OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

Dr. Steven Schanes has requested to be relieved of the office of Academic Dean, effective at the end of the current semester, in order to return to a position within the full-time teaching faculty of the Department of Political Science at the College for Men. Dr. Schanes will serve as Director of the Summer School this year.

The Most Rev. Francis J. Furey, Bishop of San Diego and Chancellor of the University, will dedicate and bless the new Educational Development Center at 4:00 p.m. next Thursday, March 28. Honored guests at this occasion will be Mr. and Mrs. Clarence L. Steber of La Jolla, who are the generous donors of the new facility. Members of the faculty and staff are invited to attend the short ceremony at the EDC. Following the dedication, a reception honoring His Excellency and the Stebers will be held in the Faculty Lounge.

Sincere gratitude is extended to the members of the Faculty Association for the very festive St. Patrick's Day party held last Saturday.

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The office of the Department of Education has agreed to serve as a central repository for information about Graduate fellowships and scholarships available at other institutions. Mrs. Knott will welcome the assistance of faculty counselors in collecting the necessary information for a central file, and will be happy to assist students and counselors who are seeking such information.

An initial informal meeting for those members of the faculty wishing to explore and discuss the Joint Statement on Rights and Freedoms of Students will be held at 11:30 on Wednesday, April 3 in Room 208. A similar exploratory meeting with interested members of the student body will be held at 12:10 on Thursday, April 4 in Room 208. From these initial meetings it is hoped that an official committee can be formed, in conjunction with representatives of the College for Women faculty and student body, to prepare a University statement of policy on this important issue.

Approval is hereby given to the following recommendation of the Committee on Academic Standards and Honors: Effective, 1968 Spring semester:

A two-fold division is restored to the Dean's List, with First Honors starting at 3.75 and Second Honors at 3.25.

The following recommendations of the Curriculum Committee are approved: General Education requirement in English for all students be broadened as follows:

a)	English	3 units
Ъ)	English 42 or 45	3 units
c)	English 30, 35, 50 or 60	3 units

One upper division course in English Areas I through VI may be substituted for either item b or c, with the permission of the English Dept.

Courses in Area VII are excluded from this structure of options; however, English 170, <u>Oriental Literature</u>, and 176, <u>Colloquim</u>, may be elected with special permission of the English Department Chairman.

At entrance to the College, all students will take an examination calculated to test their ability to write college-level English prose. This examination will be graded on a pass-fail basis. All students who pass will be exempted from English 1, <u>Rhetoric and Composition</u>. Such students will fulfill their English requirement by taking <u>two</u> lower division courses (30, 35, 42, 45, 50, 60) and one upper division course.

Proposed modification in the curriculum for Biology majors:

1. The total unit requirement for a degree in Biology is reduced from 138 to 128 units.

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Dropped courses

Biology 160 Recent Advances in Biology Formerly 1 unit, now changed to 3. Required of all majors. Prerequisite: Consent of department chairman 3 units Biology 201 Advanced Cellular and Molecular Biology Course was changed to give it more meaningful content. Prerequisite: Consent of the department chairman 2 units Biology 202 Seminar in Environmental Biology Prerequisite: Consent of department chairman 2 units Changes in course numbers

- Biology 21A-21B to Biology 1 and 2. Biology 34, 35 to Biology 3 and 4.
- 4. Changes in Departmental Requirements
 - a) Prerequisite changes: All majors will require Biology 15 and a minimum of 6 units of Math. Other lower division unit requirements remain the same. (So that units compared to 34 at State College)
 - b) Major: In both Program A and B 24 units of upper division biology courses are required to include Biology 138, 140, 144, 145, 160, as compared to the present requirements of 30 units. Eight additional units are also required and may be selected from all other biology courses offered.

The advantage of this to the student is a significant relaxation of required courses. In the past Biology 141, 146, 148, and 152 were required of all majors.

- c) Any foreign language may be selected.
- d) A minor is not required.
- e) Program A (General) and B (Pre-Professional) will be continued as in the present catalog, however, they will now be sufficiently flexible to allow a student to switch from B to A at any time in his training if he decides to select a different specialization or if he wishes a terminal B.S. degree and selects a career in teaching or the like.

At the meeting of March 14, 1968, the Committee voted against the following recommendations of the Subcommittee on the General Culture Requirement: 3 units

Area I Fine Arts and Music

(To consist of aesthetics, graphic or plastic arts or music including studio courses)

Area II Liberal Art Mathematics, Logic, Symbolic Logic, 3 units and the History of Scientific Thought

The Committee recommended that the present General Culture requirement as stated in the catalog be retained.
