Students Attend

Her greeting at the University was an impressive one. Students dressed in caps and gowns waved American flags in the stiff breeze as her chauffeured car wound up the hill to the Immaculata Chapel.

A solemn benediction, celebrated by Bishop Charles Francis Buddy, followed his official welcome to her. A procession to the College for Women closed the ceremony.

She will stay there five days, conferring with the college officials. Then she will go to El Cajon for a five day visit to the elementary and high school there.

At the airport she seemed especially touched by the greeting, in French, of four tots from the El Cajon school's nursery, Roberta, 4, and Kristie Korte, 3, and Matthew, 4, and Mark Bacino, 3.

The children, dressed in crisp, blue and white school uniforms, presented her with nosegays in their school colors of red and white, and were rewarded with a kiss and hug.

Accompanying Mother de Valon were two companions, Rev. Mother Maria Josefa Bulto, assistant general in charge of the Spanish speaking schools, and Mother Gisela Posada, treasurer general.

Rev. Mother Bulto, who is Spanish and Mother Posada, who is Cuban, were greeted in their native tongue by Spanish speaking students, including Catalina and Eva Cruz from Chihuahua, Carmen Puga of Lima, Peru, and Beatriz de la Vega of Tijuana.

French Is Used

Each of the visiting nuns received giant bouquets of red roses from the alumnae of the Sacred Heart who reside in San Diego. The presentations were made by Mmes. Frank J. Ragen, Thomas Finn, Michael Herill and Shaun McElhatton.

Students at the College for Women have prepared, in French, the official language of the Sacred Heart Order, a history of Father Junipero Serra, which was presented in the college theater today.

When she goes to El Cajon, Rev. Mother de Valon will view a history of El Cajon Valley from the days of the dons, with performances in French by the students there.

Rev. Mother de Valon's visit marks the first visit by a superior general to the west coast of the United States since 1914.

Greeted by flag-waving students of the College for Women who were dressed in cap and gowns and lined both sides of Marian Way in Alcala Park, Very Rev. Mother Sabine de Valon, superior general of the Society of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, was given a heart-warming welcome here Tuesday.

The Most Reverend Bishop greeted Mother De Valon in front of the Immaculata on her arrival for her canonical visit to members of the society who staff the College for Women. Joining in the welcome were a number of prelates and priests and seminarians.

It was the first West Coast visit since 1914 of a superior general of the society. The last visit was made by Very Rev. Mother Janet Erskine Stuart.

3 Juniors *Apr. 11 1963* Plan Work At Oak Ridge

Three juniors at the San Diego College For Women have been admitted to the 1963 Summer Student Trainee Program of the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies.

Witchcraft Lecture Slated at College

The San Diego College for Women will continue its series of faculty lectures at 8 p.m. Wednesday, May 8, when Karena Shields speaks on "Witchcraft Among the Maya: The Tragedy of Acculturation."

Mrs. Shields, who is an experienced anthropologist and sociologist, received her Bachelor of Science Degree in Education at San Jose State College and a Bachelor of Arts Degree at the University of Southern California. She was awarded a Masters Degree at the University of Mexico and is an instructor in the social sciences at the San Diego College For Women.

The authority with which Mrs. Shields speaks about acculturation among the Maya is based upon her own experience with these people in the Chiapas and Guatemala areas. She has worked

with the Mayans since her early childhood and has witnessed their customs and traditions in districts beyond frequented frontiers.

In recent years, Mrs. Shields has been making a study of the transition of the Maya from ancient to modern ways. Her lecture will be based on the effects of this transition that has come upon a proud and intelligent people as the result of the Spanish conquest and of communistic infiltration.

The lecture is open to the public.

Women's College^{6/13/63} Students Honored

Undergraduate awards have been won by several students of the San Diego College for Women. Marita Angleton has been appointed student trainee at Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies, Medical Division, where she will be trained this summer to use radioactive tracers in a medical research program.

Francis Brescia also has been appointed student trainee at the Oak Ridge Institute where she will do a radioactive research project in the Health Physics Division.

A third student in the same program is Patricia Murphy, awarded a 1963 Summer Student Traineeship. These three students are seniors at the College for Women.

Karen Graham, a junior at the college, has been granted a student research associate grant for the summer by the California Heart Association. She will do a medical research problem in San Francisco, either at the University of California Medical Center or at Mount Zion Hospital.

Several of the 1963 graduates have received fellowships. Among them are Margaret McCarthy, awarded a graduate fellowship in biochemistry at the University of California Medical Center, Los Angeles, where she will pursue studies toward a graduate degree preparatory to teaching.

