SALT I CHIEF NEGOTIATOR, UCSD PROF.
SPEAK ON NUCLEAR ARMS PROLIFERATION

Gerald Johnson, chief negotiator for President Lyndon Johnson at the SALT I talks, and UC San Diego Professor G. Allen Greb will discuss "The Impact of a Nuclear Test Ban Treaty on the Proliferation Problem" from 5-7 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 1, at the University of San Diego.

The talk is co-sponsored by Students Active for Nuclear Disarmament and the local chapter of the United Nations Association.

Johnson, a physicist who currently works for TRW in Redondo Beach, was associate director for nuclear weapons testing from 1953-56 at Lawrence Livermore Laboratories.

During the Kennedy Administration, Johnson served as assistant to the Secretary of Defense for Atomic Affairs.

Greb has written extensively on national security and arms control policy. He was chairman of the UCSD Ground Zero Coordinating Committee and assistant director of the UC Institute on Global Conflict and Cooperation.

Greb developed and taught courses on the nuclear arms race, U.S. national security policies and the history of Soviet-American relations as it pertains to nuclear arms control negotiations.

The talk will take place at the Manchester Executive Conference Center auditorium. The second hour is reserved for a question-answer session.
