## 9,000 Members

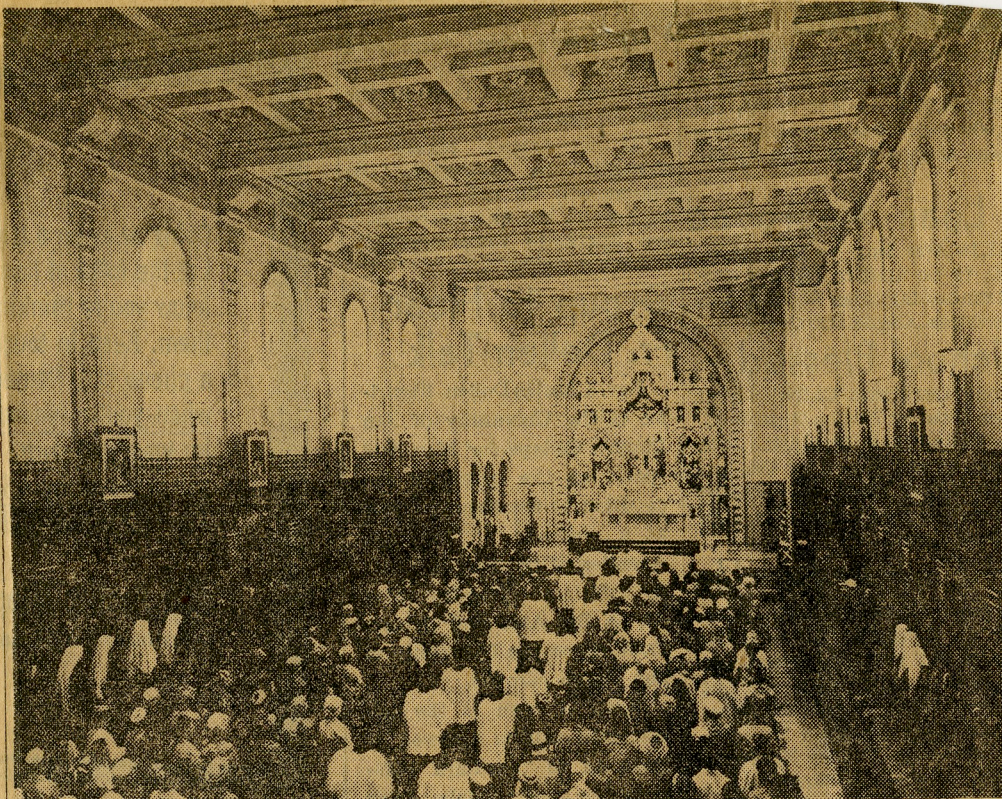

A Solemn High Mass coram pontifice was celebrated in the College for Women chapel last Thursday. The Most Reverend Bishop presided and preached the sermon.



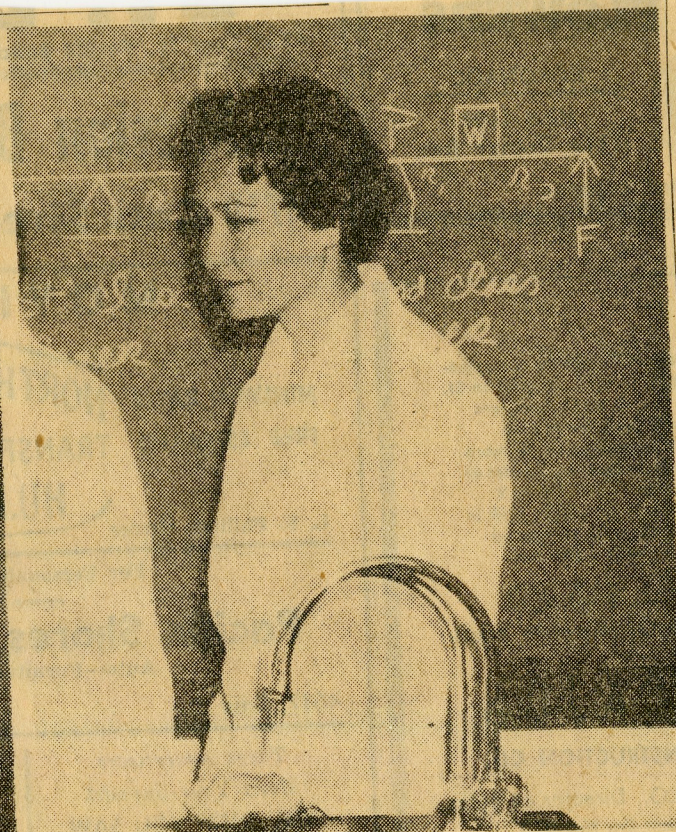

# College for Women Students Honored

Two students at San Diego College for Women were among the four outstanding San Diego County college undergraduates, majoring in the life sciences, selected to work on heart research projects under the direction of recognized medical scientists at major research centers in San Diego, Los Angeles, and San Francisco.

Dr. Douglas G. Davidson, chairman of the San Diego County Heart Association's research committee, announced.

They are Miss Karen Perlowski, 21, of 3227 Mohican Avenue, San Diego, a chemistry major, and Miss Myrna L. Stoflet, 19, of 1122 W. Occidental, Santa Ana, also a chemistry major at the college.

The four selected students will work for a period of 10 weeks under \$250 a month stipends provided by the San Diego County Heart Association. They were selected from a statewide group of nearly 100 outstanding science undergraduates, who were applicants for research awards by chapters of the California Heart Association, Davidson said.

Miss Perlowski will do research in physiology under direction of Dr. Chester Hy-

man at University of Southern California. Miss Stoflet will spend the period working in the University of California medical center Cardiovascular Research Institute, San Francisco, under Drs. Norman Staub and Winifred Storey.