Rosa Yamada has won graduate fellowships in biochemistry at the University of Southern California and at the University of California at Los Angeles, and in physical chemistry at the University of California at La Jolla. She also has been awarded a training assistantship in biochemistry at the University of California, San Francisco.

Alma Lujan has been awarded a graduate assistantship in zoology by Los Angeles State College and another in microbiology at University of Southern California. Eloisa Sanchez has been accepted for medical internship at Sharp Hospital.

A teaching assistantship in French has been received by Jeannette Leavenworth from University of Southern California and the University of California at Los Angeles.

Kathleen Day has been accepted at Stanford Law School and at the law school at University of California at Los Angeles. Carolyn Sutton also has been accepted by Stanford Law School and Georgetown in Washington, D.C.

Mary Olive Chambers has been accepted by the Graduate School of the University of Minnesota in the field of English literature.

At the graduation exercises, four of the graduating seniors were received into Kappa Gamma Pi national Catholic Honor Society. They were Barbara Dubois, Martha Spiers Kaufer, Norma Peck, and Rosa Yamada. Sarita Doyle receiver from this same Honor Society the Corcoran Award, given each year to the sophomore outstanding both in intellectual and leadership achievements.

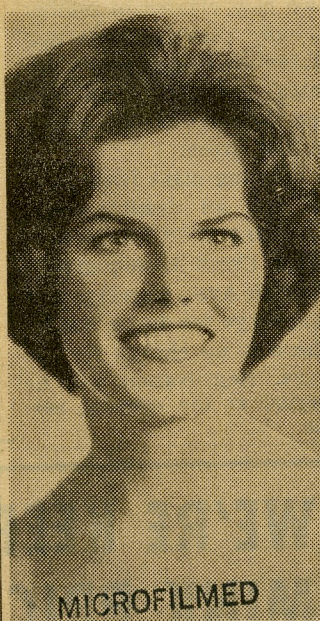

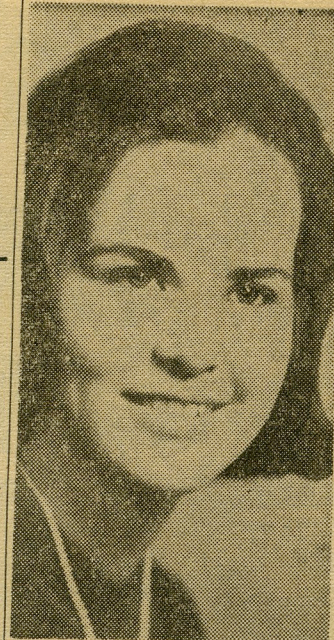

Teachers Begin Summer Studies

School may be out for the summer, but at the San Diego College for Women about 450 teachers are hitting the books hard.

They are nuns whose assignments put them in elementary and high school and in some cases college classrooms most of the year. They are using the summer months to brush up on their own educations or, in some cases,

Subjects Listed

A few samples:

Ancient Latin authors Plautus and Terence and 19th-century French novels and Spanish poets.

History, European and American; political science and government. Chemistry, quantitative analysis, geography and psychology. Gregorian, polyphonic and 20th-century music.

Elementary school reading problems and the Schott method of mathematics. General psychology and the psychology of personality.

Exception Made

Practically everything is included except what the layman might think of first in connection with studies in a Catholic college.

There are no classes in religion, except as religion is involved in one three-unit course in logic, Mother Danz reported.

The nuns face one problem in common with students everywhere. Final exams will be held Aug. 1 and 2.

