Dr. Brandes has received notice by the Arizona Historical Foundation that his book titled, Frank Hamilton Cushing: Pioneer Americanist has been accepted for publication, and should appear in the spring of 1968. The biography deals with the first significant archaeologist to work in the American Southwest. The Western Postal History Association has also begun publication of his translation of the Historia Del Correo in America, a study of Spanish communication and mail service in Mexico during the Colonial period.
