National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Stipends:

Attached to these Newsnotes is the announcement of the National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Stipends for 1983. The same process used for the last several years will again be followed for applications for these awards. Those faculty interested in securing one of the three available University nominations should contact either Dean Joseph Pusateri or Dean Sheldon Krantz by Wednesday, May 12, 1982. If there are more expressions of interest than nominations available, Deans Pusateri and Krantz will set up a committee to interview prospective nominees.

Undergraduate Majors at USD:

The Registrar's Office, at the request of my office, has provided a listing of the number of students who have declared a major in the various academic disciplines. This information has been provided each fall semester for the past several years, and for the spring semester as well a few times. It seems useful to continue supplying this data for spring as well as fall. Data on declaration of majors is in constant flux as students change their majors or move from "undeclared" status to a declared major. The data should, therefore, be considered only an approximation. Data is based on official declaration of major on proper forms in the Registrar's Office; informal arrangements with faculty or department chairs do not constitute a declaration

of major by the student. Because changes of major are rare among seniors, less common among juniors, and quite usual among sophomores and freshmen, it is relevant to know the level of students listed. Hence, information on undergraduate majors has been subdivided into upper division and lower division students.

Professor Marjorie Hart, Fine Arts Department, and Dr. Joanne Dempsey, English, have both been selected for participation in summer faculty workshops at Stanford University. Professor Hart will be participating in a workshop on Classical Music. Dr. Dempsey will be in a workshop on Literature and the Visual Arts. Congratulations to both.

Professor Janet Harrison, School of Nursing, has had an article published in Advances in Nursing Science with Mary Ann Hautman, former faculty member in the School of Nursing. The article is entitled "Health Beliefs and Practices in a Middle-Income Anglo-American Neighborhood." The survey research was conducted in a defined neighborhood in metropolitan San Diego, and was funded by a University of San Diego Faculty Research grant.

Dr. Dennis Clausen, Director of the Writing Program and Associate Professor of English, has recently been invited to join the Scott Meredith Literary Agency of New York. The Scott Meredith Agency represents many of the major novelists, dramatists, and screen-writers active in America today. Clients of the Scott Meredith Literary Agency are selected only on the basis of recommendations from active members or by establishing a national reputation with one of the major publishing houses. The Scott Meredith Agency will represent Professor Clausen in all of his future writing projects.

Sister Maureen Cronin will have an article entitled "A Challenge in Aircraft Selection: The Hornet Case" published in the Autumn, 1982 issue of The American Review of Canadian Studies.

Dr. Joseph Rost, Associate Professor of Education, presented a paper at the annual meeting of the American Educational Research Association in New York City on March 21, 1982. The title of the paper was "The Politics of Leadership."

Sister Marleen Brasefield, Continuing Education, has been elected to the Board of Directors of the San Diego County Ecumenical Conference and will serve as Convenor of the Education Committee. She is currently serving on a Program Review Panel of San Diego United Way which examines and recommends funding allocations for four community agencies. She has recently exhibited four art pieces in a show sponsored by the National Leadership Conference of Women Religious.

A paper entitled "Aristotle and the Limits of Philosophic Proof," by Dr. Dennis Rohatyn of Philosophy, has been accepted for publication in the journal Nature and System, ed. at Tucson, Arizona.

Dr. Lawrence Hinman, Department of Philosophy, was selected to be a participant in a two-day workshop, sponsored by NEH and the Council for Philosophical Studies, on Intentionality in Continental and Analytic Philosophy. The workshop will be held immediately prior to the Western Division Meeting of the American Philosophical Association in Columbus, Ohio. In addition to this, he has three book reviews forthcoming. Reviews of David Hoy's The Critical Circle and Zygmunt Bauman's Hermeneutics and Social Science will be appearing in Philosophy and Phenomenological Research; his review of Berel Lang's Philosophical Style is being published in Teaching Philosophy.

Dr. Michael Wagner, Philosophy Department, was a commentator at a session on Medieval Theology and Exegesis at the American Catholic Historical Association meetings in Los Angeles on December 30, 1981. He read two papers at the American Philosophical Association meetings - Pacific Division, in Sacramento on March 26, 1982. They are entitled "Perceptual Truth in St. Augustine's Contra Academicos" and "Perceptibles and Intelligibles in Plotinus." He has been elected Secretary of the United States Section of the International Society for Neoplatonic Studies.

Dr. Louis Burnett, Biology Department, presented a paper entitled "The CO₂ Sensitivity of Hemocyanin O₂ Affinity in an Intertidal Crab" to the Society for Experimental Biology in Leiden, The Netherlands on March 31, 1982. He also presented a seminar entitled "Carbonic Anhydrase Facilitates CO₂ Excretion and Ion Transport in Crab Gills" to the Department of Zoology at the University of Dusseldorf in West Germany.

