VOLUNTEER RESOURCES

Grant from Campus Compact:

The Campus Compact organization out of Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island, has awarded USD a \$10,000 grant. University will use the grant to further develop and expand its community-based Student Volunteer Program. Using committees and participants broadly representing the University community, plans have been made to expand the Adult Literacy Project and volunteer opportunities in neighboring areas of Mexico. A new "Big Sister/Big Brother" project will be developed and contacts with coordinators from community agencies will be increased. Recruitment of student volunteers for the expanded program will be accelerated, particularly in campus housing units. Video presentations will be produced to orient prospective volunteers to community service opportunities. A twelve-month calendar organized around a theme of volunteer community service will be produced to increase visibility and awareness of the program. Support will be extended to faculty supervising any experiential education opportunities. Brochures will be produced to provide an overview of USD social issues events, experiential education and community service opportunities.

VARIA

Dr. Linda A.M. Perry, Communication Studies, made a presentation at the 10th Annual Meeting of the Organization for the Study of Communication, Language and Gender in Milwaukee, Wisconsin entitled, "He Was a Good Ole Wagon, Brother but He Done Broke Down." She also chaired a panel, "Competitive Papers: Ideology, Feminism and Discourse," at the 73rd Annual Meeting of the Speech Communication Association in Boston. Dr. Perry authored a chapter entitled, "Weaving the Web: Oral Histories as a Feminine Methodological Stance," in Beyond Boundaries: Sex and Gender Diversity to be released this summer. She will be the Director of the 11th Annual Meeting of the Organization for the Study of Communication, Language and Gender to be held in San Diego from October 6-9, 1988.

USD's Law School will host the CLEO Program this summer. Professor Roy Brooks will direct the program; Darrell Bratton will be teaching in the program.

Sister Maureen Cronin, Associate Provost, has received a research grant from the Quebec Government. She will spend time in Quebec City and Montreal examining the response of the people of Quebec to recent developments in NORAD and NATO. In particular, she will study the reactions of the French-speaking province to the development of the Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI) or "STAR WARS."

On April 22-23, Visiting Professor Walter Raushenbush of the School of Law attended a meeting of the Law School Admission Council Board of Trustees in Santa Barbara. He is the secretary and a past president of the Board.

Dr. Dennis Briscoe, School of Business, is chairman of the board of directors of the San Diego-Tijuana unit of Habitat for Humanity, an international organization based in Americus, Georgia. The group plans to build 25 homes for the needy in Tijuana by the end of the summer. With help from the needy families and donations of materials from developers, contractors and manufacturers, the organization builds the homes and sells them at no profit, no interest and with payments within the reach of the poorest families.

Professor Larry Alexander has had two pieces recently accepted for publication: one, a short commentary that is to appear as part of a symposium issue of the <u>Southern California Law Review</u>; the other, an examination of constitutional interpretation and authority to appear as part of a symposium in <u>Constitutional</u> <u>Commentary</u>. He also has completed a critique of the preference for the status quo in some forms of contractarian thought and an analysis of the concept of "low value speech."

Irving W. Parker, Professor of English, received the 1988 Distinguished Alumni Award from California Phi Delta Chapter of Phi Kappa Theta Fraternity on May 6, 1988.

Director of the Law Library, Nancy Carter, presented a program on American Indian law for visitors from Africa on April 29. The lawyers and judges from Chad, the Ivory Coast and Mauritius are studying U.S. Law under the Fulbright International Visitor Program. Next month, Professor Carter will present the keynote speech on Communication at the American Association of Law Libraries Institute on Law Library Management, scheduled for June 22-25, 1988, at the University of Alabama Law Center.

In April, Professor Lester Snyder was the lead speaker and moderator at a retreat of the Real Property Section - State Bar of California, on the subject of "The Ladder Theory of Taxation: Use of Tax Laws As a Device to Allocate Wealth Resources." Also, he will speak on "Advanced Real Estate Taxation Planning" at the two meetings of the California Education of the Bar this June, to be held in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Dr. Hugh Ellis of the Department of Biology, who was on sabbatical last semester, attended the American Ornithologists' Union national meeting in San Francisco last August and the annual meeting of the American Physiological Society here in San Diego in October. In December, he presented a paper entitled "Total body water in phalaropes and other birds: the role of lipids" to the annual meeting of the American Society of Zoologists in New Orleans. This presentation was coauthored by Dr. Joseph Jehl of the Sea World Research Institute. They are currently preparing this work for submission to a journal.

Dr. Ellis has also had an article published this year in Oecologia (vol. 74, pp. 546-550). Entitled "Incubation energetics of the Laysan albatross," it was coauthored with Drs. T.N. Pettit and G.C. Whittow of the University of Hawaii and Dr. K.A. Nagy of UCLA.

While on sabbatical at the Physiological Research Laboratory of Scripps Institution of Oceanography, Dr. Ellis worked on the swimming energetics of the Eared Grebe. He will return to Scripps this summer to continue that work. When he left USD last summer to begin his sabbatical, members of the Biology Department encouraged him to be as productive as possible. Dr. Ellis is pleased to report that he has complied, and expects to be a father by the end of this month!

Professor Joseph Edrey, Visiting Law Professor from Israel, gave a lecture to the San Diego County Bar Association, Tax Section, on April 12 on "Taxation and Inflation and V.A.T. - The Israeli Experience." He also has a book review in 22 <u>Israel Law Review</u>, p. 140, of Income Tax Law by A. Rafael and D. Efrati.

Adjunct Law Professor Howard Shore has just completed his coprosecution of Joselito Cinco in Orange County.

Visiting Professor Richard Saphire has completed an article entitled "Enough about Originalism," which will be published in a symposium on constitutional interpretation in the Northern Kentucky Law Review. In addition, he is currently working on an article entitled, "Residential Streets and the Public Forum Doctrine."

Hugh Friedman was the moderator of "Update on Business Transactions" seminars for business lawyers in five major cities sponsored by the local bar associations, including San Francisco, Santa Clara County, Los Angeles, Orange County and San Diego County, and prepared the materials for the handbook that was used in the seminars. Also, the 1988 Update (4th edition) of his two-volume California Practice Guide - Corporations is now being distributed by the publishers. This edition involved extensive revision to reflect the changes in the corporate law, federal and state securities laws, and tax laws during 1987. Hugh's book continues to be cited by the California appellate courts and other commentators. In addition, he will be serving as the discussion leader for the forthcoming seminar on Privacy, Politics and the Law, co-sponsored by the San Diego Bar

Association and California Western School of Law. Professor Friedman will spend the summer in Japan where his activities will include lectures at the Osaka and Tokyo Chambers of Commerce and the Kyoto Comparative Law Center.

Judy Rauner, Director of Volunteer Resources, will be giving a workshop entitled "Models for Student Community Service: Universities and Communities in Partnership" at the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators Development Day, California State University, Long Beach, on June 9, 1988.

Dean Ed DeRoche, Dr. Ed Kujawa and Dr. Johanna Hunsaker have coauthored an article entitled "Department Chairs: A School's Untapped Resource," which was published in The High School Journal 71 (February/March, 1988): 135-137.
