### OFFICE OF THE PROVOST

### Acting Dean:

President Hughes has authorized me to name Dr. Carol Baker, Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, to the role of Acting Dean until Joe Pusateri's return. As many of you are aware, Joe is in the hospital. It appears that it will be a few weeks before he is able to return to his office.

All of us appreciate everything Carol is doing to facilitate the work of the Dean's office as she handles both her own role and that of Acting Dean.

### Enrollment for the 1983-1984 Academic Year:

Attached to these <u>Newsnotes</u> are the final enrollment charts for the regular academic year 1983-1984, with both Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) and head-count enrollments included for all segments of the University.

An analysis of the attached charts will reveal to you a number of factors:

- Undergraduate enrollment is above projections for fall, spring, and annual average; the net attrition rate was 7.4% instead of the budgeted 7%; the 7.4% compares to a net attrition rate of 6.5% last year and 4.7% the year before;
- Graduate enrollment declined sharply for the spring semester, and we are well below budget for the current year;
- School of Law enrollment is under budget by 6 day students (annual average) and 15 students over budget for evening students; LL.M. enrollment is considerably under budget for full-timers and somewhat under for part-timers; the Los Angeles LL.M. program is on target.

### Congratulations:

Congratulations to President Author Hughes on his election as Vice-Chair of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities at their annual meeting on January 27, 1984, in Washington, D.C. The NAICU provides a national voice for independent colleges and universities, and keeps the public and government informed about the concerns of independent colleges and

universities. NAICU keeps its members informed of government actions that affect their ability to meet America's educational needs.

### Pre-Registration Statistics:

In early December, 1983, the following number of students pre-enrolled for spring semester. For comparative purposes, figures for the last two years are included:

In January, 1983, 89 undergraduate students who did not pre-register enrolled anyway. In January, 1983, 226 graduate students and 19 special students who did not pre-register enrolled anyway.

It has come to our attention that faculty members in possession of the older versions of the <u>Faculty Handbook</u> do not have a copy of the <u>Tuition Remission</u> Policy as revised in October, 1981. It is attached to these <u>Newsnotes</u> for inclusion in your <u>Handbook</u>.

#### UNIVERSITY SENATE

The University Senate has revised policy in regard to "Dead Week." The term "Dead Week" will not be used in the new <u>Bulletin</u> for 1984-1986. Beginning in the 1984-1985 academic year, University policy regarding examinations prior to final examinations will be as follows:

"In fall and spring semesters, examinations are limited during the week prior to final examinations. There may be no major examinations: minor quizzes are permitted as long as they are listed on syllabi at the beginning of a semester and do not count for more than 10% of the course grade. Laboratory practicums, papers, oral reports, and make-up examinations are permitted. Students are responsible for class attendance and material presented during the week before final examinations."

The Senate is reviewing ARRT policies on campus to determine whether those policies conform to academic due process standards. If you have comments or suggestions, please share them with your senators as soon as possible.

#### Gift Income:

January, 1984, income totaled \$391,074 from 373 gifts. This brings the 1983-1984 year-to-date total gift income to \$2,105,002 and 1,073 gifts. January, 1983, produced a total of \$429,472 from 189 gifts for a 1982-1983 year-to-date total of \$1,675,058 and 971 gifts.

The Irvine Challenge is doing quite well in this second of the three year program. Year-to-date figures for 1983-1984 are 559 gifts producing \$42,383. This time last year, the year-to-date figure was 456 gifts at \$36,164.

#### FOUNDERS GALLERY

"The Indignant Artist," an art exhibition that includes visual expression of artists' protest and social comment from the 17th to the 20th centuries in the form of prints, will open at the University's Founders Gallery on February 23.

