Abstract

Is your institution planning or hoping to plan a beprexit? If so, you are not alone. Many colleges and universities are seeking alternatives to Digital Commons since the August 2017 acquisition of bepress by Elsevier. The Statewide California Electronic Library Consortium (SCELC) Institutional Repository (IR) Subcommittee formed in late 2017 to perform an environmental scan of current and emerging institutional repository platforms and the ways in which they meet the needs and match the values of SCELC member institutions, the majority of which are small to midsize private colleges and universities that do not have the staff or infrastructure to build or support a homegrown or Open Source IR. The SCELC IR Subcommittee members represent a range of institutions, some that have Digital Commons, some that have another IR platform, and some that don't yet have, but want, an IR.

Subcommittee members evaluated IR solutions from companies such as TIND and Ubquity Press and consortia such as LYRASIS. Because the turnkey IR platform solution space is still emerging, the SCELC IR Subcommittee also investigated current consortial projects. PALNI and PALCI, consortia similar to SCELC based in Indiana and Pennsylvania, are working with a developer to improve Hyku for the consortial IR environment. This session will educate attendees about for-profit, non-profit, and consortial options in today's IR landscape, as well as provide information regarding the IR needs and preferences of SCELC member organizations.

Abstract

The University of North Texas Health Science Center (UNTHSC) approached the Texas Digital Library (TDL) in 2018 about migrating their scholarly repository from Bepress Digital Commons to a new DSpace 6.x instance hosted by TDL. In the course of this project TDL developed a workflow for the repository migration that included: using Amazon Web Services for digital object storage; developing code for preprocessing, metadata mapping, and generating DSpace item packages; and incorporating existing DSpace import tooling for repository data. In collaboration with UNTHSC, TDL staff created a process for converting a community/collection hierarchy built in a spreadsheet to an XML-formatted structure suitable for import into DSpace. Additionally, TDL developed code to create Simple Archive Format packages for digital objects in the repository that incorporated 1) a metadata crosswalk (also built in collaboration with UNTHSC staff), 2) data about the repository harvested from its OAI-PMH feed, and 3) the metadata and digital objects themselves located in S3. Finally, TDL worked with UNTHSC staff to customize the configuration and look-and-feel of the new DSpace instance to meet their needs. This presentation will discuss in detail our Bepress to DSpace migration from initial design, to the project execution, including successes and challenges, to the conclusion and assessment of the project deliverables. TDL will lay out our experiences from throughout the collaborative process, what we learned along the way, and offer suggestions for others considering similar migration projects.



Successes

- Migrated ~3,700 items w/metadata and supporting objects
- Developed workflow using existing DSpace tooling, spreadsheets, and custom Ruby to "glue" the steps together
- Achieved repository alignment with an open, supportive consortium

Challenges



- New items and metadata edits were delayed to bepress Archive
- Metadata in the <u>bepress</u> Archive lacked key fields like type and format








PALCI and PALNI Receive IMLS Grant to Develop the Hyku Open Source Institutional Repository

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) has awarded \$172,172 to the Pennsylvania Academic Library Consortium, Inc. (PALCI) in partnership with the Private Academic Library Network of Indiana (PALNI) for Scaling Up a Collaborative Consortial Institutional Repository as part of the National Leadership Grants for Libraries Program. IMLS received 138 preliminary proposals requesting more than \$33 million in funding, and selected 36 applicants to receive awards during this grant cycle. With this award, the partners will develop and pilot an affordable, open-source, and collaborative institutional repository solution based on the Hyku software.



SCELC IR Interest Check Survey Preliminary Results






Are you planning to leave your current platform vendor and/or get a new institutional repository solution? (69 responses)
