## Undergraduate Majors at USD:

The Registrar's Office has provided a listing of the number of students indicating a major in the various disciplines (page 6). This information has been provided each semester for the past several years. The data is applicable for fall semester, 1984 (see <u>Newsnotes</u> of November 11, 1983, and November 19, 1982 for last two years' fall data) – though of course all will realize that data on declaration of majors is in constant flux as students change their majors or move from "undeclared" status to declaration of major. The data should, therefore, be considered only an approximation. Because changes of major are rare among seniors, less common among juniors, and quite usual among sophomores and freshmen, it is relevant to know the level of students listed. Therefore, the information on undergraduate majors has been subdivided into upper division and lower division students.

## UNIVERSITY RELATIONS

Gift Income:

The University of San Diego received a record \$6.8 million in gift income from more than 3,000 donors during the past fiscal year. The total is an 81% increase from the \$3.75 million the university received during 1982-1983.

Gift income was up in all categories. Gifts to the Annual Fund, which is used to sustain current operations and to fund quality improvements, increased to \$938,000, a \$345,000 one-year increase.

He recently spoke at the North Terrace Elementary School, Oceanside, on "Teaching Thinking Skills," and to the San Diego Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa on the new book <u>How Administrators Solve Problems</u>.

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"The Unfuture of Humankind," an article by Dr. Dennis Rohatyn, Philosophy, has been published in <u>World Futures</u> (ed. Ervin Laszlo), Vol. 20, No. 1/2 (1984), pp. 1-22.

Dr. Joseph Pusateri, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, recently reviewed two new books, <u>IBM and the U.S. Data Processing Industry and</u> <u>Memories That Shaped an Industry: Decisions Leading to IBM System/360</u> for <u>Business History Review</u>, published by the Harvard Business School. Dr. Pusateri's recent book, <u>A History of American Business</u>, published in January, 1984, is going into a second printing this fall because of its use in a substantial number of collegiate business history courses. The publisher, Harlan Davidson Inc., has asked him to co-edit a new companion casebook on American business history with Prof. Henry Dethloff, History Department Chair at Texas A&M University. Dr. Tim Kelley, School of Business, published in the September, 1984, issue of the National Public Accountant, an article entitled "Health and Stress: Are You Type A or B?"

Professor Rosemary Goodyear, School of Nursing, chaired the Western Regional Accreditation Committee of the American Nursing Association in Kansas City, Missouri, November 8–11, 1984.

Professor C. Hugh Friedman, School of Law, was appointed Vice-Chair of the California Commission on the Teaching Profession. The Commission is a 17-member board which will explore specific ways to improve the teaching profession in California.

Business School professor Don Helmich has just had his co-authored book, Executive Succession: Toward Excellence in Corporate Leadership, published by Prentice-Hall. The book is based on Dr. Helmich's work in the area of corporate leadership spanning a fifteen-year period of paper presentations, articles and field research. The book will be available in bookstores within a few weeks both in paperback and hard-cover.

Two articles by Dr. Mary Quinn, English Department, have been published recently: "Ozymandias' as Shelley's Rejoinder to Peacock's 'Palmyra'" in English Language Notes, and "Shelley's Translation of Dante's Sonnet" in <u>The Explicator</u>. She has also been invited to present a workshop on December 4th at a conference on the teaching of writing organized by the San Diego Writing and Boynton-Cook Publishers. Her workshop, which is primarily for college teachers, will be on "The Payoff in Particulars: Students Read and Write about Literature."

On Saturday, October 27, Dr. James Gump, History, presented "Militarization in Southern Africa" to a workshop at San Diego State University sponsored by the College of Extended Studies and entitled "The Arms Race and Third World Countries." On Sunday, October 28, he chaired a session for the African Studies Association which met at the L.A. Hilton. The session was entitled "The Regional Political Economy of Southern Africa." Dr. Iris Engstrand, Chair of the History Department, presented a paper entitled "The Historian as Expert Witness: Roles and Risks" at the annual Western History Association conference in St. Paul, Minnesota on October 12 and gave the keynote address on "California Ranchos: Their Hispanic Heritage" November 2 at California State University, Long Beach, in celebration of the bicentennial of the first California ranchos.

Dr. Ray Brandes gave a paper on "The <u>San Jose</u>, Patron Ship of the Sacred Expedition to Alta California, 1769" and Dr. Iris Engstrand spoke on "Junipero Serra: Founding Father of San Diego," November 11 at the conference commemorating the bicentennial of Father Serra's death, sponsored by USD and the San Diego Historical Society.

Dr. Irene Palmer, Dean of the School of Nursing, was invited to Chair the External Review Team to evaluate the graduate program leading to the Master of Science in Nursing at the Orvis School of Nursing, University of Nevada, Reno, October 15–16. She also attended the Annual Meeting of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing in Washington, D.C. in October. Dr. Palmer was selected to chair the AACN's History Project.

November 8-11, the San Diego National Student Nurses' Association held a mid-year conference in which Dr. Palmer was invited to speak at three workshops. They were entitled: "Career Mobility: Getting from the Associate Degree or Diploma to the BSN and Beyond!", "Getting from the Associate Degree or Diploma to the BSN" and "Beyond the BSN: Graduate Nursing Education." Dr. Palmer gave an in-depth look at nursing education, the types of programs available, and how students can plan their education to meet the goals they have set for themselves.

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Assistant Professor Mary Ann Hautman, School of Nursing, attended a Transcultural Nursing Society conference in Boston, Massachusetts, October 10–12. Dr. Hautman also presented a research paper titled, "Self-care Responses to Respiratory Illness Among Vietnamese" at the American Public Health Association meeting in Anaheim, November 12–13.
