## Enrollment for the 1990-1991 Academic Year:

Attached to these <u>Newsnotes</u> are the final enrollment charts for the regular academic year 1990-1991, with both Full-time Equivalent (FTE) and headcount enrollments included for all segments of the University.

An analysis of the charts will reveal to you a number of factors:

- Undergraduate enrollment is above budget for the year (by 125 FTE students). Net FTE attrition (minus graduating, disqualified, or dropout students, plus new students) was 6%, exactly the amount budgeted.
- The graduate student FTE dropped between fall and spring (a normal pattern), and the annual average is just slightly below budget (column 9: 562 FTE) by 6 FTE students.
- School of Law annual average enrollment is exactly on budget in day students and over budget by 6 evening students; on-campus LL.M./M.C.L. enrollment is less than 1 FTE below budget in full-time students, and 95 units below in part-time units.

Because we have nearly reached USD's Undergraduate headcount enrollment targets, we will continue to control the number of entering freshmen (which we have done quite successfully the past several years) and probably to reduce the number of new transfer students, in order that Undergraduate enrollment will remain fairly stable.

## Phased Retirement Deadline:

Nicolas Reveles, formerly of Music; Dr. Murney Gerlach of History; and Dr. Virginia Muller of Political Science.

Dr. Caywood chaired a session and read a paper entitled: "'Well-shaped and clean limb'd': The Female Body in Aphra Behn and Fay Weldon" at the second meeting of the Aphra Behn Society, held February 22-23 in Albuquerque. She also recently completed a review essay for College Literature of Anne Ruggles Gere's Writing Group: History, Theory, and Implications and served as assistant dramaturge for Will Roberson's production of Aphra Behn's The Rover. The play is currently in rehearsal at the University of Missouri at Kansas City.

This paper was solicited for publication in the journal Comparative Strategy and will appear in its July, 1991 issue. She also attended a day-long seminar for teachers of Soviet Politics organized by the American Political Science Association.

Dr. Nadkarni will be presenting a joint paper entitled "The Future of Democracy in India and Pakistan" at the forthcoming meeting of the Western Political Science Association in Seattle, March 21-23, 1991 and will also be chairing a panel on "The Soviet Union, The United States and the Third World: From Conflict to Cooperation" at the International Studies Association Convention in Vancouver, Canada, in March, 1991.

Dr. James Otte, History, has presented the following papers: "An Anonymous Oxford commentary on Aristotle's <u>De generatione et corruptione</u>" at a Medieval History conference in Kalamazoo, Michigan; "Alfredus Anglicus and the Reception of Aristotle," at the Augustinian Historical Institute of Villanova University; "The Introduction of Aristotle in the 12th Century: The case of the <u>De generatione et corruptione</u>" at UC, Davis; and "Frederick Barbarossa and the Unification of Germany," at the University of Texas, San Antonio.

In August, 1990, Dr. Otte spent two weeks in Oxford working on an anonymous 12th century commentary on Aristotle. The Bodleian Library "disbound" the manuscript so he could read the interlinear and marginal commentary. Dr. Otte, and Dr. Gary Macy of Religious Studies, attended a conference at UCLA entitled "Medieval Heresy and Dissent" in January.

Dr. Otte's local lectures include "The Rise of Prussia and Germany" at the San Diego Genealogical Society; "German History and Unification" for the German American Society; and "Napoleon and Military - Land and Sea" for Navy Officers Lecture series.

Dr. Gary Macy, Theological and Religious Studies, was selected as a member of the School for Historical Studies at the Institute for Advanced Studies at Princeton for the 1991-1992 academic year.

Three major articles of his have appeared this year: "Reception of the Eucharist According to the Theologians: A Case of Diversity in the 13th and 14th Centuries," Theology and the University (Proceedings of the Annual Convention of the College Theology Society, 1987); the symposium review of Bernard Cooke's The Distancing of God: The Ambiguity of Symbol in History and Theology; and "Berengar's Legacy as Heresiarch," Auctoritas und Ratio: Studien zu Berengar von Tours (Proceedings of the Colloquium on Berengarius of Tours, Herzog August Bibliothek Wolfenbuttel). The last article was a result of Dr. Macy's participation in the above conference. He was the only American scholar invited.

Dr. Macy also published a book review of Michael O'Carroll's <u>Corpus Christi: An Encyclopedia of the Eucharist</u> (Glazier: Wilmington, DE, 1988) in Horizons, vol. 17 (Fall, 1990), pp. 345-346.

His book, The Banquet's Wisdom: A Short History of the Theologies of the Lord's Supper, was accepted by Paulist Press and is awaiting a publication date, and the article, "Of Mice and Manna: Quid mus sumit as a Pastoral Question" will be published in 1991 in Recherches Théologie Ancienne et Médiévale.
