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DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH - Mr. Don Ernst, Chairman

The paperback revolution has affected tremendously methods of teaching in college. This is common knowledge. It is an area that can be easily neglected, however, first because of its very newness, and second, because it is a continually changing field. It may be in our best interest as teachers to give this subject more attention.

As it stands now, the student uses our bookstore twice a year - to buy text books at the beginning of each semester. Besides this, it serves little purpose except to sell writing paper and tee-shirts. In the mean time, students (many without transportation) must go off the campus to find the most elemental books related to their fields, if those books cannot be found in our library. It has been suggested that we should offer as wide a selection of quality paperbacks as possible in our bookstore.

It could be justified on many counts. We have the students to support enlarged bookstore facilities; over a thousand at the combined colleges, plus many more coming in for summer institutes, etc. A teacher often finds it too demanding on the students' pocket-books to assign many of the titled he would like, yet he wishes that the student would read with more diversity in the field. The various important titles now in print, especially in literature, history, psychology, philosophy and sociology, offer the student solid evidence of the new specialized research in his field. It would compliment the library well.

It is true that there are a few paperbacks, not directly incorporated in courses, in stock now. But the selection is so limited, unattractive and haphazardly chosen that it offers little appeal. The Hopkins News Agency, located within a half mile of the University, services many schools in the area, including San Diego State and U.C.S.D. They offer a complete line of quality paperbacks and provide racks for their display. The venture would make money: 30% profit and guaranteed pick-up of any or all the books that aren't moving. The advantage of such an arrangement is the quick and steady service which it affords. Within a day or two, most any title desired can be made available. It would, however, heed the assistance of the staff to keep abreast of the many specialized works continuously being published.



This is simply a suggestion. If others feel there is merit in it, please let it be known. It does seem to fulfill a basic requirement of a university - to provide opportunities for knowledge.
