USD'S THEME FOR 1986-1987

"In Pursuit of Economic Justice" is the theme chosen by the Faculty Social Issues Committee for the 1986-1987 school year. This theme is a natural sequence to the "Experience of Peace" theme which we are promoting this semester. It is also timely to adopt this theme for next year since the final draft of the Bishops' Pastoral on the U.S. economy will be completed in the fall.

Central to the theme of economic justice is the dignity of every human being. The Bishops' Pastoral writes: "The economy is a human reality, formed by human decisions and actions. It is men and women working together, developing the gifts of God's creation and building a world more fit for human living." The theme would address issues of resources allocation, including issues of income and wealth distribution among people and among nations. We invite faculty to begin thinking of ways to incorporate issues of economic justice into their courses in 1986-1987. Some issues to consider are: poverty, employment, discrimination in the market place, aging, access to education and medical care, trade and tariffs, migration policies, agricultural policies, care of the environment, types of social and economic systems that promote human dignity and economic well being, the economic and social costs of allocating resources to weaponry, and U.S. policies toward Third World countries.

Two or three team-taught courses on some aspect of economic justice will be offered in the spring semester, 1987. The courses can be inter-disciplinary or offered within the same college, school or department. As in the case of the Peace courses in spring, 1986, the departments will be reimbursed for the faculty who participate, and stipends will be available for joint January preparation. Faculty members interested in offering such courses should send brief proposals to the Provost's Office before September 15, 1986. The Social Issues Committee (or a sub-committee thereof) will review the proposals and choose the courses. Proposals should develop as fully as feasible both the general concept and the way it will be implemented. Please indicate in the proposal whether the course is under an existing rubric or whether it needs Curriculum Committee action.

In addition to the spring, 1987, courses, there will be in both fall, 1986, and spring, 1987, outside speakers, films, internships and other activities based on the Pursuit of Economic Justice.

UNIVERSITY SENATE

The following items are being discussed in the Senate during the remainder of the academic year:

- revisions of the rank and tenure document of four schools: Arts and Sciences, Business, Education and Nursing;
- 2) the possibility of periodic evaluation of tenured faculty separate from merit pay (see report of University Senate ad hoc ARRT Committee - Dr. Valois, Chair - dated January 7, 1986 and distributed to faculty);
- 3) salary differentials between academic ranks and the perception that they are too small; and
- 4) the difficulties associated with faculty parking and measures to address the problems.

VARIA

Dean Ed DeRoche, School of Education, served on a panel on the "Crisis in the Teaching Profession" for LEAD Associates, and a panel on "Critique of the Commons' Report," Joint University Conference, San Diego State University.

He is co-chair of the Education Committee of the San Diego Bicentennial Committee of the U.S. Constitution, and was a luncheon speaker at the San Diego Reading Council Annual Conference.

On January 8, Dr. Dennis Rohatyn, Philosophy, spoke at a meeting of the International Association of Business Communicators held in Long Beach, CA on the topic "The Paradox of Effective Communication."

His radio series, Lookout!, in association with Cox Cable studios, El Cajon, will consist of 1-5 minute PSA spots aired throughout each month during station identification. The master video tapes are on deposit at the Media Center.

Dr. Rohatyn has been elected secretary-treasurer of Philosophers for Social Responsibility (PSR), a national organization which meets concurrently (thrice yearly) with the American Philosophical Association. The newly-elected President is Deborah Chaffin (San Diego State University); the Vice-President is Nancy McKenzie (Vassar College). The next session will be held in Los Angeles, March 27-29.

The Media Center has acquired a copy of "Media Bias," a one-hour panel discussion filmed last July 22 at Sonoma State University, featuring Ben Bagdikian, Richard Bunce, Richard Lichtheim, Donald Lazere, Deirdre English, Frank Morrow and Dr. Rohatyn as panelists; moderator, Joel Rudinow. The program is also airing on various cable networks throughout Northern and Southern California.

Irving W. Parker, Associate Professor of English, was re-elected Secretary of the Board of Directors of the Santee Community Theatre at the annual membership meeting on December 18, 1985.

Dr. Lou Burnett, Biology, attended the annual meeting of the American Society of Zoologists in Baltimore, Maryland last December where he presented a lecture in a symposium on Mechanisms of Physiological Compensation in Intertidal Animals. The title of the lecture was "Physiological responses to Air Exposure: Acid-base Balance and the Role of Branchial Water Stores." In addition, Dr. Burnett coauthored a contributed paper with Dr. Charlotte Mangum, College of William and Mary, entitled "CO₂ Sensitivity of the Hemocyanins and Hemerythrins." Dr. Burnett also served on a panel of judges for the best graduate student paper award.

Professor C. Hugh Friedman, School of Law, was elected unanimously to serve as president of the Del Mar Fair Board for the remainder of a vacated oneyear presidential term. In February, Professor Friedman presided as Moderator of Business Planning Workshops in San Francisco and Los Angeles. Their panel members were made up of expert corporate, tax, and securities practitioners from the Bar Associations of these two cities. The workshops were based on his recently published two-volume treatise: <u>California Practice Guide</u>: Corporations.

In March, he attended a meeting of the california "Blue-Ribbon" Commission on the Teaching Profession, which was held at Claremont College. Professor Friedman is vice-chairman of this Commission. During the summer, he taught International Corporations in USD's Summer Law Institute in Paris where he became the proud owner of a Selmer et Cie. clarinet. He made his debut at the San Diego Pops on the Bay upon his return to San Diego.

Professor Friedman has just completed and published the second edition of his two-volume California Corporate Practice treatise.
