Freshman Class Profile:

The Office of Undergraduate Admissions has completed its annual profile of the Class of 1983, which is appended to these Newsnotes. You will note that the statistical information concerns 682 entering freshmen, which is not the same as the total headcount of freshmen (877) reported in the last Newsnotes. The profile appended here includes only first-time freshmen entering in September, 1980, while the enrollment chart headcount includes transfer freshmen (about 110 of them), plus those who may have come to USD last February and are still classified as freshmen.

Fall, 1980 Enrollment Chart Correction:

In the last Newsnotes issue (October 3, 1980), on page 7, FTE Graduate Enrollment, on-campus, Column 9, was listed as 292. That figure is inaccurate; it should be 295. Please correct your chart. This correction brings about changes in two other columns: Column 11 should be 303 rather than 300 FTE; Column 14 should be 2822 rather than 2819.

The Case of the Disappearing Coffee!:

Can anyone shed light on what is happening to the coffee in the Serra Hall Faculty Lounge? My interest, of course, stems from the fact that the Provost's budget pays for the coffee supplies in Serra and Founders Faculty/Staff Lounges. The Founders Hall Lounge does not seem to be a problem. Purchase of supplies this year has been approximately equivalent to the same period of time last year. Though I have been told by faculty that they occasionally see students in the Lounge helping themselves to coffee, it has also been noted that these students have been asked to leave and have been told that the coffee supplies there are not for their use. Apparently this is sufficiently effective to control any abuses.

Not so in Serra Hall. For your information, my office was asked on October 3 to authorize purchase of an additional 72 pounds of coffee for the Serra Lounge, making 216 pounds needed within a five-week period! Last year, the equivalent time to make the order totals reach 216 pounds was January 3 - which was nearly 18 weeks into the fiscal year. My office is currently holding up the authorization for an additional order for Serra Hall until we find out what is going on and what can be done about it. Coffee needs of \$633 within five weeks is more than the budget can bear. Since there was only a small personnel increase in that building, geometric growth did not cause the problem.

It has come to my attention that some professors, particularly but not exclusively

those teaching evening classes, are said to take their whole class to the Serra Hall Lounge for a coffee break. If true, this is wholly unacceptable. Vending machines are in Serra Hall for student use during breaks. Coffee is provided in the Lounges for the exclusive use of faculty and staff. Others have suggested that perhaps other larders than USD's are being supplied from Serra Lounge! If so, then we will simply be unable to continue having coffee there.

At the moment, I can only think of two alternatives, but would appreciate suggestions on other possibilities. The only alternative not possible is to continue as we are; my budget just cannot handle it. The first alternative might be - if indeed whole classes are being allowed to go to the Serra Lounge for coffee - to lock the Lounge at night; I do not like the idea of locking the Lounge while classes are in session; besides, if the abuses are during the daytime hours, this will not solve the problem. The second alternative might be to remove the coffee from the Serra Lounge, and arrange with the academic department users that it be made available in the departmental areas, with transfer of the funds to their budgets for future purchases; usage could then be controlled in smaller units.

Please let me, Sister Cronin, or Debbie Gough (all at 4553) know your ideas on the case of the disappearing coffee.

Camino Theatre Management:

Pamela Connolly, Instructor in Theatre Arts, has been appointed as manager of Camino Theatre. Ms. Connolly will serve on an ad hoc basis this fall, and will be officially appointed to the position for the spring semester. Her responsibilities include training of student personnel, supervision of the day-to-day maintenance of the Theatre, and policy recommendations on Theatre needs or requirements. Scheduling of events and Theatre use will remain in the Special Events office.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

Student Union:

The Student Union, which has been under renovation since the middle of the summer, will have its "grand opening" on October 31. A variety of opening activities have been planned. Discount coupons will be available in the Vista. All faculty and administration are encouraged to visit the facility during this day.

VARIA

Dean Ed DeRoche of the School of Education recently gave a talk on the "Value of Catholic Education" to Stella Maris Parent-Teacher Group. He also wrote an election packet for elementary and secondary school teachers and students which has been published by Copley Newspapers, Milwaukee Journal/Sentinel, and Richmond Newspapers.

Ellen Cook and Bob Johnson, both of the School of Business, presented a program on "Meeting Japan's Challenge" to the business community on October 3. This program was part of the on-going Update Seminars. Faculty members are invited to attend future seminars.

Ellen Cook, Jim Daniels, and Bob Zelechowski attended the American Accounting Association annual meetings in August. At this meeting, Dr. Cook was appointed to the membership committee of the AAA and to the chairmanship of the Committee on the Doctoral Consortium, a subcommittee within the International Chapter of the AAA.

Dr. Sylvia Lewis, Associate Director of the Dean's Grant of the School of Education, and Dr. DeForest L. Strunk, Director of Special Education, spoke at the 25th Annual Conference of the American Association on Mental Deficiency, Region II on October 4, 1980. Dr. Lewis and Dr. Strunk spoke on "Changing Regular Education Training: the Impact of Deans' Grants." Dr. Edward DeRoche, Dean, School of Education, and Dr. Rosalie Rhoads, Special Education, together with several graduate students in Special Education, attended this conference.

Dr. Strunk has been named Chairperson of the Standards and Professional Relations Committee of the California State Federation, Council for Exceptional Children for the academic year 1980-1981.

Professor Harvey Levine, School of Law, will present a six-hour lecture in five cities in California concerning insurance law. The lectures will include comprehensive discussions of insurance bad faith concepts including first party and third party bad faith litigation, uninsured motor vehicle insurance law and various aspects of punitive damage litigation.

On November 7, 1980, Professor Levine will present a lecture at the California Trial Lawyers Association's annual convention in San Diego. The lecture will include discussions of the landmark cases decided by the California Amicus Curiae Committee. Professor Levine has been a member of that committee, which prepares and argues cases on behalf of the California Trial Lawyers Association in the California Supreme Court.

On September 22, 1980, Professor Levine was appointed to the State Bar of California Committee on Jury Instructions. As a member of the Committee, Professor Levine will assist in drafting jury instructions which are utilized by the State Bar of California.

James Vergari, Adjunct Professor of Law, has been elected "Life Member" of the American Law Institute. He was elected to the Institute in 1954.

In July, Professor Vergari conducted a 4-day seminar on Financial and Payment Systems in Portland, Oregon, for the Oregon Credit Union League. Also, in

September, he was a speaker and panel participant in the Economic Conference of the Credit Union National Association held in Nashville, Tennessee. His topic was the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980.

Dr. Patricia Lowry, School of Education, has recently been appointed to the Board of Directors of Concern of Orange, Inc. This organization provides professional counseling services to students of Catholic elementary/secondary schools in the Diocese of Orange.

Dr. Lowry has been asked to serve as project evaluator for a Title IV-C Project on School Administrator Effectiveness in Santa Cruz County. She will design the Evaluation component of the project and oversee the project audit and evaluation during 1980-81 school years.

Professor Ralph Folsom of the Law School has recently published, with the assistance of Sheryl Anderson, USD Law '81, a supplement to his treatise, Incapacity and Adoption. Professor Folsom's article, "Trademarked Generic Words," recently published in the Yale Law Journal, has been selected to be re-published by the U. S. Trademark Association in the Trademark Reporter. Professor Folsom received a USD research grant during the summer of 1980 and has written an article, "Anti-trust Enforcement Under the Secretaries of Agriculture and Commerce," which has been accepted for publication in the Columbia Law Review.
