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Budget Summary: Expenditures:

Attached to these Newsnotes is the official summary of the budgeted expenditures at the University of San Diego for the current fiscal year (September 1, 1995-August 31, 1996). For your information and interest, most of the budgeted operating revenues which balance the \$111.9 million in expenditures come from three sources:

Tuition and Fees:	79.3% (\$88,806,557)
Room and Board:	9 % (\$10,083,656)
Other Auxiliary Enterprises: (such as Bookstore, Special Events, summer camps, dining services to outside groups, etc.)	8 % (\$ 8,990,993)

The other 3.7% of operating revenues come from such sources as federal work-study funds; private gifts, grants, contracts; Graduate Career programs; outside-funded centers; interest and dividend revenue; etc.

Dr. Joan Anderson, School of Business, became the co-editor of the *Journal of Borderland Studies*, along with Paul Ganster of San Diego State and Duncan Earle of Texas A&M, as of December 1. Her article with Dr. Denise Dimon, "The Impact of Opening Markets on Mexican Male/Female Wage and Occupational Differentials" was published in the *Social Science Journal*, October, 1995. A second article with Denise Dimon and Jeffery Brannon (U. Of Texas, El Paso), "Women's Labor Force Participation and Migration to the Texas Border Region," was published in the Fall, 1995 issue of *Journal of Borderland Studies*. In addition, she published a book chapter, "Ecuador's Economy in the Post War Period," in Laura Randall, ed., *Latin American Economies in the Post War Period*.

Dr. Anderson attended the Latin American Studies Association meetings in Washington in September, where she presented the paper "Productivity and Wage Differentials between U.S. and Mexican Workers by Gender," written with Denise Dimon. She was appointed to a consultation for the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A. to review their report on sustainable human development.

Dr. Mitchell Malachowski, Professor of Chemistry, gave a presentation entitled "Copper(II) Complexes as Catalysts for the Oxidation of Catechols: Models for Tyrosinase," at the 1995 International Chemical Congress of Pacific Basin Societies, Honolulu, HI, December 17-22, 1995.

Msgr. I. Brent Eagen, Vice President for Mission and Ministry, contributed an article on the history of the Mission San Diego de Alcala to a book entitled *Gold Rush Trails to San Diego and Los Angeles in 1849*, published by the San Diego Corral of The Westerners. Msgr. Eagan served 22 years as pastor of the Mission Basilica San Diego from 1971-1992. The book will be available this month from the San Diego Corral of The Westerners at P.O. Box 87307, San Diego, CA 92138.

Professor Roy Brooks' book, *Civil Rights Litigation: Cases and Perspectives*, was published recently by Carolina Academic Press. The book, co-authored with Gilbert Carrasco and Gordon Martin, was dedicated by Professor Brooks to Sister Sally Furay, Vice President and Provost.

The second edition of Dr. Mary Jo Clark's book, *Nursing in the Community*, was recently released by Appleton and Lange. The previous edition of this book has been billed as one of the top-selling community health nursing textbooks in the nation.

Dr. Clark's article, "Using a Public Health Nursing Model to Assess and Plan for Health Needs at a Summer Day Camp," was published in the December issue of the *Journal of Community Health Nursing*.

Dr. Carol Bruton, School of Business, presented the paper "Simulation in the Accounting Classroom: The Difficulty of Achieving Analogical Transfer" at the Business and Managerial Decision-Making Conference of the Society for Computer Simulation held in La Jolla this month. The paper, co-authored with Dr. Gary Schneider, School of Business; and Dr. Michael Bradley, Augusta College, has also been accepted for publication in the *Proceedings* of the meeting.

Judith Lewis Logue, Director of Financial Aid and Chairperson of The San Diego Student Opportunity and Access Program (San Diego Cal-SOAP), was recently a panelist on a Cox Cable program called *Living with Diversity*.

Sister Dale Brown, Associate Director of Financial Aid, was the recipient of the leadership award from the California Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators in December for service to independent colleges and universities and the financial aid profession. She was a presenter at two sessions at the annual conference, "Determining Financial Eligibility," and "Surviving Cal Grant Program Reviews."

