FALL SERIES OF MICROCOMPUTER COURSE BEGINS AT U.S.D. OCTOBER 1

"Computer Resources for Educators," a series of one-day courses to train educators and administrators in the use of microcomputers begins its Fall program at the University of San Diego on Saturday, October 1.

Tuition fees are \$65 per course, with an additional \$25 for courses involving hands-on computer work. All courses in the series sponsored by U.S.D.'s School of Education and Continuing Education may be taken individually or as a part of the Graduate Certificate Program. All classes in the series are from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. On Saturday, October 1, "Introduction to the Use of Microcomputers in Education Settings," provides the person with no previous microcomputer experience the opportunity to discuss advantages and disadvantages of microcomputer use, learn to operate a microcomputer and to write a simple program in the BASIC language.

"Introduction to Visicalc," is scheduled for Saturday, October 8. This course is designed as an introduction to the use of financial modeling techniques in business and education settings. Students will be given the opportunity to design their own applications.

On Saturday, October 22, "Introduction to the Use of LOGO," provides an introduction to the use of APPLE LOGO with hands-on experience with turtle graphics and list processing.

The series of microcomputer courses continues through January with courses offered November 5, "Introduction to the Use of Authoring Languages"; November 19, "APPLE PILOT"; December 3, "Word Processing for Educators"; January 21, "Microcomputer Application for Special Educators" and "Microcomputer Applications for Counselors."