### 10-Week Period

The grants were established to encourage talented students to go into medical research as a career.

"Funds invested in heart research during the last 10 years by the Heart Association are beginning to bring major results," Davidson said. "We now need more investigators to follow up the clues that have been uncovered and pursue promising lines of investigation on the causes and prevention of hardening of the arteries, high blood pressure, and strokes."

In addition to the two San Diego College for Women students, John P. Miller, 23, of 7271 Blackton Drive, La Mesa, a San Diego State College premedical student, and George L. Hody, 19, of 904 Harborview Drive, San Diego, a premedical student at Pomona College, also were awarded summer grants.

This is the second summer in which two students from the College for Women have participated in the program.

Last year, Miss Stoflet held a similar research associate-ship while engaged in assisting Dr. W. F. Mommaert of the Department of Medicine at the University of Southern

## Giant Storm On Sun Snarls World's Radios

A huge, boiling storm on the sun's face is juggling radio transmissions all over the world.

A gigantic sunspot 150,000 miles in diameter intensified radio transmissions on some wave bands, all but blotted out reception on others and caused reception to skip about erratically.

San Diegans were able to see the huge spot on the sun's face yesterday as a haze filtered out some of the sun's brightness.

### Report Radio Reception

Some amateur radio operators said they received unusually well on high frequency wave bands and picked up interference on low frequency bands.

Rudolph Lippert, professor of astronomy at the University of San Diego's College for Women, explained that the sunspots discharge huge amounts of electrified particles which shake up the earth's ionosphere—the "mirror" which bounces radio waves back to earthbound stations.

Lippert said the sunspot, clearly visible without the aid of a telescope in San Diego, is one of the biggest he has seen. The sunspot is about 19 times the size of the earth, he said.

### Actually Is Huge Storm

"In the present cycle, there are more sunspots than at any time in the history of astronomy," Lippert said.

A sunspot actually is a gigantic storm on the sun, Lippert explained. Great masses of burning hydrogen and helium gases whirl violently, shooting out electrified particles and sucking in streamers of gases.

Nobody knows what causes the sunspots, Lippert said.

Weatherman A. W. Anderson said that, while it has never been proved, there is a theory that if some of the sun's heat is lowered, temperatures on earth would drop and chances of rain would increase.

## Big Sunspot Visible Here <sup>1961</sup>

A gigantic sunspot nearly 19 times the size of earth was clearly visible—when the fog permitted — today in San Diego.

Early risers said they could see the sunspot without the aid of a telescope shortly after sunrise because the haze filtered out enough of the sun's brightness to permit them to look directly at it.

It was a matter of watching the sunspot each time the fog lifted enough.

Rudolph Lippert, professor of astronomy at the University of San Diego's College for Women, estimated the diameter of the sunspot at 150,000 miles. He said the spot is about 1,200 miles deep.

The earth's diameter is 8,000 miles.

"It's one of the biggest I've

ever seen," Lippert said. "The sun is tremendously spotted, but this one's a giant."

He said he first saw the sunspot Monday when he was showing his students the passing of the planet Mercury across the sun.

"Mercury was the smallest of the spots," he said. "You could put 1,000 Mercuries into that spot."

Weatherman A. W. Anderson predicted more fog and low clouds in San Diego coastal areas tomorrow. He said the weather in the mountains and desert will be clear.

A weak storm front moving down the coast merely will add to the clouds in San Diego, he said. It won't bring rain, he added.

He predicted a high temperature of 68 for San Diego and a low of 54 tonight.

## BACKGROUND OF NAMES

# Spanish Photos Linked To S.D.

The origin of the city's name, as well as that of Alcalá Park, where the University of San Diego campus is located, has been documented with pictures from Spain.

Joaquin Duran, a Spanish student attending the local university, recently received photographs of the original University of Alcalá and of the city of Alcalá, Spain, and three reproductions of a composite picture of the Spanish city's historic structures.

Duran, a 22-year-old senior who is from Malaga, at the request of Willard A. Swan, a university professor, wrote to the mayor of Alcalá de Henares asking for a photograph of the original University of Alcalá. Swan, who teaches business administration but also spends much of his free time painting, wanted a photograph for an artistic reproduction.

Upon receiving the request, Mayor Felix Huerta sent four photographs showing the university and the

city of Alcalá and the three reproductions.

In one of the photographs, the mayor indicated a convent where the Franciscan father, San Diego de Alcalá—for whom the city of San Diego was named—served as legate in the 15th century.

He noted that Alcalá is in the central part of Spain, 20 miles northwest of Madrid. It is on the Henares River and has a population of 30,000.

The University of Alcalá once was a famed university in Spain, second only to the one at Salamanca. It was founded in 1499. In 1836, however, the university was moved to Madrid and the original imposing structure now serves only as a monument.

Mayor Huerta told Duran he was happy to find interest in the historical city and particularly in San Diego de Alcalá.

A San Diego University spokesman said a painting by Swan, reproduced from the photograph, would be placed on display.

duces to first graders include the abacus, plastislates and summary books.

Abacuses, calculating instruments used in ancient and medieval Europe and parts of the Orient, help children understand the structure of the numbers system, the transfer across columns and indeed the basic principles of mathematics, Schott says.

To get across his techniques, Schott contends, it is necessary to retrain every teacher. In the summer of 1959 2,500 teachers were retrained; last summer, 4,000,

and 6,000 are expected this summer.

Among institutions offering the retraining courses in the summer of 1961 will be the University of San Diego, Schott said.

But summer school is not enough, Schott contends. He and his wife and Dr. Furbush travel among schools where the Schott program is in operation conducting still more training for teachers.

In addition, he instructs classes at the schools and regards the young faces he sees in them as "my thousands of god children."

