DEPARTMENT OF ART

The Society of Architectural Historians held its meet Saturday, February 28, in Pasadena in order to study and discuss the western expressions of the Arts and Crafts movement (c. 1900-1914). After orientation, the group went on a walking tour of neighborhoods which were particularly rich in that idiom. Four houses were open and the group inspected them thoroughly and discussed them with the owners with particular emphasis on restoration techniques.

Luncheon was served at the Greene & Greene's Gamble House (which is now a historic monument). It was opened for inspection though closed to the public. The group reconvened at the Huntington Museum for a seminar on the Arts and Crafts movement. David Gebhard (UCSB) spoke on Voysey, Robert Winter (Occidental) on Ashbee, and Ester McCoy (UCSB) on Mac Intosh. A group discussion followed of "Why the drop in popularity of the Arts and Crafts esthetic after 1914?" The Henry E. Huntington Gallery's exhibition of Will Bradley drawings which demonstrated that esthetic was the final event and focus of study.
