Analysis of Student/Faculty Statistics

Attached at the back of these *Newsnotes*, for your information, are two pages summarizing and interrelating for the current semester (Spring, 1999) courses offered, class enrollments, average students per course, student units generated, FTE faculty, student/faculty ratio, etc. W have published comparable information each Fall semester since 1972, and each Spring semester since 1974.

The student/faculty statistics need some explanation, and you are asked to read the data in the light of the annotations which follow:

- 1. The data is based on enrollment statistics received from the Registrar's Office in February, 1999.
- 2. Figures are comparable to those of prior years, since the same basis was used for figuring out the statistics.
- 3. The official student/faculty ratio figure is Column N or Column M (if one does not include sabbaticals). Both Columns M and N include administrative time (such as department chairships) and any special project time as well as instructional time. However, Column L which gives an instructional student/faculty ratio is included also, since the comparison between Column L and Columns M and N indicates the effect of faculty administrative time on the student/faculty ratio.
- 4. The administrative time of the Deans and Associate Deans of the five Schools/College is not included anywhere in the chart; their instructional time is included, in that the student units are counted, but the FTE faculty is not increased by virtue of the fact that a Dean or Associate Dean is teaching a course.
- 5. The formula for determining the number of classes, and hence the average students per class, for laboratory courses counts each lab section of a course with several labs as a class section but does not count the lecture as a class. Courses with lecture and single associated lab are counted as one class. This only affects figures in Columns A and C for those departments offering lab courses.
- For some Honors Program and interdisciplinary courses, each faculty member received three units of faculty load credit and student credit hours were divided evenly among the two disciplines which the faculty members represented.

Note: One key element in student/faculty statistics is not reflected on a chart such as this, namely, the advising load. A discipline may have a fairly high student/faculty ratio, but a small number of majors for its faculty members to advise. Another discipline may have the same or smaller student/faculty ratio, along with a hundred or more majors to advise.

Office for Community Service-Learning

A USD team presented findings from a National Community Development Program at a Washington DC "Summit on Civic Partnerships," February 17-19. Suzanne Love, a USD senior and service-learning leader, Bob Feinberg, Twain Junior/Senior High School teacher, and Judy Rauner, Director of the Office for Community Service-Learning, gave a panel presentation and served as resources throughout the Summit. Participants in the Summit included: major funders of service-learning initiatives - Housing and Urban Development, the Corporation for National Service, Surdna Foundation, and Ford Foundation program directors; Executive officers of national service-learning organizations, Campus Compact, the National Society for Experiential Education, COOL (Campus Outreach Opportunity League), and Learn and Serve America. Gettysburg College, North Carolina Central University, and USD were the three institutions of higher learning chosen for the three-year program.

Student Affairs

The Associated Students experienced an exciting and productive year. Adopting the theme of "Momentum," the Executive Board, Senators, and Directors provided their fellow students and the campus community with a variety of programs and services that increased in quality and content throughout the 1998-1999 academic year.

A.S. officers had the opportunity to co-sponsor a number of programs with academic departments and faculty members. Particularly memorable were the Catholics in Film Symposium held in conjunction with A.S. Film Forum and Dr. Ken Serbin of the History Department, and two recent panel discussions focusing upon the war in Kosovo and the Littleton, Colorado tragedy that featured collaborative efforts between A.S. Academic Programming and Dr. Larry Hinman of the Values Institute.

Student government officers were also active in this year's celebration of USD's 50th Anniversary. A.S. President Kristen Jones served as a member of the 50th Anniversary General Committee. Two large-scale student programs were staged; the Amazing Jonathan Show in Shiley Theatre and the Reel Big Fish Concert on West Point Field. Both events were extremely successful and were enjoyed by students, faculty, and staff as well as guests from the greater San Diego area. Finally, the Alcalá Yearbook dedicated its 1999 edition to Dr. Alice Hayes for her dedication to the University and her ability to provide both a sense of tradition and future vision for the institution.

Awards are distributed by country and region, vary in activity and length of stay, are sometimes tied to very specific appointments, and at other times are unrestricted. Prescribed awards, particularly for lecturing, identify areas of specialization, host institutions affiliation, and the type and level of the Fulbright assignment. These awards generally reflect the priorities and special interests of the host country and universities. Open awards, titled in various ways across country and regional programs, allow candidates to propose their own lecturing or research endeavors and host affiliations. Areas of specialization represented by the prescribed awards in this region include: business, economics, business administration, marketing, communications, information technology; management, public health, art, political science, law, computer science, and electrical engineering.