Schott recently completed a week's visit to schools operated by the San Diego Roman Catholic Diocese, among them St. Rita's School, St. Jude's Academy, Holy Family School, Nazareth House, St. Martin's Academy, Holy Spirit School and Our Lady of Mount Carmel Convent, which started his program last September.

Modern mathematics leads inevitably into science studies, Schott says. For that reason, youngsters in the program find themselves doing work in weights, measures and scientific experiments, he said.

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# Planners Defer Coed Catholic School Ruling

The city Planning Commission yesterday deferred for two weeks a decision on a permit application to build the first coeducational Roman Catholic high school in the four-county San Diego Diocese.

Rev. Joseph Stadler, pastor of St. Charles Catholic Church, 935 18th St., Palm City, said the high school to be built in his parish represents a new concept in parochial school education. This area is a part of the city of San Diego.

All present Catholic high schools in the San Diego Diocese, comprising San Diego, Imperial, Riverside and San Bernardino counties, are either all-boy or all-girl schools.

Other dioceses in California, however, have coeducational high schools.

Father Stadler said the \$550,000 high school will be built on Coronado Street between 17th and 18th streets in Palm City, an area now annexed to San Diego.

"A better term than coeducational for the school would be coinstructional," he explained. "Boys will be taught by priests and girls by nuns. But assemblies and other social programs will be coeducational."

He said the school, named Marian High School, will serve Coronado, Imperial Beach, Chula Vista, National City, San Ysidro and other areas of south San Diego. It will be the first Catholic high school in the south bay area.

## A Sermon In Drama

'Everyman' is offered by student players at USD this afternoon

THE FINEST PLAY the Middle Ages has left to posterity, "Everyman," will be enacted by the Alcala Park Players today at 3 p.m. at the University of San Diego College for Women.

"Everyman," written in the 15th Century by an unknown author, is a memorable example of a morality play—a piece that is more sermon than drama.

In the play, God sends Death as a messenger to summon Everyman. Everyman, panicked by the unexpected calling, looks for some companions to help and comfort him.

Searching, he finds Fellowship, Cousin, Knidred and Goods, all of whom are friendly until Everyman asks that they accompany him beyond life.

Appealing desperately and with a weight of sin, Everyman at last finds solace and companionship in Good Deeds, Knowledge and Confession, although Beauty, Discretion, Strength and Five Wits have also abandoned him.

Shriven and renewed, Everyman enters immortality hand-in-hand with Good Deeds. A homiletic epilogue follows their exit to reiterate the warnings of the play.

Producing a play from the Medieval period offers a challenge to director and actors. There are no specifications for actions, sets, costumes, make-up or lighting. The bombastic characteristics of Greek roles is missing as well as the scenery-painting lines of Shakespeare.

## IOWA CHAPLAIN VISITS BROTHER

# Criminals Lie To Selves, Too, Prison Priest Says

By GREG PEARSON

The most common characteristic of all criminals is their tendency to lie.

"They have lied ever since committing their first crime," Rev. Bernard E. Brugman, Catholic chaplain of Iowa State Penitentiary, said in an interview here yesterday. "They lie to God. They lie to others. And they lie to themselves.

"And that's what really makes them difficult — when they lie to themselves. That's dangerous."

### VISITS BROTHER

Father Brugman was here visiting his brother, Rev. Leonard Brugman, chaplain of the University of San Diego's College for Men.

He has been a chaplain at the prison for 10 years. Before that he was dean of men at St. Ambrose College in Davenport, Iowa.

"Basically," he said, "the work of a priest with college men and with prison inmates is no different. It is the approach that is different. The college student is usually seeking something. But you have to take something to the inmate, who in many cases does not seek it.

"It is more difficult dealing with inmates. You have to gain their respect. You have to speak their language. They must respect you first as man before they will accept you as a chaplain. And that is a big, big job."

Is there such a thing as an incorrigible man?"

"Who can say a man is incorrigible?" Father Brugman asks. "No one is born bad. They are made bad — by others and by themselves."

Iowa State Penitentiary, which is at Fort Madison, is a maximum security prison with an average of more than 1,300 inmates.

And studies show, Father Brugman said, that fewer than 1½ per cent of them were faithful church-goers before being first committed.

### MUTUAL INTEREST

"I maintain that if we could get our school systems to teach the 10 Commandments and interpret them according to Christian principles that our prison populations would drop 80 per cent within 50 years," he said.

"When should the education and training of a child start? When the baby is on the way. That's not too soon, believe me."

Father Brugman said the

interest prisoners have for each other is "tremendous."

"It is greater than you'll find anywhere else among men," he said. "They do all they can to contribute to the over-all welfare of each other."

He said about 45 per cent of the men at Iowa State Penitentiary regularly attend the services conducted either by him or by the Protestant chaplain.

"It has a great effect on their rehabilitation," he said. "Of course, I can't say how many of them will be canonized.

"After all, how many of us become saints?"

## WAVE Commander to Speak At USD's College for Women

Cdr. Frances E. Biadasz, USN, a WAVE who has served 24 years in the Navy, will address the students of the University of San Diego at 8 p.m. next Monday, March 6, in the theater of the College for Women.

Commander Biadasz will discuss *What We Have at Stake in the War in Vietnam*.

The commander has served 10 years in the Office of the Secretary of the Navy, and the Chief of Naval Operations in the Pentagon. For two of these years she served on the personal staff of Chief of Naval Operations, Adm. Arleigh A. Burke.

### Heads Navy Division

For the past year she has been head of the *Socio-Political Section of the Counterinsurgency Division of Special Operations* at the U.S. Naval Amphibious School in Coronado. She also lectures in the school on the different philosophies and techniques of free governments and totalitarian communist dictatorships.

