### Enrollment Charts:

Attached to these <u>Newsnotes</u> are the official Enrollment Charts tracing USD's enrollment (headcount and FTE - Full Time Equivalent) over the past six years, including the current semester. In one of the next issues of the <u>Newsnotes</u>, we will publish the official HEGIS (Higher Education General Information Survey) enrollment charts as they have been sent to Washington, D.C.

As you can see in analyzing the charts, we are considerably above budget in undergraduate students, and a little above budget in graduate and law students. Subsequent Newsnotes issues will supply more precise information on new undergraduate students. One "odd" feature in this year's charts is that USD's fall enrollment seems to be enormously above budget in freshmen (FTE), below budget in sophomores, and considerably below in juniors and seniors. We checked into this aberration, and discovered the following: 1) Close to half of our four hundred or so new transfer students appear to be listed as freshmen, many of them "high freshmen," that is, students whose transferable units do not quite reach the requisite 30 units for sophomore standing; 2) listed among the sophomores are 183 students who have between 50 and 59 units and who are therefore close to being juniors and 133 juniors with 80-89 units who are almost seniors.

Since School of Law budget figures on the chart are in annual average terms, it is difficult to analyze the fall semester. The fall semester figures which went into the annual average are: Day: 692 (as compared to 705 actual); Evening: 256 (as compared to 257 actual).

The overall picture puts us above 5000 students for the first time in the University's history (5003 headcount, to be exact!), and encouragingly above budget for FTE. As you are aware, however, USD as a tuition-dependent institution can never sit comfortably until spring enrollment is in; sometimes we are under our budgeted spring net attrition rate institution-wide, and sometimes we are above it. At least there is some margin when we are over budget in the fall semester.

No projections have yet been made for 1983-1984, so this portion of the chart has been left blank.

### Law Student Profile:

Attached to these <u>Newsnotes</u> is the annual profile of the First Year Law Class, Day and Evening Divisions. If you wish to compare it with last year's profile, you will find the latter in the Newsnotes of November 6, 1981 (# 129).

I cannot resist including excerpts from a wonderful letter from a USD alum in the first year of dental school, sent to a biology faculty member, thanking the biology department and the Health Sciences recommendation committee for four years at USD, and commenting on the "head start" given by USD's academic preparation: "I just wanted...to thank you and the entire Biology Department for the past 4 years. Although it is only 4 weeks into the semester, it is obvious to me that I am much better prepared than the vast majority of the students here regardless of where they attended undergrad school. With the exception of the specific dental classes, everything I've had so far has been review. Especially helpful has been my experience in gross anatomy, which is the class that seems to give everyone here the most trouble. My lab partners as well as my instructors are amazed at the detail with which I know the structures of the upper limb. It really is a big advantage. Histology and embryology also have helped immeasurably. With the classes I've had at USD I feel I am better prepared than anyone here. In closing I just want to thank you, Dr. Traylor, and the whole Biology department and recommendation committee for all you have done for me. "
