UNIVERSITY RELATIONS

University Relations' 1982-1983 fiscal year gift revenue totals are at \$3,750,000. This is a 39% increase over total gift revenue for 1981-1982. Even more impressive has been the achievement in the unrestricted gift category. The totals for 1982-1983 show \$435,434, which is a 63% increase over the previous year. Total alumni giving moved to \$96,000, which is a 109% increase over 1981-1982. The number of alumni donors has doubled. This has been in response to the Irvine Foundation Challenge Grant.

This has been a most successful year for the University and for the programs of the University Relations Division. Thanks to each of you for the assistance and understanding you have provided us.

VARIA

Dr. John Schindler, Department of Physical Sciences, had a publication appear in August - "Calculation of the Missing Mode Effect Frequencies from Raman Intensities," Journal of Physical Chemistry, 1983, 87, 3017-3019. The article was written last spring in conjunction with Dr. Jeff Zink and Lee Tutt of UCLA and Dr. Eric Heller and David Tannor of Los Alamos National Lab and basically represents work previously performed at UCLA.

Therese T. Whitcomb, Professor of Fine Arts, has just completed the extensive remodeling and redesign of St. Agnes Roman Catholic Church, Point Loma. She extensively renovated the 1934 structure and all its contents in order to restore the Spanish baroque integrity of its original style, but to realign it with the standards and practices of Vatican II.

Dr. William R. Soukup of the School of Business spoke to the Rancho Santa Fe Invisible University on the topic, "A Look into the Future of Corporate Production" on October 5, 1983.

Also in the School of Business, Dr. Charles J. Teplitz has had his article, "Computer-Assisted Test Construction for the Decision Sciences," published in the September, 1983 issue of Simulation and Games.

During the last six months, Dr. Lawrence M. Hinman, Philosophy Department, has presented the following papers: "Transcendental Feelings" at the Western Division Meeting of the American Philosophical Association in Chicago; "Heidegger, Being, and Play" at the Seventeenth Annual Heidegger Conference at the University of New Hampshire; and "Kant, Emotions, and Morality," at the Johns Hopkins University. During the summer, he attended a six-week Summer Institute on Kantian Ethical Thought, sponsored by the National Endowment for the Humanities, at Johns Hopkins. He also had three articles accepted for publication: "Nietzsche and Quine: The Limits of Epistemological Conservatism," will appear in Philosophy Today; "Transcendental Feelings" has been accepted at Dialectica; and "Nietzsche's Claim that All is Flux" will be published by International Studies in Philosophy. Three articles have also appeared in print during this period: "On the Purity of Our Moral Motives" in The Monist; "The Ambiguity and Limits of a Sociobiological Ethic," in International Philosophical Quarterly; and "Can a Form of Life Be Wrong?" in Philosophy.

Dr. Hinman has also been invited to present a paper at a symposium on the parabolic in Nietzsche's thought to be held at the Eastern Division meeting of the American Philosophical Association. The other two contributors are J. Hilles Miller (Yale) and Alexander Nehamas (Pittsburgh). These papers will be published in the next issue of Nietzsche-Studien.