She is the author of "Proposals for Defense Reorganization: Analysis and Evaluation" published by the Naval War College in 1958. Her name appears in the 1966 "Who's Who of American Women" and in the tenth edition of "American Men of Science: The Social and Behavioral Sciences."

She has been selected for membership in Pi Sigma Alpha, the honor society in Political Science.

Cdr. Biadasz recently was awarded the Navy Commendation Medal for dynamic leadership in improving the Socio-Political Section of the Navy's Counterinsurgency curriculum — an entirely new field of instruction for the Navy.

In a recent talk to the students of Cathedral Girls' High School Cdr. Biadasz explained the legal and moral right of the presence and posture of the United States in Vietnam. When Southern Vietnam, as a free and independent State called on the United States for assistance against a cruel enemy, our response was given promptly to this friendly nation, she said.

### Goes to New Post

"Through the book, I hope to offset a lot of the success the Communists have been having," the enthusiastic instructor told the Evening Tribune.

"They're getting their ideas across through pamphlets and other forms of propaganda."

## Geared for Teens

The 116-page book is geared primarily for children of high school age, she said.

It deals with the history, tenets and tactics of the Communists.

It explains the roots of the tree of communism—atheism, dialectical materialism, naturalism and the class struggle.

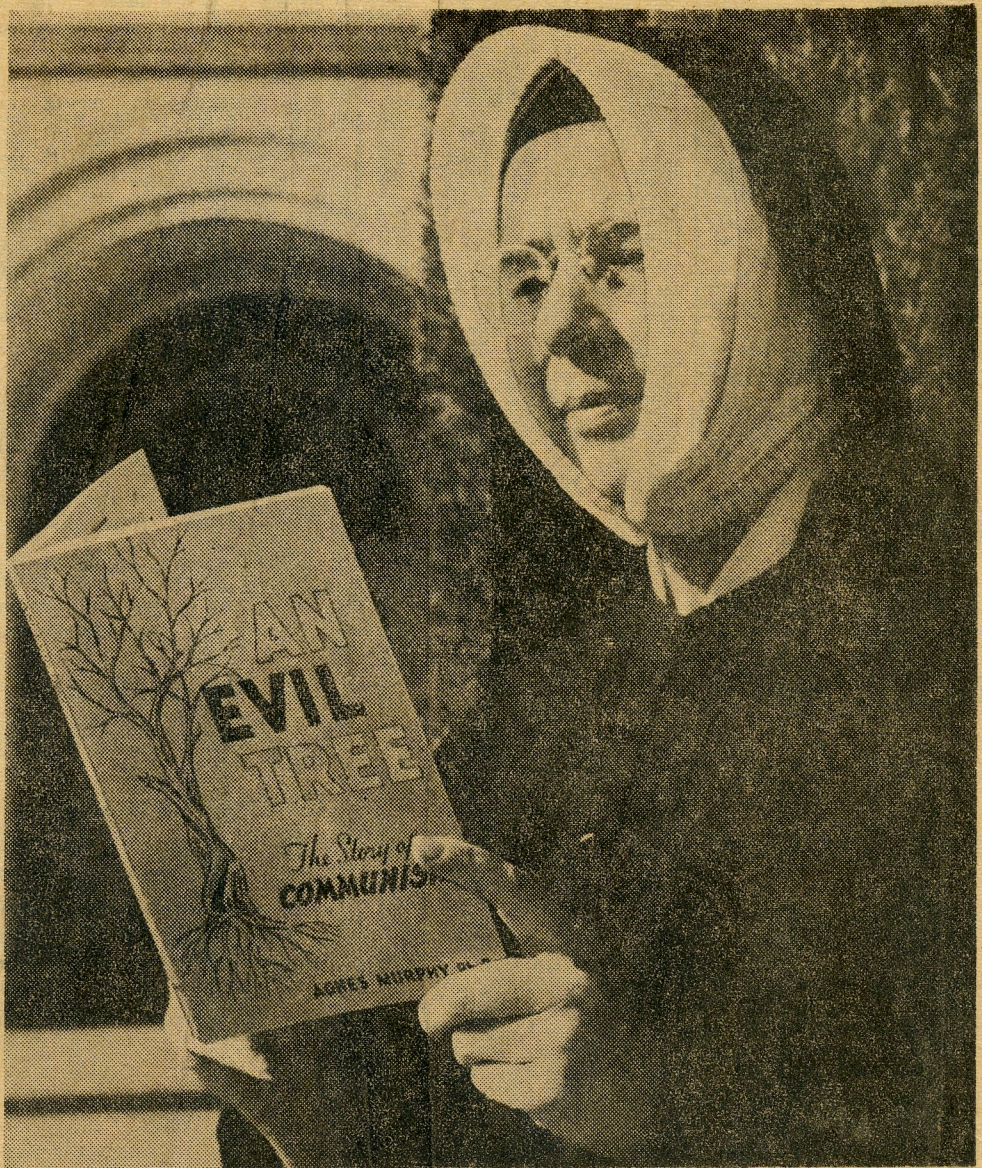
It analyzes: Revolution, as the planting of the tree of communism; dictatorship of the proletariat, the trunk of the tree; and the classless society, the flowering of the tree. They are criticized in a simple, easily understood style.

## Christian Outlook

Mother Murphy deals with the subject from the viewpoint of Christianity, but stresses that Christianity and the American way of life are so intermingled that they are inseparable as a weapon against communism.

