Scholarship Fund Event Planned

The Chancellor's Ball, a dinner dance with entertainment, will be held May 5 at Hotel del Coronado to raise money for a scholarship fund at the University of San Diego Law School.

the cost will be \$25. For each unit under 11 the cost will be \$30.

Student apartments, southward from the campus across Linda Vista Road, will be reduced in rent from \$450-\$475, depending on accommodations, to a flat \$430 a semester, including board.

The college, with 438 students last fall, looks for 450 in September. The School of Law, with 178 now enrolled, hopes for 200 students in the fall.

USD's College for Women, with 758 enrollees last fall, hopes to limit its student body to 800 next semester. The college (which increased by 180 students this year) reported a desire to slow its growth rate to maintain individualized instruction.

The college will abandon its past practice of admitting on probation students whose prior grades or test scores are below standards.

Higher tuition, announced last year, will take effect next fall. For day students the increase will be from \$350 to \$400 a semester. Other fees will bring a year's attendance cost to about \$900.

For residence students higher rental rates will bring a year's attendance cost to about \$2,000, although students can maintain present costs through increased occupancy per room.

An additional 40 rooms will be furnished for occupancy by women students.

The University of California will open its first student apartments, accommodating 106. Enrollment, now 156, is

predicted to grow to 220. All will be graduate students.

Elsewhere in the state where undergraduates are admitted, UC regents have adopted stiffened entry requirements.

USD Names Head of Men Cadden New President; Formerly Was Dean

The Very Rev. John P. Cadden has been named president of the College for Men of the University of San Diego.

Father Cadden, dean of the College for Men since last June, replaces the Rev. Russell Wilson, who is retiring because of ill health.

The Most Rev. Charles Francis Buddy, bishop of the San Diego Catholic Diocese and president of the university, announced the appointment yesterday.

Father Cadden has a bachelor's degree in arts from the University of Scranton, Pa., and a master's degree from Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C. He also has received a doctorate of sacred theology.

He taught American history at Catholic University after serving four years in the Navy.

Father Cadden established the first boys school in San Bernardino and opened University High School in Alcala Park here in 1957. The enrollment has grown from 65 students to more than 500.

Summer Europe Trip Planned by Students

Several students from the San Diego College for Women are planning a summer European tour. Among the girls, Anita Geyer, Hisako Kawasaki, Michiko Ohkura, Hisako Okada, Maureen Pecht, Martha Roan, Jill Ver Hoven, and Akemi Yamamura will accompany Madame Brink, French instructor at the college.

The party will leave on June 10 from Montreal, Canada, sailing on the SS Homeric. The first landing will be in London, England, where the British Museum, Trafalgar Square, Buckingham Palace, Stratford-on-Avon, the birthplace of William Shakespeare, and the House of Parliament will be the featured stops. The special events in London will include a luncheon meeting with the Conservative and Labor leaders of Parliament.

In Italy, the tour will begin at Venice, where the girls will visit the famed Piazza of St. Mark and the massive cathedral, second only in Byzantine architecture to St. Sophia in Constantinople. A moonlight gondola serenade on the canals will be featured.

Four days will be spent in Rome, full of sightseeing excursions to the ancient landmarks of both pagan and Christian culture. Places the company will see include the Pantheon, the Colosseum, the Roman Forum, Michaelangelo's Statue of Moses, the Sistine Chapel and St. Peter's. It is expected that an audience with the Holy Father will be arranged for July 7.

Madame Brink will be the official guide for the 13 days spent in France. At Lourdes the girls will witness a Bastille Day celebration on July 14. They will visit the famous Grotto of the miraculous spring where Our Lady appeared to St. Bernardette in 1858.

On the way to Bordeaux, they will stop at a resort in Biarritz at the foot of the Pyrenees Mountains. Another special attraction will be the evening light and sound spectacle at the Castle Chenonceaux, when the

histories of the many French castles are retold.

