1989-1990 Budget:

The spring phase of preparation of the 1989-1990 fiscal year budget is under way. Budget sheets have been distributed, to be completed according to guidelines set last fall by the USD Budget Committee, and approved by the Board of Trustees. The final 1989-1990 budget goes to the Trustees for approval in late February.

Financial Aid Trends:

For the information of members of the academic community, I am attaching the following charts to these Newsnotes: 1) Undergraduate-Graduate Financial Aid trends from 1975-76 to the present and 2) Law School Financial Aid trends from 1976-77 to the present.

Social Issues Courses for Spring, 1990:

The Social Issues Committee of the University of San Diego has chosen the theme of "Issues of Poverty" for the academic year 1989-1990. Accordingly, the Committee is soliciting proposals for special team-taught courses for the spring of 1990 that will focus on this theme. These courses include a January stipend for course preparation and compensation for at least one of the departments involved.

Some issues related to this theme might include (but not be limited to): the "business" of poverty, domestic and international issues of poverty, the feminization of poverty, health care for the poor, civil/human/economic rights, the plight of the elderly poor, homelessness, the plight of refugees, hunger in the third world, the theme of poverty in literature, daycare and the cycle of poverty, education and poverty, drug abuse and

poverty, the church and the poor, the responsibility of the welloff to the poor, the causes of poverty, the romanticization of poverty, the welfare system, the effect of poverty on family life, foreign aid, and charity vs. development.

Faculty who are interested in teaching a course should submit proposals to Dr. Cynthia Caywood, Dept. of English, Chair, Social Issues Committee, by <u>Monday, April 3, 1989</u>. The proposal should include: the names and departments of the participating faculty; the course title, description, and objectives; the requirements of the course and method of evaluation; and a reading list.

"The Lost Architecture of Kiev", documenting that city's destroyed Baroque monuments, will be exhibited in Founders Gallery from February 21 through March 31, 1989. An opening reception featuring Ukrainian music and refreshments will be held for the University community on February 21 from 7:00-9:00 p.m. The exhibition, part of the Gallery's continuing internationalization program, is being cosponsored by the Ukrainian Museum in New York and the San Diego Ukrainian Millenium Committee. A catalogue with one hundred illustrations will be available.

VARIA

In June, 1988, the <u>Boletin de la Fundacion Federico Garcia Lorca</u> in Madrid published an article by Dr. Sandra Robertson entitled "Mariana Pineda: el Romance popular y su retrato teatral." In October, she attended the Midwest Conference on Hispanic Literature at Washington University in St. Louis where she presented a paper entitled "El Prisionero: The Last One Hundred and Fifty Years."

Sister Patricia Shaffer is back from her sabbatical leave which she spent at the University of Georgia working with Dr. William Timberlake in the Department of Genetics. She learned techniques for cloning genes in <u>Aspergillus nidulans</u> and cloned two large pieces of DNA each containing one of the L-asparaginase genes. She is in the process of testing the subclones of these at USD. The protein products of one of the genes may be used by Dr. Poplack of the National Cancer Institute to treat acute lymphoblast leukemia.

Sister Shaffer also published an article entitled "An asparaginase of <u>Aspergillus nidulans</u> is subject to oxygen repression in addition to nitrogen metabolite repression" in <u>Molecular and General Genetics</u>, 212, 337-341 (1988). In addition, she presented a poster on her work at the FASEB meeting in May, 1988 in Las Vegas and at the Gordon Conference on Fungal Metabolism in July.

Her sabbatical leave was partially supported by an NSF Visiting Professorship for Women. One aspect of this grant is to make women scientists more visible. While at the University of Georgia, she established a local chapter of Sigma Delta Epsilon/Graduate Women in Science. This group put together a good seminar program on campus and collaborated with the Women's Studies Program to cosponsor one of the speakers, Dr. Sue Rosser, a scientist and Director of the Women's Studies Program at the University of South Carolina. Also while on sabbatical, Sister Shaffer attended conferences on Women in Science. One sponsored by the American Association for the Advancement of Science entitled "Changing Vision of Reality: Women in Science and Engineering", July, 1987, at the University of Michigan, renewed her acquaintance with Ms. Sue Coady Kemnitzer (USD grad). Sue is Executive Director of the Congressional Task Force on Women, Minorities and the Handicapped in Science and Technology. Sue has been part of many activities sponsored by AAAS and SDE/GWIS. This whole experience has made Sister Shaffer aware of the need to encourage women to enter upon scientific careers.

Currently, Sister Shaffer is National President-Elect of SDE/GWIS and is working with the local Chapter which will cosponsor with the Orange County/LA Chapters the National Conference "Women in Science: Academe and Industry - Today and Tomorrow" at USD, June 22-26, 1989.

Professor Terry Whitcomb, Fine Arts Department, has been elected to the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the new Center for the Study of Decorative Arts which opens February 4 in San Juan Capistrano. Focus of the Center will be upon architecture, landscape architecture, and furnishings. The Center's programs, which include libraries, exhibitions, lecture and travel series, specialized courses and an outreach program, will also maintain centers in Dijon, France and Florence, Italy.

