He reeled off a list of athletes who were helped, including Billy Cannon, LSU's All-America back.

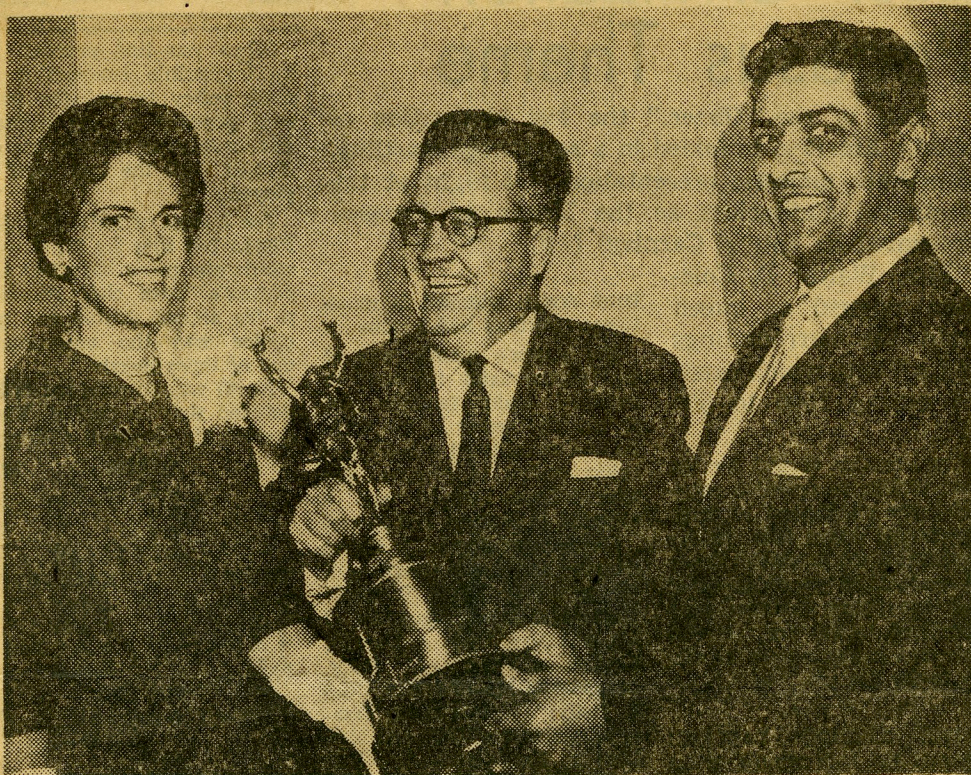
Earl "Apple" Schmidt was master of ceremonies. Irwin poche, promotive and athletic director of the club, presented the awards to the club champions.

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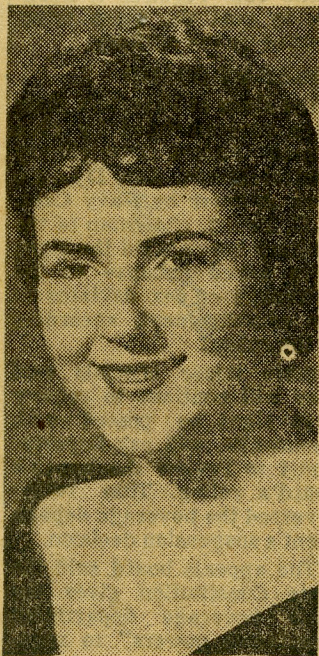

