### OFFICE OF THE PROVOST

### Enrollment for the 1984-1985 Academic Year:

Attached to these <u>Newsnotes</u> are the final enrollment charts for the regular academic year 1984-1985, with both Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) and headcount enrollments included for all segments of the University.

An analysis of the attached charts will reveal to you a number of factors:

- Undergraduate enrollment is above projections for fall, spring, and annual average; the net attrition rate was 7.6% instead of the budgeted 7%; the 7.6% compares to a net attrition rate of 7.4% last year and 6.5% the year before;
- for the first time since 1979-1980, spring graduate enrollment showed an increase over fall, pushing the graduate annual average slightly above budget;
- School of Law annual average enrollment is under budget by about 24 day students and over budget by 45 evening and part-time students; on-campus LL.M./M.C.L. enrollment is minimally over budget in full-timers and considerably over in number of units, while the Los Angeles LL.M. in Tax program has more full-timers than expected, but may end the year under budget in units, unless summer enrollment is very high.

## Pre-Registration Statistics:

In early December, 1984, the following number of students pre-enrolled for spring semester. For comparative purposes, figures for the last two years are included:

Chair of the Political Science Department, Dr. Pat Drinan, had a book review of Vladimir Nahirny's <u>The Russian Intelligentsia</u> published in the fall issue of <u>The American Political Science Review</u>. Dr. Drinan also was a featured speaker at the World Affairs Council meeting of January 15 with the topic of "NATO and the Soviet Bloc: A New Beginning," A repeat of that presentation has been requested for the Rancho Bernardo Chapter of the World Affairs Council on February 28.

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Dr. Don Peterson of the Department of Physical Sciences is spending his sabbatical leave in Washington, D.C. as a member of the staff of the Sub-committee on Fossil and Synthetic Fuels. He has just completed a study of potential barriers to increased coal utilization which will be published as a staff report later this month. A series of Congressional hearings, the first of which will be on February 21, will be held to explore some of these barriers.

Dr. Peterson will speak on Congressional coal activities at the national meeting of the Western Coal Transportation Association in San Antonio in March.

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Professors Virginia Shue and Sarah Smith, School of Law, have coauthored an article entitled "California Civil Codes Sections 4800.1 and 4800.2: Review, Analysis, and Suggestions for Reform." The article will be published in the Winter, 1985, Community Property Journal.

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In the Foreign Languages Department, Dr. Sandra Robertson attended Romancero y Cancionero Español: An International Symposium at UCLA on November 8-10, 1984. She will be attending The Spanish and Latin American Woman as Literary Figure and Writer symposium at San Diego State on March 6-8.

Her paper, "Mariana Pineda: The Ballad of Tradition and Lorca's Stage Portrait," has been accepted for presentation at the above conference in March. She taped five sessions with Dr. Dennis Rohatyn for his radio program, Thinking Things Through, on the subject of "The Responsible Translator" and related topics. The programs were aired on FM 89 in late December and early January.

Professor John Chambers, Political Science Department, has been elected Chapter Representative to the Council of Chapters, American Statistical Association (ASA) for 1985–1986.