Emphasizing religion and Americanism as ammunition against communism, the book says:

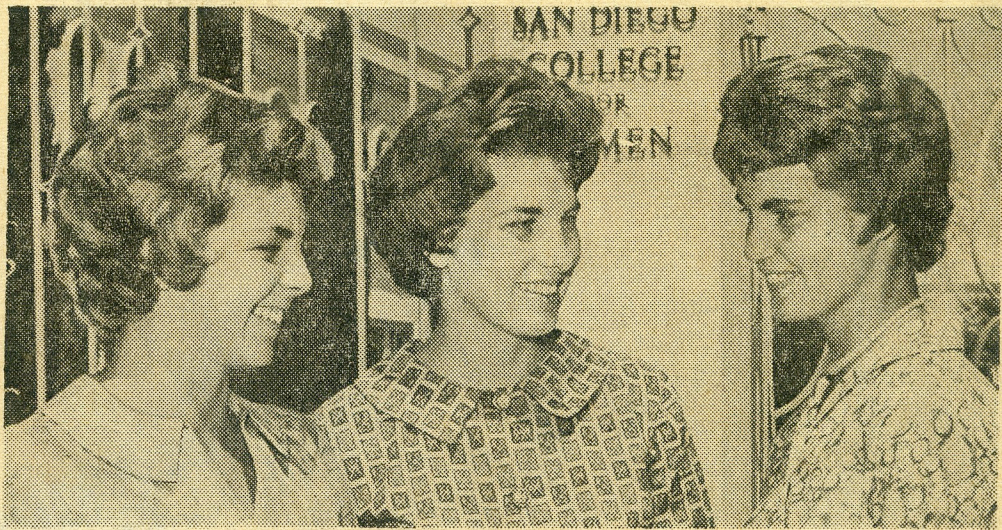

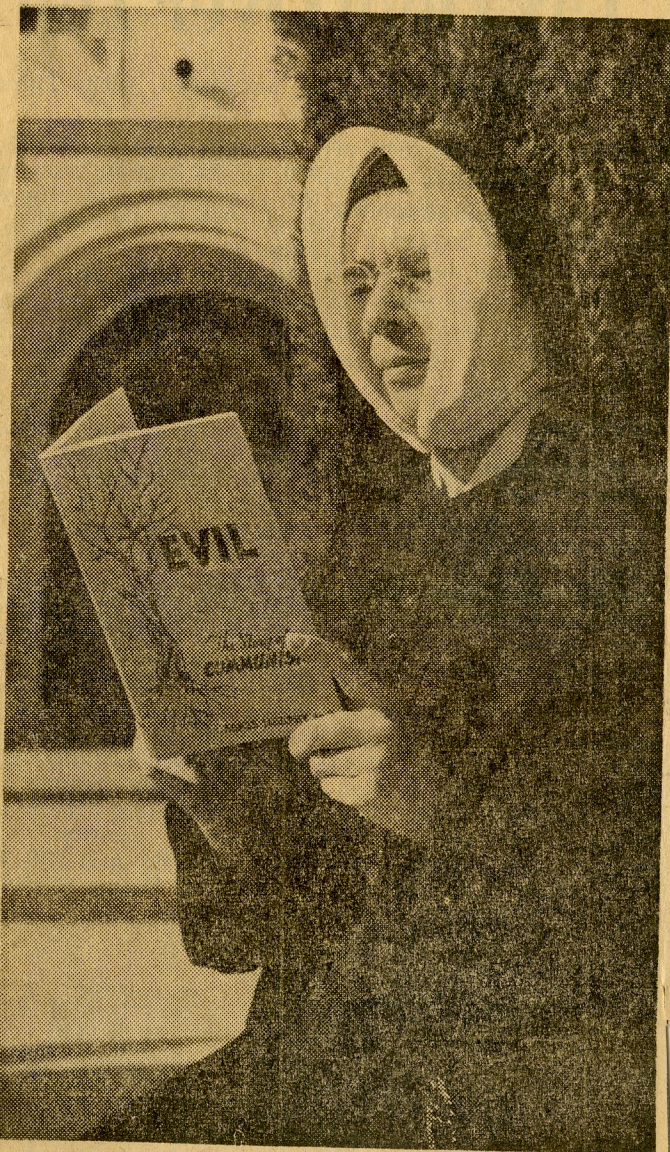

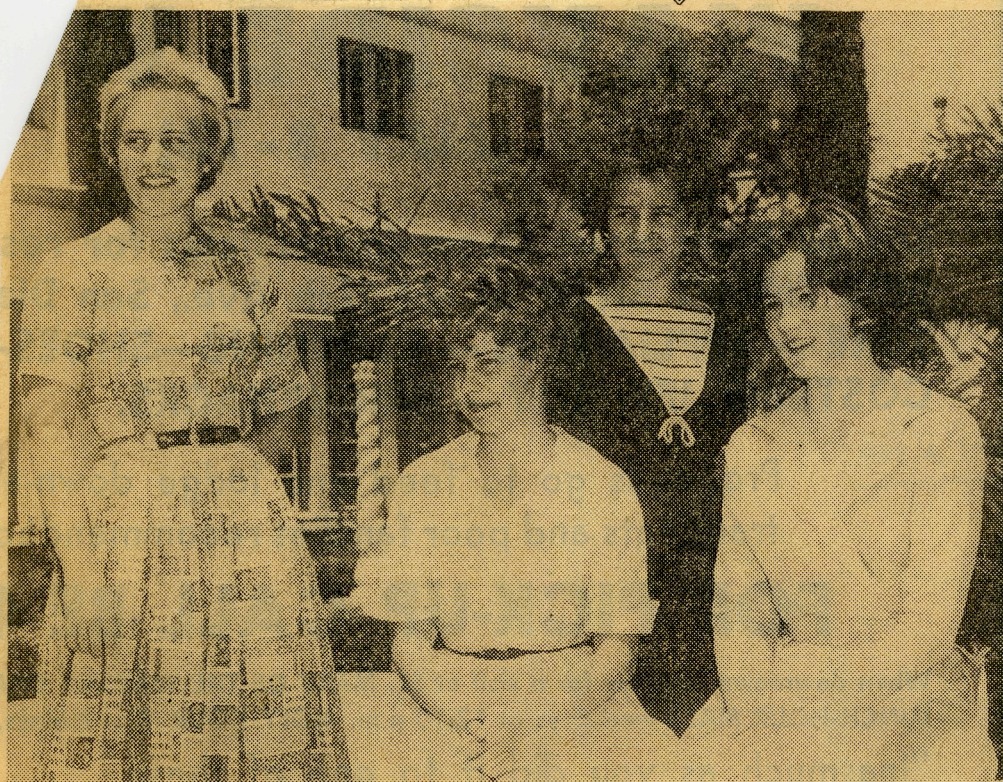

Miss Myrna Stoflet, 20, a senior at the University of San Diego's College for Women, last night was honored as the outstanding student in the California Heart Association summer student research program.

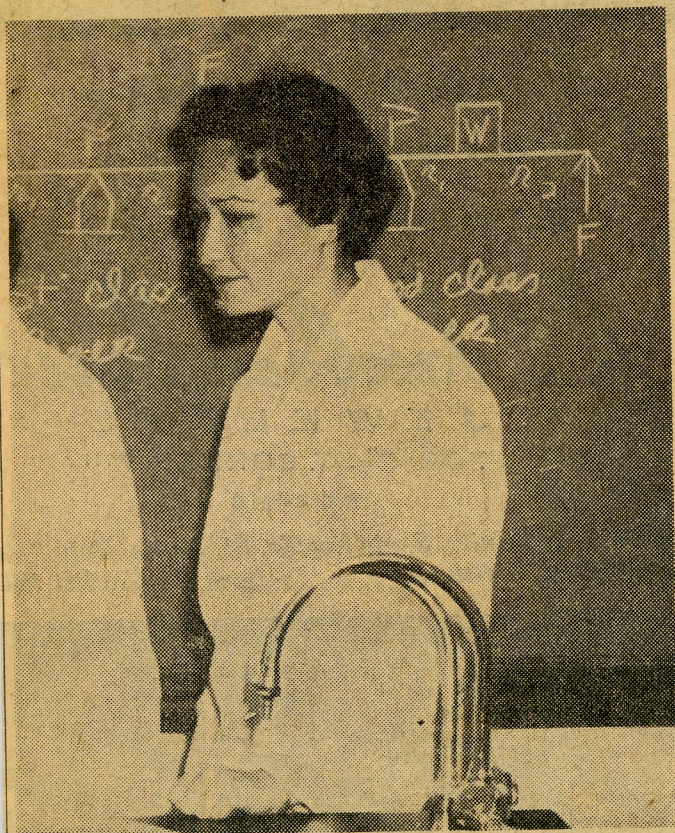
The work which won her award was performed by Miss Stoflet as a research associate at the Cardiovascular Research Institute of the University of California Medical Center in San Francisco.

## Myrna Stoflet Honored by Heart Group

A 20-year-old senior at San Diego College for Women was honored by the California Heart Association Saturday, May 20, when she received the second annual Kathryn and Clifford B. Cherry Award as the outstanding student in CHA's summer student research program.

Myrna Stoflet, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold N. Stoflet of 3315 Chicago St., San Diego, accepted the award before more than 300 delegates of CHA's 30 chapters at the annual dinner. The affair climaxed the two-day annual meeting at the Disneyland Hotel in Anaheim.

The student research associate's program was started by the CHA in the summer of 1957 when eight outstanding college men and women were placed in research laboratories in medical centers throughout the state.

### 94 Selected

Since that date 94 students have been selected by the CHA research committee to participate in the summer program—supported by Heart Association chapters at a cost of \$53,542.

The award was established in 1959 by Dr. Kathryn and Dr. Clifford B. Cherry of Los Angeles for the encouragement of students who have shown an interest in cardiovascular research, and who have demonstrated outstanding ability in their summer work. Miss Stoflet is among 29 students who have been selected to participate in the 1961 summer program. Her research is supported by the San Diego Heart Association.