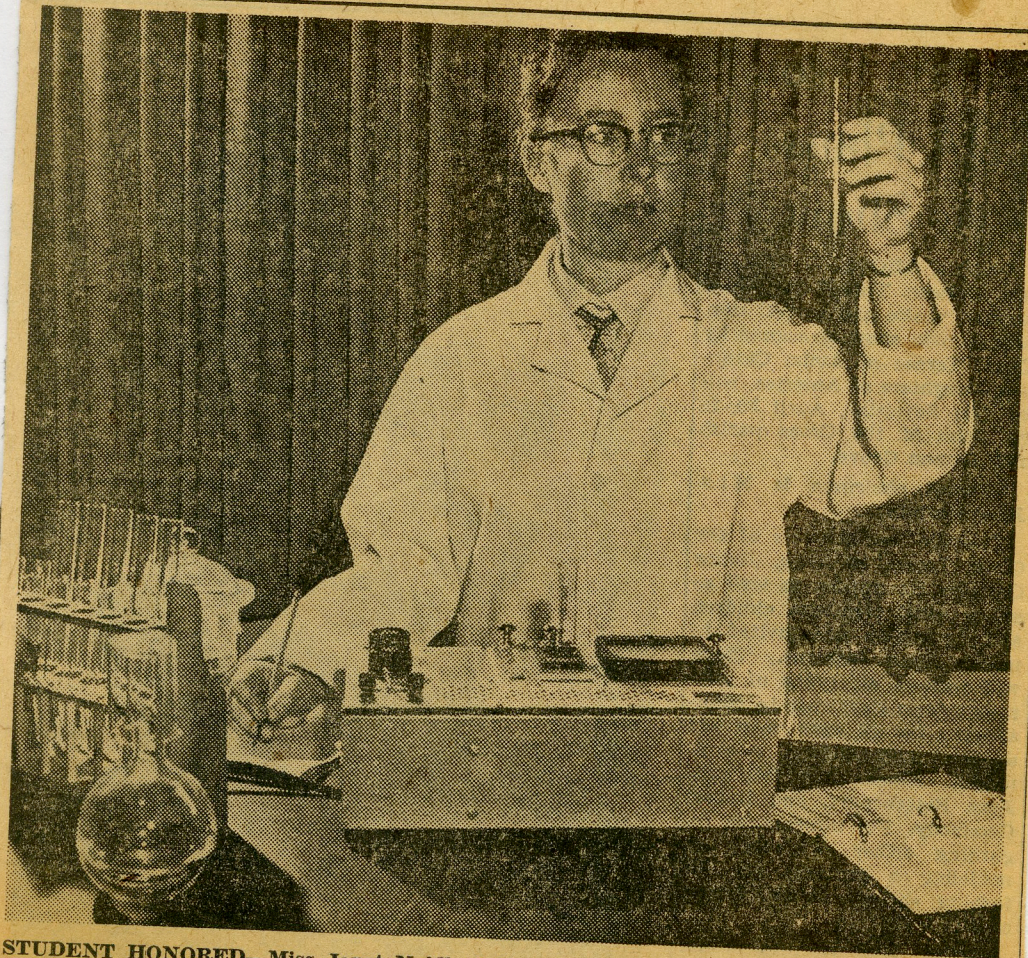

Members of the faculty and student body at the San Diego College for Women were elated at the news of the recent acceptance of Miss Janet Naidl to graduate study by three universities in the field of medicine.

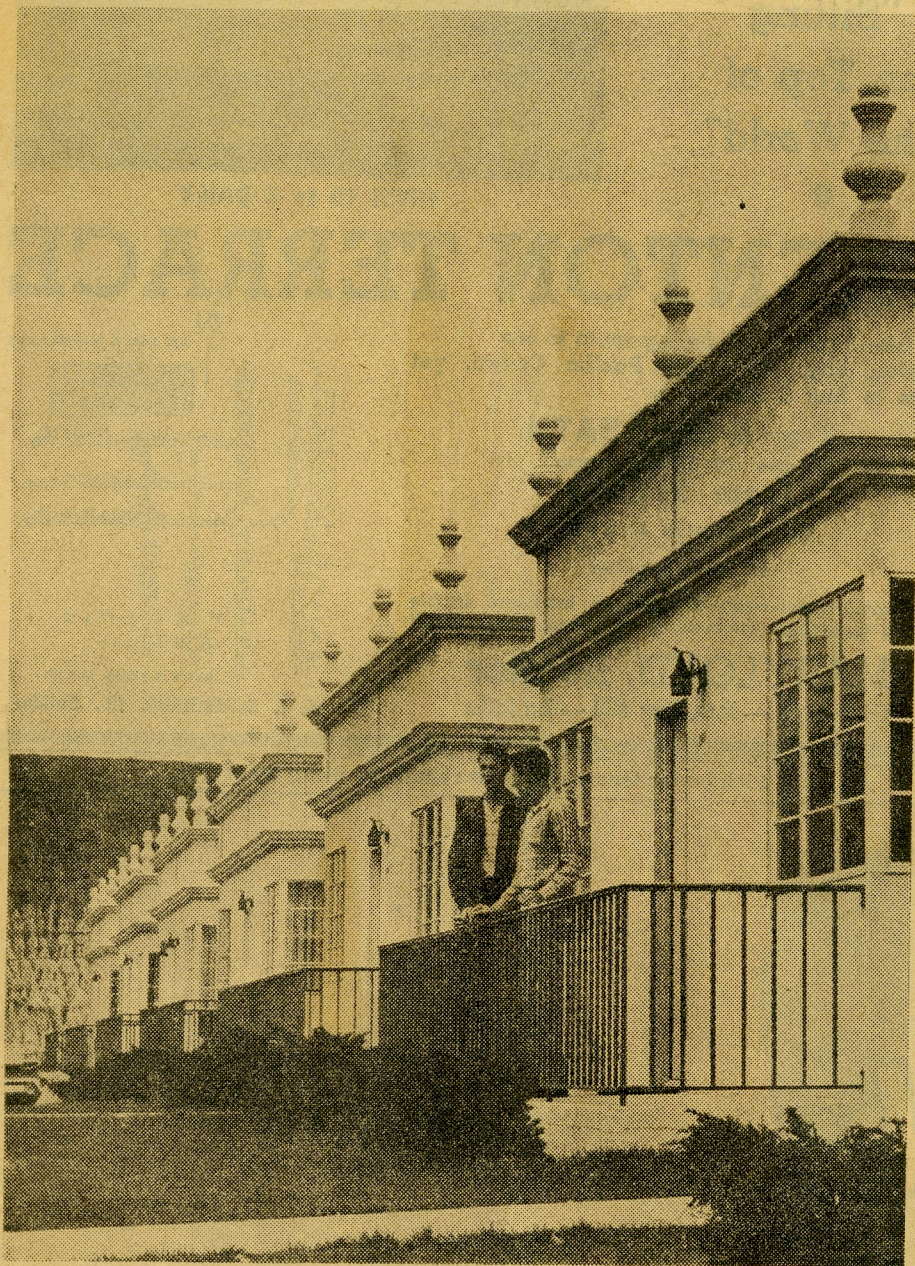
Miss Naidl, a senior at the College for Women, has been accepted for advanced study leading to the MD Degree by the Creighton University School of Medicine, the Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania, and the St. Louis University School of Medicine.