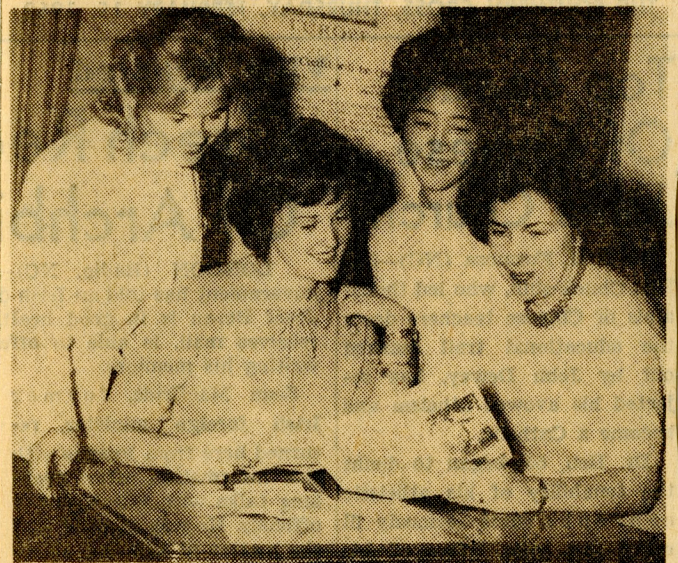
The tour will end with a four-day stay in Paris, visiting the old and modern section of the city. The Eiffel Tower, Napoleon's Tomb, the Louvre Museum, the Sorbonne University, and an afternoon excursion to the Palace of Versailles are notable attractions.

Throughout Europe the girls will visit many homes of the Society of the Sacred Heart, whose religious staff the College for Women.

Madame Brink is a well-qualified companion who has lived for some time in Paris. She is the daughter of a diplomat, was educated in Europe and studied at the Sorbonne. Before coming to San Diego, she taught at the Alliance Francias in Paris and the University of Montreal.

The girls will travel for more than six weeks, also stopping in Holland, Germany, Switzerland and Austria. College credit may be obtained for those taking the tour.

