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### OFFICE OF THE PROVOST

#### Enrollment for the 1984-1985 Academic Year:

Attached to these Newsnotes are the final enrollment charts for the regular academic year 1984-1985, with both Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) and headcount enrollments included for all segments of the University.

An analysis of the attached charts will reveal to you a number of factors:

- Undergraduate enrollment is above projections for fall, spring, and annual average; the net attrition rate was 7.6% instead of the budgeted 7%; the 7.6% compares to a net attrition rate of 7.4% last year and 6.5% the year before;
- for the first time since 1979-1980, spring graduate enrollment showed an increase over fall, pushing the graduate annual average slightly above budget;
- School of Law annual average enrollment is under budget by about 24 day students and over budget by 45 evening and part-time students; on-campus LL.M. /M.C.L. enrollment is minimally over budget in full-timers and considerably over in number of units, while the Los Angeles LL.M. in Tax program has more full-timers than expected, but may end the year under budget in units, unless summer enrollment is very high.

#### Pre-Registration Statistics:

In early December, 1984, the following number of students pre-enrolled for spring semester. For comparative purposes, figures for the last two years are included:
