Jose Macedo, Engineering Department, co-authored the paper "Ladar-based Discrimination of Grass from Obstacles for Autonomous Navigation," published in *Experimental Robotics VII*, edited by Daniela Rus and Sanjiv Singh, Springer - LNCIS, Lecture Notes in Control and Information Sciences, pp. 111-120, 2001. Co-authors were R. Manduchi and L. Matthies from the Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL-NASA) in Pasadena.

Dr. Macedo organized and conducted a two-day workshop on LabView and computer vision for industrial inspection. The workshop was offered at USD on January 19 and 26 to engineers from the San Diego area.
