WASC 5th-Year Accreditation Visit:

The report of the team from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges on their fifth-year visit to USD has been received by the University. The summary reads:

"The responsibilities and challenges continuing to face the University of San Diego within its geographical context have been briefly noted. As a unique private institution it has the opportunity for leadership and special visibility; it also has less visible means of support than its institutional neighbors, and perhaps faces more hazards. But, the progress since 1970 is impressive, and suggests that the University may be emerging in the eyes of the community and the neighboring San Diego State University and University of California as an institution of distinct quality, increasingly worthy of respect. It seems quite possible that the decade of the 70's will be seen historically as one of special significance and progress. We hope the University will continue to make spirited responses to its many challenges and maintain the integrity that we have witnessed during the present visit."

Internal Publication of Faculty Salary and Compensation Data:

Appended to these <u>Newsnotes</u> are tables of data on the salary and compensation of our full-time faculty. Similar data has been published in previous years (<u>Newsnotes</u> of March 29, 1974; February 28, 1975; April 9, 1976; and March 2, 1977). The data is presented on a chart previously used by the AAUP. This and last year the AAUP and HEW (Department of Health, Education, and Welfare) have coordinated their institutional salary surveys in order to reduce duplication and reporting burdens. Thus, the AAUP did not ask for information in this form this year. They will, as we have, use the HEW data to produce the type of information you find in the appended tables. The AAUP and HEW data was collected by Debbie Gough, Secretary to the Provost, and analyzed by Bob Barr, Assistant to the Provost.

The first table contains the institutional summary, as reported (in a more complex form) to HEW. The following tables show the breakdown by School/College. In order to avoid the identification of individual salaries, ranks with fewer than five persons are combined with one another, as noted, or are not reported. It is for this reason that ranks are combined in some units. Only summary information is reported for the School of Nursing.

The School of Law has provided, as in previous years, comparative statistics from other law schools showing national and state medians and USD's relative position.

St. Thomas More and the Difficulty of Restraining Sovereign Power through Law - Dr. James McConica, Professor of History, Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies, University of Toronto - Commentator: Dr. Stanley Chodorow, Professor of History, University of California, San Diego

Obedience to Lawful Authority – Dr. Michael Bayles, Professor of Philosophy, University of Kentucky – Commentator: Dr. M.E. Smith, Professor of Philosophy, Smith College

Value in a Lawyer's Life – Dean Clinton Bamberger, Executive Vice– President, U.S. Legal Services Corporation; former Dean and Professor of Law, Catholic University of Law – Commentator: Dr. John M. Winters, Professor of Law, University of San Diego

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Dr. Philip O. Hwang, Associate Professor of Education, recently conducted a workshop on <u>Concept of Stress and Techniques of Stress Management</u> for the administrative cabinet members of Chaffey Community College. This same program has also been accepted as a whole day pre-convention workshop by American Personnel & Guidance Association for its annual convention in March at Washington, D.C.

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On Friday, October 28, 1977, Professor Ed Imwinkelried, School of Law, lectured in Chicago on the subject of Scientific Evidence. The location was the Conrad Hilton Towers in downtown Chicago. The lecture was part of the National College of District Attorneys' East Coast Trial Techniques Seminar. Approximately 110 prosecutors were in attendance.

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Professor C. Hugh Friedman of the School of Law was recently elected to represent the lawyers of San Diego and Imperial Counties as a member of the Executive Committee of the California State Bar for a three-year term. The Executive Committee plans and conducts the annual State Bar Conference, the annual conference of Bar presidents and acts as liaison between the Board of Governors of the State Bar and local Bar associations on various professional matters, including developing and advocating proposals for legislative reform. Professor Friedman is immediate Past President of the San Diego County Bar Association. He was also elected by the law school faculty to be its delegate to the forthcoming American Association of Law Schools annual meeting.

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Professor Robert L. Simmons, Law School, has written an article on the subject, "Modernizing the Justice System." It appeared in the December 16, 1977 issue of the <u>Official California Reporter Series</u> published by the West Publishing Company.

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Law School Associate Dean Doris Y. Alspaugh served on an accreditation inspection team with the Consultant to the Committee of Bar Examiners of the State Bar of California for an official visit and inspection of the John F. Kennedy School of Law on January 24–26, 1978.

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Don Helmich, School of Business Administration, received acceptance of his research paper for the Western Academy of Management Meetings held in Sacramento, March, 1978, titled "Structural Variation and Organizational Success."

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Dr. Irene S. Palmer, Dean of the School of Nursing, is attending an orientation conference to prepare accreditation visitors for the National League for Nursing Division and Baccalaureate and Higher Degree Programs. Dr. Palmer also spoke with the Boston College School of Nursing Research Interest Group on the Historical Research Methods on January 27, 1978.

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On December 8, 1977, Dr. Jack Morrison, Director of Counselor Education, School of Education, participated in a dedication ceremony at Garfield Independent Learning Center. This high school offers an alternative type of education for those pupils having difficulty adjusting to the "regular high school." Because the "idea" for Garfield began in one of Dr. Morrison's graduate courses in Counselor Education, he has maintained close contact with the originator of the concept. In 1972 Mrs. Georgiana Gaylas, then a counselor at the old Snyder Continuation High School, completed her pupil personnel services credential requirements at the University of San Diego in the Department of Counselor Education. One of her term papers developed the concept now known as Garfield Independent Learning Center. That term paper became, in 1976, Dr. Gaylas' dissertation topic, which Dr. Morrison was privileged to supervise. The dissertation in turn was used as the basis for a \$50,000 Title II Media Center grant. The grant developed into a new school, building and laboratories now known as Garfield Independent Learning Center, where the emphasis, according to the principal, Dr. Georgiana Gaylas, is first on the guidance and counseling of the individual pupil! Not too frequently does an educator have an opportunity to see a term paper develop into an actual functioning entity. On December 8, Dr. Morrison had that pleasure.

The ratings which will be based on 1974-75 actual distribution of average compensation (col. 8) will be sent to individual institutions prior to their publication. To preserve confidentiality of individual salary figures, data for *columns* (8) and (9) will NOT BE PUBLISHED for any rank with five or fewer faculty members. Similarly, the data reported *in columns* (12) and (15) will NOT BE PUBLISHED for any rank with five or fewer faculty members in either column.