By means of high academic achievement in her major and minor fields, chemistry and biology, admissions tests given by the various universities and personal interviews, Miss Naidl won the coveted acceptance for graduate work in a field in which only 10 per cent of applicants are accepted.

The prospect of four years of graduate study, one year's internship, and one year's residency is a pleasing one to this senior, who has planned a medical career "since grade school." Her final choice of medical school is that of St. Louis University.

Miss Naidl is the daughter of Mrs. Rowena Ireland Naidl, a teacher in the San Diego School System. Her sister, Rowena Naidl, a 1959 magna cum laude graduate of the San Diego College for Women, now serves as a Navy ensign in the capacity of communications officer in the NOL laboratory, Silver Springs, Md.

A student of the College for Women since her freshman year in 1957, Miss Naidl serves as president of the college's Science Club, plays the viola in the String Ensemble Group, and is a member of the Children of Mary.

on campus are housed in dormitories in upper stories of the main building. Their class rooms are at ground level.

The men's apartments, completed last July, are all occupied, except for three units. There are 110 male students now living on campus, and 10 priests who are faculty members also occupy apartments there.

Father William D. Spain, administrative vice president of the College for Men, said construction of more apartments is planned along a similar hillside site on campus, across Linda Vista road from the present buildings.

No date for the housing expansion has been fixed, however, and it will be geared to university needs. There are now more than 300 enrolled in the College for Men and enrollment is expected to double by next year.

Father Spain said it was possible, as the university expands, the present apartments would be reserved primarily for graduate students and faculty members. So far, no apartments are leased to married student couples, but that practice could be changed if the need demanded, with sections set aside for married students.

Right now, the university is planning to expand and hopes to provide more housing as the need arises.

As in the last staging ten years ago, the role of Christ is played by a 48-year-old innkeeper Anton Preisinger. Dengg Irmgard, a 21-year-old typist, was chosen to portray the Virgin Mary.

Priest Appointed Law School Head

The Rev. Martin J. McManus, 41, onetime practicing attorney and a naval veteran of five World War II campaigns, has been appointed regent of the school of law, University of San Diego, it was announced yesterday.

Rev. Charles F. Buddy, bishop of the San Diego Catholic Diocese, named Father McManus to succeed the Rt. Rev. Msgr. James Booth, chancellor of the diocese who also has been serving as regent. Msgr. Booth will continue in the post of chancellor.

Father McManus has been a professor of law at the university since September.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin J. McManus of 1357A Goshen St. His brother is Robert Paul McManus of 1091 Albion St., an electronics scientist at the Navy Electronics Laboratory.

Father McManus was ordained to the diocesan priesthood after a 10-year career as a trial lawyer in Los Angeles and four years of active duty as a naval officer.

He was born in Toledo, Ohio, where his father retired after 22 years as a deputy collector for the department of Internal Revenue. The McManus family settled here during the war.

Father McManus was commissioned an ensign upon his graduation from Georgetown University, Washington, D.C., with a law degree in 1942. As a pre-law major, he had earned a bachelor of arts de-

gree at John Carroll University, Cleveland, in 1939.

He was assigned to the Office of Naval Intelligence and then served on the battleship New York and Idaho. Aboard the Idaho he saw action in the Kavieng, Saipan, Guam and Pelleiu campaigns.

In late 1944, Father McManus was sent to San Diego to prepare for the Okinawa campaign. He was trained as a naval gunfire liaison officer at the Amphibious Base.

He jumped off with the 96th Army Division on Easter Sunday, 1945, at Okinawa.

