OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

1. We are pleased to announce that Mrs. Marian Holleman has been appointed Acting Head Librarian for the remainder of the academic year 1969-1970.
2. At the invitation of Bishop Quinn, Father James J. McGinley, S.J., Association of American Colleges consultant, will return to the campus for a brief visit, November 30-December 2. Many members of the faculty may remember that Father McGinley was here on campus as a consultant from September 22-September 29, 1968.

OFFICE OF THE ACADEMIC DEAN

1. The recently elected Committee on Faculty Standing has held two meetings this week. Dr. Jeanne Brink Rigsby has been elected chairman of the Committee.

MEETINGSFinancing of Equal Opportunity in Higher Education

Sister Annette Bourret, USD Financial Aid Officer, attended this conference in Phoenix, Arizona, November 9-13, 1969. Present at the meeting, sponsored by the College Scholarship Service, were over a hundred financial aid officers from colleges and universities, representatives of state organizations, and the College Entrance

Examination Board. There were two main speakers each day on various aspects of the key topic, the tremendous need to provide massive assistance for the financially disadvantaged minorities.

### Conference of the Preparation of Teachers of English

Sister Guest attended this meeting, sponsored by the California State Department of Education, November 9-13.

Sister Guest says that this meeting seems to have been a second step in an "improve the teaching of English in the schools" campaign. In 1968, about 100 elementary and secondary teachers of language arts and English were given training at Asilomar; last week's 4-day session brought these same 100 teachers together with 100 college and university teacher-educators.

Among the featured speakers were Robert Hogan (Executive Secretary of the National Council of Teachers of English), Dr. William Glasser, M.D. (author of Reality Therapy and Schools Without Failure), Dr. Alan M. Hollingsworth (Chairman, Department of English, Michigan State University), and Edmund J. Farrell (Supervisor of English Education at Berkeley).

Sister Guest says that some of the points made at the meeting were: teachers are not well prepared to teach composition and reading at the secondary level; the "tri-partite" classification of "English" into language, composition, literature is unsatisfactory; more English Teacher Specialists will be trained to assist the in-service teacher education.

Dr. de Mourol, who attended the same meeting, says that from the English teacher's viewpoint, the new flavor of "revolution" injected into the group discussion meetings was one of the most interesting aspects of the conference, for it was supported by those over fifty as well as those under thirty. It added heat to the meetings, but scarcely any light, because the self-styled "revolutionaries" had no program beyond the elimination of present procedures in the training of English teachers. Dr. de Mourol noted that USD already employs several of the new procedures recommended in the findings of a nationwide survey of English Education professors. This survey emphasized the importance of 1) secondary methods course taught by an English professor with experience in the secondary schools; 2) course in advanced composition; 3) ghetto schools experience in a fifth-year program of student teaching; USD's credential program has these provisions.

International Affairs Seminar

Mr. Lawrence Conrad, USD Foreign Student Advisor, attended the November 13 meeting of the International Affairs Seminar held at the Town and Country Hotel. Mr. Conrad was one of the panelists on the third panel, "Foreign Students and International Cultural Programs." The first panel was on "International Science and Research Programs," and the second on "International Commerce, Transportation, and Finance." Mr. Conrad said that there were over forty organizations represented at the meeting, which was conducted by the International Affairs Board of the City of San Diego.

GUEST SPEAKER, DR. RAMON SENDER

Dr. Ramon Sender was a guest speaker of the USD Spanish Department on November 6. Dr. Sender, who was born in Aragon in 1902, is currently a member of the Spanish Department at USC, as well as being one of the best Spanish novelists outside Spain today.

Dr. Sender spoke on La Novela Espanola de la post-Guerra. Dr. Graves was interested in the fact that there were visitors from all the other campuses in the area, and that the room was filled to capacity; Dr. Sender's lecture was given in Spanish.

USDCW's Volleyball Team
