JUSTICE MOSK, SKELLY WRIGHT TO HEADLINE USD FOREIGN PROGRAMS

California Supreme Court Justice Stanley Mosk and J. Skelly Wright, chief judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the district court circuit, will join the faculty of the University of San Diego law school in its summer European programs.

Justice Mosk will teach in Dublin, where the program concentrates on international human rights problems. His course will discuss the use of international human rights norms in state court litigation in federal systems. Mosk has served on the court for more than a decade and is the author of some of its most important decisions in fields as diverse as criminal procedure and commercial law, according to USD law professor Herbert I. Lazerow, director of the Institute on International Law which offers the overseas programs.

Judge Wright, well-known for his opinions in *Edward v. Habib* and numerous administrative law decisions, will co-teach comparative administrative law in Paris with California Western professor Therese de Saint Phalle. The course will compare administrative law in the United States with that in France, which has been the model for much of European administrative law.

Now in its twelfth year, the Institute also offers summer programs in Mexico City, treating law of the Americas; Oxford, on Anglo-American comparative law; London, on international business transactions; and Russia and Poland, dealing with socialist law and East-West trade.

"This year," says Lazerow, "students can participate in clinical programs where they receive actual lawyering experience in London on international business transactions and English advocacy, in Dublin on international human rights and Irish general practice, and in Mexico City on inter-American legal affairs."

Last summer's programs, the director said, attracted 325 students, a record enrollment. Participants included U.S. law students, lawyers, judges, and graduate students in international relations and attorneys and students from 12 foreign countries.
