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

Student Development Annual Student Activities Interest Survey

On August 31, 2004 the Office of Student Affairs administered for the 31st year an interest survey to 1039 freshmen. This survey contains two sections: the first, asking student to indicate their interests in being involved in various aspects of campus life during their first year; the second, asking them to indicate their expectations for learning and personal development.

Comparing this year's results to the previous year, this freshman class expressed more interest in joining fraternities and sororities (+3%), joining student government (+4%), participating in professional/honorary associations (+2%), participating in the multicultural center (+4%), participating in multicultural organizations (+3%), attending sessions on social and political topics (+2%), and attending large concerts featuring well known performers (+9%).

In section two regarding developmental expectations, incoming students expressed an interest in the development in personal skills including the ability to write, verbal and non-verbal communication skills, and learning to cope successfully with stressful situations. Making connections/friendships with other students topped the list.

Dr. Neu has been invited to serve as a grant reviewer for the Hansen Institute for World Peace, San Diego.

Richard Seer, Director of Graduate Theatre, has directed a production of Steven Dietz's Fiction for the Old Globe Theatre. This production was the West Coast premiere of the Seattle playwright's three-character drama. In April, he will direct the Globe production of the Olivier Award-winning play, Vincent in Brixton, by Nicholas Wright.