Miss Stoflet attended Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana and was graduated from St. Ann High School in Kaneohe, Hawaii, in 1958. She majors in chemistry at the College for Women and carries minor studies in mathematics, biology, and philosophy and has been on the Dean's Honor List since she entered college.

### Research Aided

The Heart Association's search for gifted minds gives outstanding college undergraduates an opportunity to carry out biological research under the guidance of leading experienced investigators in 16 selected medical centers. The 10-week summer program carries a stipend of \$750 for each student.

Working under some of the leading physiologists, biochemists, anatomists and clinical investigators of the state, the students have an opportunity to design and conduct their own experiments. The investigators have predicted the reasonable likelihood that more than half of the students participating in the 1961 summer program will go into research as a full-time career.

Miss Stoflet has indicated her desire to engage in some kind of scientific work — either teaching or research. She intends to continue her education toward a doctorate. She served as a student research associate at the Cardiovascular Research Institute of the U.C. Medical Center, San Francisco, under the supervision of Dr. Julius H. Comroe, director of the Institute.

# Schools of S. D. Diocese To Graduate 3,376 Students

## 162 Scheduled For Degrees At Colleges

Nearly 80,000 Catholic students received religious instructions in the Diocese of San Diego this year.

The number includes 31,000 students educated in 100 Catholic schools, colleges and universities in the diocese.

More than 3,300 students will receive their diplomas at graduating exercises from these schools in the next several weeks.

At commencement exercises at the University of San Diego's colleges, 162 graduates will receive degrees.