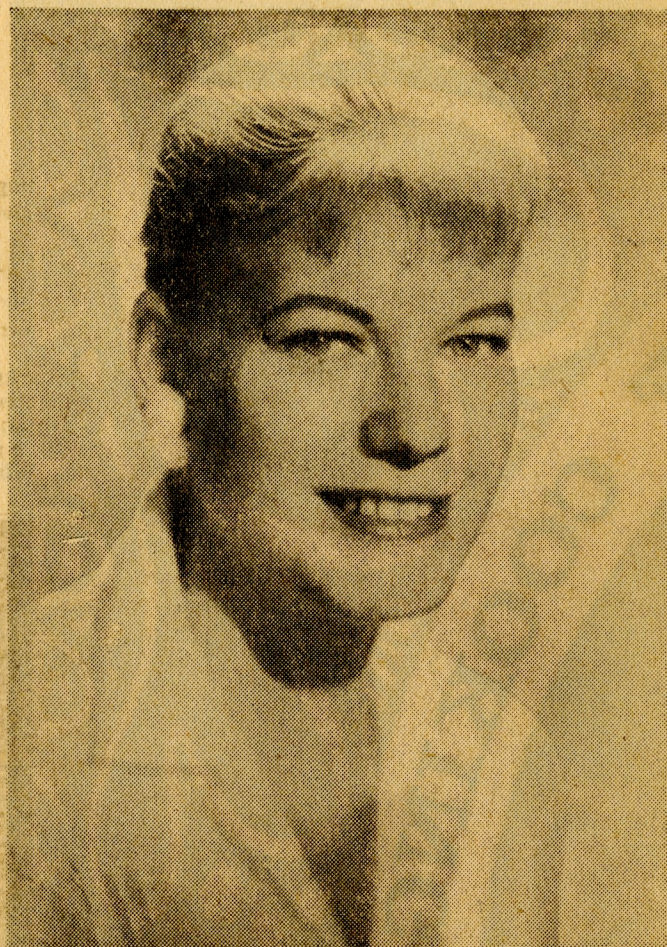

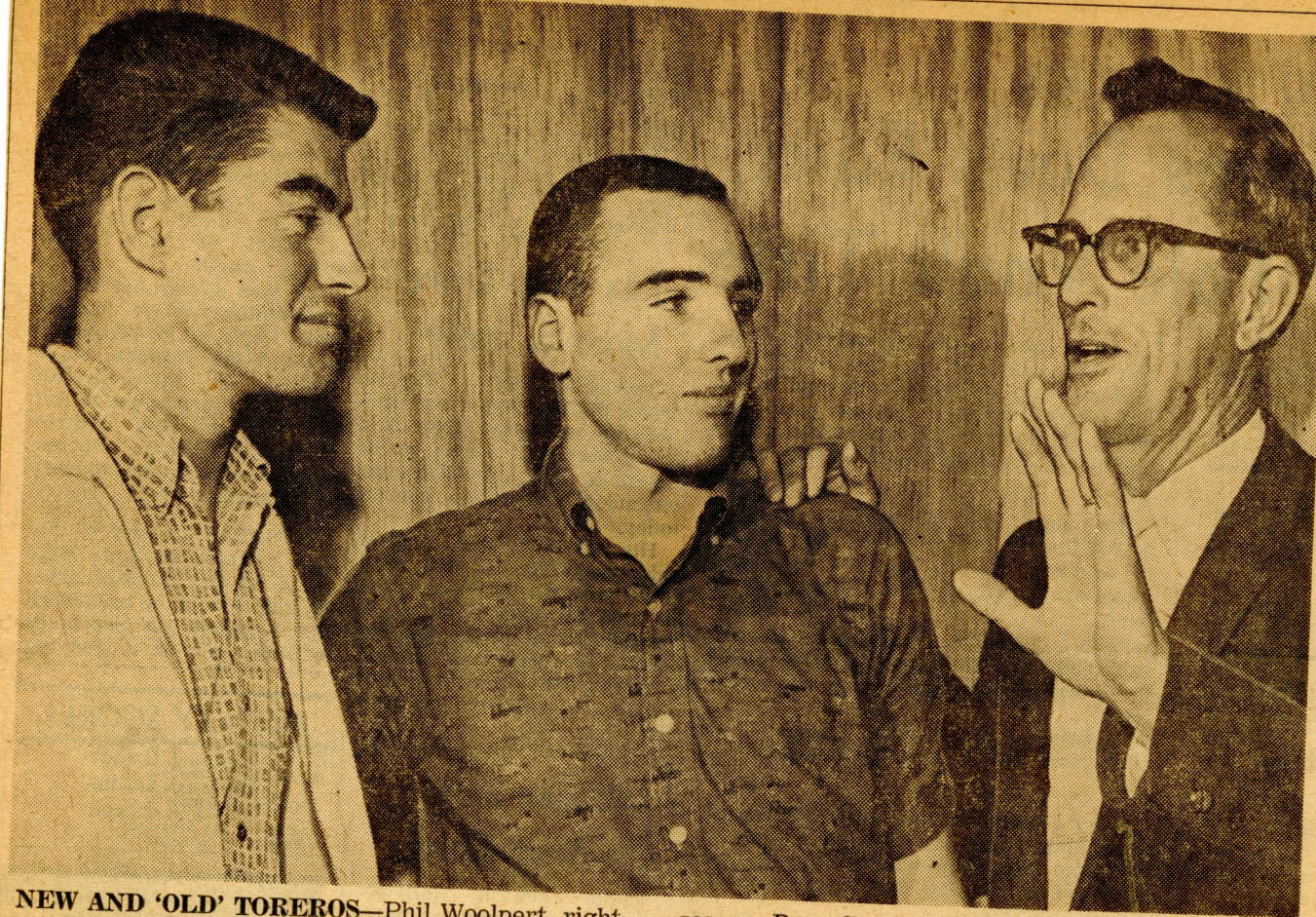

'GREAT DEAL OF POTENTIAL HERE' *March 1962* Woolpert Optimistic as He Assumes Dual USD Role

Phil Woolpert stepped into a challenge yesterday as he shouldered the job of basketball coach and athletic director at University of San Diego. The Toreros had a 6-20 record last season. But the outlook is not black.

Woolpert summed it up best. "There's a great deal of potential here. This is a situation which lends itself to improvement and I'm confident we'll be able to step up the program. But it'll take time."

This, Woolpert said, is why he'll start a three-year contract April 1. "One year just isn't enough. It takes longer than that to set up a good freshman program and get your operation going."

Woolpert, whose University of San Francisco teams produced all-Americans Bill Russell, K. C. Jones and Mike Farmer and won two national championships and 60 straight games, is a natural source of confidence.

The Toreros are moving up. That feeling was in the air at University of San Diego as Woolpert spoke. Phil, a soft-spoken, likeable fellow whose mouth spreads in an easy smile as he springs a quip — often on himself — exudes confidence.

But how far will the Toreros move up? "I think we should be competing on the level of Pepperdine and the other West Coast Athletic Conference teams. It'll take a while but I think USD could fit into this conference."

The WCAC now has only seven members, making ex-

pansion to eight a feasible move.

According to Woolpert, the next edition of the Toreros will play a tight defensive game — but not ball control.