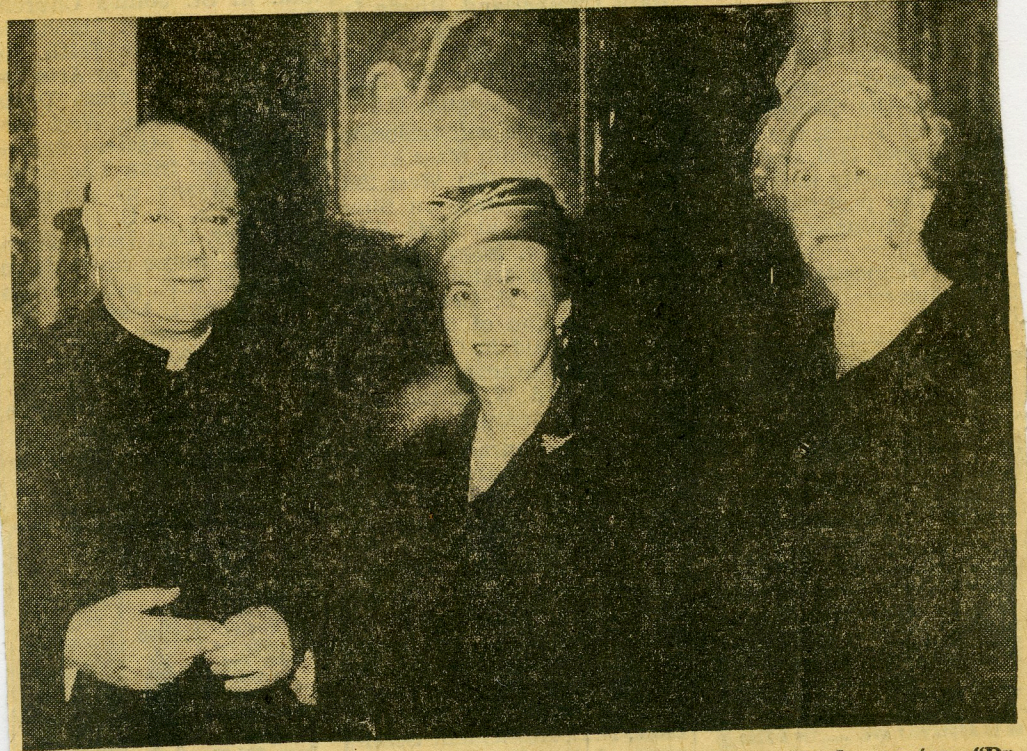

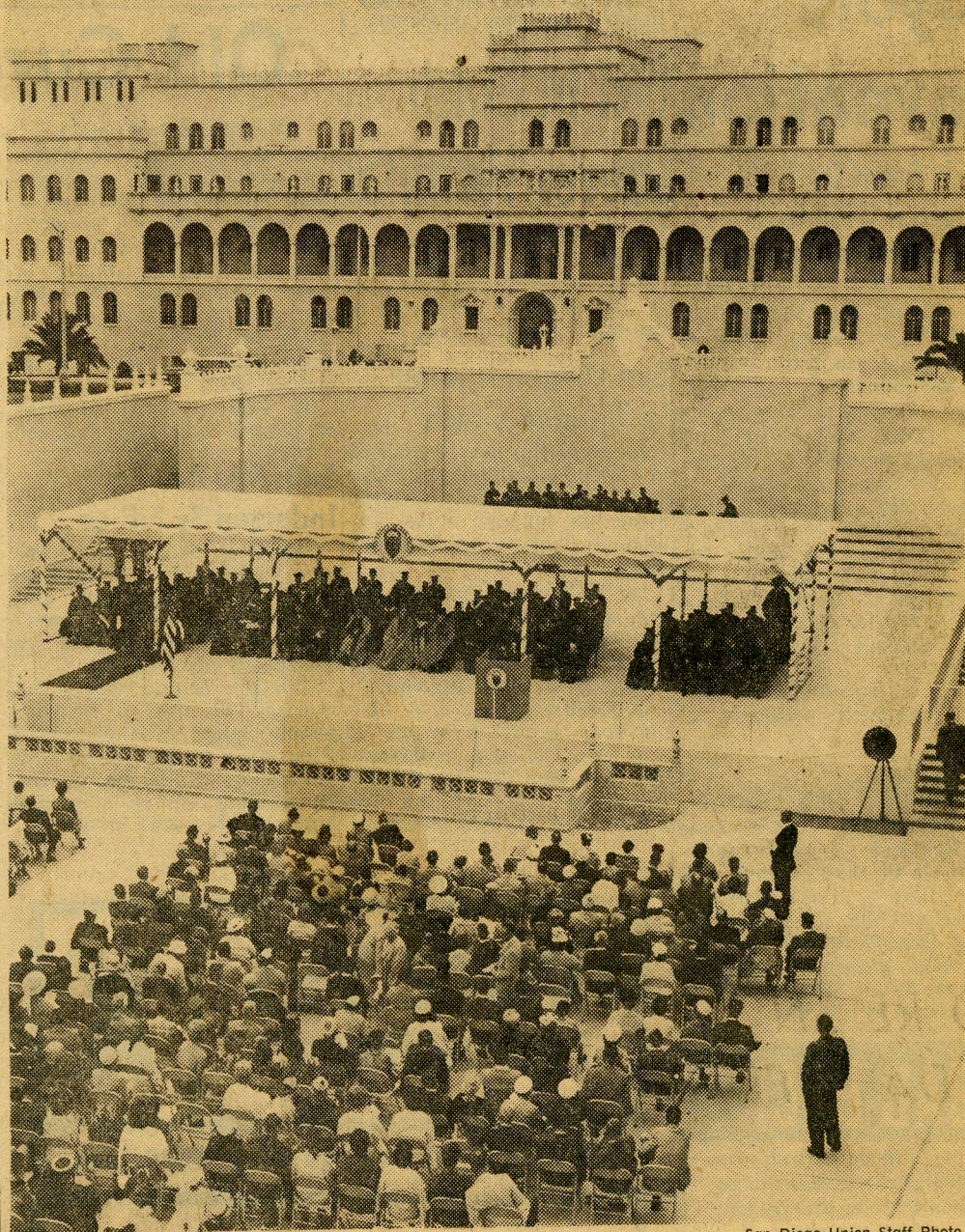

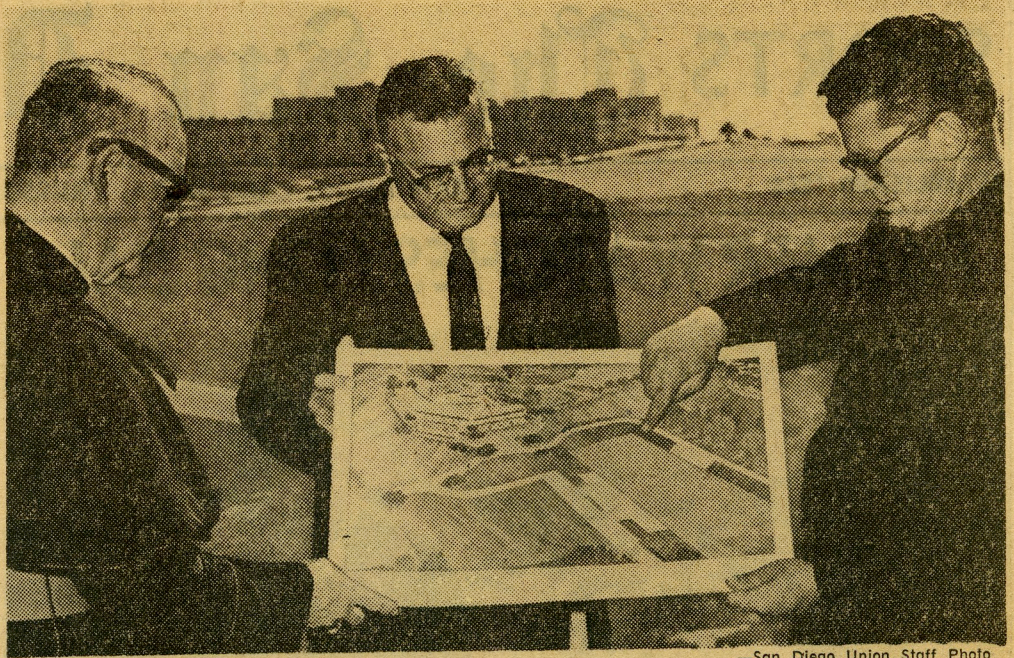

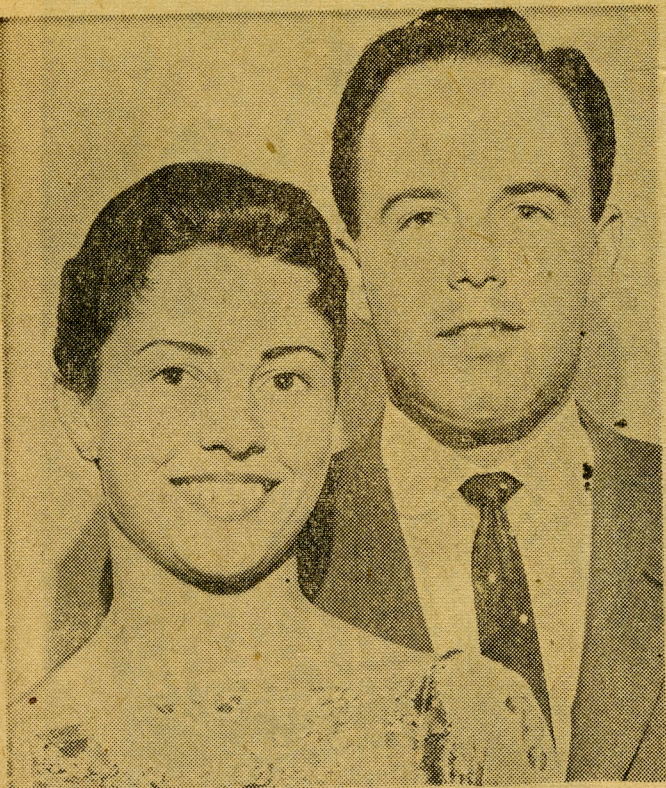

The University of San Diego College for Women will hold a Workshop in Elementary Mathematics from July 25 to August 5. Registration, which has now reached 80, is being extended to include 100. Registration arrangements may be made by calling CY 6-6113.

The workshop, to be conducted by Dr. Andrew F. Schott, has been specifically designed to assist teachers in kindergarten and grades 1-6, as well as elementary supervisors, principals, and college teachers of elementary mathematics methods courses, to understand the new mathematics curriculum needed to meet the demands of modern junior and senior high school mathematics courses.

Two students at San Diego College for Women were among the four outstanding San Diego County college undergraduates, majoring in the life sciences, selected to work on heart research projects under the direction of recognized medical scientists at major research centers in San Diego, Los Angeles, and San Francisco, ♦

Dr. Douglas G. Davidson, chairman of the San Diego County Heart Association's research committee, announced.