### College for Women Lists Number

The College for Women will award the Bachelor of Arts degree to 69 graduates, Bachelor of Science in Nursing to six students, the Master of Arts degree to two and the Master of Science in Education to four.

In addition, 19 students of the women's college will receive the general elementary credential in teaching and one in the junior high credential.

A member of the graduating class, Myrna Stoflet, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold N. Stoflet of San Diego, received the second annual Kathryn and Clifford B. Cherry Award for outstanding achievement in the California Heart Association's student research program.

### 3 Awarded Sorority Membership

Three graduates, Mary King, Mary D. Louie and Karen J. Perlowski were awarded membership in the Kappa Gamma Pi national sorority.

The Most Reverend Bishop of San Diego, president of the university, will preside at the graduation ceremonies at 3 p.m. this Sunday, May 28. His Excellency also will deliver the commencement address and confer the degrees. Rt. Rev. Msgr. William A. Bergin, rector of Immaculate Heart Seminary, will present the candidates for their diplomas.

The baccalaureate Mass will be offered in the college chapel at 10 a.m. by Rt. Rev. Msgr. James P. O'Shea, editor of The Southern Cross.

Commencements for the College for Men and the School of Law are scheduled for Sunday, June 4. The Bishop will confer the Bachelor of Arts degree on 71 students of the college and the Bachelor of Law degree on 11 graduates of the Law School.

### Irwin to Give Address

John J. Irwin, attorney and member of the university's Board of Regents, will deliver the commencement address. Irwin is a former deputy mayor of Los Angeles and former administrative assistant to Vice President Nixon.

The Bishop will also offer the baccalaureate Mass for the graduates of the men's college and the law school at 11 a.m. Sunday, June 4, in the Immaculata.

Grammar schools in the diocese will graduate 2,363 students, high schools 797, and colleges 216, bringing the total number of graduates to 3,376.

### Number of Institutions Told

Catholic educational institutions in the diocese include 76 elementary schools, 17 secondary schools, five seminaries, two colleges and one post-graduate school.

Catholic students in public schools enrolled in religious classes through the year reached a new record of 48,704.

Priests, Sisters, Brothers and lay teachers of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine conducted the classes.

Catholic educational institutions in the diocese are staffed by 732 teachers, including 130 priests, 454 Sisters, 12 Brothers, and 136 lay teachers.



# USD Law School Wins Accreditation

Accreditation of the University of San Diego School of Law by the American Bar Association was announced today by the Most Rev. Charles F. Buddy, bishop of the San Diego Catholic Diocese.

"The news of the American Bar Association approval is very gratifying," Bishop Buddy said.

"It is undoubtedly due to the common effort made by the students and distinguished faculty under the leadership of the dean, Father Martin McManus."

Father McManus, dean of the law school since June, 1960, said the approval means:

**First**—Graduates of the university's law school now may

take the bar examination in any state.

**Second**—Graduate work in law now may be taken in any school on the basis of a law degree from the university.

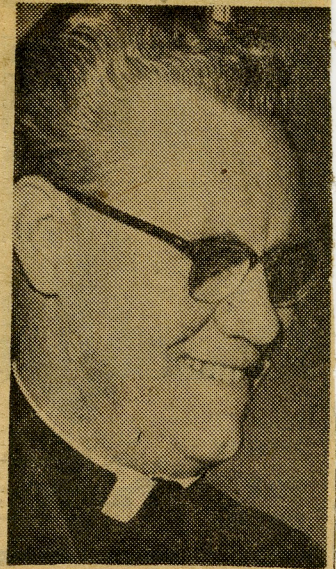
**Third**—Credits now may be transferred from the university law school to any other school.

Is being a woman a handicap to practicing law?

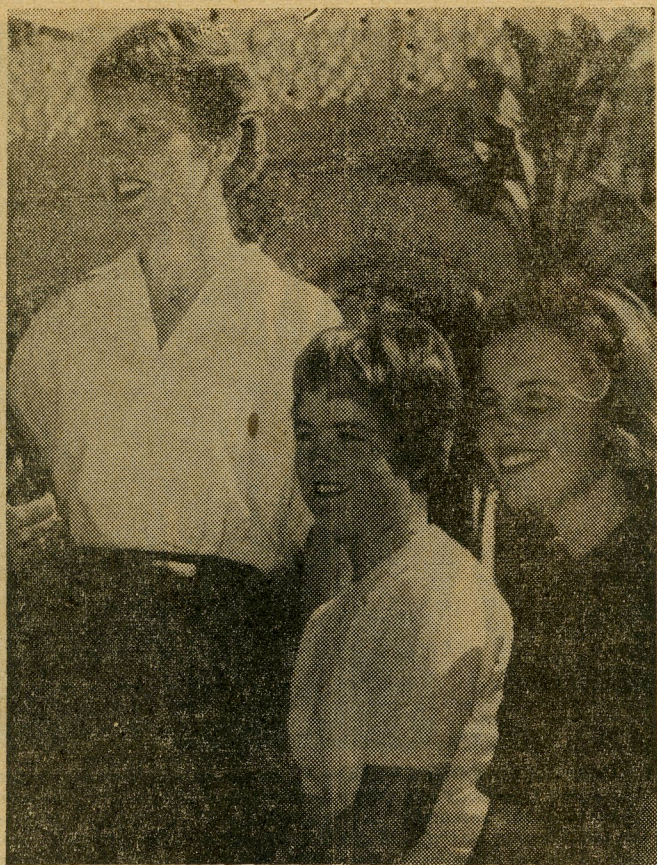

Rev. Andrei Urusov, SJ, will appear in San Diego from Sunday, November 12, until Sunday, November 19, for a series of lectures sponsored by the Father Serra Club. Father Urusov's lectures are the first ever sponsored by the local Father Serra Club.

