FROM THE PRESIDENT'S OFFICE

Revision of Student Dress Regulations

At the request of the student body, and upon the recommendation of the Faculty Committee on Student Affairs, the following changes in dress regulations for the students will become effective on Monday, November 6, at all times on campus:

- (1) Tailored jeans, tailored walking shorts, and tailored bermuda shorts are approved as on-campus wearing apparel. Specifically prohibited are swim trunks, gym shorts, and cut-off trousers.
- (2) Any type of footwear may be worn but must be worn with socks.
- (3) Any type Tee-shirt, including white, may be worn. Undershirts are not acceptable as outside shirt wear. Shirts designed to be tucked in the trousers are to be worn tucked in.
- (4) Exceptions to the above regulations are permitted in the gym and the resident apartment areas.

- (5) On special occasions, the College may require a more formal style of dress.
- (6) All students, in their clothing and grooming, are expected to adhere to acceptable standards of neatness and cleanness.

The University of San Diego Debate and Forensics squad won four victories in the novice division and two in the Intermediate division of debate competition at the Pacific Southwest Tournament held at El Camino College last weekend.

Freshmen Jim Staunton and Dick Walton compiled a perfect record and received Superior Awards by defeating the University of Redlands, East Los Angeles and Fullerton Colleges in debate competition. Sophomores Brian Thompson and Everett Harry defeated the University of California Santa Barbara and Riverside and lost to Claremont Men's College and San Diego State.

The squad will travel to Loyola University this weekend for a tournament.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE DEPARTMENT

Fr. Creoglio and Fr. Sullivan attended the Fall Conference of the Foreign Language Council of San Diego Sat. at the Hanalei Hotel. In projecting teaching into the computer age, Dr. Howard Lee Nostrand of the University of Washington said the greatest need will be "self-propelled self-instruction." Dr. Theodore Brunner, UCI, reminded the San Diego County Classical League that four out

HISTORY DEPARTMENT

The Autobiography of a Deigueno Woman, Delfina Cuero as told to Florence Shipek will be published before Christmas by Dawson's Book Store, Los Angeles, as No. 12 in the Baja California Travel Series. This will be Mrs. Shipek's second book in the Series. The first was Lower California Frontier, 1870, No. 2 in the series.

Fr. Rigney, professor of European History, attended the Fall Meeting of the History Guild of Southern California on Fri., Oct. 27 at 8 p.m. at Occidental College, Los Angeles. The chairman of the meeting was Dr. John E. Rodes of Occidental's Department of History. There were three speakers: (1) Prof. Lewis Hanke of UC-Irvine, who discussed the great importance of the Spanish American viceroyalty reports to the King of Spain during the some 300 years of the Spanish colonial period. (2) Professor Douglass Adair of the Claremont Colleges who spoke on the ANNUAL REGISTER, the oldest English Journal (starting in 1758) to record the events of the year, with special reference to the writings of Edmund Burke. (3) Professor Ray Billington, of Huntington Library and Northwestern University, presented the case of Staughton Lynd, one-time teacher at Yale University and the apparent injustice done him by this university and other schools till he was finally exonerated and re-hired by a school near Chicago in the present month of October, 1967. At 9:30 p.m. the meeting, attended by about 100 members, came to a close.

MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

Mr. de Malignon is participating in a weekly seminar in recursive function theory being held at San Diego State College. Other participants include three faculty members and a graduate student at SDSC and two industrial mathematicians. The seminar is making a study of Recursive Equivalence Types.