"In the past usually I've worked my teams about 60 per cent of the time on defense," he said. "That's the hardest part of the game to learn. Offense comes naturally, a kid practices shooting all the time but it takes about two years for the average high school player to learn to play defense. Defense is blood and guts."

Although he's been out of college basketball since 1959 and hasn't been close to the San Diego high school picture at all, Woolpert has some definite ideas on recruiting.

"I'd like to play boys from this area only. This is the way we worked at USF and it works out best. Of course, I'm not going to pass up a good kid from out-state but

I think the locally grown ballplayer is the better bet.

"We may recruit junior college players until the program gets started but I favor a strong freshman program which means you can work with the player four years."

Woolpert indicated he has yet to select a freshman coach but has a prospect in mind. He dropped enough hints to support talk the choice might be John Cunningham, a St. Augustine High and USF product who led San Diego City League scorers in 1955.

Woolpert and the Very Rev. John Paul Cadden, president of the College for Men at USD, said they hadn't worked out the details of what USD will offer in the way of athletic scholarships.

Fr. Cadden indicated that eventually tuition, room and board would be offered whereas only tuition is given athletes now.

Sandra Loubat, student body president, spoke, expressing the student body's gratitude for Mother Teegarden's work at the college.

A variety show was staged that night. Students of both the women's and men's college presented talent acts.

Colleges Set Admissions Rule Shifts

3 Will Tighten Requirements; Fee Increases Slated

Three San Diego higher institutions will revise their admissions policies for students entering next fall and additional changes will take the form of increased tuition and fees.

A survey of five higher institutions also showed they either expect, or hope, enrollments will climb from 26,854 this year to about 27,770 in September.

One institution—San Diego State — expects to turn away 1,000 students applying for dormitory space, and California Western University for the first time expects full occupancy of its dormitories.

RULE CHANGES SET

It will cost more to attend the University of San Diego's separately organized College for Men and College for Women, California Western and for non-residents to enroll at San Diego State.

Admissions requirements are being changed at Cal Western and tightened at San Diego City College and the two USD colleges. Tightened requirements are forecast at San Diego State for fall 1963.

SDS, which began the academic year with 12,500 students, expects 500 more next fall. Fees required of non-residents, now \$8.50 a unit or a maximum of \$127.50 a semester, will go up to \$12 a unit with a top of \$180.

Non-residents are persons under 21 whose parents or guardian have not resided in California for at least a year.

MUST TAKE TEST

SDS dormitories, with a capacity of 1,050, rejected 700 would-be residents last summer and now have a waiting list of 300. Housing Director John M. Yarborough predicts 1,000 turn-aways this summer.

California Western, elected to membership in the College Entrance Examination Board in October, will follow membership requirements that applicants take the CEEB's scholastic aptitude test for admission.

The university, however, will continue to regard an applicant's four-year high school record as an important entry criterion.

Cal Western tuition, now \$390 a semester or \$780 a year, will go up to \$500 a semester or \$1,000 a year. Freshman applications, 50 per cent higher than last year, cause officials to predict enrollment will rise from this year's 1,800 to 2,100 in 1962-63.

TUITION BOOST

At USD, the College for Men will require higher grade point averages and test scores than in previous years. Precise requirements have not been fully approved.

Tuition, now \$300 for 12 to 16 units, will be changed to \$325 a semester for 11 to 17 units. For each unit over 17