Father Urusov's subjects range from communism to the Catholic Russian Apostolate.

Father Urusov was born in Moscow at the beginning of the Russian revolution. A prince of an ancient Russian family which dates from the centuries of the Tartar conquest in Russia, he knew only the Soviet regime, with its terror, expropriations, famine, and persecution of the Church.

With the loss of his parents under the communist onslaught, he was left alone with his small brother in the hands of a peasant nurse, who with great sacrifices, saved their lives.

Eventually he joined the Catholic Church at the age of 21 and went to study at the Russian seminary in Rome. At the beginning of World War II he joined the Jesuit Order and was ordained a priest in the Russian Byzantine Rite.

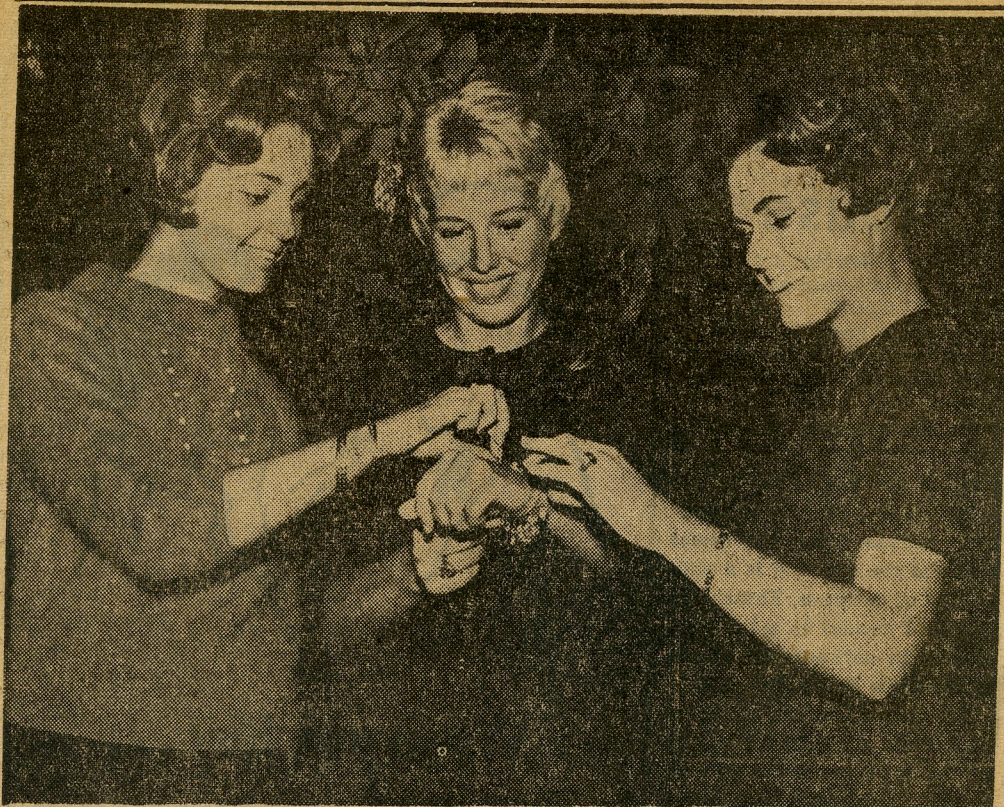

# Bishop To Mark 25th Anniversary

Twenty-five years as Catholic bishop of San Diego will be marked tomorrow by the Most Rev. Charles Francis Buddy.

The occasion will be observed at an 11 a.m. ordaining service in the Immaculate Chapel of the University of San Diego. At the service 21 sub-deacons will be ordained. They will become priests in April.

Later priests of the diocese will give a luncheon at the Immaculate Heart Seminary of the university in the bishop's honor.

The bishop was born in 1887 in St. Joseph, Mo. In 1901 he entered St. Benedict's College in Atchison, Kan., before attending St. Mary's College in St. Mary's, Kansas. From 1909 to 1915 the bishop attended the North American College in Rome and was ordained Sept. 19, 1914, in

Rome's Cathedral of St. John Lateran. In 1917 he was appointed curate at St. Joseph's Cathedral in St. Joseph, Mo., where he once had served as altar boy.

He became rector of this cathedral in 1926 and had served 10 years when Pope Pius XI divided the Los Angeles diocese.

Pope Pius appointed Bishop Buddy as the first bishop of the San Diego diocese in 1936 and he assumed the post the following February.

The 35,000 square mile diocese includes San Diego, Imperial and San Bernardino Counties. Under Bishop Buddy, it has increased from 66 to 423 priests, 59 to 157 parishes and 11 to 98 schools. The expansion program was climaxed in 1954 by construction of the University of San Diego.

## Bishop Opposes 'UCSD' Name As Confusing

The bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Diego is opposed to the name "University of California at San Diego" for the new campus on Torrey Pines Mesa, a Diocesan spokesman said yesterday.

The Most Rev. Charles F. Buddy, bishop of the diocese, has expressed his opposition to the proposed UCSD name in letters to both Dr. Clark Kerr, president of the University of California, and Donald H. McLaughlin, chairman of the university Board of Regents, the spokesman said.

There already is confusion in mail delivery between San Diego State and the University of San Diego, which is maintained by the diocese, without adding another complication, the statement said.

Bishop Buddy was out of town yesterday attending a Roman Catholic retreat in Cathedral City, near Palm Springs.

The Rt. Rev. Monsignor James Booth, chancellor of the diocese, acknowledged Bishop Buddy had written the two letters declaring his opposition to the proposed UCSD name and had received word that they would be presented to the Board of Regents.

Booth said he did not know if Bishop Buddy intended to talk with regents when they meet in San Diego later this month.
