ECONOMICS AND BUSINESS

Dr. Miller's new book, "Mathematics for Management," will be published by the United Nations Press next spring. The book was mainly written as part of a UN grant that Dr. Miller received last summer, which also included lecturing in several of the eastern European nations.

Mr. Leo Kloos has joined the Division faculty as a part-time lecturer and is offering the Personnel Management course this semester. Mr. Kloos is an industrial relations consultant in San Diego and has considerable operating and academic experience here and on the East Coast. He was a labor-management relations examiner for the Labor Relations Board in Los Angeles. He has his master's degree from Catholic University and will be completing his doctorate work at UCLA.

Dr. Miller had been invited to be a member of the visiting accreditation committee for the University of Redlands by the Western College Association. The committee visited the University on 6 - 8 November. This is the same association which will send an accreditation committee to the University of San Diego on 27-29 November.

HUMANITIES

Language Department: Fr. Sullivan was host to the Foreign Language Council of San Diego County at the Town and Country Hotel in October. About 400 language teachers heard Professor D. Lincoln Canfield of the University of Rochester divide American speech into five main classifications with humorous examples of each. Fr. Sullivan explained to the American Classical League the pattern and philosophy behind the Latin Major at the College for Men. It was agreed that counselors should be advising students to take four years of Latin in high school.

Speech Arts Department: Recently the University of San Diego debate team competed at San Fernando Valley State College in the Pacific Southwest Collegiate Forensic Association's first speech tournament. The team, consisting of W. Fenton Sink and Everett Harry, won a Superior rating for outstanding debating and was one of seven teams out of 107 that was awarded undefeated medals.

The tournament attracted 48 colleges and universities from as far away as Utah. Most of the major schools in the Western United States attended including USC, UCLA, University of Arizona, Loyola, Redlands, and Idaho.

On October 28, USD travelled to San Diego State College for another tournament. This month will see USD at Loyola, University of Oregon and the University of California at Santa Barbara. USD, now in its second year of forensic competition, competes in all of the major collegiate forensics tournaments. The debate team is under the coaching direction of Fred C. Sanders, chairman of the Speech Arts Department.

NATURAL SCIENCES AND MATHEMATICS

Mrs. Cohen, Dr. Bradshaw and Dr. Spanis of the Biology Department and Dr. Peterson of the Chemistry Department recently completed a special two-week course given by the Special Training Division of Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies (ORINS). The course, which included two hours of laboratory and a 90-minute lecture each day, was intended to provide faculty members and advanced science majors at small colleges with specialized training in radioisotope techniques. Laboratory instruction was carried out in a special mobile laboratory from ORINS. Faculty members from the College for Women also attended the course.

SOCIAL SCIENCES

Dr. Gilbert L. Oddo, Professor of Political Science at the University of San Diego College for Men, recently addressed the Kearney Mesa Rotary Club on "Some Implications of the Vietnamese Crisis."

Oddo discussed the background of U.S. involvement in Vietnam, the alternatives in the present course, and the ideological forces at work. He examined three alternatives in the current Vietnamese crisis: The first of these was complete U.S. withdrawal from Vietnam; the second, total escalation of the war to the possible extent of provoking World War III; or finally, the Johnson Administration stand of neither withdrawing nor increasing unreasonably the war effort. Dr. Oddo termed the third alternative, or Johnson position, as "on the surface, the least satisfactory but, in the context of the modern world, the soundest policy to follow."

Professor Oddo is the Director and founder of the ACUPA (Associated Colleges and Universities for Programs Abroad) summer program at the Institute of Technology in Guadalajara, Mexico. Oddo teaches courses in Political Problems of Underdeveloped Countries and Aspects of Cold War Politics during the six-week summer session. He has addressed some twenty groups in Mexico on the subject of Vietnam.