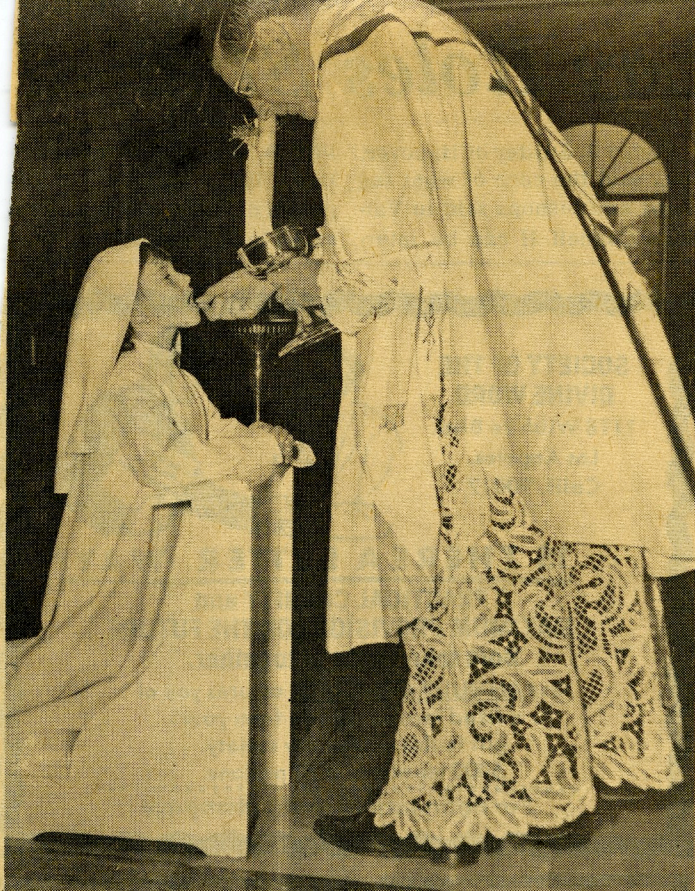

An informal reception will be held after the graduation in the foyer of More Hall. Members of the Law Wives Club will serve refreshments.

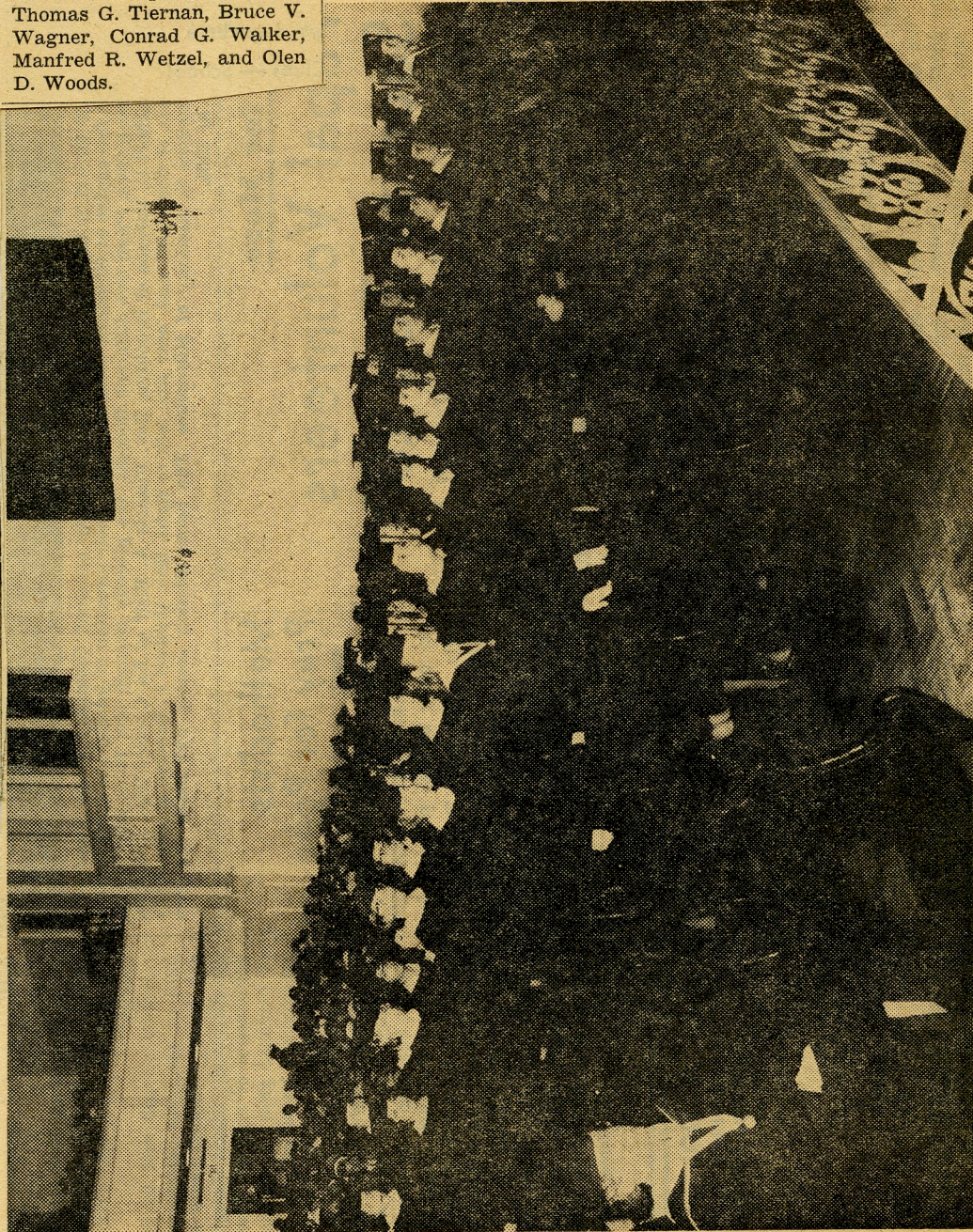