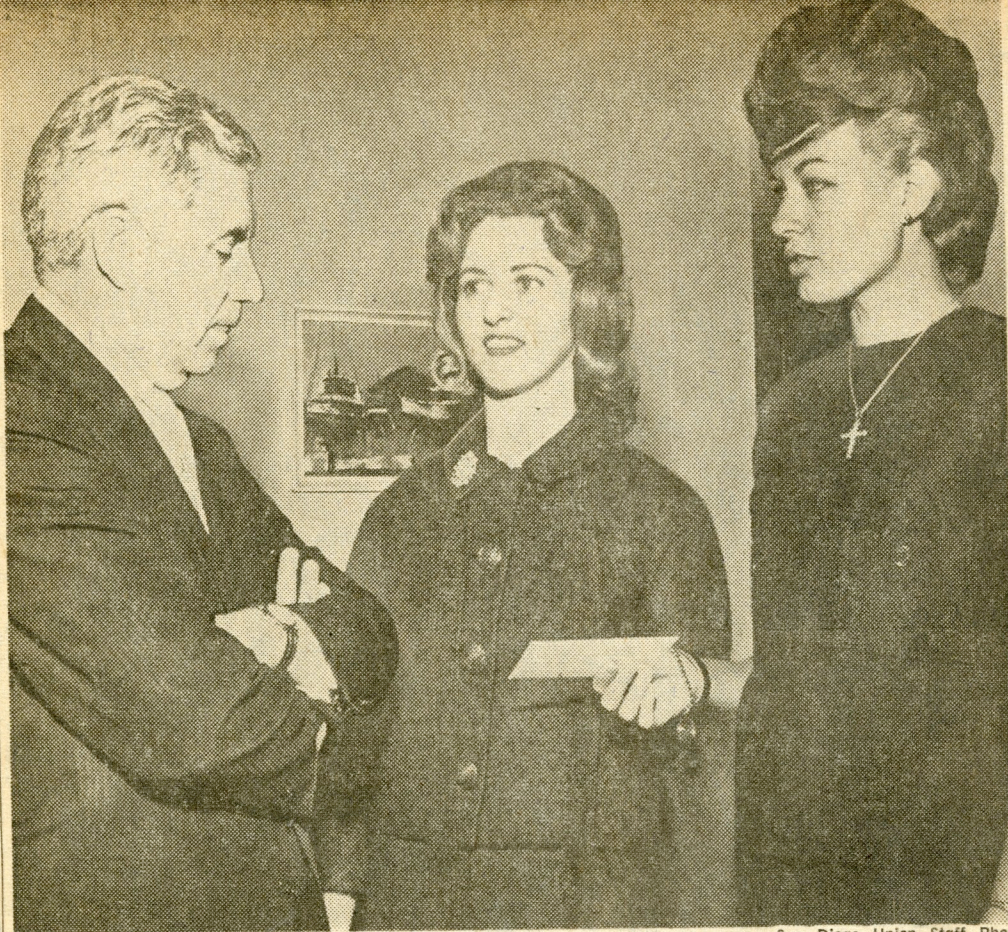

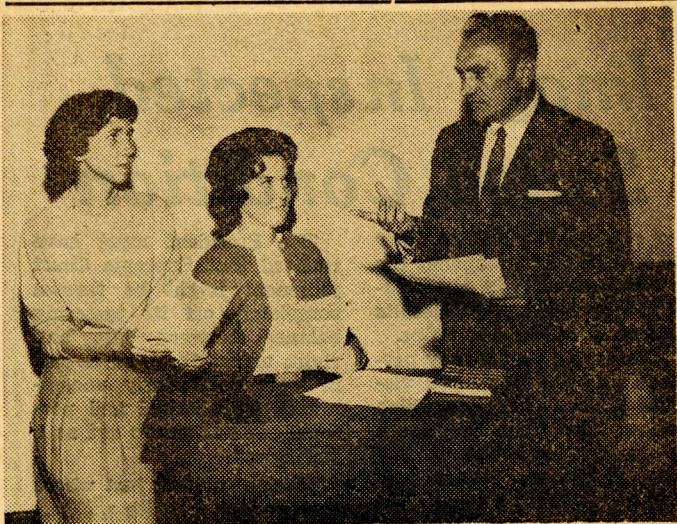

Delegation Sent To 'United Nations'

The University of San Diego College for Women has sent a delegation representing the Republic of El Salvador to the Model United Nations which is meeting in El Cortez Hotel until Saturday.

Kathleen Day, a junior political science major, was elected chairman of the delegation.

Beverly Snow, a graduate student in Spanish, is co-chairman. Patricia Buckley, a junior history major, is secretary.

Ninety-six colleges from seven western states are participating in the four-day conference. Over a thousand student-delegates will represent the 104 member countries of the United Nations. This is the largest of six Model United Nations that will be held throughout the United States this spring.

Resolutions have been submitted for inclusion on the agenda of the 12th session to the Special Political Committee, the Political and Security Committee, the Economic and Social Council, the Administrative and Budgetary Committee, and the Full Disarmament Commission.

The resolution presented by El Salvador to the Special Political Committee calls for the ineligibility of the People's Republic of China for membership in the United Nations.

A resolution calling for respect of fundamental rights of the Tibetan people is submitted to the Political and Security Committee.

The Economic and Social

Council is receiving a resolution concerned with the denial of basic human rights to the captive nations of the Sino-Soviet bloc.