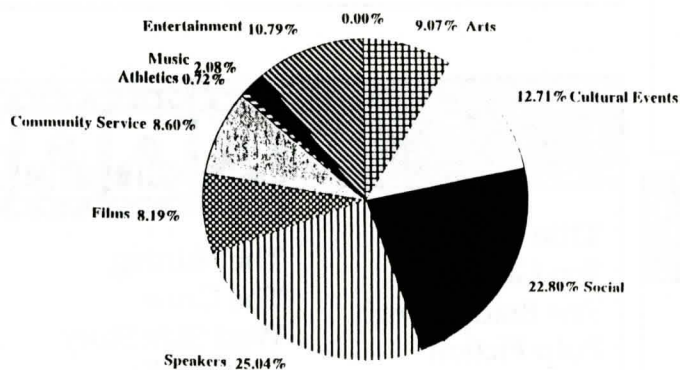

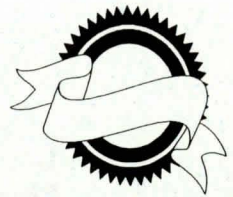

Synopsis: Associateships are offered to established scientists and engineers who have held the doctorate for five or more years to conduct research in chemistry, mathematics or physics at U.S. Government laboratories. Annual stipends range from \$35,000 to \$83,000. Tenure may be as brief as three months or may be extended for up to three years, depending upon the laboratory.

Some laboratories do not accept senior applicants or foreign researchers. If tenure exceeds six months, relocation for dependents and household moving expenses are provided in the U.S. and Canada. U.S. citizens who begin tenure during a leave of absence from a permanent position in the U.S. or abroad, to which they will return, are offered reimbursement for return relocation, if tenure exceeds six months.

Attendance at one or two professional meetings yearly is encouraged; limited funds are available for such travel. A health insurance program is available on a cost-sharing basis for associates and dependents.

Deadlines: April 1, 1996; July 1, 1996; October 1, 1996

Title: ASEE U.S. Navy Sabbatical Leave Program

Synopsis: Awards enable engineering and science faculty members on sabbatical to pursue research at U.S. Navy laboratories while on sabbatical leave.

Restrictions: Applications are accepted on the above deadline dates of each year. Faculty should submit applications at least six months prior to the proposed starting date.

All applicants must be U.S. citizens, must hold a teaching or research position at a U.S. college or university, and must either hold or be eligible for a Department of Defense Security Clearance of Secret. Appointments are contingent upon the availability of sabbatical leave positions.

Participants receive a monthly stipend making up the difference between salary and sabbatical leave pay from their home institution. In addition, participants will receive reimbursement for travel to and from the laboratory site and a relocation allowance for those who must relocate their residence during their sabbatical leave tenure. Participants may not accept stipend or salary

payments from other federal sources, including research grants and contracts, during the tenure of the appointment.

Title: Luce Foundation -- Henry R. Luce Professorship Program

Synopsis: Professorships that bring diverse academic disciplines together in unusual combinations are funded at \$105,000 per year for the initial five years. Emphasis is on the humanities and social sciences. Private colleges and universities may apply; Luce professors must be recruited from outside their faculty. Up to three awards are made annually.

Restrictions: In most instances, funds cover the salary of the Luce Professor and related expenses associated with the program such as public symposia, faculty seminars, travel, research assistance and administrative support.

Preapplication consultation with the sponsor is strongly advised.

Title: SPSSI Grants-In-Aid Program

Synopsis: Support is provided for scientific research in social problem areas related to the sponsor's basic interests and goals, and particularly for research dealing with racism and sexism. Up to \$2,000 per grant is available, and up to \$1,000 is available for graduate student research if the university will match the amount requested.

Restrictions: Research proposals that are highly timely and event-oriented may be submitted at any time during the year, and will be reviewed within one month of receipt. All other applicants should submit proposals by the above deadline dates for consideration at the fall and spring committee meetings, respectively.

Eligible applicants are researchers and investigators, along with graduate students at the dissertation stage of the graduate career. There are no citizenship restrictions.

are normally not provided for travel to conventions, travel or living expenses while conducting research, stipends of principal investigators or costs associated with manuscript preparation.

Title: ICF -- Internships and Associateships in Field Ecology

Synopsis: Internships and associateships offer hands-on training in the conservation and preservation of cranes and their wetland habitats. Eligible applicants are senior undergraduates through recent graduates; graduate students are especially encouraged to apply. Associates receive \$550 per month plus housing; interns receive \$275 per month plus housing.

Objectives: The sponsor offers internships for training in the conservation and preservation of the world's cranes and their wetland habitats. Specifically, internships are supported for directing the restoration of prairie, savanna and wetland communities on the sponsor's property.

Program staff will learn a variety of ecological, botanical, hydrological and horticultural skills. Depending on the season, activities include the following: prescribed burns; vegetation identification and sampling; seed collecting, planting and site preparation for community restorations; wetland monitoring; control of problem vegetation; field studies of wild Sandhill Crane populations; public tours; and interaction with foreign scientists.

Program staff conduct an independent research project related to prairie, savanna or wetland restoration and receive training in project design, data analysis and development of professional presentation skills. In addition, associates manage the seed collecting, planting and site preparation plan including organization and management of interns and volunteers.

