Enrollment for the 1987-1988 Academic Year:

Attached to these Newsnotes are the final enrollment charts for the regular academic year 1987-1988, with both Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) and headcount enrollments included for all segments of the University.

An analysis of the charts will reveal to you a number of factors:

- Undergraduate enrollment is above budget for the year (by 129 students). Net FTE attrition (minus graduating, disqualified, or dropout students, plus new students) was 5.1% instead of the budgeted 7%.
- Though the graduate student FTE dropped between fall and spring, the annual average remains above budget (column 9: 525 FTE). This is 6 FTE students above the budgeted 519.
- School of Law annual average enrollment is over budget by 83.5 day students and under budget by 33.5 evening students; on-campus LL.M./M.C.L. enrollment is below budget in full-time students, and 94 units above in part-time units.

Phased Retirement Deadline:

Anyone interested in the Phased Retirement option beginning in 1989-1990 must apply by March 31, 1988. Please refer to your Faculty Handbook for the procedures.

WASC Report:

Two copies of the report which was drafted by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) team which conducted the fifth-year visit on November 16-17, 1987, are available in the Copley Library for any members of the USD community who wish to review the materials.

UNIVERSITY RELATIONS

Scholarships Established:

Six USD students this fall became the first group to receive Peter and Bruce Bidstrup Memorial Scholarships. The scholarships were established by Doubletree and Compri Hotels' executive Peter Bidstrup and his wife, Regina, in honor of Bidstrup's two sons. The brothers, one a USD student at the time of his death, were born with congenital kidney disease.

Recipients of the Bidstrup Scholarships this fall include Gregory Norombaba, Timothy J. Perkins, Tracy L. Postma, Shannon M. Taylor, Marc C. Thompson, and Emelie C. Tirre. Scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$2,500 per semester and are renewable for a maximum of five semesters.

VARIA

Donald Weckstein, School of Law, was leadoff speaker and discussion leader on Professional Responsibilities of Dispute Resolvers, Society of Professionals in Dispute Resolution, on October 2, 1987. On October 11-14, he was a member of the Planning Committee and Moderator, Western Conference of the Industrial Relations Research association on Labor-Management Relations, University City.

In November, he was a panelist on Arbitration of Wrongful Termination cases, San Diego County Bar Association Section on Labor and Employment Law. Professor Weckstein was speaker and workshop leader on January 15, 1988, at the American Arbitration Association meeting on Issues and Answers in Arbitration in Anaheim. He was co-chair of the National Conference on Federal Sector Labor Relations on February 4-5, sponsored by USD.

His article, "The Purposes of Dispute Resolution," has been accepted for publication in a spring, 1988 issue of the American Business Law Journal.

Professor Weckstein has been reappointed chair, Attorneys Employment and Practice Commission, Administrative Law Section, American Bar Association; reappointed co-chair, subcommittee on Public Sector and Interest Arbitration, Section of Labor and Employment Law, American Bar Association; appointed senior vice-chair, Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee, Section of Tort and Insurance Law Practice, American Bar Association; and elected to the Executive Board of the San Diego Chapter of the Society of Professionals in Dispute Resolution.

James Rocha, Assistant Professor of Fine Arts, has had two paintings accepted for showing in the 6th Annual Maine/Maritime Flatwork Exhibition at the University of Maine, Presque Isle.

Both works were completed as part of an Arts and Sciences mini-grant he received last year.

Mr. Rocha was recently commissioned to execute two paintings for the new U.S. Naval Hospital complex located in Florida Canyon. Both works are acrylic on canvas and have been installed in the Chapel at the above site.

Father Ron Pachence (Institute for Christian Ministries) will be making two presentations at the Los Angeles Religious Education Conference, March 11-12, 1988: "The Church in Transition" and "Fashioned in God's Likeness."

His recent book and series of six audio cassettes, Speaking of Sacraments, will be made available to conference participants by WinterSun/NALR publishers.

Dr. Judith Liu, Sociology, attended the 1988 Conference on Historical and Underwater Archaeology held in Reno, Nevada on January 14-17, 1988. In the "Overseas Chinese and Asian Archaeology" sessions, she presented her paper, "Angst in the Archives: Researching Chinese Occupations in San Diego, 1870-1900."

Dr. Cynthia Villis, Dean of Academic Services and Director of the Counseling Center, has been appointed to the Committee on Women of the California State Psychological Association. The Committee sponsors annual education workshops for the general public and professional psychologists on subjects which help psychologists relate to the needs of women.

Dr. Dennis Rohatyn, Philosophy, has had the following recent publications: review of Tom Regan, "Bloomsbury's Prophet" in Canadian Philosophical Reviews, Vol. VII, No. 9 (September, 1987), 370-72; review of John B. Noone, "Rousseau's Social Contract" and Hilail Gildin, "Rousseau's Social Contract," in Journal of Social Philosophy, Vol. VI (1987), 53-55; and "Propaganda Talk," in Trudy Govier (ed.), Selected Issues in Logic and Communication, Belmont, CA: Wadsworth, 1987, 73-92.

Dr. Rohatyn was chair of "The Contemporary Relevance of Michel de Montaigne," Sixteenth Century Studies Conference, Tempe, Arizona, October 31, 1987; "The Fallacies of Doublespeak," National Council of Teachers of English, Los Angeles, November 21, 1987; "The Early Moore," G.E. Moore Society, New York, December 28, 1987; and was commentator on J. Anthony Blair, "Premise Adequacy of Cogent Arguments," Association for Informal Logic and Critical Thinking (AILACT), concurrent with APA Eastern Division meeting, New York, December 29, 1987.

His forthcoming presentations include: "Logic for Nihilists," and "Siegel's Roots," Conference '88 on Critical Thinking, Christopher Newport College, Newport News, Virginia, April 7-10; "I lie, therefore I am': Cartesian strategy in the Discourse on Method", 350th Anniversary of Descartes' Discourse on Method, an international conference to be held at San Jose State, April 15-17; "Radio Ergo Sum," AILACT, concurrent with APA Central Division, Cincinnati, Ohio, April 28-30; "The Future of Critical Thinking" and "Media Myths," 6th International Conference on Critical Thinking and Educational Reform, Sonoma State University, August 7-10; "The Devaluation of Value," International Society for Value Inquiry, Arundel and Brighton, England, August 21-27; "The Unity of 'Las Meninas,'" 11th International Congress in Aesthetics, University of Nottingham, August 29-September 2; and "Zelig from A to Z," Philosophical Themes in Film, American Society for Value Inquiry, concurrent with APA Central Division, Chicago, April, 1989.

Eighty of 116 five-minute segments for "San Diego on Air", (KPBS FM) have aired on Mondays at 4:15 p.m. Dr. Rohatyn has just completed a series of six lecture on the "Relevance of Critical Thinking" to the faculty of San Diego Community College District.

Sister Dale Brown, Assistant Director of Financial Aid, will chair the Committee on Training in 1988 for the California Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators. Members of the Committee will conduct workshops around the state on the numerous significant changes in federal regulations and their application to the awarding of federal aid funds.