On April 1-2, Dr. Bart Thurber, Coordinator of the Organizational Skills Program in Arts and Sciences, and Dean Joseph Pusateri attended the Association of American Colleges conference in Chicago of "Career Options and the Liberal Arts." On April 21, Dean Pusateri also presented awards at the Annual Greater San Diego Science Fair.

On April 16, Dean Pusateri and Associate Deans Patricia Feulner and James Hottois attended the annual meeting of the Southern California Academic Deans held on the USD campus. Dean Pusateri presided over the morning session that included a presentation by Dr. Lawrence Hinman, Philosophy, on "Teaching Values in the Curriculum."

SUMMER STIPENDS 1983

Application Deadline

October 1, 1982

General Information

This program provides support for college, university, junior and community college teachers, freelance writers, and others working in the humanities to pursue two consecutive months in full-time study or research. The work proposed may be within the applicants' special fields of study, or it may be in some other field that will enable them to understand their own fields better and enlarge their competence. The proposed project may be one that can be completed during the stipend period, or it may be part of a long-range project.

Stipend and Tenure

Each stipend provides \$2,700 for two consecutive months of full-time study or research. Recipients of stipends may not hold major fellowships or grants during their stipend tenure. Summer Stipend recipients must devote full time to their study or research projects for the two-month tenure of their stipends.

Application Deadline and Award Notification

Applications must bear a postmark no later than *October 1, 1982*. Awards will be announced by mid-March, 1983.

Eligibility

Each college, university, and junior and community college in the United States and its territorial possessions may nominate **THREE MEMBERS** of its faculty or staff for Summer Stipends. No more than two of the nominees should be in early stages of their careers, i.e., *junior nominees*. Only one should be in a more advanced stage, i.e., *senior nominee*. For the purpose of this program, applicants who hold the rank of instructor or assistant professor or who are in comparably early stages of their careers are considered to be *junior nominees*. Applicants at more advanced stages are considered *senior nominees*. Applicants on temporary leave from their home institution (e.g., sabbaticals, visiting professorships, fellowships at other institutions) must be nominated by their home institution. Applicants with

terminating appointments and those not employed by colleges or universities are *exempt* from nomination and may apply directly to the Endowment. If applicants are on a terminating appointment, they must give the date of termination. Except for those applicants who are exempt from nomination, applications *must* be signed by the institutional officer authorized to submit the institutional nominations.

Each institution is requested to establish and announce its nominating procedures to all prospective applicants. Persons who wish to apply should become familiar with their institution's procedures well before the application deadline of October 1, 1982.

Applicants need not necessarily have advanced degrees, but their formal professional training must have been completed by October 1, 1982. Persons seeking support for continuing professional training or study or research leading toward a degree are not eligible to apply, nor are degree candidates, even if the proposed work is not related to their degree program. If the professional training of an applicant has been a degree program, the degree must have been received, or all requirements for it must have been completed (including final official acceptance of the dissertation or thesis) by October 1, 1982.

Applicants who have completed all requirements but do not have the actual degree *should ask the dean of their degree-granting institution to certify to the Endowment by letter that the requirements have been met by the application deadline. This letter must accompany the application.*

Recipients of Summer Stipends must wait five years before they are eligible to apply again in this program; i.e., those who held stipends in 1979 or after are not eligible to apply for 1983.

Teachers in undergraduate colleges and in two-year colleges who are concerned primarily with increasing their knowledge of the subjects they teach should apply to the NEH Summer Seminars for College Teachers. An applicant may

apply to both the Summer Stipend Program and to a Fellowship Program, but may receive only one award during the same year.

Scope

The scope of support for projects includes, but is not limited to, the study of the following: language, both modern and classical; linguistics; literature; history; jurisprudence; philosophy; archaeology; comparative religion; ethics; the history, criticism and theory of the arts; those aspects of the social sciences which have humanistic content and employ humanistic methods; and the study and application of the humanities to the human environment, with particular attention to the relevance of the humanities to the current conditions of national life. Studies that are predominantly empirical or clinical rather than humanistic are not eligible for support. The Endowment continues its interest in studies of the relationship between human values and science and technology.

Two Endowment Divisions support scholarly research, the Division of Fellowships and Seminars and the Division of Research Grants. Applications for support of individual study and research should be submitted to the Fellowships and Seminars Division. Applications involving the collaboration of two or more scholars should be submitted to the Research Division.

While problems pertinent to the substance of an applicant's teaching are an appropriate part of fellowship study, applications for the planning of institutional curricula, empirical educational research projects, and educational surveys are not eligible for fellowship support. Inquiries about the possibility of Endowment support for curriculum projects should be directed to the Endowment's Division of Education Programs.

Work in the creative or performing arts — such as writing of fiction or poetry, painting, sculpture, musical composition or performance, acting, directing, dance, or the making of film — is excluded as are studies directed toward teaching these arts. Inquiries about the possibility of support should be directed to the National Endowment for the Arts. Critical, historical, and theoretical studies of the arts, however, are eligible for support from NEH.