They are Miss Karen Perlowski, 21, of 3227 Mohican Avenue, San Diego, a chemistry major, and Miss Myrna L. Stoflet, 19, of 1122 W. Occidental, Santa Ana, also a chemistry major at the college.

The four selected students will work for a period of 10 weeks under \$250 a month stipends provided by the San Diego County Heart Association. They were selected from a statewide group of nearly 100 outstanding science undergraduates, who were applicants for research awards by chapters of the California Heart Association, Davidson said.

Miss Perlowski will do research in physiology under direction of Dr. Chester Hy-

man at University of Southern California. Miss Stoflet will spend the period working in the University of California medical center Cardiovascular Research Institute, San Francisco, under Drs. Norman Staub and Winifred Storey.

10-Week Period

The grants were established to encourage talented students to go into medical research as a career.

"Funds invested in heart research during the last 10 years by the Heart Association are beginning to bring major results," Davidson said. "We now need more investigators to follow up the clues that have been uncovered and pursue promising lines of investigation on the causes and prevention of hardening of the arteries, high blood pressure, and strokes."

In addition to the two San Diego College for Women students, John P. Miller, 23, of 7271 Blackton Drive, La Mesa, a San Diego State College premedical student, and George L. Hody, 19, of 904 Harborview Drive, San Diego, a premedical student at Pomona College, also were awarded summer grants.

This is the second summer in which two students from the College for Women have participated in the program.

Last year, Miss Stoflet held a similar research association while engaged in assisting Dr. W. F. Mommaert of the Department of Medicine at the University of Southern

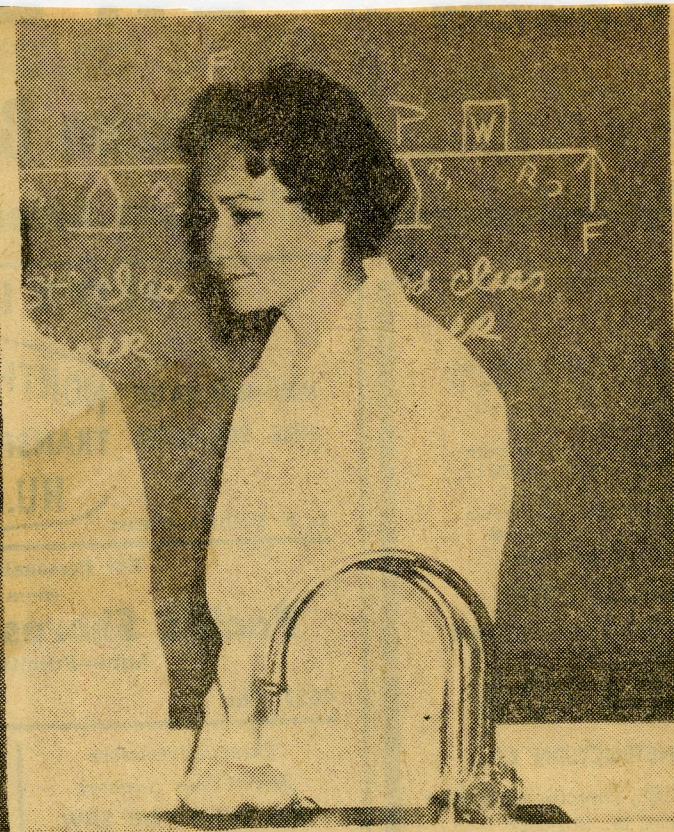

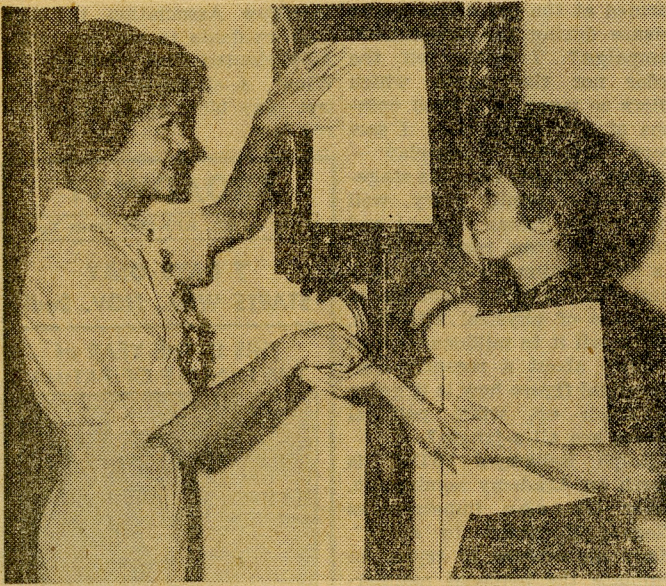

Pioneer Grid Fans Delirious

Westgate Park resembled Forbes Field Saturday night and the fans reacted much like Pirate fans in the World Series celebration when the underdog University of San Diego football squad pulled off the biggest local grid surprise in many seasons.

Riotously happy USD supporters swarmed onto the field to carry quarterback Jan Chapman and coach Mike Pecarovich on their shoulders after the Pioneers stunned Marine Corps Recruit Depot, 21-20.

