Academic Calendar, 1979-1980:

In the fall of 1977, the USD ad hoc Calendar Committee formulated a two-year proposal for the academic calendar of the College of Arts and Sciences and the Schools of Business Administration, Education, and Nursing. Recommendations for the 1978-1979 (current) academic calendar, and the 1979-1980 calendar were printed in the Newsnotes of November 9, 1977, along with the Committee's report and rationale. Comments from faculty and administration were solicited, the Committee met again to discuss revisions in the light of the comments, and the 1978-1979 and 1979-1980 academic calendars were officially adopted in early December, 1977.

Attached to these Newsnotes is a copy of the 1979-1980 calendar, for the convenience of those who may not have been here last year or who no longer have the November, 1977 Newsnotes.

The School of Law proposed academic calendar for 1979-1980 is also appended to these Newsnotes.

VARIA

Dr. Joseph Rost, Director of the Educational Administration Program, School of Education, delivered an address to the Fall Conference of California School Administrators, San Diego Region, on November 16, 1978. His topic was: "Human Relations Training in California Educational Administration Programs."

DeLoss McGraw of the Art Department will have some of his work included in a forthcoming book published by Davis Publications of Worcester, Massachusetts. The book is entitled Photo-Art Processes and is authored by Nancy J. Howell-Koehler, Professor at Antioch College. Mr. McGraw's work will appear in a chapter on design.

Dr. Joseph P. Ghougassian, Associate Professor in Philosophy, has been re-elected on the Board of Directors of the Institute of Logotherapy, Berkeley, California. His position is that of Research Philosopher in Residence.

Also, Dr. Ghougassian has been appointed to the Editorial Board of The International Forum for Logotherapy, the official Journal of the Institute. Interested members who wish to submit professional articles to the Journal may contact Dr. Ghougassian for more information.

Dr. Ghougassian also attended an NSF Chautauqua short course on "The Ethical Issues in Engineering" at Stanford University on October 30 and 31.

Professor Ed Imwinkelried recently spoke at a Statewide Trial Tactics Seminar for Hawaiian prosecutors. The seminar was held at the Hilton Hawaiian Village Hotel in Honolulu. Approximately 50 prosecutors attended. He spoke on the following subjects: presenting scientific evidence, attacking expert testimony, and uncharged misconduct.

Dr. Ellen Cook, School of Business, has been invited to review papers for the Outstanding Manuscript in International Accounting 1979, sponsored by the American Accounting Association. Dr. Cook serves on the Research Committee of the International Section of the AAA.

Father William Shipley, Philosophy Department, recently took part in a conference at Saddleback College on the general subject "Our Search for Values in Contemporary Crises." He delivered a paper entitled "Scientific Research and Etho-Science Values."

Dr. Robert Bacalski from the Spanish area of the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures attended a major symposium, Cervantes and the Renaissance, on November 16-18. The symposium was held at Pomona College in Claremont, California. In addition to many fine scholarly papers on Cervantes and his works, the program included a good production of one of Cervantes' plays, El refián dishoso, a concert of 16th-century Spanish music played on authentic Renaissance instruments, and a short ballet entitled Don Q. Pas de Deux.

Dr. William Frietas and a group of Spanish graduate and undergraduate students attended the Symposium on Latin American Drama at California State University in Los Angeles on December 2.

Sister Alicia Sarre and Dr. Robert Bacalski will attend the annual meeting of the National Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese in Coronado at the end of December.

Dr. Philip O. Hwang, Coordinator of Doctoral Program, School of Education, conducted a workshop on "Concept of Stress and Techniques of Stress Management" for a group of counselor educators and supervisors during the annual convention of Western Association of Counselor Educators and Supervisors at Monterey, California on November 20.

Dr. Jane Via, Religious Studies Department, attended the annual meeting of the Society of Biblical Literature and the American Academy of Religion in New Orleans. She presented a paper at the Seminar to Luke-Acts Scholars. Her paper which involves an interpretation of a portion of Chapter 7 of the Acts of the Apostles from the perspective of major themes in Luke and the Acts, was published in the SBL book of seminar papers.

Dr. Kathleen Dugan, Religious Studies Department, participated in a special conference sponsored by USCC in Tuscon, Arizona and also attended a meeting of the American Academy of Religion in New Orleans. She delivered a paper there on "The Vision Quest of the Plains Indians," to a group who form the working group in the Religion of the American Indian.
