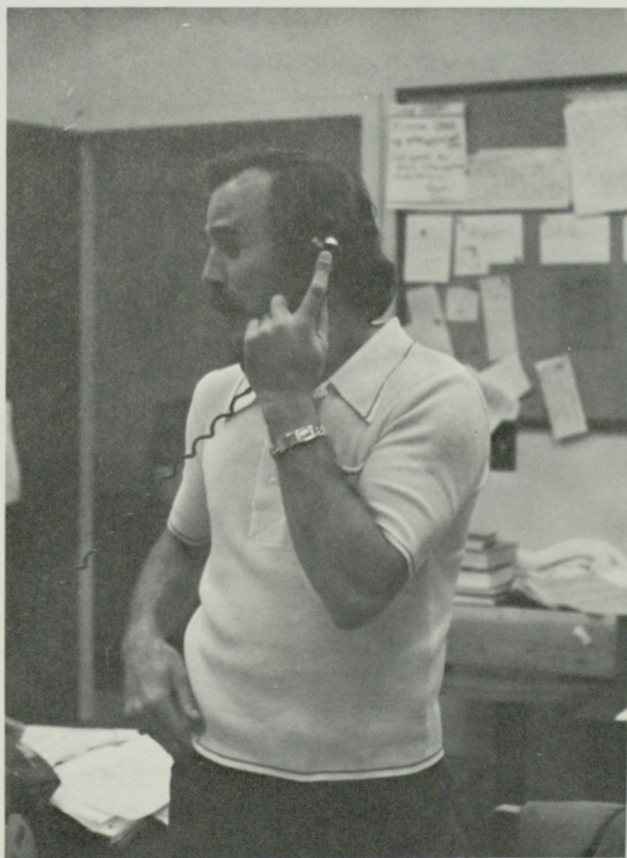
VETS

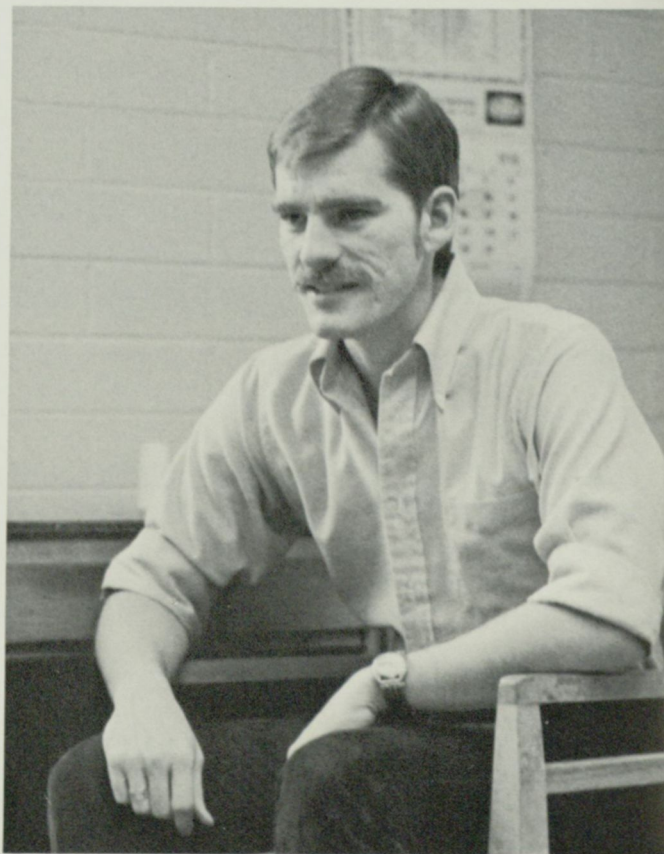
The VA Vet Rep., as a specialist on new laws and rules, is the campus consultant on all veterans' affairs from application to receipt of checks.

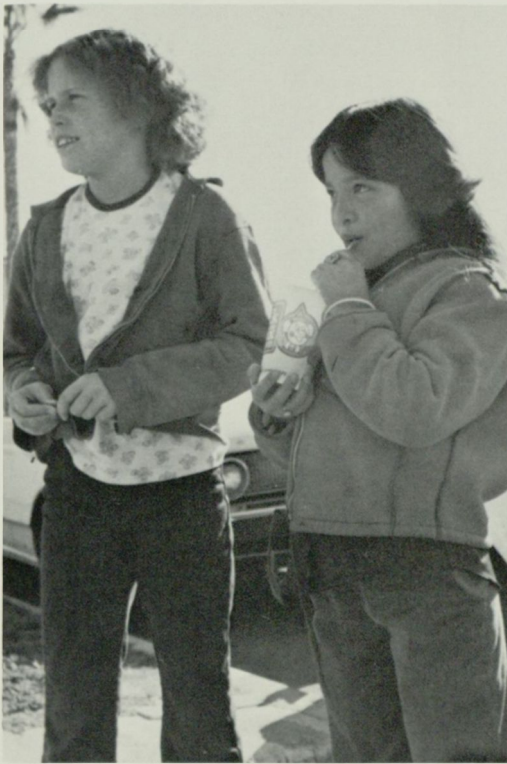
CHARISMATIC PRAYER GROUP