Chapman, unashamedly in happy tears in the noisy dressing room following the remarkable contest, said . . . "Everyone went out to win . . . it was everybody."

But, it was the expert handling by the gutty little quarterback that enabled the Pioneers to hand the heavily favored Leathernecks their first loss in 21 contests and fourth loss in 34 games over four seasons. This was USD's third straight triumph.

Chapman, a 5-10, 180-pounder from Arkansas

City, Kan., picked himself off the turf several times after being shaken by tackles but the Marine chargers failed to discourage him. He passed for two tallies and scored the last touchdown on a wedge-like quarterback sneak.

Pecarovich, the veteran strategist with many seasons at Gonzaga and Loyola behind him, praised Chapman for his selection of plays.

"They (the Marines) thought they could run for a touchdown when they

wanted to," Pecarovich said. "I have nothing but praise for our boys."

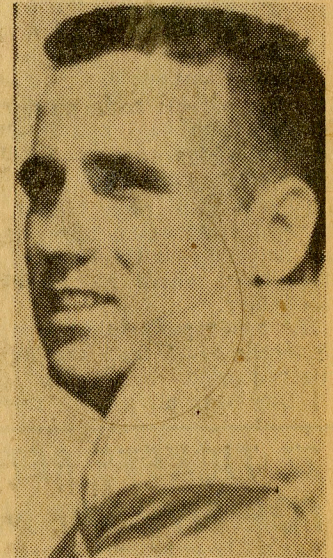
"Joe Gray played his usual great ball game while Larry Tessary and Jim Gabriel did the job I expected them to do."

Gray hauled in a beautiful pass over his shoulder in the third period to complete a 58-yard touchdown play for USD and did an outstanding running job. Tessary and Gabriel performed at the cornerback spots on defense and held the vaunted Marine runners

Al Hall and Billy Martin.

Martin did escape for 82 yards and a touchdown on the opening kickoff of the second half but otherwise the fourth Chicago Bear draft choice, who had averaged better than 9 yards per carry, was held to 33 yards in 10 carries. Hall, a four-year Marine veteran and Los Angeles Rams property, gained only 37 yards in nine carries.

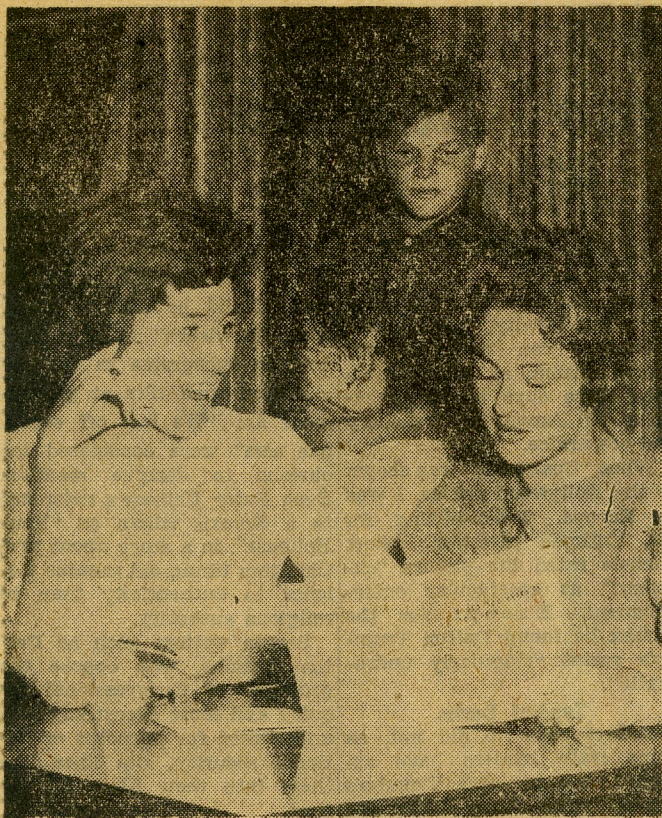
The night, however, belonged to Chapman and a fired-up Pioneer line. Chapman (Continued on b-7, Col. 1)

Four Visiting Students Merge Views On U.S.

If you were to gather together four young women from four countries with such diverse cultures as exist in Iran, Germany, Japan, and El Salvador it would seem likely they would disagree on a great many points.

However, this is not the case with four young foreign students attending schools in this area.

The young women and the schools they attend are the Misses Shahindokht Torabi, Meshed, Iran, La Jolla High School; Gabriele Hauff, Kirchheim tech, Germany, California Western University; Yasuko Kajii, Osaka, Japan, San Diego State, and Margarita Zelaya, San Salvador, El Salvador, University of San Diego College for Women.

All speak English fluently, are relaxed in their new environment and think Americans are the friendliest, although sometimes too informal, people in the world.

They admire our educational system for its "personalized" atmosphere. Their consensus was that instructors here have a little more time for the individual student, and are more interested in problems of academic adjustment.

None of them could find reason to criticize our culture but they do think that our men are a little too domesticated.

"Men were not meant to wear aprons, wash dishes and walk the dog, this is woman's work," said Miss Hauff and the other three assented in varying degrees.