Judge Robert C. Coates, Law School, had an article entitled "Our Courts and the Homeless" published in the September and October issues of <u>Dicta</u>. He is presently finishing a book to be entitled Solving America's Homeless Dilemma.

During the fall term, Professor Paul Wohlmuth of the Law faculty participated in team-teaching an interdisciplinary course in the Honors Collegium at UCLA entitled "Foundations for a Unified Social Science." In addition to law, the teaching team consisted of researchers in physics, biology, anthropology, economics and political science from UCLA; UC, Irvine and USC with whom Professor Wohlmuth has been collaborating since 1984. The team has been working on several manuscripts on the dynamics of human societies viewed as evolving complex systems.

Professor Wohlmuth's presentation on the significance of the Critical Legal Studies movement to western culture in "An Evening with the Crits" at the Student Center on January 19 reflected the approach to law and legal systems which he has contributed to the UCLA project. He also developed this point of view in his recent article in <u>World Futures: The Journal of General</u> <u>Evolution</u> entitled "Nested Realities and Human Consciousness: The Paradoxical Expression of Evolutionary Process" and in the Professional Responsibility Seminar which he team-taught in the fall with Professor Steven Hartwell.

A "Landlord Tenant Handbook" prepared by Associate Professor Steven Hartwell has just been published for local distribution by the San Diego County Human Relations Commission. He will lead a workshop on Negotiating for the Southern California Association of Law Librarians in February at the U.S. Grant Hotel. In March, he and a colleague, Dr. Roger Pace of USD's Communication Studies Department, will jointly present a paper entitled "Group Decision-Making in a Technological Society" at the Conference on Communication and the Culture of Technology sponsored by Texas A&M University. *****

Dr. Dennis Rohatyn, Philosophy, has had the following articles and papers published recently: Theory and Problems in Logic for the Schaum's Outline Series, July, 1988; "Hell and Dystopia: A Comparison and Literary Case Study", in Utopian Studies, Vol. II, University Press of America, 1988; and a review of Paul Roth's <u>Meaning and Method in the Social Sciences</u> in <u>Philosophy of the</u> <u>Social Sciences</u>, 1988. Conference papers include "Montaigne, Descartes and the French Revolution," Forgers of the French Revolution, Texas Tech University, October 8, 1988; "Bell's Theorem, Duhem's Holism and the Unity of Science," Fall Workshop on Bell's Theorem, George Mason University, October 22, 1988; "Mind over Media: Critical Thinking on Public Radio," Institute on Critical Thinking, Montclair State University, October 23, 1988; and the upcoming "Rediscovering Montaigne: Montaigne's Significance for Contemporary Philosophy," Rocky Mountain Medieval and Renaissance Studies Conference, Grand Canyon, AZ, April 21-23, 1989.

Dr. Rohatyn continues his weekly radio commentaries for <u>San Diego</u> on <u>Air</u> (KPBS FM). He has written 246 segments, of which 175 have aired. On October 31, KPBS aired "An American Nightmare: Orson Welles' Martian Invasion," a twenty-seven minute documentary commemorating the 50th anniversary of <u>The War of the Worlds</u> broadcast, which he wrote, produced and narrated. A copy is available in the Media Center.

On December 7, he participated in a "San Diego Forum on Ethics" moderated by Fred Friendly at Mandel Weiss Center. Fellow panelists included philosophers Michael Carella (SDSU) and Gerald Doppelt (UCSD).

Professor Richard Huffman, Law School, has been selected as the moderator of the CEB program on New Developments in Criminal Law to be presented in February in San Diego and Palm Springs. In addition, he has been asked to review the report of a research project on sentencing for the National Institute of Justice.

Professor Larry Alexander will be presenting papers at Northwestern in March and at a conference in San Diego in April. These papers will later be published. He has had an article on vote dilution accepted for publication and will have an article on the compatibility of rights and consequentialism published later this year. He will write an introduction to the to-be-published papers presented at the AALS section on Constitutional Law in New Orleans. Professor Alexander will moderate a panel at the Pacific Division meeting of the American Philosophical Association in Oakland in March. *****

Adjunct Professor Garth Gartrell will write a book for West Publishing Company on <u>Employee Benefits</u>, <u>Pension Plans and Employment Law</u>. It is due out in the fall of 1990.

Professor Laura Berend, who has completed her term as Chair of the State Bar Commission on Corrections, assisted the ACLU in coordinating the November seminar on how to litigate a Section 1983 case. She attended the 11th Annual Conference of the Organization for the Study of Communication, Gender and Language sponsored by USD in October. She also attended the AALS annual meeting in New Orleans in January.

Donald Weckstein, Law School, is serving as chair of the Directory/Membership Committee, Dispute Resolution Forum of San Diego. In November, he spoke to Couples Club of North County on "Why Lawyers are Unpopular and What We Can Do About It." On January 24, he spoke on "Evidence and Proof" at the Advanced Arbitration Advocacy Institute of the American Arbitration Association.

Professor Weckstein's article, "The Purposes of Dispute Resolution: Comparative Concepts of Justice," appeared in 26 <u>American Business</u>, L.J. 605 (1988).