The Disarmament Commission resolution calls for a law governing outer space, declaring use of this area for military purposes illegal.

El Salvador's final resolution is presented to the Administrative and Budgetary Committee calling for the establishment of a committee to collect membership dues and to determine action to be taken against delinquent nations.

3 Plan Summer Stay In Mexico Jungles

"It is one of those places that hang on to you."

That's the way Mrs. Karena Shields describes the jungles of Southern Mexico near the Guatemala border.

And the professor of anthropology and sociology at the College for Women this Sunday will start the long trip to the plantation she has in that

jungle land. She will be accompanied by Penny Nutting and Jeannette Leavenworth, two students at the College for Women.

Living is rugged in the primitive, dense jungles, and Mrs. Shields has warned the collegians they will not be on a picnic for the next three months.

But Mrs. Shields loves the place—it's home to her. The plantation was owned by her father and she spent her childhood there. She learned to speak Mayan language at an early age, and the Indians there consider her as "one of the Family."

Mrs. Shields will take a supply of medicines with her, and the plantation will serve as an emergency medical station for the Indians of the surrounding mountain area.

Thus she has earned the name of "La Gringa Bruga"—witch doctor. And because of her fair complexion, they consider her "a real freak," Mrs. Shields says.

The biggest problem now are the communists who have infiltrated the jungle area. "And it doesn't take many of them to stir up trouble," Mrs. Shields said.

Shields says.

Usually she gets a great welcome—fireworks and all—when she returns to the plantation. But on a recent visit her life was in jeopardy.

The communists had been reading a book to the Indians which told of the way the Americans had massacred so many Mexicans. As a result, her old Indian friends had lost all love for her.

Finally seeing the book, Mrs. Shields discovered it was the story of the Alamo—without any dates.

There are no priests in the area and a 12-hour horseback

ride is required to reach the nearest church.

"The girls during the visit will learn to respect the thinking of other people and learn how they act and feel in their most primitive surroundings," Mrs. Shields said. "And the Indians should have a chance to see an American or two to appreciate our way."

"The Indians there are not really underprivileged. They have pride and joy—they laugh a lot. They are a very intelligent people. Of course there also are a lot of bad ones," Mrs. Shields said.

Life will be rugged but it should be a rewarding experience for two college girls who will learn to know and like strange customs hidden in the jungles of Southern Mexico.

2 Coeds Plan Mission To Mayans

How many coeds would choose to spend summer vacation 12 hours by horseback from the nearest town in an area bordered by an alligator-infested river and a snake-infested jungle?

Two who have made that choice are Veronica (Penny) Nutting, 20, and Jeanette Leavenworth, 20, both University of San Diego College for Women juniors, who will undertake a three-month mission to Mexico with Mrs. Karena Shields of the college faculty.

The three women will live in a thatched-roof house on a chocolate and coffee plantation in a nearly inaccessible jungle in the state of Chiapas on the Guatemalan border.

Mrs. Shields was brought up on the plantation, which belonged to her father, and has worked for the past 25 years with the Mayans who live in the mountains virtually untouched by the outside world.

Until joining the college faculty four years ago, she lived there

year-round. Since then she has spent her summers there.

An instructor of anthropology and sociology at the college, Mrs. Shields is also trained in medicine and will operate a medical station on the plantation to treat the Mayans, who are 14 hours away from the nearest doctor.

Penny and Jeanette will assist her at the station and will also undertake a field project in ethnology, for which they will receive college credit. The girls, both social science majors, call this their "private peace corps."

The three adventurers will leave Sunday to fly to Villa Hermosa in Tabasco, which is 300 miles "as the crow flies" from their destination. The rest of the trip will be by railroad, dugout canoe and horseback, a 10-day journey in all.

For three months Penny and Jeanette will be masquerading as Mrs. Shield's "nieces." She explains, "The people resent any outsider. The girls will have to learn to get along with them."

Where will they be when they reach their destination? Approximately 13 degrees north of the equator in an area of 3,000 foot altitude, where civilization as we know it does not exist.

Food will be scarce. "I lose 20 pounds each time I go down there," says Mrs. Shields. Their staples will be fresh fruits grown on the plantation and wild boar, deer, chickens and "whatever else we shoot."

Mrs. Shields describes the Mayans as "Hatfields and McCoy's." They frequently come to her with bullet wounds inflicted in inter-clan feuds. Broken bones and machete cuts also are common.