Gabriele, 23, an art major who plans to become an interior architect, said too

that she wishes there was a little less "togetherness" at school functions.

"You go with someone, you dance with that one person and you have little if any opportunity to become acquainted with anyone else."

On the other hand, Miss Torabi, 18, doesn't miss this sort of social behavior. In her country, young people do not date as we know it. There parties are held in private homes supervised by adults.

She knows of one purely American social function that she would like to introduce in Iran — the slumber party.

"I think the activities

girls have here are such fun and I want to start a girls' social club in Meshed, my home.

Her great loves are peanut butter, spaghetti and corn chips and her ambition is to become a doctor. She would like to see the women of her country have the privilege of voting.

Asked if they still wore the chador, or veiled garment, she smiled and admitted about half of the women still do. "But I think they are just too lazy to wear western dress, the chador is very comfortable."

Miss Zelaya, 19, a biology major at the College for Women, is also looking toward a medical career. Both

her grandfather and father are doctors and she said, "It has been my aim all my life to work among my people, particularly in the rural areas where they don't always receive the care they need."

The fourth young woman, Miss Kajii, 24, has received her bachelor of arts degree from Doshimha University in Kyoto and is working toward her master's degree at State.

Although she feels the basic philosophies of her country and ours have few basic similarities, "people are people with the same problems and triumphs no matter where they live."

She likes the manner in which parents listen to their

children here, treating them more as equals.

Her favorite American and Japanese writers are Eugene O'Neill and Dzal Osamu. She will return to her country at the completion of another year to teach English.

The four young women, outstanding examples of their countries, have set their goals high. They have the desire to contribute to their own countries the knowledge gained in this one.

All said they would miss the United States but felt that the experiences would be invaluable in promoting a better understanding among their peoples of our culture, standards and ideals.

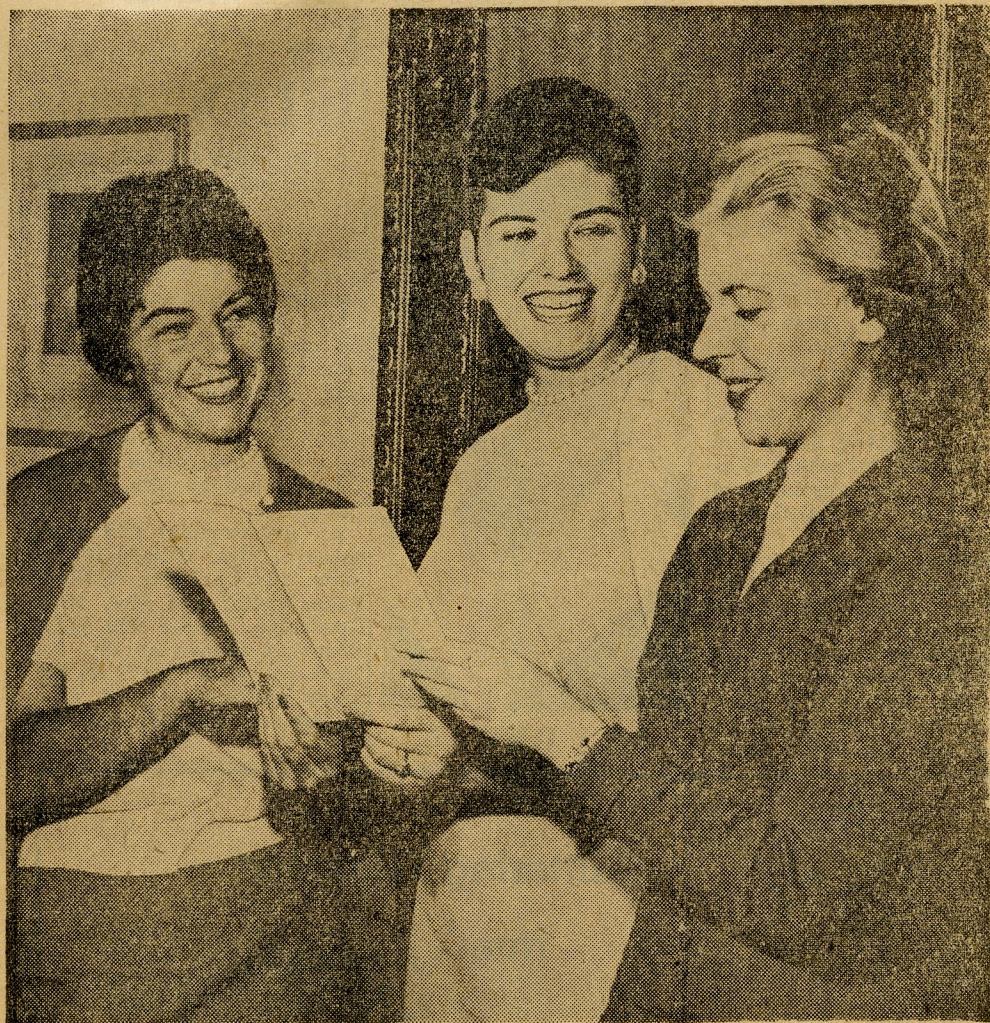
