OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

All-University Meeting:

I wish to remind faculty members, administrators, and professional staff of the announcement in the September 1, 1978 <u>Newsnotes</u> of the meeting I have called for <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>September 26</u>, 1978, in Saloman Lecture Hall, from <u>12:15 p.m.</u> to <u>1:15 p.m.</u> Since this is the lunch hour, some may wish to bring a bag lunch, and you are welcome to do so. It is my intent at the meeting, joined by Vice President Jack Boyce, to review with the faculty the current financial status of the University of San Diego.

HEW Clinical Grant:

The School of Law has received a \$30,000 grant for an Environmental and Mental Health Clinical program under Title II of the Higher Education Act. The funded program adds to the existing clinical programs at the Law School two specialized clinical education opportunities, an Environmental Law Clinic and a Mental Health Law Clinic, each enrolling from 5 to 8 students each semester. The Mental Health Clinic will provide legal representation to patients in the mental health system in California. In the Environmental Law Clinic, students will be engaged principally in the enforcement of state, federal, and local environmental laws including the California Environmental Quality Act, California Coastal Act, N.E.P.A., zoning and other local land use and environmental protection ordinances. Students will represent neighborhood and environmental groups lacking financial resources.

Enrollment Charts:

Attached to these <u>Newsnotes</u> are the official Enrollment Charts tracing USD's enrollment (head count and FTE – Full Time Equivalent) over the past six years, including the current semester. This year's figures are comparable to the last three year's figures, since the tuition structure has been identical since 1975–1976. During the two years prior to 1975, the undergraduate tuition structure was totally on a per unit basis, so there is a slight noncomparability in the mode of calculating FTE students. In one of the next issues of the <u>Newsnotes</u>, we will publish the official HEGIS (Higher Education General Information Survey) enrollment charts as they have been sent to Washington, D.C.

As you can see in analyzing the charts, we are comfortably at or above budget in undergraduate and law school enrollment, and critically under budget in graduate enrollment. Obviously we cannot glean a full picture of 1978–1979 enrollment until spring semester statistics are in, but we will endeavor to analyze the graduate enrollment, which is less than last year. Kudos are enthusiastically in order for the fine achievement of the Office of Undergraduate Admissions in bringing in a large group of freshmen and more transfer students than ever, without any diminishment of academic standards.

Resident Housing Statistics, Fall, 1978:

Dean of Students Tom Burke's office reports the following housing statistics for this fall semester. For comparison, statistics for the fall of 1974, 1975, 1976, and 1977 are also listed. The Bahia Loma and University Knolls are entirely undergraduate again this year, but included three graduate students in 1976 and 30 in 1975. Some undergraduate students are being temporarily housed in the Graduate Center Apartments this year, and there are again undergraduates housed in the Padre Trail Inn. Completion of the new residence complex under construction near the Valley apartments will enable us to return to normal use of the Graduate Center apartments in 1979–1980, and to eliminate the need to rent space at the Padre Trail Inn.