The forty-five works in the exhibition include original etchings and lithographs by such artists as William Hogarth, Thomas Nast, Kathe Kollwitz, Jose Clement Orozco, Honore Daumier, Joan Miro, Jacob Lawrence, Otto Dix, William Gropper, Reginald Marsh, Gabor Peterdi, John Sloan, and Francesco Goya. Topics covered are politics, social change, and human rights. The Gallery is open weekdays from 12:00 to 5:00 p.m. and on Wednesdays from 12:00 to 7:00 p.m. An opening reception will be held on February 22 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

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Dr. Virginia Muller of the Political Science Department had an article, "Doublethinking Our Way to 1984," published in the December issue of Reason. She also had a book review of Walter La Feber's Inevitable Revolutions: The United States in Central America published in the December 1 issue of Library Journal. In addition, in November, Dr. Muller attended a U.S. Department of State Regional Foreign Policy Conference on U.S. – Soviet Relations.

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DeForest L. Strunk, Director, Division of Special and Gifted Education, presented and chaired a panel on "Training Special Educators to Use Microcomputers with the Handicapped" on Friday, January 27 at the Second National Conference on Technology in Special Education sponsored by the Council for Exceptional Children and the Council of Administrators of Special Education. Accompanying Dr. Strunk on the three-day conference were Dr. Robert E. Nelson, Professor of Special Education, School of Education, and Dr. Susan Zgliczynski, Assistant Professor, School of Education. Dr. Beverly Dexter, who is Associate Professor of Special Education at Lynchburg College, Virginia, and is currently spending her post doctoral sabbatical in Special Education at the University of San Diego, also accompanied Dr. Strunk to this conference.

Dr. Strunk has been reappointed to the Advisory Board of the San Diego Regional Center for Developmental Disabilities and the San Diego/Imperial Counties Developmental Services, Inc.

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Professor of Management Phillip Hunsaker, School of Business, has had the following articles published recently: "Deal Making: Effectively Using the Negotiations Process," Registered Representative (November, 1983); "Learning Negotiation Skills Through Simulation," with J.S. Hunsaker, and G.B. Whitney, Simulation and Games (December, 1983). Articles accepted for forthcoming publication include: "Coping with Burnout," International Journal of Management (in press, January, 1984); "Strategies for Interpersonal Negotiating," Personnel (April-May, 1984). Dr. Hunsaker is on sabbatical leave this semester at the University of Auckland in New Zealand, where he is writing a textbook on organizational behavior.

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Dr. Irene S. Palmer, Dean and Professor of the School of Nursing, attended the Long-Range Planning Committee meeting of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing in Washington, D.C. the week of January 21-26. While she was there, she also worked on the Task Force on Historical Figurines and was the Project Director for the AACN History Project.

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The American Newspaper Publishers Accounting Foundation has published a 33-page guide, written by Dean Ed DeRoche of the School of Education, entitled Minimum Competencies Assessment in Reading and the Use of Daily Newspapers To Teach These Competencies.

Dr. DeRoche has also recently given the following two speeches: "The Civil War: Some Facts/Some Fiction," Ranchos del Norte Corral of the Westerners, Escondido; and "Newspapers in Education Research: Implication for Secondary School Principals," National Association of Secondary School Principals, Las Vegas, February 3-4, 1984.

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Irving W. Parker, Associate Professor of English, was elected as a Memberat-Large to serve on the Board of Directors for the Santee Community Theater at the annual membership meeting held on January 29, 1984.

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Dr. Dennis Rohatyn, Philosophy Department, spoke at the Madeleine School in San Diego on the topic "Where is Education Going in 1984?" Dr. Rohatyn, along with Prescott Nichols and Glenn Richard of SDSU, was interviewed by Bob Lawrence of KCST TV in connection with an upcoming news segment on Orwell/1984 that will be aired on February 27 at 5:00 p.m. and on February 28 at 5:00 and 11:00 p.m.

Dr. Rohatyn's paper, "Six Criteria in Search of a Philosopher," has been accepted for publication in Vol. IX of Philosophy Research Archives, to be published in March, 1984. He has also been asked to serve on their board of referees.

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Dr. Hugh Ellis, Biology Department, published an abstract of some of his Hawaii work in the last issue of the <u>American Zoologist</u> in 1983.