The Mayan women are a hearty lot. Mrs. Shields recalls one native who brought his wife to the medical station, explaining, "She must be sick. We walked 35 miles and she sat down twice."

But Penny and Veronica are undaunted. "I'm terribly excited," says Penny. "I just can't think about anything else."

Returning to California, Mother Wolff-Salin spent a year at the order's Convent of the Sacred Heart in El Cajon. She later moved to the USD College for Women to begin studies for a master of arts degree in philosophy which was awarded to her Sunday in the commencement exercise.

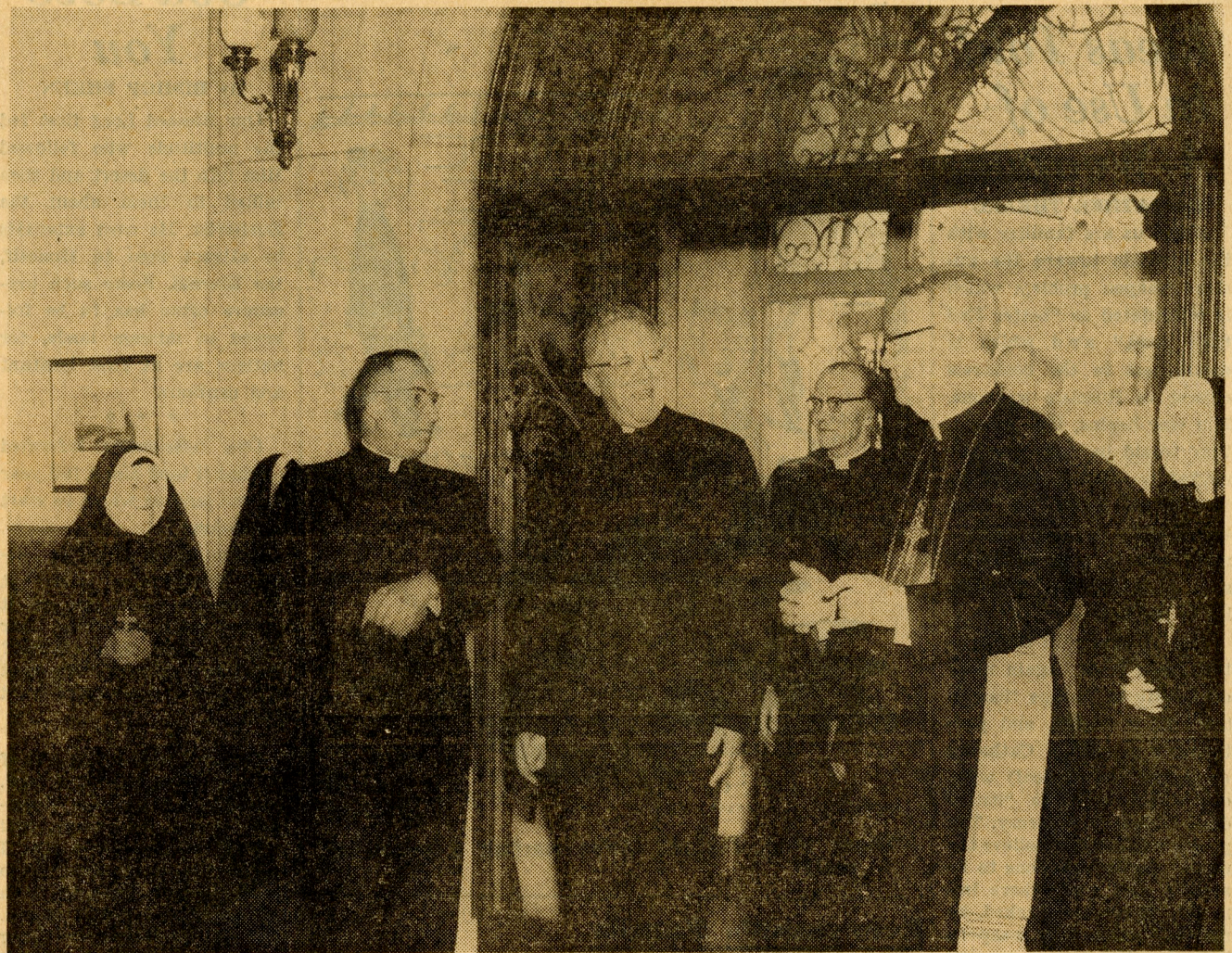