Awards include airfare, up to one-half of base salary, baggage allowance, relocation and living allowance, language training and one return visit to the U.S. for stays over nine months.

Restrictions: Eligible applicants are U.S. senior investigators in the sciences or engineering. Senior investigators are defined as those individuals who have received their Ph.D.s five or more years before the application date (or who have had equivalent experience past the Masters degree over that time period). Proposals must be submitted through regular institutional channels.

The duration of visits is three to twenty-four months. The following costs are allowable for long-term visits to Japan: up to one-half base salary, plus applicable fringe benefits; up to \$400 per month living allowances in Japan; up to \$300 in excess baggage; up to \$3,000 for one return professional visit to the United States, if length of visit to Japan is nine months or more; relocation allowance of up to \$1,500; communications and shipment of equipment and supplies; Japanese language study (in the U.S. and/or Japan); up to \$1,000 to speak at professional meetings in the U.S. following the visit; plus expenses for dependents when visit is for six months or more.

Applicants must present written evidence of the host institution's willingness to cooperate in the project.

Synopsis: The sponsor supports planning visits in the Americas which facilitate U.S. participation in international science and engineering activities. Eligible applicants are U.S. institutions on behalf of U.S. scientists, engineers, or science educators. Award amounts vary.

Objectives: Support is provided for planning visits to permit investigators to consult with prospective foreign partners to finalize plans for a cooperative activity eligible for support by the sponsor. Proposals for such visits are considered only in cases where: there is evidence that substantial progress has already been made in planning the prospective joint activity; the sponsor judges that face-to-face discussion is essential to complete plans; and other likely sources of travel support are unavailable. Projects must be based on direct cooperation between U.S. and foreign counterpart scientists and engineers. Funding is provided for planning visits to regions of the Americas, including Canada and the Caribbean nations. Funds will not support visits to Cuba.

The objectives of activities in the Americas are: to make use of unique research environments and facilities that offer new opportunities to the U.S. scientific and engineering research communities; to provide young scientists with an international experience that will be of value to their future work; and to stimulate new forms of cooperation through the use of innovative communications technologies which are used increasingly throughout the hemisphere.

Additional objectives include strengthening the scientific and engineering research infrastructure in the region through the support of mutually beneficial cooperation, and furthering cooperation within the framework of the North America Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). The sponsor will normally provide support only to projects that initiate activities involving new foreign collaborators or new types of activities. Proposals for activities involving regions and countries where interactions between U.S. and foreign investigators have been limited are encouraged.

The following are areas that the sponsor has designated as being research priorities: advanced materials, advanced manufacturing, biotechnology, civil infrastructure; environment and global change; high performance computing and communications; and science, mathematics, engineering, and technology education.

Restrictions: Deadlines tend to remain the same each year. For proposals that involve activities with Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Mexico and Venezuela, there are two deadlines per year: May 1 and November 1. Although proposals for projects involving other countries may be submitted at any time, submission by one of these two dates is suggested. Proposals should be submitted at least four months in advance of the start date of the proposed activity. Planning visits may be of one or two week duration.

Title: Rockefeller Foundation - Humanities Fellowship - CUNY Dominican Studies Inst.

Synopsis: Fellowships at the Dominican Studies Institute of City College of New York are provided to scholars in the humanities to generate a socio-cultural and historical profile of Dominicans that will fill some gaps left by traditional scholarship in representations of ethnicity, culture, class, and gender relations in the shaping of Dominican society.

Objectives: The sponsor funds fellowship programs which provide support to scholars in the humanities whose work furthers the understanding of contemporary social and cultural issues and extends international or intercultural scholarship. Awards provide in-residence fellowships to scholars who are testing disciplinary boundaries or moving into newer fields of inquiry within the humanities.

The three-year program will draw attention to the Afro-Dominican majority of the population, as agents of history and culture from colonial times to the present. Year One will explore dissidence in Dominican society, highlighting the role of women. Year Two will examine the African presence in Dominican life from slavery times to the present, including the contributions of Haitians, U.S. blacks, and Anglophone West Indians who came to Dominican territory at different points. Year Three will focus on workers and ordinary people, including the experience of immigrants, the formation of a Dominican diaspora, and the emergence of Dominicans as a transnational community.

Restrictions: Eligible applicants are scholars of the humanities; there are no citizenship restrictions. Generally, resident fellowships are eight to ten months in duration and carry an average stipend of \$35,000, plus \$2,000 toward travel, benefits, and relocation costs. Awards may not be used for graduate study, advanced training, or for writing poetry or fiction. Resident scholars should be able to devote most of their time to their own research projects and publication, and should not be expected to teach.
