### OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

#### Foundation Visits:

I shall be on the east coast (and in the midwest) from October 4th to 7th, visiting foundations which may have funds for which USD can apply for its various programs. The groups I will visit include Carnegie Corporation of New York, Ford Foundation, Rockefeller Foundation, Exxon Education Foundation, Raskob Foundation, Santa Fe Railway Foundations, and Dr. Scholl Foundation.

#### Kellogg Foundation Grant:

Dr. Irene S. Palmer, Dean of the School of Nursing, and I are happy to announce that the W. K. Kellogg Foundation has approved a grant to the Philip Y. Hahn School of Nursing in the amount of \$355,449. over a three-year period, beginning October 1, 1976. The project grant supports the Baccalaureate Program at the School of Nursing in its development of the Family Health Nurse Practitioner, will support the development of a Learning Resource Center in the School of Nursing and will support an extended campus at Imperial Valley College which will enable the University to offer the Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing in Imperial County.

### OFFICE OF THE PROVOST

#### Enrollment Charts:

Attached to these Newsnotes are the official Enrollment Charts tracing USD's enrollment (head count and FTE - Full Time Equivalent) over the past six years, including the current semester. This year's figures are comparable to last year's, since the tuition structure is identical for the two years. During the three years prior to 1975-76, the undergraduate tuition structure was totally on a per unit basis, so there is a slight non-comparability in the mode of calculating FTE students. In the next issue of the Newsnotes, we will publish the official HEGIS (Higher Education General Information Survey) enrollment charts as they have been sent to Washington, D.C.

#### Resident Housing Statistics, Fall 1976:

Dean Tom Burke's office reports the following housing statistics for this fall. For comparison, statistics for Fall, 1974 and Fall, 1975 are also listed. The Bahia Loma and University Knolls apartments are almost entirely undergraduate this year. Three graduate/professional students live among the undergraduates in these apartments this year compared to 30 in 1975.

\* These figures are not necessarily simple additions of those above since, for example, some Bahia Loma residents are graduate students.

\*\* The use of the Bahia Loma and University Knolls has changed between 1975 and 1976. Last year, no resident of either was on a Room and Board Contract. This year everyone in the University Knolls is on the regular residence plan. Thus, the Knolls is classified now as a conventional resident hall. About 20 persons in the Bahia Loma are on Room and Board Contracts.

Swine Flu Shots:

The University Health Service will inoculate for the swine flu commencing the last week of October. Members of the University community who wish to be inoculated should sign up at the Health Service, Camino 196, before October 15, 1976, so that the vaccine can be ordered. This service is free to students, faculty, and staff.

Dr. Arthur Frederick Ide has had an article published in the Journal of San Diego History, Fall, 1976, entitled "San Diego, The Saint and the City." It is an etymological and philological study of the linguistic transition between San Diego and St. Didacus; a detailed historical analysis of his canonization and the reason for the naming of the port, San Diego.
