DEPARTMENT OF BIOLOGY

This summer Dr. Ross Dingman presented a paper on short term evolution in Pocket gophers at the annual meeting of the American Society of Mammalogists at Nag's Head, North Carolina. Anderson Medical Center of the University of Texas; McNeese State College, Louisiana; and the University of Arizona.
