



Kyoto Prize Winner to Speak at USD

The Sixth Kyoto Prize Laureate Seminars will be held March 14-16, 2007. As usual, the recipients are people of unusual accomplishment and character. You, your students and your friends are invited to attend. Information on all events may be found at www.kyotoprize.org. The seminars are free, but you must register at this site in advance. You may register a group, simply by giving the number of people, or as an individual.

USD will host the winner of the Kyoto Prize in Arts and Philosophy again this year. The Prize field is Design. The recipient is Mr. Issey Miyake. He will give a presentation at USD on March 16 at 3:30 p.m. in Shiley Theatre.

I urge you to encourage your students to go to this presentation and to go yourself. I found his presentation in Kyoto fascinating. Hearing him is the sort of exposure that broadens student's perceptions of the many ways to make a positive impact on the world.

Many people know Miyake by his popular perfume. However, he has long been a force in the Clothing Design field. Miyake characterizes himself as a designer, and says that fashion is about making money, but design is about art. Indeed, his creations are exhibited in art galleries around the world, recently his work was featured at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

Miyake's citation reads, "A designer who uses innovative technology to create clothing from the fundamental concept of "a piece of cloth," and who consistently creates garments that can be incorporated into people's lives, cutting across both time and national boundaries."

Yvette M. Fontaine, director of the Office of International Services and adjunct faculty in the SOLES counseling program, and Minh-Ha Hoang, associate director of Admissions, gave a presentation titled "Working with Refugees in our Schools" at the Eighth Annual Forum on the State of California Counseling and Guidance in San Diego Schools.

Jan Gist, Dramatic Arts, joined a select group of American Theatre Voice and Speech teachers who traveled to Moscow last October to present workshops for the students and faculty at the Moscow Art Theatre. Gist presented a workshop on breath expansion and support, showing students the proper techniques of breath endurance and tone resonation.

Gist also traveled to London in early January to participate in a round table discussion with the top voice and speech teachers of Great Britain and various other European countries. The panel addressed present concerns within the dramatic arts discipline, and defined the scope and direction of future cross-cultural conferences. Gist also worked with undergraduate and graduate students from the Central School of Speech and Drama on approaches to Shakespeare, and presented a paper on the skills and challenges necessary for successful writing and publishing within the industry.

Kathleen Kramer, Engineering Programs, has co-authored (with Stephen C. Stubberud of Rockwell Collins, Inc.) "Data Association for Multiple Sensor Types Using Fuzzy Logic" that appeared in the December issue of *IEEE Transactions on Instrumentation and Measurement*. This work develops a method of emulating the chi-squared metric for measurements and tracks that may be non-Gaussian.

Louise Stanger, director of Alcohol and Other Drug Services, will be a featured speaker at the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) Strategies Conference for Alcohol Abuse Prevention and Intervention on Feb. 1-3 at the Sheraton Atlanta Hotel in Atlanta, Ga. The three-day conference will bring together senior-level campus administrators, prevention and education staff, and researchers from the alcohol and other drug arena to focus on sharing information and advancing knowledge about alcohol and other drug use at colleges and universities.
